TOPICS OF THE TOWN

The grade for the Columbia spur of the V., V. & E. has been completed, and the contractors, Stewart & Welch, have stored their outfit in this city until the injunctions are lifted and work can be resumed on the smelter branch.

The Great Northern Telegraph construction force, J. E. Hannier foreman, arrived in this city last Saturday morning from Republic, having completed the line to that city. They immediately commenced stringing the wire around the loop in this city.

Clarence W. Morgan left Saturday morning for a short visit to Portland, Ore.

All the shade trees planted in Columbia last spring are in a healthy condition, and in a few years the residential portion of the city will be "a thing of beauty and a joy forever."

The V., V. & E. bridge across the Kettle river below Columbia is nearing completion. The pile driver has nearly reached the opposite bank.

The regular monthly meeting of Greenwood Typographical Union, No. 358, was held in the News office, Grand Forks, Sunday afternoon. The following officers were elected and installed for the ensuing term: President, G. A. Evans, of Columbia; vice president, A. D. Hill, of Phoenix; secretary-treasurer, J. L. Meikle of Grand Forks; sergeant at arms, E. L. Hall, of Grand Forks. Executive committee, A. D. Hill, of Phoenix, chairman; E. D. Hall and Lee Tutt, of Grand Forks. Greenwood Typographical Union comprises all the union printers in the Boundary, and is in a flourishing condition both numerically and financially.

Mrs. Nat Taylor arrived from the east last Friday to join her husband, who is contemplating going into business in Grand Forks.

W. Paterson, of Shakespeare, Ont., arrived in the city last week. Mr. Paterson is a homeseeker, and will probably locate in the valley.

Wm. A. Thurman, a prominent tobaccoist of Nelson, B. C., was in the city the latter part of last week.

Alderman J. J. McIntosh is out of town on a week's vacation.

The Hamilton Spectator says of Miss La Dell, who appears at Biden's opera house Wednesday night, July 9: Miss La Dell, in her dramatic, pathetic and humorous sketches, delighted and thrilled her hearers and it was with reluctance that she was allowed to retire from the stage. The recital of "The Captive" was realistic and almost maddening as the terrors of madness were delineated. She recited "Story, as Told by a Little Girl," which surprised everybody. Her imitation of children is simply perfect;

while she is equally at home in dramatic and pathetic. Miss La Dell will be greeted with a bumper house on her return.

THE FERNIE STRIKE

The strike of the Fernie coal miners, on account of its important bearing on the smelting industry, is of considerable local interest. If prolonged, a coke famine that will temporarily cripple the Boundary smelters will naturally follow. The situation at Fernie has changed very little during the past week. The men at Michel quit work last Tuesday, but a large number of them objected to the strike and returned to work again. Trouble is feared, as most of the Fernie miners realize that if the Michel miners continue the company will be able to supply at least a portion of the British Columbia market with coke, and this they intend to prevent if possible. The company is preparing for a long siege at Fernie. Superintendent Stockett issued the following notice on Tuesday: "All employees at the Coal Creek mines during the month of June are hereby notified to call at the mine office promptly for their time statements, which will be paid upon presentation at the Fernie office. All miners or others having tools in No. 1 mine are notified to remove them therefrom on Thursday or Friday, on which days the mine will be open for that purpose. Credit will only be given for those tools returned. After Friday the fans will be stopped and the mine close." The notice caused considerable comment in Fernie, but nearly all the men drew time on Friday. There is very little excitement about town at the present time. The men who usually spend their money for liquor are holding it for the rainy day which promises soon to come upon them. It is remarkable how quiet the town is considering the number of men of all classes that are idle, but they seem to realize that they have struggle before them that requires a clear brain. The company, it is understood, is laying off all the men at the mines who are not on strike, with the exception of those who are absolutely necessary. Chief of Provincial Police Bullock-Webster has arrived on the scene, accompanied by a dozen specials. Trouble is no doubt anticipated, and the government is determined to prevent lawlessness. Rumor has it that men are to be imported from the coast to work the mines, but there seems to be little foundation for this report. General Manager Tonkin is still at the coast, and nothing will be done toward settling the strike until his return, which will be at least two weeks. The Fernie board of trade at a special meeting, decided to ask the Associated Boards of Trade to take immediate action toward the conciliation of the parties.

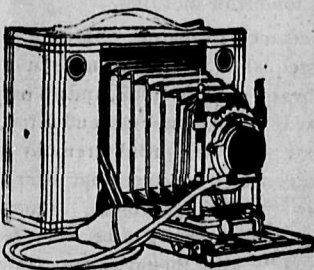

The strike of the Fernie coal miners is more far-reaching in its effects on disinterested parties to the dispute than any other that has taken place in recent years. It is also the most cruel, because as long as it lasts the mining industry in this part of the province will be sadly crippled by reason of a coke famine, and thousands of contented and industrious workmen will be forced into involuntary idleness; because if the smelters lack the coke to treat the ore, it would be useless to quarry it out of the ground. It is difficult at present to say where the blame for the trouble should be placed, because conflicting reports are current as to its origin.

The Olalla company, a Similkameen hot air concern, composed principally of ex-Salvation Army officers, was very anxious, last spring, to construct the Coast-Kootenay road, claiming to have ample funds to carry the project to a successful completion. But of late the company has kept very quiet. It is supposed that when the officers figured out the cost of maintaining a detective department, a necessary adjunct of all hot air financial institutions, they realized that they had been too sanguine, as the sleuths will accept nothing but hard cash for their services.

Of the two guideless wonders mentioned in The Sun a couple of weeks ago, Dr. M proved an easy winner. He succeeded in going around the track, while the Hot Air road hasn't started running yet.

The Dominion financial year has come to an end with Canada still on the crest wave of prosperity. And the prospects for the future were never so bright.

GRAND FORKS COUNCIL

The regular session of the Grand Forks city council met last night at 8:20 o'clock, all the members being present with the exception of Mayor Holland. Alderman Harvey presided. All the business transacted was of a

routine character, no measures of public importance coming up for consideration.

On motion of Ald. Sheads, seconded by Ald. Matheson, the school bond interest was made payable in Montreal instead of in Grand Forks. This action rescinds a prior motion on the same subject.

A large number of bills were ordered paid.

On motion of Ald. Sheads, seconded by Ald. Gaw, By-law No. 78, providing for the proper regulation of signs, awnings and verandahs, was ordered re-committed at the next meeting.

On motion of Ald. Sheads, seconded by Ald. Gaw, \$300 per month was charged the Granby company for power from April 1st, 1902.

Last week's ore shipments from Boundary mines: Granby mines, Phoenix, 1964 tons; Mother Lode, Deadwood, 1824 tons; Snowshoe, 510; Sunset, 1050 tons; B. C. Mine, 610 tons; Emma, 43 tons; Jewell, 60 tons. Total, 6120 tons.

Boundary shipments were small last week, due to lack of coke at the smelters. The Granby's two furnaces were blown out early in the week and have not yet been started.

Last week the Mother Lode smelter was forced to suspend operations temporarily on account of shortage of coke, and no shipments of ore are now being made from the Mother Lode mine.
