### The Enlarged No. 2 Furnace Will Be Blown In Next Monday

#### Steel Works Will Soon Be Operated at Their Full Capacity

Three of the furnaces at the Granby smelter were closed down for a short time this week to make connections with No. 2 furnace, which has been out of commission for about a month while being remodeled and enlarged. It is expected to have this furnace ready to be blown in by Monday or Tuesday.

The last car of machinery for the Grand Forks Steel Construction Works is daily expected to arrive in the city. On its installation the works will be opened in full blast.

Died—In this city, on Thursday, August 2, Annie Grace, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. E. Massie, aged four months. The child had been sick for about a week with cholera infantum, which was the cause of death. The funeral took place last evening from the family residence. The sympathy of the people of the community is being extended to the parents in their sad bereavement.

Howard Bush arrived in the city this week, and has assumed his duties as head clerk in the grocery department of Jeff Davis & Co.'s store.

Elenor W. Johnson, of the International News Bureau, Seattle, was a visitor in the city this week.

E. Spraggett, supervisor of roads, this week started to repair the wagon road between this city and Cascade recently damaged by a cloudburst. There are five large washouts, necessitating the construction of about a mile of new road.

#### The Salvation Army

Captain Quaife, of Vancouver headquarters, assisted by Captain Moore and Lieutenants Chatterson and Crossman, will open the Salvation Army work in Grand Forks on Saturday and Sunday, August 4th and 5th. The meetings will take place as follows: Saturday at 8 p. m., great opening meeting; Sunday at 7 a. m., hallelujah breakfast, 11 a. m., holiness meeting, 3 p. m., free and easy meeting, 8 p. m., Salvation meeting. Public meetings will also be conducted every night during the week at 8 p. m. The meetings take place in the hall next to the old Union hotel on Riverside avenue. A cordial welcome is extended to all to attend.

The following is a summary of the work done by the Salvation Army in Canada during the past year:

Rescue—563 girls were received into the 11 homes of this territory. Of these 251 were sent to situations, and 114 were restored to parents or friends.

The Children—514 children were taken care of in this territory last year.

Prison Work—1159 men were met and advised on the day of their discharge in Toronto last year. 990 were given temporary employment. All large prisons in Canada are regularly visited, and prisoners advised and assisted as far as possible on their discharge.

Labor Bureau—7907 men were found temporary or permanent employment through this agency.

Men's Social—88,089 beds and 74,238 meals were supplied the past year.

League of Mercy—This board of heroic workers is carrying the message of peace and mercy to thousands of sick and unfortunate throughout Canada. They visit jails, hospitals, etc., and distribute thousands of War Crys' free each week.

Missing Friends—Out of 556 persons enquired for last year 113 were found.

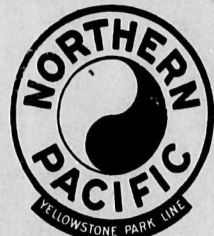
