SURVEY RESUMEI

H. W. Warrington, chief engineer of the Kettle Valley line, with fifteen men, stores and provisions, today left for the upper North Fork country to complete the survey of the road from Bannock City to Franklin camp.

Today surveyors' stakes were driven on Fourth street, from the river to Observation mountain. In order to obtain a better grade, it is proposed to cross the Kettle river at Fourth street; thence follow that thoroughfare to the base of Observation mountain; thence on the west side of that mountain to the Granby smelter. It is claimed that the grade from the Kettle Valley line station to the Granby smelter via the North Fork route would be too heavy.

It was reported this week that C. P. R. capital is behind the present activity in Kettle Valley line circles, and that the option on the McKinley mine is held by C.P.R. Interests. These rumors, however, lack confirma-

Associated Boards of Trade

G. O. Buchanan, president of the Affiliated Boards of Trade of Eastern British Columbia, has issued the following circular letter to the boards associated with that body:

The eighth annual convention of the associated boards will be held in Cranbrook on Wednesday of the week following that in which the provincial legislature convenes in annual session. The probabilities are that this will bring our meeting in the month of January. By way of eminder, I will mention the subjects that occupied our attention at the last meeting, together with the results of our efforts to secure action in line with our wishes:

A LICENSE to cut timber can be acquired only at public competition. A rental of \$5 per square mile is charged for all timber berths excepting those altuated West of Yale, for which the rental is at the rate of 5 cents per acre per annum.

In addition to the rental, dues at the following rates are charged:—

All cense is issued so soon as a berth is granted, but in unsurveyed territory no timber can becut on a berth until the licensee has made a survey thereof.
Permits to cut timber are also granted at public competition, except in the case of actual settlers, who require the timber for their own use.

Settlers and others may also obtain permits to cut up to 100 cords of wood for sale without competition.

The dues payable under a permit are \$1.50

The dues payable under a permit are \$1.50 per thousand feet B.M., for square timber and sawlogs of any wood except cak; from ½ to ½ cents per lineal foot for building logs; from 12½ to 25 cents per cord for wood; leent for fence posts; 3 cents for railway ties; and 50 cents per cord on shingle bolts.

Leases for grazing purposes are issued for a term of twenty-one years at a rental of two cents an acre per annum.

Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than \$20 acres may be acquired by one individual or company.

Royalty at the rate of 10 cents per ton of \$2,000 pounds is collected on the gross output. Entries for land for agricultural purposes may be made persenally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior at Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration at Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district within which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

Action who has received an entry for a homestead, is required to perform the coulditation to the continuous plans:—

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land to each year during the term of three years.

It is the practice of the Department to require a settler to bring 15 acres under cultivation, but if he prefers he may substitute stock; and 20 head of cattle, to be actually his own property, with buildings for their accommodation, will be accepted instead of the cultivations.

(2) If father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of the Act, seides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such persons as a homestead, the requirements of the Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent resi-

father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of the Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Application for a patent should be made at the end of three years before the local agent. sub-agent or a homestead inspector. He fore making an application for a patent, the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Otawa. of his intention to do so. W. W. CORY.


