C. P. R. TO THE RESCUE

May Operate the Kaslo & Slocan Railway

Victoria, March 29.—It is believed
here that satisfactory arrangements
have been made whereby a Kaslo
& Slocan line from the Great Northern
Railway, secure Provincial Govern-
ment aid in rebuilding it, and turn it
over to the C. P. R. for operation.
Mr. S. Griffiths, government consult-
ing engineer, has gone to Kaslo to
make an examination of the property,
on behalf of the government authori-
ties, it is understood.

It is also asserted that before he
left for Winnipeg, Mr. F. W. Peters,
assistant to Mr. William Whyte, vice-
president of the C. P. R., who has
been on the coast for some weeks in
connection with various matters, took
up with the government the question
of operating the road.

REVOLT AGAINST STOLYPIN

Even Russia Will Not Stand for a Dictatorship.

St. Petersburg, March 27.—An im-
perial ukase promulgating the Zem-
stvo bill, article 87, of the fundamen-
tal laws has been issued with the Em-
peror's acquiescence. M. Stolypin's
assumption of what are virtually dic-
tatorial functions has struck the po-
liticians with amazement, and has
produced what is regarded as a grave
constitutional crisis. The residence
of Durovov, the deposed ex-minister
of the interior, has become the centre
of a political revolt, in which it is
sought to unite both chambers and
nearly all parties with the govern-
ment.

THE PROPHECY CAME TRUE

The New-Advertiser in its "Twenty
Years Ago" items has the following:
"Mr. W. J. Bowser, L.L.B., a bar-
rister of New Brunswick, has just ar-
rived in this city and will practice
here. He has taken offices for that
purpose in the Turner block on Cor-
dova street. Mr. Bowser is a graduate
of Dalhousie University, Nova Scotia,
and will be sure to succeed in his pro-
fession."

The above is being noted in various
papers and in some cases lessons de-
duced therefrom. All there is to it is
simply that the Attorney-General had
the brains to make good and he made
good. But what suffering is in store
for the good people of this province if
other youths arriving from the eastern
provinces mistaking brass for
brains imagine that they too must
turn the trick. When a youth arrives
with his pocket-lined with clippings
from country papers showing address-
es of farewell from such and such de-
bating society in which the bearer is
marked out to be the intellectual
Moses who is to lead the poor British
Columbians out of Egyptian darkness
and the youth is sufficiently blinded
with self-conceit to believe it all, then
there is tribulation ahead both for the
youth and for the public who for their
own protection must do a heap of
"sitting on".

Last week the Gazette made refer-
ence to the death of Thomas Raby, an
old-time placer miner on Rock Creek.
Since then more details have come to
hand which show that the manner of
his ending was typical of the man—
game to the last. On Friday the 10th
all he had gone over to Beidesville
about 7 or 8 miles distant for supplies
and bought about 50 lbs. worth which
he started to pack home although he
was a man of 80 years. On his way
back he called at Jimmy Copland's
cabin and left there about five o'clock,
that being the last time he was seen
alive. On Sunday morning he was
found by Andy Donahoe, his nearest
neighbor who is another of the old
timers living farther down the north
fork. He was found about 6 feet from
the cabin door with the pack beside
him and the cabin door still locked
with the key on the outside. Heart
failure was evidently the cause of
death for he had complained to a
friend of a couple of bad spells he had
during the winter.

STRAINING AT A GAT

Ghost of Deceased Wife's Sister Re-ap-
pears in Court

New Westminster, March 29.—Her-
bert Victor Baker, an hotel clerk, in
North Vancouver, appeared in the city
Police Court this morning, charged by
the attorney-general's department
with alleged violation of the marriage
act in New Westminster in marrying
his deceased brother's wife. Provincial
Constable Wilkie made the charge
acting under instructions from Victo-
ria. The charge sheet in court was
amended to read that by making the
necessary affidavit that he knew of no
impediment to the celebration of the
marriage, the accused committed per-
jury.

Magistrate Edmonds held a prelimi-
nary investigation, and remitted the
matter to a higher court to decide the
legal point.

From the evidence adduced it ap-
peared that Baker drew the analogy
that if marriage with his deceased
wife's sister was legal, marriage with
his deceased brother's widow was
likewise.

Mr. W. H. Bole, K.C., for the crown
produced a table of affinities, compiled
in the reign of Henry VIII., which
he contended was applicable to the
marriage laws of Canada, except as
amended by Dominion statutes. In-
sofar as there was no mention of a
deceased brother's wife, the learned
counsel advanced the theory that mar-
riage between parties within these de-
grees of affinity was prohibited.

OBITUARY

It was with no little surprise that it

Seattle and one sister, Mrs. Gaunce,
who lives in Victoria. The funeral
under the direction of Hedley lodge
A. F. & A. M. will take place to-day
at 2 p.m.

CANADA'S BANK FAILURES

Some Statistics Which Go To Show
That Present System of Inspection
is Faulty

Bank failures have been frequent
enough of late in Canada. The statis-
tics as furnished by Dr. Edwards, the
Conservative member for Frontenac,
are somewhat startling. In his speech
in the House on Thursday last he said:

"From 1880 to 1906 there were 48
chartered banks established in Canada
and of that number 12 or 25 per cent.
failed, and others only saved them-
selves from failure by amalgamation;
in the neighborhood of 30 per cent. of
all the banks which have been estab-
lished since 1880 have failed and one
half of these failures have occurred
since 1896 during the time the present
Finance Minister has held office. . . .
Sir, it is a sorry commentary on
our banking system and on this gov-
ernment, that the percentage of fail-
ures of chartered bank in the Dominion
of Canada has been greater since
this administration came to power in
1896, and under the care of the present
minister of Finance, than in any other
country in the world. Mr. H. C. Mc-
Leod, former general manager of the
Bank of Nova Scotia, commenting on
this deplorable state of affairs, used
these words:

"Most, if not all the above mention-
ed failures were fraudulent, and it is
now plainly evident that a few hours
examination by a skilled banker would
have disclosed an insolvent condition
in any one of these banks years before
it collapsed."

COAL MINERS' STRIKE BEGUN

Over 5000 Quit Work in Crowsnest Mines
On April 1st.

Fernie, B. C., March 31.—Following
practically unanimous strike votes in
the last few days by the various locals
of district No. 18 of the United Mine
Workers of America, comprising with
one exception all the operating coal
mines of the British Columbia Crows-
Nest Pass and of Alberta, went on
strike at midnight to-night. It is es-
timated by the district officials that
5,640 union men have thrown down
their tools. This includes not only
the actual mine operatives but the
men employed in the coke industry of
the Pass, which is directly dependent
on the coal supply.

DONT WANT BLACKS

Edmonton Wants Ethiopian in Small
Doses Only.

The arrival of the colored delegation
from the states, together with their
conspicuousness on the streets of Ed-
monton stirred up bitter feeling. Dr.
Ely Sunge wrote a strong letter to the
papers protesting against the admis-
sion of the negroes into the province.

Premier Sifton stated that there
was nothing in the provincial statutes
to keep the negroes out. The board of
trade is committed to a policy rigidly
against the immigration of the negro.
They have left for Athabasca Land-
ing, in which vicinity they will take
up their future homes.

Police Magistrate Hallet, of Green-
wood, has recently given three months
in jail, without the option of a fine, to
a man named Gilbertson for supply-
ing liquor to an interdicted man. A
dose or two of that kind is needed in
Hedley. Here, the defiance of the
law has been shameful in the matter
of interdicted men securing liquor but
no prosecutions seem to follow. If the
Attorney-General's department wants
the new liquor law to have the effect
it was intended to have and the law
respected as it should be it would pay
to have a stranger in plain clothes
sent in here to do some detective work
and have a few of these bottle artists
gathered in. Also the proper time to
put a man on the interdicted list is be-
fore he has gone through his pile and
not after. The supplying of liquor to
drunken men is also a crying shame
and although it is forbidden by law it
goes on nevertheless.

Good Friday a week from to-mor-

BANK OF B. N. A.

The seventy-fifth annual report of the above bank is to hand and shows this solid old institution to be in a healthy state. Last year the net profits after deducting current charges and providing for bad and doubtful debts, amounted to \$491,830.14. In October last there was paid out for dividend \$146,000.00 which with bonuses equalled 7 per cent for the year and there is available for April dividend and bonus a balance of \$278,378.90. A strong feature about this bank and one which should command more than ordinary attention at the present time in view of the recent discussion in the subject of banking in the Canadian House of Commons in connection with the defunct Farmers' Bank, is its audit. In this respect the Bank of B. N. A. shares with the Bank of Nova Scotia the honor of being one of the only two banks in Canada which have an independent audit apart from the ordinary bank inspection of branches by inspectors of the bank itself on behalf of its directors. In the Bank of B. N. A. it is not the directors who appoint the auditor but the shareholders, and this bank together with the Bank of Nova Scotia is ready for governmental audit and they would welcome such a change. The significance of this will be better understood in connection with an item in another column of this issue which deals with an incident in the Canadian House of Commons which occurred a few days ago when the affairs of the unfortunate Farmers' Bank were up for discussion. With a paid-up capital of \$1,866,000.00, a reserve of \$2,052,333.33 and total assets of over \$50,000,000.00 and a sound audit this bank offers special attractions to depositors.

Assuming that the Attorney-General's department has other reasons for taking the action which they have done in the North Vancouver "deceased brother's widow" case than would appear on the surface there is every likelihood that their attitude in the matter will be misunderstood. So far as right or wrong in it goes it is very sure that the consensus of public opinion of the present day untrammelled by the doctrinal hair-splitting tendencies of the ecclesiastical courts of a century ago will say that the difference between a "deceased wife's sister" and a "deceased brother's widow" is the difference between tweedledum and tweedledee, and once the "deceased wife's sister" bill was made law in this country it was quite permissible to reason from analogy that it would cover the case of marriage with a "deceased brother's widow" It is to be hoped therefore that the ob-

ject of the Attorney-General's department in this instance was to remedy the unfortunate oversight on the part of the framers of the "deceased wife's sister" bill in making the phraseology of the bill fall short of specifying the case of a "deceased brother's widow." By making a test case of this and sending it up to the higher courts with every probability of the verdict being in favor of the legalization of such a marriage such a decision would practically (so far as this province is concerned) take the place of a separate "deceased brother's widow" bill by the Dominion government. Owing to clerical domination of the Dominion representation from Quebec it was no easy matter to secure the passage of the "deceased wife's sister" bill and as the Quebec representation is stronger now than it was then it might be more difficult now to get through such a piece of legislation and thus the plan of putting it up to the higher courts will be the simpler way to attain the object in view so far as this province is concerned. Of course it will be billious on the poor beggar who is made the scapegoat and it would be only fair that he should be reimbursed for any financial loss he may sustain by reason of it.

The secretary treasurer of our Board of Trade is in receipt of two handsome silver medals won by our fruit in competition with the world at the London Horticultural Society's exhibition, London, England. Both are silver Knightsian medals, one for the Keremeos district itself and the other for the Kamloops district, of which we formed a part in the competition. They are neatly gotten up in plush cases with black leather lining. They may be seen at the office of the secretary.

Some claim that the grievances of the British Columbia fruitgrower against the Fielding-Patterson brand of reciprocity is purely imaginary, and we have even heard individual fruitgrowers themselves uphold it on the ground that if our fruit industry cannot flourish in open and even competition with our friends across the line that we had better quit. The inference contained in this may be quite right but the premise is undoubtedly wrong. It will not be even competition. We give a concrete example: Last week one of our fruit ranchers got in some machinery and fixtures which he required in his business, the value of which was \$60. On this he had to pay \$19.18 duty, so that to say nothing of the higher freight bill, his machinery cost him nearly one-third more than it would his neighbor across the line. Much might be said in favor of free trade, all around (though we are not in sympathy with even that) but there is no justice or equity in the reciprocity measure now before the country.

ORCHARD PLANTING NUMBER

Those who intend planting fruit trees this spring, whether beginners or experienced fruit growers will be interested in and perhaps secure some useful information from the March number of The Canadian Horticulturist of Peterboro, Ont. which devotes considerable attention to this subject. Selection of soil and location suitable for an orchard, preparing for planting how to plant, the best varieties, cultivation after planting and other subjects of like nature are dealt with by competent authorities in this number. Articles also appear dealing with the subjects of spraying, fertilizing, renewing old orchards and other matters which will prove of interest to the practical fruit grower at this season. A report of the deputation of the fruit and vegetable growers who waited on the Government recently in regard to the proposed tariff changes is given in this number by a staff representative who accompanied this deputation. An illustration showing the members of this deputation on the steps of the Parliament Buildings, Ottawa, also appears.

Amateur flower growers and gardeners can secure many useful suggestions from this number. Articles appear dealing with the care of dahlias, cannas and climbing roses. "Intensive gardening on a small lot" gives the experience of the writer in the management of a small vegetable garden, describing the preparation of the soil, fertilization of the soil and planting. "What to grow and how to grow it" explains in detail the making and management of a hotbed.

The issue is well illustrated throughout, the illustrations adding greatly to the educational value of the articles.
