## PLEA FOR PROGRESS

### American Capital Needed to Develop Canadian Resources.

To the Editor of The Evening Sun.

To the general mind it would appear that certain men in authority would exclude from our territories, as a thing most vile, the Great Northern railway because it is presumably American capital, and because the overbearing Colossus—the C. P. R.—would then have to do a fair thing. They would say to alien capital: "Out on you! You, leech-like, would bleed us dead," and then, China-like, creep into their own dog kennel, and, because little can be seen through the small door, imagine the whole universe inside.

We have not in Canada today daring capital enough to develop our country abreast with other countries. Shall we then, as a country, sit down, a dumb, cold warehouse and store-room for future generations to dance around or feed upon, or shall we move forward, a nation among nations? Choosing the latter, we are compelled to seek capital where we will, and who has better right to invest in this Canada of ours than our own countryman, Mr. Hill? We must recognize the fact that Mr. Hill is largely independent of us, while we are largely dependent on him, or some other capitalist, to develop our country with fair rapidity.

If, as our authorities now view the matter, they see fit to exclude Mr. Hill and his railroad from our territories, why did they not make this injunction before so much work had been done by the Great Northern? The action, if it be only a show at opposition, is a high-handed piece; if real, it is disgraceful and unfair. Americans do not exclude from the eastern states Canadian roads, and why should Canada here drive out American roads? The Americans are progressive. Must we, then, lay behind because the men who have been entrusted with the country's welfare prove themselves imbecile, weak-eyed, maudlin?

It is disgraceful to any county or any government the actions of our present legislature, and the very idea

of an action being in the lobby of parliament at Ottawa to prevent the renewal, extension or second granting of the Hill charter is preposterous and shameful.

The present proceedings of the government is no voice of the people and should be fought down either with a newspaper war or open opposition. Today, let it be spoken to our shame, men still live in our fair Canada who can be bought or sold. Such principles had suited well the courtiers of a Stuart Court or sycophants in Louis XVI's ante-chambers, but out on men who have no more honor than can be bribed. If they continue to rule, Canada, hand-gyved and bound to the rock like fairest Andromeda, must weep heard only of earth and sky while Perseus is forbidden to set her free; her mountain wealth proving a Pandora's box filled with curses which otherwise had been blessings.

### HORRIFYING ACCIDENT.

Winnipeg, April, 16.—A sad tragedy occurred today at Overmore, about 20 miles from Emerson. Fred Franksy, a farmer, and his two small children, a girl aged five and an infant son, were severely burned, the children dying of their injuries in a few hours. The family residence took fire in the absence of the parents. Franksy returned in time to rescue the children, but the two youngest were fatally burned and Franksy himself was so badly burned that he is now in the hospital.

### NEWSPAPER POSTAL RATES.

Toronto, April 17.—Postmaster-general announces that the British postal authorities hold that no change could be made in the postal rates on newspapers without their consent, and that representations have been made to them in favor of reduction but their consent has not yet been obtained, their reply being that the British authorities did not see their way clear to make a reduction.

The opinion prevails to some extent that the local attorneys who have been retained by the opponents of the V., V. & E. are censurable for taking the fee and giving legal service for the Hot Air company, when the result of such service is conceded to be detrimental to the entire community. Some go so far as to charge damage against Columbia because these gentlemen reside here. In our way of viewing this matter the position is untenable and the claim groundless. They have a perfect right to engage their services in any legitimate law case. It might as well be said that no lawyer has a right to engage his services in defense of any person offending against the laws that make for the good of the community. While we deplore the actions of Holland in these railway matters as disastrous to the twin cities at this time, as do nine-tenths of their citizens, Messrs. Clement & Spence have only done what any sensible barrister would do under like circumstances, and justifiable in doing.

As we understand it, the V., V. & E. matter before the Ottawa railway committee last Tuesday was a proposed bill to establish the validity of that company's charter, which was in dispute, that question having been raised by the Hot Air promoters, backed by the C. P. R. The passage of this bill by the parliamentary railway committee insures its adoption by parliament, probably without any alteration, and action must soon be taken both in Ottawa and at Victoria, the coronation ceremonies necessitating a speedy adjournment in both cases. In former years the C. P. R. was the opponent. This time the Kettle Valley lines was ostensibly against the proposal, and was represented by Mr. Stratton of Toronto. However, MacKenzie and Mann had such a strong lobby out that Stratton and his associates realized they were beaten, and retired from the fight.

# PASSED RESOLUTIONS GREENWOOD IN LINE

## Meeting in Board of Trade Rooms Sympathize With Mr. Hill.

The railway situation is still the all-absorbing topic locally. A meeting was held in the board of trade rooms last night, which had been called late in the evening, to pass resolutions expressive of the feeling regarding these conditions.

Strong resolutions were adopted setting forth the situation as seen by the leaders in the movement, deploring the action of the authorities at Victoria which has obstructed the completion of the V., V. & E. railway to this city and also to the Granby smelter and mines, and asking the government to withdraw its opposition to the road.

A resolution was also passed looking to the retirement of Mayor Holland for the reason that his individual interests led him to act not in consonance with the best interests of the city of Grand Forks.

As the gathering was hastily called, the meeting is not considered by many to have been sufficiently representative, another grand mass meeting is proposed to follow this one.

The resolutions passed will be printed in The Evening Sun tomorrow.

## VERIFIED BY MANN.

As soon as the report reached this city from Ottawa that the bill bearing on the V., V. & E. charter had been reported on favorably by the railway committee, a telegram was sent by Acting Mayor Harvey to MacKenzie & Mann, asking for positive information in relation thereto, and the following was received in reply:

# COLUMBIA, B. C.

## Situation, Environments and General Resources.

The City of Columbia is situated near the junction of the North Forks of the Kettle river with the main Kettle river, and is distant about 300 miles east of Vancouver.

The natural situation of the city for beauty is not excelled in America. A verdure-clad and flower-bespangled rolling prairie, traversed by a river of bright, sparkling water, fringed with forest trees and surrounded by mountains, forming a charming combination of picturesqueness and grandeur. Water is supplied the city by pumping from a beautiful spring of exceptional purity, capable of supplying a city of 50,000 inhabitants.

The Granby smelter and converter—the most modern and perfect plant of the kind in America—employing hundreds of men, is contiguous to the city.

Owing to the fine climate, the central situation, the beautiful environments, the bright prospects for future growth and prosperity, Columbia will be an educational centre, a city of homes, as well as a wholesale distributing point; and when finally allied and wedded to her sister sister, will be the best and largest city in the interior.

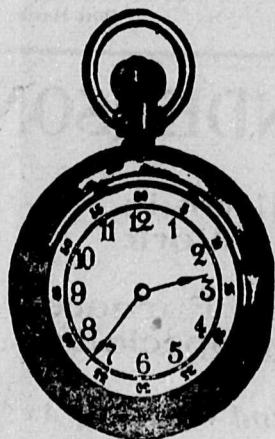

## SUMMARY LAWS FOR IRELAND.

Dublin, April 17.—Three sections of the Crimes Act have been put in force in a large number of the districts in Ireland by a proclamation issued by Earl Cadogan, the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. These sections provide for summary jurisdiction in the cases of criminal conspiracy, intimidation and unlawful assembly, for trial by special jury, and for change of venue at the option of the crown. The counties scheduled to enforce the foregoing sections of the Crimes Act are, Cavan, Clare, Cork, Leitrim, Mayo, Roscommon, Sligo, Tipperary and Waterford, as well as the boroughs of Cork and Waterford. These are the districts in which the United Irish League has been most active. The league itself has not yet been proclaimed, but it is believed this step will be taken shortly.
