ISSUED TWICE A WEE

ELECTION NOV. 3RD

Dominion Parliament Dissolved, and Polling One Month Hence.

A Short, Sharp Campaign and Vigorous Work Will Be Required.

After many months of weary waiting on the part of the electorate, the announcement has finally been made that the Dominion parliament has been dissolved and that a general election will be held throughout the Dominion on November 3rd. It is probable, however, that in some of the more inaccessible ridings, where it is not so easy to get over the territory, the date, as usual, will be a little later than for the more settled portions of the country.

The announced date is about one month earlier than was generally expected, though both political parties, more especially in the east, have long been making preparations, and for the past month have been conducting an active campaign.

The short time between now and election day will insure a very vigorous time for the candidates to fully state their position to their constituents, especially in this particular d'striet, which extends to far distant points.

The candidates in this riding who will offer themselves for their coun try's service are Duncan Ross, journalist, of Greenwood, Liberal; Mar tin Burrell, nurseryman, of Grand Forks, Conservative; while the Socialists have chosen as their standardbearer Ernest Mills, a promiuent labor union man, of Greenwood.

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
