It was in-
dicative, too, of the opening that ex dicative, too, of the opening that ex
isted in the province for more nurseries for fruit trees. There was a scarcity of apple trees for planting and on the other side of the line, bu
 industry during the present year are exceedingly bright. There was an unusually large quantity of nursery stock imported in November and De
cember, according to Mr. Cunuing cember, according to Mr. Conning
ham, who says: "During the last two weeks we inspected five carloads of nursery stock. A large propor-
tion of it consisted of ornamental tree, and most of it came from Europe. This European stock is remarkably well packed. and has European packers use mostly peat moss, which protects the roots and give a freshness to the stock which
we do not find in American packed goods.
"We have a great deal of trouble
with Japanese plants, and have had to condemn many. One large shi ment of American fruit trees wa condemned. The shipments of Jap anese oranges this year were re
markably heavy and exceedingly satisfactory. This is largely due the order I had issued through the board of horticulture last spring, notifying the dealers that any Jap Jose or any othes scale would dealt with in the same manuer as
