TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

ROW IN THE LEGISLATURE.

Victoria, Feb. 25.—There was a disgraceful scene in the legislature yesterday afternoon. Richard McBride, leader of the opposition, Joseph Martin, leader of the party formerly the opposition, but which voted with the government last session, and Smith Curtis, formerly Martin's first lieutenant, engaged in what nearly averted being a fist fight. It was over the seat in the house usually allotted to the leader of the opposition. McBride took it when he entered the chamber, and when Martin arrived there was a wordy war. McBride held the seat until the chaplain rose to read the prayers. The new leader of the opposition rose also, and Martin slipped into the chair. Smith Curtis threw him back, and Martin's followers sprang forward. It came within an ace of being a fist fight, resulting in a war of words, the discussion lasting all the afternoon. Finally, by motion, the members were ordered to take their old seats.

RESIST STUMPAGE CHARGE.

Greenwood, Feb. 25.—Two interesting test cases will come before Judge Leamy today. C. J. Martin, purporting to represent J. Murray, provincial timber inspector, has made demands upon Chinamen selling firewood for the payment of stumpage fees and threatening seizure of their cordwood and teams in event of their failing to make payment. The Chinamen have brought action to test the right of the government to collect stumpage on wood cut on mineral claims. It is significant that both mining companies and private individuals are protesting against this levying on wood and timber cut on mineral claims, but they left it to the Chinamen to resist payment and bring action to test the validity of the impost.

As evidence of the unusual mildness of the season, visitors from Boundary Falls and Midway state that buttercups are now blooming in those places.

TYRANT WEYLER AGAIN.

London, Feb. 25.—It is announced in a special dispatch from Madrid that General Weyler, the war minister, is urging the queen regent to give him a free hand in dealing with "the rebels in Catalonia," and that Premier Sagasta threatens to resign if General Weyler's request is granted. The queen regent is said to favor General Weyler's plan.

EXTENSION MINE TO OPEN.

Nanaimo, Feb. 25.—An attempt, it is reported, is about to be made to open No. 3 slope, Extension. With the fine weather only what water is

pumped enters the slope, and leaks through the crevices of the rocks near the stoping in the tunnel further reduces this. It is believed that about 230 feet perpendicular height of water is now in the mines, and that probably the fire is out. The management may adopt a plan of opening the stopings of No. 3 slope at any time and investigate.

ROYAL HORSE HONOR.

Ottawa, Feb. 25.—Dr. Steward Webb, the American palace car magistrate, has purchased from Lord Minto the four horses used to draw the Prince of Wales' carriage while in Canada.

PROMINENT MASON DEAD.

Montreal, Feb. 25.—R. C. White, founder of the Clyde Iron works, and a prominent Mason, died yesterday, aged 64.

BIG C. P. R. SHOPS.

Montreal, Feb. 25.—The capacity of the new Canadian Pacific shops here will be 120 locomotives per year, and from 20,000 to 25,000 cars per year.

G. J. BURY PROMOTED.

Montreal, Feb. 25.—G. J. Bury, Superintendent of the Crow's Nest Pass line, has been transferred to the position of assistant general superintendent of the Lake Superior division, with head quarters at North Bay.

GORED TO DEATH.

Niagara Falls, Feb. 25.—T. Zeig, a brother at the Carmelite monastery at Falls View, was killed by a vicious Jersey bull, which he was feeding. He was found dead with the bull standing over him.

VANCOUVER ITEMS.

Vancouver, Feb. 25.—Miss Jean Macfie, for eight years matron of the Vancouver city hospital, died yesterday at Pittsburg.

Free Masons from all over the province will send representatives here next month to lay the corner stone of the Carnegie library.

Blackburn, a boy aged seventeen, who is charged with stealing, was today identified as the person who made several holdups two months ago. Blackburn is a nephew of an English Judge, and will inherit fifty thousand dollars in two years.

TRYING TO STARVE HIMSELF.

Ottawa, Feb. 25.—Stanislaus Lacroix, the Montebello murderer, has eaten nothing since being informed of the government's refusal to commute death sentence to life imprisonment last Thursday, and is now in a serious condition. He positively refuses to eat. His death is looked for in a few days unless he alters his decision.

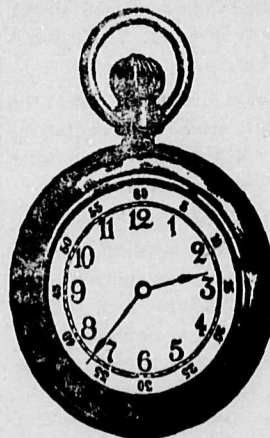

COLUMBIA, B. C.

Situation, Environments and General Resources.



The City of Columbia is situated near the junction of the North Forks of the Kettle river with the main Kettle river, and is distant about 300 miles east of Vancouver.

The natural situation of the city for beauty is not excelled in America. A verdure-clad and flower-bespangled rolling prairie, traversed by a river of bright, sparkling water, fringed with forest trees and surrounded by mountains, forming a charming combination of picturesqueness and grandeur.

The Columbia & Western railway, which was constructed by the Canadian Pacific Railway company, has its station, freight warehouse and yards in the center of Columbia, and the

Vancouver, Victoria & Eastern Railway company, has located its depot, freight sheds and yards along the east line of the corporation, thus giving the city connections with two trans-continental lines.

The Canadian Pacific railway company has large interests in the city, having selected the site on account of the superior natural advantages as a railway centre.

The climate, taken all the year around, is the best in Canada—part of the summer is rather hot and dry, but the rest of the year is enjoyable.

Throughout the Kettle River valley there is an extent of fertile agricultural land, part of which is now being cultivated.

Apples, plums, pears, prunes, cherries and all the small fruits grow abundantly. The valley surrounding Columbia, divided into small fruit and vegetable farms, will sustain a large population.

Building material is plentiful in the district. Lumber can be procured at fair prices, and brick lime and stone of good quality can always be obtained when required.

The mining interests are of the first importance to this country, and will do much to build up Columbia. Large mineral lodes have been discovered through the mountains adjacent to the city, and what were mere prospects a short time since are now large paying mines.

Water is supplied the city by pumping from a beautiful spring of exceptional purity, capable of supplying a city of 50,000 inhabitants.

The Granby smelter and converter—the most modern and perfect plant of the kind in America—employing hundreds of men, is contiguous to the city.

Owing to the fine climate, the central situation, the beautiful environments, the bright prospects for future growth and prosperity, Columbia will be an educational centre, a city of homes, as well as a wholesale distributing point; and when finally allied and wedded to her sister sister, will be the best and largest city in the interior.
