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## SURVIVAL OF THE FITTEST

That is What It Is Coming to in the  
Wireless-Situation.

If anything was needed to show what wireless system is going to win out it was furnished in the first trip records of the last three boats equipped with wireless apparatus on the coast that the public are most familiar with. Of course the United Wireless which is strongly entrenched on the coast, having its factory at Seattle with numerous land stations and ocean going craft equipped, is installing apparatus on more boats all the time, including tugs and freighters, but the three we refer to as being best known among the most recent installations are the Princess May, Empress of China and J. J. Hill's big liner Minnesota. Now the C. P. R. made an agreement with the United Wireless Co. to instal their system on all the C. P. R. company's Pacific fleet, but it was found out that there was a lusty canine in the manger so far as the Empresses were concerned and that canine was the Marconi system which owes all the advancement it has ever made to the fostering care of the British admiralty. The C. P. R. Empresses have always carried an imperial subsidy and are on the British naval reserve, and hence it was the Admiralty which had the say what system was to be installed on them and consequently the Empress of China got the Marconi equipment, almost filling up her wireless room with apparatus. Well, she started off for Asia and from the hour she left the Gulf of Georgia behind her, never a squawk was heard from her any more than if she had never had any equipment.

Now take the other C. P. R. boat the Princess May which runs from Vancouver to Skagway. She was equipped with United Wireless apparatus, being given one of the small power equipments as she was doing a coasting trade and would never be far from a land station, but when she left for Skagway with her new equipment on board and operator McClenaghan at the key she "sassed back" for 300 miles, being in communication with Vancouver for all of that distance, and when she was opposite Wrangell she was in communication with the Eureka land station in California, a distance of 1500 miles and also with boats in the mouth of the Columbia river.

Then take the Minnesota which was given the United Wireless equipment. When she left for the Orient after getting the wireless she was in communication with the Pacific coast of America for 2200 miles, and picked up communication with Japan again when within 2200 miles. It is fully believed from this performance of the Minnesota that at night when the wireless waves travel farther and are heard more distinctly, the Minnesota will be able to communicate from the Orient to the western coast of America.

In connection with the Princess May's equipment also, it is given out that the experience of the May bears out reports of other wireless equipped boats that the government station at Cape Lazo should be shifted to some other point as its present location does not seem favorable for communication by wireless with passing ships. The Princess May's wireless operator is of opinion that in addition to moving the Cape Lazo station to a more favorable location some more stations should be put in. And when the government is at it they should allow the United Wireless to put in a thoroughly efficient system which the company will guarantee at all times instead of buying from them the old straight Shoemaker instruments with which the stations at Point Grey, Estevan Cape Lazo and Pachebena Point were equipped. While United Wireless will supply the Shoemaker instruments for those who want them, they can supply far better and more efficient working apparatus.

## ONTARIO'S BIG STORM

Hurricane Swept Across Province From  
St. Clair to St. Lawrence

On April 8th a hurricane crossed into Ontario from Michigan sweeping eastward carrying death and destruction in its path.

Several lives were lost and damage done to the extent of about half a million dollars.

Wm. Tunks, farmer, near London, was killed by a falling tree, and a Hamilton man is reported to have been drowned. From every quarter comes news of barns and summer cottages partly or wholly wrecked by the violent wind. At Chatham there was a loss of \$10,000, and at Tilbury the hurricane wrecked fifty derricks.

In Canboro, near Dunnville, teacher and pupils had to make their escape through the windows of a schoolhouse, the complete destruction of which soon followed.

At Hamilton, John Jamieson, aged twenty-two a well known local amateur wrestler and football player, is missing, and is believed to have been drowned. The roads leading to this city are impassible from uprooted trees and telegraph posts. At Toronto a number of costly summer cottages on Hanlon's island, have been destroyed.

## "THE UNCO GUID"

A Presbyterian Minister in Toronto Pres-  
bytery Attacks Earl Grey.

Toronto, April 8.—Earl Grey and Sir Mortimer Clark were denounced by Rev. W. B. Findlay at the meeting of the Toronto Presbytery yesterday for patronizing the Woodbine race meet. The moderator requested Rev. Mr. Findlay to bring the matter before the chair formally in a resolution. This was done, and after a heated discussion the resolution was laid over until the next meeting.

## A RAILWAY ENTENTE

The Canadian Northern and Great  
Northern Believed to Co-operate.

At intervals for several months past there have been rumors in the papers that the Canadian Northern and Great Northern had formed an offensive and defensive alliance, particularly in reference to railway building, and that it was not improbable that in some places they would be running over the same tracks to save unnecessary outlay in building.

Winnipeg papers evidently give every credence to the report and they point out that wherever Hill builds into the Canadian west he is not in opposition to the Canadian Northern.

The part of the story, however, which concerns us most here is the portion which refers to the great probability that a part of the V. V. & E. between here and the coast will be a joint road maintained and used by the two systems. That will be the portion between Aspen Grove and Hope or perhaps from Aspen Grove all the way into Vancouver. It is generally understood that the route down the Coquihalla to Hope will entail some very expensive construction and as the Canadian Northern are also seeking a route to the coast and want to come down the North Thompson to Kamloops it would certainly be to the interests of both roads to join in a common route down the Coquihalla. An agreement of this kind entered into now might hasten the completion of the V. V. & E. to the coast.

## WANT COLD STORAGE.

Requirements of B. C. Fruit Were  
Urged at Ottawa.

Brandon, April 6.—W. A. Lang of Pachebena, B. C., formerly of Brandon is here to-day, returning from a trip to Ottawa where he has been for a month pressing for support from the government for a big cold storage system for fruit. He proposes to establish plants at about ten points in B. C.

Lang says the fruit production of the Okanagan district alone within four years will be over six thousand cars a season.

## THE OPENING BALL.

Brilliant Easter Monday Event Celebrates  
Opening of Richter's New  
Hall.

A few Hedleyites went to Keremeos Centre on Monday evening for the grand ball to be given on the occasion of the opening of Richter's new hall at Keremeos Centre.

The hall has recently been completed, and is one of the finest if not the finest public hall in the valley. The building is 50 x 60 feet with a stage 20 x 40 feet to permit of putting on almost any play or performance that may come through. For a ball-room it is particularly well adapted and thoroughly safe, being on the ground floor. The flooring is of specially selected material and thoroughly seasoned and is pronounced by those skilled in the terpsichorean art to be one of the finest they have been on.

The hall was handsomely and tastefully decorated. This part of the arrangements was carried out under the directions of Mrs. Richter, and the result attained showed the rare skill and taste brought to bear in the task, for the room was transformed into a veritable bower of beauty.

Fully 150 guests were present. The music was supplied by a dance orchestra from Oroville which discoursed excellent music. With a beautifully decorated ball-room, a floor in excellent condition and good music, it only remained for the supper to take rank with the other features of the occasion, and Mr. and Mrs. Blinirst of the Central Hotel saw to it that this was fully up to the mark. Rarely have ball-goers in the Similkameen had the opportunity of partaking of so fine a spread.

## QUEBEC EASILY LEADS IN WATERPOWER

British Columbia is Third on List of  
Provinces, According to Official Estimate.

Ottawa, April 6.—Before the forests, waterways and waterpowers committee of the commons this morning, R. E. Young, superintendent of Dominion railway lands, gave a conservative estimate of waterpower of the Dominion. He placed it at 25,682,907 horsepower, which converted in coal on a basis of five pounds of coal per hour per horsepower, means 531,187,590 tons of coal per annum.

The province of Quebec leads with 17,075,939 horsepower; Ontario next with 3,120,160, and British Columbia third with 2,000,000. Alberta is fourth with 1,000,000; Northwest Territories, 600,000; Manitoba 504,000; Saskatchewan, 500,000; New Brunswick 150,000; Nova Scotia, 54,300.

## MINING AT BEAVERDELL

Much Mining Activity on Properties  
Around Beavardell

The Sally mine has been working all winter and occasional ore shipments made.

Much interest centres in operations on the Bell where a tunnel is being driven to tap the ore body. The Bell has always been considered a very valuable claim.

A new strike has been made on the Rambler owned J. W. Nelson, of Greenwood, and W. H. Rambo. This is one of the most extensively developed claims of the camp outside the Sally. There has been done in shaft-work about 140 feet of sinking and over 500 feet of tunnelling. The latest strike is a vein 3 inches wide running 500 ounces of silver.

## NICKEL PLATE SAMPLED

A Corps of Experts Now Engaged in  
Sampling

A sequel to the many rumors afloat during the last year looking to probable change of ownership in the Nickel Plate, was the appearance on the scene last week of a party of mining experts under the direction of Walter Bean, a mining engineer, of Colorado.

It has been understood that M. K. Rodgers has held an option on the property for some time, and last year he made a pretty thorough examination and sampling of it during the summer, returning later in the year for a two days' examination in company with Walter Bean.

Whether this be a final examination under Mr. Rodgers' option or whether it be by way of appraisal of present value of the mine required in the action pending in the courts of this province between the Daly estate and Mr. Rodgers on his interest in the property, is an open question. To Mr. Rodgers belongs the credit of spying out the property for them in the first place, getting after the ore bodies and showing up their extent and value and then putting in a plant which put the property on a paying basis, for with practically no change it has now run a little over four years and turned out over two million dollars in bullion.

There are at present five in the party who are making the examination, and they are in charge of Walter Bean, of Denver and A. G. Merrill, of Los Angeles, although it is understood that their number will shortly be increased. Where a large sum is involved the examination has to be more thorough.

The sampling we presume will be confined to the two or three claims already opened up, but had Mr. Rodgers been in charge during the whole period that the mine has been running and had carte blanche it is more than likely that there would to-day have been other Nickel Plates and Sunnysides disgorging pay ore in the large group of 24 claims gathered in by Mr. Rodgers for the company in the earlier stages of his operations here and held ever since without effort to open them up.

The public meeting held in Vancouver last week to back up the resolution of the Vancouver Board of Trade on Canada's duty in the matter of immediate contribution towards maintenances of the British navy, showed that in Vancouver there is no party politics in the thing at all, for prominent men on both sides were present giving their support to the movement.

Billy Maclean's battle for a two cent fare on Canadian railways has been making great progress during the past year. The test case which he fought out with the Grand Trunk to make them carry out one of the conditions of their original charter to transport third-class passengers between Toronto and Montreal at a penny a mile was the thin end of the wedge by which he is heaving them.

that both the Grand Trunk and C.P.R. were carrying citizens of United States through Canada at the rate of two cents per mile and Canadians who sat beside them in the same first-class cars had to pay three cents per mile.

The reported resignation of Pugsley as Minister of Public Works, which the Premier is said to have demanded from him, is hailed by those on both sides of the House, who are anxious to see cleaner government, as evidence that Sir Wilfrid wants to clean up and get rid of an element in his administration which has discredited it for so long.

Provincial Autonomy Relieves Mounted Police of Much of their Work

The first vote taken up was for three-quarters of a million dollars to defray the cost of the up-keep of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police.

Mr. Foster wanted to know if it was the policy of the government to withdraw the members of the force from thickly settled districts with the idea in view that ultimately the day will come when the provinces will have to look after the administration of law and order themselves.

Sir Wilfrid said that was the policy of the government, but it was thought necessary to keep a considerable force along the boundary line.

C. A. Magrath spoke regretfully that in the older districts little was seen of the familiar police.

six months in Kamloops. Since his departure some others of like ambitions in life have taken the hint and got out, or they would have been sent out.

**ASSAULT CASE**

The leading excitement in town last week was the assault case between Vander J. Rose, of the Hedley House, and Constable Sproule. The latter came out of the fray in a manner which is calculated to show those who were disposed to underrate his ability to discharge the duties of his office, that in future it will be well to leave him alone. The defendant in the case had been drinking enough to inspire a little Dutch courage and had foolishly listened to a few lying busybodies, who by way of engineering some free drinks for themselves carried stories to him that the constable was going to arrest him. In this frame of mind he went on to the street about 10 o'clock on Thursday night and came across Sproule on the sidewalk opposite the Grand Union when he proceeded to precipitate trouble, first with his tongue and latterly with his fists. At this stage the constable proceeded to do things also, and without using revolver, baton or handcuff or even striking with his fists, managed in something less than a minute's time to choke his assailant into submission and had him on his way to the lock-up. A charge of aggravated assault was laid as provided for in the statute, but by a piece of good luck F. W. Groves, J. P., arrived in town and was requested by the local magistrate to sit with him on the case which enabled them to deal with it summarily, under Part XVI of the code. Otherwise on the evidence adduced at the hearing there would have been no alternative, but to commit for trial at the next court of competent jurisdiction when the case would have come before a judge and the punishment provided in such a case may go as high as two years imprisonment. The bench imposed a fine of \$100 and costs. They may have erred and gone beyond their power in the lightness of the fine imposed, but as the defendant acknowledged the wrong and gave assurances for future conduct, and the prosecutor also requested that all possible leniency be shown, they decided to take the risk of making the fine as low as they did.

Had the prosecutor taken the opposite course and claimed the full protection due him in the discharge of his duty, the bench would have had no hesitation in meting out the penalty which the law provides.

**A. Y. P. BUILDINGS READY.**

What Distinguished Visitors say of the Location and Arrangements.

Rear Admiral Robley D. Evans, better known as "Fighting Bob" was a visitor in Seattle recently, and during his stay here was the guest of the Alaska Yukon Pacific Exposition officials for a trip around the fair grounds. On the occasion of his visit he went through the manufactures and Oregon State buildings, in both of which exhibits are being installed. Admiral Evans expressed his approval of the fair in the following words:

"If one should comb all the world he could not find a more beautiful spot for an exposition than the site for the Alaska Yukon Pacific Fair. I have never seen anything myself to equal it. It is a veritable jewel of a place; and the fair will be ready, too, in my opinion."

"Fighting Bob" is not a man given to many words, but his quiet remarks about the exposition were fully appreciated by the fair management. The Admiral saw the Exposition Grounds with most of the large buildings complete, and a score of the smaller ones nearing completion. The fair grounds will be everywhere dotted with these smaller structures and they do much to complete the general plan of the grounds, and to give the finishing touches to the completed picture as it has been planned by the landscape men and the architect. Among the smaller buildings now being finished are the Dairy, Good Roads, Womens, Grand Trunk Railway, Arctic Brotherhood, Masonic, Y. W. C. A. and Hoo Hoo buildings. Then there are the three county buildings, representing Spokane, Chelan and Yakima counties, and of course dozens of shows along the Pay Streak.
