

ELECTION NOV. 3RD

Dominion Parliament Dissolved, and Polling One Month Hence.

A Short, Sharp Campaign and Vigorous Work Will Be Required.

After many months of weary waiting on the part of the electorate, the announcement has finally been made that the Dominion parliament has been dissolved and that a general election will be held throughout the Dominion on November 3rd. It is probable, however, that in some of the more inaccessible ridings, where it is not so easy to get over the territory, the date, as usual, will be a little later than for the more settled portions of the country.

The announced date is about one month earlier than was generally expected, though both political parties, more especially in the east, have long been making preparations, and for the past month have been conducting an active campaign.

The short time between now and election day will insure a very vigorous time for the candidates to fully state their position to their constituents, especially in this particular district, which extends to far distant points.

The candidates in this riding who will offer themselves for their country's service are Duncan Ross, journalist, of Greenwood, Liberal; Martin Burrell, nurseryman, of Grand Forks, Conservative; while the Socialists have chosen as their standard-bearer Ernest Mills, a prominent labor union man, of Greenwood.

The only exception to this general rate given by all the railroads is that the Spokane Falls & Northern road and its branches do a little better and make this rate a fair and a fifth for the round trip, instead of a fare and a third. But the most desirable rate, and the granting of which the railroads have shown special liberality, is a round-trip rate of one fare good on a certain day in each community. The Spokane Falls & Northern and its branches sell this one fare rate on October 4, which is the second day of the fair.

Eastern Capitalists Arrive.

A distinguished party of eastern capitalists, headed by Senator Miller of New York, arrived in the city over the Great Northern railway on Wednesday.

The object of the trip is to investigate some mining properties at Grand Forks and Greenwood.
