

## NEW BRICK BLOCK

**W. K. C. Manly Will Erect a \$15,000 Building on His Present Site**

**Will Be 20x80 Feet, Two Stories High--Work to Start July 1**

A new brick block, to cost about \$15,000, will be erected this summer by Mr. W. K. C. Manly on his present location on Bridge street. The building is to be 20x80 feet, and will be two stories in height. Work on the new structure will be commenced about the 1st of July. The stores now on the site will be moved to another location as soon as the Manly-Hunter-Kendrick consolidation is carried into effect.

When P. Burns & Co. erect their new brick block, which will adjoin the Manly building, the corner of Bridge and First streets will have a metropolitan appearance.

**Total Assessed Value of Property Within City Limits Is \$1,200,000**

## SUNSET SAUNTERINGS

It is reported from Vancouver that the Canadian Pacific Railway company has let the contract for the construction of a line of railway from Nicola to Spence's Bridge, a distance of 45 miles. While the present contract calls for only 45 miles of railway, it is announced that it is the intention to run the line ultimately through the Similkameen and on to the Boundary country. In the meantime the new branch will give the people of Nicola an outlet with direct connection with the coast. Construction will begin immediately and is to be carried on during the summer.

The government of Japan has, through its consul at Vancouver, Kishiro Morikawa, replied to an offer of space on the Dominion fair grounds for an exhibit from the flowery kingdom, explaining that on account of the present struggle in the far east it would be impossible to give the required attention to the matter. M. Morikawa has, however, been authorized to call on all such of the mikado's subjects as are resident merchants of Canada to contribute to an exhibit that will represent Japan at the Canadian national exhibition. A space 60x40 feet will be placed at the disposal of the Japanese exhibitors, and they promise to produce something most attractive.

The word of Charles M. Hay, president of the Grand Trunk Pacific, who all along maintained that once construction work begins on the new line it will be rushed forward to completion, is now backed by Sir Charles Rivers Wilson, who has arrived in Montreal from New York. Sir Rivers said: "The work will begin just as soon as specifications are accepted by the government, and, once begun, it will be pushed forward with all due speed, and no time will be lost in bringing it to completion. We now have all the money we require for this work, and there will be no delay in starting it."

The Russian fleet is reported to be short of coal. If Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky will bring his boats to Grand Forks, he could secure an interest in a few claims of the Southeast Cootenay Coal & Coke Co., Ltd., at a reasonable figure.

A London cable conveys the gratifying intelligence that the Western Canada Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd., capital £450,000, has been successfully floated in London. This is the culmination of negotiations which have extended, in several directions, over a number of years, and were previously on several occasions on the eve of success.

The second round in the fight between the Hill and the C.P.R. interests concerning the coast to Kootenay railway did no take place last Tuesday before the railway committee, the consideration of the V., V. & E. bill being postponed till the 30th inst.

### SUNSET SAUNTERINGS

The Great Northern railway now uses about 1000 tons of Fernie coal for its own engines. All the passenger locomotives on its line between the coast and Cut Bank, which is some distance east of the Rockies, are supplied with this coal.

### Synopsis of Regulations Governing the Disposal of Dominion Lands within the Railway Belt in the Province of British Columbia

A LICENSE to cut timber can be acquired only at public competition. A rental of \$5 per square mile is charged for all timber berths excepting those situated West of Yale, for which the rental is at the rate of 5 cents per acre per annum.

In addition to the rental, dues at the following rates are charged:—Sawn lumber, 50 cents per thousand feet B.M.

Railway ties, eight and nine feet long, 1 1/2 and 1 3/4 cents each.

Shingle bolts, 25 cents a cord.

All other products, 5 per cent. on the sales.

A license is issued so soon as a berth is granted, but in unsurveyed territory no timber can be cut on a berth until the licensee has made a survey thereof.

Permits to cut timber are also granted at public competition, except in the case of actual settlers, who require the timber for their own use.

Settlers and others may also obtain permits to cut up to 100 cords of wood for sale without competition.

The dues payable under a permit are \$1.50 per thousand feet B.M., for square timber and sawlogs of any wood except oak; from 1/2 to 1 1/2 cents per lineal foot for building logs; from 12 1/2 to 25 cents per cord for wood; 1 cent for fence posts; 3 cents for railway ties; and 50 cents per cord on shingle bolts.

Leases for grazing purposes are issued for a term of twenty-one years at a rental of two cents an acre per annum.

Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres may be acquired by one individual or company.

Royalty at the rate of 10 cents per ton of 2,000 pounds is collected on the gross output.

Entries for land for agricultural purposes may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires to apply to the Minister of the Interior at Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration at Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district within which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

A fee of \$10 is charged for a homestead entry.

A settler who has received an entry for a homestead, is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:—

(1) A least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land to each year during the term of three years.

It is the practice of the Department to require a settler to bring 15 acres under cultivation, but if he prefers he may substitute stock and 20 head of cattle, to be actually his own property, with buildings for their accommodation, will be accepted instead of the cultivation.

(2) If father (or mother, if the father is deceased) who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of the Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of the Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of the Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Application for a patent should be made at the end of three years before the local agent, sub-agent or a homestead inspector.

Before making an application for a patent, the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

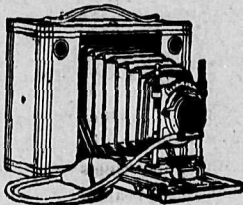

## MORRISON TIED UP

Because C. P. R. Refused to  
Construct a Spur to  
the Mine

Offered to Guarantee a Daily  
Shipment of One Hundred  
and Fifty Tons

The Montreal & Boston Consoli-  
dated has taken over the Morrison  
mines, near Greenwood. The prop-  
erty is not likely to be added to the  
shipping list in the immediate fu-  
ture, owing to lack of transporta-  
tion facilities. Mr. Pemberton,  
manager of the Montreal & Boston,  
states that he had offered to guaran-  
tee the Canadian Pacific railway 150  
tons of ore a day, and pay for it  
whether it was hauled or not, until  
such time as the railway company  
was entirely reimbursed for the capi-  
tal outlay of building the spur from  
its branch to the Mother Lode mine.  
This spur would be three-quarters  
of a mile in length and would cost  
about \$700. The Canadian Pacific  
refused to build the spur, hence the  
company does not now know exactly  
what its next move will be.

Work on the Sunset, in Green-  
wood camp, one of the first prop-  
erties acquired by the Montreal & Bos-  
ton company, is to be commenced  
immediately. Shipments will be  
made and maintained to the com-  
pany's smelter at Boundary Falls.

H. T. Pemberton, manager of the  
Montreal & Boston company, has re-  
turned from a trip to the Similkameen  
country. The best developed prop-  
erties in that district, he says,  
are the Sunset group, on which the  
British Columbia Copper company  
has taken a bond.

It is reported that Stemwinder  
mine will commence to ship ore on  
the 20th inst.

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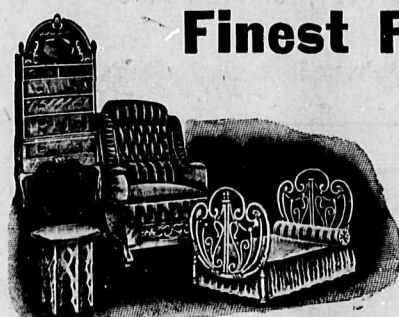
