### "The Bonnie Brier Bush"

It will be great news indeed to all of us to learn that "The Bonnie Brier Bush" will be given here on Wednesday, January 12, at the Grand Forks opera house. He is transformed from an ascetic and literal believer in the Calvinistic interpretation of the Scriptures to one who after all sees some good in the golden rule. All this is very beautifully brought out in the play. The comedy element in the piece is strong and persistent. Its chief exponent is Postie, whose droll philosophy and witticisms are an excellent foil for the more serious portions of the play. The company this season is all that could be desired, while a quartette of male singers and William Meikle, a Scotch bag-piper, will add to the general effectiveness.

### Growth of Industry

The growth of the fruit industry during the year just dead has been well illustrated by the importation of nursery stock and by the numerous inquiries for large tracts of land, declares Thomas Cunningham, provincial fruit inspector. The last inquiry he received was for from 5000 to 10,000 acres suitable for fruit growing, and the importation of nursery stock indicated how largely growers already established were extending their business. It was indicative, too, of the opening that existed in the province for more nurseries for fruit trees. There was a scarcity of apple trees for planting last year both in British Columbia and on the other side of the line, but the prospects of the growth of the industry during the present year are exceedingly bright. There was an unusually large quantity of nursery stock imported in November and December, according to Mr. Cunningham, who says: "During the last two weeks we inspected five carloads of nursery stock. A large proportion of it consisted of ornamental trees, and most of it came from Europe. This European stock is remarkably well packed, and has come through in good shape. The European packers use mostly peat moss, which protects the roots and give a freshness to the stock which we do not find in American packed goods."

"We have a great deal of trouble with Japanese plants, and have had to condemn many. One large shipment of American fruit trees was condemned. The shipments of Japanese oranges this year were remarkably heavy and exceedingly satisfactory. This is largely due to the order I had issued through the board of horticulture last spring, notifying the dealers that any Japanese oranges infected with San Jose or any other scale would be dealt with in the same manner as other fruit similarly affected. Shipments of deciduous fruits have been larger this year than any previous year. Many have not been in good condition, and condemnations for the port of Vancouver will total 14,000 packages."

### Synopsis of Canadian Homestead Regulations

ANY available Dominion Lands within the Railway Belt of British Columbia may be homesteaded by any person who is the head of a family, or any male over eighteen years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased), of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

Coal—Coal mining rights may be leased for a period of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 per acre. Not more than 2,500 acres shall be leased to one individual or company. A royalty at the rate of five cents per ton shall be collected on the merchantable coal mined.

### Oldest White Man Dies

Antoine Lamprone, who died at Kamloops on Christmas eve, is believed to have been British Columbia's oldest inhabitant—certainly the oldest white man in the province. He was 111 at the time of his death. He had himself lost all count of the passage of years, but cherished an old, old family Bible, in which the fact was recorded of his birth on March 15, 1798. Old-timers in the Kamloops district, among them C. T. Cooney of Tranquille, himself a resident of fifty years' standing, remember Lamprone as a very old man when they came to the country half a century ago. He had been for years a pensioner of the Hudson's Bay company, for whom he worked as a trapper and courier in the early days of the last century.
