FAIR REDISTRIBUTION

The Boundary Will Be Given Two Representatives.

Victoria, March 17.—Saturday last Attorney-General Eberts gave notice of the redistribution bill for today. The membership is likely to be increased from 38 to 42 or 43.

Esquimalt will lose a representative and the two Lillooets will be combined in one. There will also be a carving up of North Victoria, that portion of it on Vancouver island going into South Victoria, and the islands being grouped with other islands of the gulf.

Vancouver city is expected to get one additional member.

Roseland riding, now represented by Smith Curtis, will, it is said, be divided into three. Roseland, Trail, and adjacent territory, getting one member. Grand Forks another, and Greenwood district another.

East Yale is to be divided into two, the line being drawn about Penticton. The north half of the riding will be made a district with Vernon as its centre, and the south half making one, with Rock Creek, Princeton, Camp McKinney, Fairview and Keremeos.

The other three additional members are likely to go to Slokan, Nelson and Southeast Kootenay.

This is believed to be the rough outline of the present draft, but it is being constantly changed and may be materially altered before Monday.

WILL FORM A COMPANY.

New York, March 17.—A company is being formed here to promote the Marconi system of wireless telegraphy in this country. It is proposed to incorporate this company in New Jersey with a capital of \$10,000,000, and it is stated that the raising of \$750,000 will place it on a commercial basis. Of this latter sum \$250,000 is to be paid to the present English company, and Mr. Marconi is quoted as authority for the statement that the other \$500,000 will be a sufficient amount on which to start operations.

AMBULANCE FOR THE BOERS.

Paris, March 17.—Vicomte Christian de Villebois Mareuil, a brother of the officer killed in South Africa, has written to the British government requesting permission to take a French ambulance to the Boers. He says the ambulance is ready for South Africa immediately if Great Britain gives the necessary authorization. The vicomte would have made the request before, but was deterred from so doing by the refusal to allow other ambulances to

go to the Boers. Now, however, since General Delarey's release of General Methuen, the vicomte thinks the British government may consent to the French ambulance going.

ACCIDENT AT NELSON.

Nelson, March 17.—As Charles Love was assisting to fit up a steam shovel in the C. P. R. yards Saturday, the arm of the shovel falling caused the chain to switch over a pulley suddenly. It struck Love on the head. Part of the bone was removed and other pieces driven into the brain, making a very ghastly injury. He is not expected to live.

WINNIPEG'S COMB CUT.

Winnipeg, March 17.—The second match in the series for the Stanley cup was played here Saturday between the Winnipeg Victorias and the Montreal hockey team. The ice was in good condition, and despite the terrible blizzard blowing, over three thousand people witnessed the game. The Montreals were winners by five to nothing. They won by superior combination work on the forward line and by trickery tripping tactics.

WINTER RETURNS.

Winnipeg, Man., March 17.—The snowstorm which began yesterday continued today, and tonight Winnipeg is practically snowbound. It is the worst blizzard ever experienced here, and coming as it did, after two months of almost summer-like weather, its effect is severely felt. No trains had reached the city up to a late hour tonight. The Great Northern express is stalled near the boundary line; the Northern Pacific transcontinental trains are long overdue. The storm is widespread in its area, extending from Regina in the west to Port Arthur in the east. Street car traffic was entirely suspended tonight.

FELL INTO THE COLUMBIA.

Marcus, Wash., March 17.—Saturday night about 7 o'clock, Foreman Peterson and two companions from Martin's rock quarry were crossing the Columbia river bridge returning to camp. Knowing an engine was expected along at any moment, and thinking he heard it approaching, Mr. Peterson stepped aside to get out of the way, and in doing so either slipped or stepped into space and fell into the river, about 50 feet below. He made a heroic effort to swim out, but was soon lost sight of and was drowned. Dragging has been going on during the day in hopes of recovering the body, but without success. It is claimed he had several hundred dollars on his person. This is the first accident to occur on the new bridge.

John Freeman died at the Sisters' hospital, Roseland, Friday night of a fractured skull. The injury was received at the White Bear mine on Monday through a fall of timber in the shaft. Deceased was a former shift boss of the Le Roi mine.

It is said that Dunsmuir's two million dollar private railway snap has fallen through on a difference between cash and bonds.

A. F. MacNeill, K. C., of Rossland, goes to Victoria tomorrow where he has obtained a special sitting of the full court to hear argument in the matters at issue between the V., V. & E. railway and the R. & G. F. line people. The argument will be on appeal from the judgment of Walkem, J., granting the Yale Hotel company and the Grand Forks & Kettle River Railroad company an injunction restraining the V., V. & E. road from crossing the lands of the hotel company or the line of the R. & G. F. road. The full court does not ordinarily sit until April, but as construction is tied up on the V., V. & E. until the injunction matter is settled, the urgency of the question was sufficient to bring about a special sitting on the Supreme bench. Now we shall see what we shall see.

CITY SUNBEAMS

J. W. Palmer, mayor of Republic, who was a contractor on the Hot Air, is in town. Also, M. M. Buttz, who had 2½ mile contract on the Hot Air on Trout creek, accompanied by his bookkeeper, Rube Hull, is here settling up.

Chas. Ferguson, general manager of the construction department on the Hot Air line, has recovered from an attack of pneumonia, and is down from Republic.

The statement made that there is an agreement between the Great Northern and the C. P. R. on freight rates into the Boundary, is denied by officials of the former company.

"The Queen of Hayti" company gave an enjoyable performance last night at Biden's opera house to a large audience. The olio part of the pro-

gramme was very good; in fact, the best that has been seen in Grand Forks in recent years. Deserving of special mention was the acrobatic work of Frank Kirk and Harry L. WILL MAKE IMPROVEMENTS.

G. C. Hodge, district superintendent and foreman Irwin, of the Vernon & Nelson Telegraph Co., were in the city Wednesday, making plans and arranging for the betterments the company will undertake in Phoenix in the near future. Hodge stated that the local office of the company would be moved to the new location recently purchased, which is the building formerly occupied by the Eastern Townships Bank on First street. It is probable that some 3000 feet of cable will be laid in the city, and it is the intention to have all the lines metallic circuited, thereby giving a much improved service.

But little can be done before the snow goes, and the improvements

will probably not be started for several weeks yet. It is the intention of the company to make the service first class in every respect, and to this end metallic circuits will be established in Greenwood and Grand Forks also. —Pioneer.

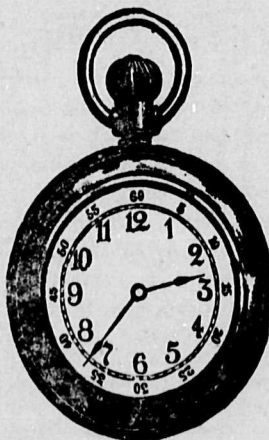

COLUMBIA, B. C.

Situation, Environments and General Resources.

The City of Columbia is situated near the junction of the North Forks of the Kettle river with the main Kettle river, and is distant about 300 miles east of Vancouver.

The natural situation of the city for beauty is not excelled in America. A verdure-clad and flower-bespangled rolling prairie, traversed by a river of bright, sparkling water, fringed with forest trees and surrounded by mountains, forming a charming combination of picturesqueness and grandeur.

The Columbia & Western railway, which was constructed by the Canadian Pacific Railway company, has its station, freight warehouse and yards in the center of Columbia, and the

Vancouver, Victoria & Eastern Railway company, has located its depot, freight sheds and yards along the east line of the corporation, thus giving the city connections with two trans-continental lines.

The Canadian Pacific railway company has large interests in the city, having selected the site on account of the superior natural advantages as a railway centre.

The mining interests are of the first importance to this country, and will do much to build up Columbia. Large mineral lodes have been discovered through the mountains adjacent to the city, and what were mere prospects a short time since are now large paying mines.

Water is supplied the city by pumping from a beautiful spring of exceptional purity, capable of supplying a city of 50,000 inhabitants.

The Granby smelter and converter—the most modern and perfect plant of the kind in America—employing hundreds of men, is contiguous to the city.

Owing to the fine climate, the central situation, the beautiful environments, the bright prospects for future growth and prosperity, Columbia will be an educational centre, a city of homes, as well as a wholesale distributing point; and when finally allied and wedded to her sister sister, will be the best and largest city in the interior.

? WANT THE BIG FIGHT

**Many Clubs Submit Offers
to Jeffries and Fitz-
simmons.**

San Francisco, March 17. — Bids for the Jeffries-Fitzsimmons fight were opened here Saturday, and a number of local clubs submitted offers. The only outside club to put in a bid was the Century club of Los Angeles. The bids, with the exception of the Los Angeles club, offered only a straight percentage of the gross receipts. The Los Angeles club submitted three propositions: A purse of \$25,000; 75 per cent of the gross receipts, with a guarantee of \$20,000; and 75 per cent of the receipts.

The local bids were as follows: National Athletic club, 82 per cent; Yosemite Athletic club, 66 2/3 per cent; San Francisco, 70 per cent; Twentieth Century, 80 per cent, Bay City, 62 1/2 per cent to the principals and 12 1/2 per cent to charity; Hayes Valley, 75 per cent.

Delaney, representing Jeffries, announced that the different bids would be considered by Jeffries and Fitzsimmons, and they would probably require some time to determine which was the best offer.
