THAT DISMISSAL.

Prominent Liberals in this riding—not self-constituted spokesmen for the Liberal party, but men whose voices are listened to in the councils of the party, have assured the Gazette not only that they consider an injustice has been done to Mr. Wade in the matter of the Penticton post office, but that Duncan Ross has done an injury to their party in Yale-Cariboo by listening to those who have urged him to do this thing, and they repudiate the right of T. C. Revely to speak for them in this matter. One reason which they give for thus repudiating the letter which appeared in last week's Gazette is that instead of allowing an act of which they were heartily ashamed to be forgotten as soon as possible he must add further injury by placing the party in a still worse position by the ridiculous defence which he has allowed to appear over his name.

Anent the spoils system Mr. Revely must be credited with enunciating a principle of Liberal ethics, viz., that 9 years of Liberal rule should be considered the maximum for a Tory to hold office; and mark the fatherly indulgent way in which he condones the Government's offence. Mr. Wade moved the office "without the consent of the Government, a matter they are most particular about."

Note the self-satisfied chuckle contained in those concluding paragraphs—the parable of the smelter flat. Have property-owners in Hedley any reason to thank Mr. Revely for the publication of that kind of stuff? In all conscience surely the town has suffered enough this summer from the propagation of that sort of rot through the medium of jaw-vagging without putting it into cold print and sending it abroad to the whole province. In the first place, the cases are not parallel at all, for in Penticton both the old townsite and the new are owned by the Southern Okanagan Land Co., and to accuse them of wishing to do up the old townsite in the interests of the new by trying to get the post office moved is pure drivel. In the second place, it would be impossible to lay out smelter flat as a townsite and sell lots on it for it was obtained for smelter purposes, and not for town-siting, and for smelter purposes it must be used. In the third place if the Daily Reduction Co. had the power to townsite smelter flat and the majority of the people preferred to move there why shouldn't they have the post office there? The greatest good to the greatest number has always been considered good sound doctrine; but apparently it is to be excluded from Mr. Revely's new code of Liberal ethics.

So much for the letter signed T. C. Revely. There is also a column of misrepresentation in the Similkameen Star, signed Ajax and purporting to be from Penticton, but the manuscript for which never saw Penticton. A comparison of the two letters will settle very effectively the authorship of both, no matter what flimsy ruses may have been employed to conceal; but in this case the very clumsiness of the attempts to conceal, furnishes additional proof of identity.

Now the Gazette has made no misstatement of the case, except in one minor incident—that of the petition which it appears had not reached its destination when the dismissal was made, but it is by no means certain that Mr. Ross had not been advised by wire of the petition with its purport and the number of signatures attached before the dismissal was made. With

regard to the petition is it not remarkable that the same mis-statements should appear in both letters and couched in precisely the same words. They do not attempt to deny that 115 signatures out of 125 were on the petition to retain Mr. Wade, but they both say that the 115 were made up of transients. Now if men who have come in there and invested large sums in real estate and intend residing in Penticton are not to be considered genuine signers, then where do the carpet-baggers come in—the ones who formed a fair percentage of the remaining ten who would not sign, and no counter-petition could be got up in Penticton signed by bona fide property-holders or residents that could get a dozen signatures.

This attempt to convey the idea that it is a case of one townsite against the other is mere moonshine for reasons already pointed out, and is deliberately intended to throw dust in the people's eyes so as to blind them to the real issue. If the people of the old townsite didn't want to see the office moved why did Stewart & Mathias, who purchased the building occupied by Mr. Wade, force him out? To state that he was induced by the S. O. Land Co. to move the office is to tell a deliberate falsehood to mislead the public. The question of removal was never thought of until Mr. Wade was given notice to vacate, and it was only the question of the greatest convenience to the greatest number which prompted removal to the new townsite at all. To question that the greatest number is on the new townsite would never be thought of by anyone else except the writers of these letters, for the difference is simply overwhelming in favor of the new. In building this year fully five times more has been expended in the new townsite than in the old. Ajax says that the bank is in the old townsite and no one knew any better than he that the quarters in which the bank was opened were only temporary and that the new bank building had been arranged for at the outset, and commencement made forthwith to get it in shape, on Main street. But the amusing feature of all is that the point to which Mr. Wade had removed the office and where it is now located are only about from 150 to 200 feet apart, which proves that the question of convenience does not figure in the case so far as they are concerned, and that it is simply a vulgar exhibition of the spoils system.

Another feature which must not be lost sight of is that to give the thing a show of decency and order the Department sent Post Office Inspector Greenfield in to examine and report on the situation, but they would not wait until his report was received together with the petition of which cognizance would have to be taken.

There is in Ajax's letter an exhibition of personal antipathy towards the managing directors of the Southern Okanagan Land Co. The reason for that may be easily explained. The managers, however, do not require any advice from Ajax as to how the affairs of the company should be run, but they may have occasion to explain to the public how, in protecting the company's interests they were obliged to spoil a little game for Ajax.

As for Mr. T. C. Revely, a little additional light may be shed on the subject when it is known that rumor ascribed to Mr. Revely the first move for dispossessing Mr. Wade, it being currently reported fully three months before the dismissal, that Mr. Revely was to have the post office himself, and subsequent moves look as if he has, with the assistance of Mr. Ross, accomplished the remarkable feat of transferring something that he never had. This is the feature of the situation that is most repugnant to old Liberals, who feel that their party has been imposed upon to further personal ends, and that the more the affair is raked up the worse they, the Liberals, are scandalized.

W. T. Atherton went over to Midway last week to see his daughter. Miss Atherton has been ill and is endeavoring to regain strength camping over on the Kettle River with relatives.

Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Armstrong left yesterday for Hedley where they will reside. It is understood that Mr. Armstrong is going into business with J. A. Schubert.—Vernon News.

Mr. and Mrs. Schubert returned to Hedley last week after a three weeks' stay in Pentiction, where they were camping on the lake shore. Mr. Schubert thus combining business with pleasure.

Mr. W. D. McMillan was in town on Tuesday. Mr. McMillan is well pleased with the vigorous manner in which the B. C. Copper Co. are going to work to prove up the ore bodies on the Apex group which he recently bonded to them.

Chief Engineer Kennedy's trip west was cut short at Princeton by a telegram which he received calling him back to Ottawa where he must appear before the Railway Commission on the 29th. Mr. Hogeland went on over the new route to Hope, but Mr. Shields accompanied Mr. Kennedy back.

J. F. Royer and wife drove in on Tuesday. Mr. Royer has fully decided on running his stage through Fairview which will be a very great convenience. There should be a mail as well, especially since Fairview has been made a land office.

The children of the Methodist Sunday school will hold a picnic on Saturday, the 26th inst., on the bank of the Similkameen near Pinto's. Conveyances will be at the church at 8:30 to take the small children and the baskets. A cordial invitation is extended to all.

The Labor Day sports committee have been using every endeavor to secure an outside base-ball team for a match on the first day of the games. The prize of \$200 is a liberal one and should bring a good team. Oroville was disposed to entertain the proposal but finally declined. The committee next offered to give them \$100 towards expenses. This will mean that they will get \$200 if they win and \$100 if they lose. Some arrangement on those lines will likely be made.

Mr. Hilton Keith, of Allison, B. C., was in town on Monday. Mr. Keith is representing the Allison townsite in which the controlling interest has been purchased by the C.P.R. The big corporation is going to push Allison and make it an important railway point, which they can easily do as their line from Spence's Bridge will come out on the Similkameen at Allison, and the Great Northern railway must pass through, making it a junction point. The townsite itself is a beautiful piece of ground, making it a most desirable location for a town.

The trail to the Nickel Plate is very much in need of attention, as it is becoming dangerous in places. In fact the trip up the tramway looks to be the safer of the two at the present time, for the thin covering of earth on the steep mountainside is sliding down, and to make matters worse, some people who use the trail are in the habit of taking a short cut down crossing the various legs of the switch-back, by sliding their horses down in the dust. There was a man at work with a pick and shovel fixing up the lower end last week, but a footing will have to be cut in the bed rock in many places before it will be safe.

This year appears to be a repetition of last so far as quantity of water in the streams is concerned. The Gazette rode in company with an old prospector about ten or twelve miles over the country from which the water supply of Twenty Mile is supposed to come, and dry creek beds were pointed out that were never known to have been dry at this time of the year, or in fact any season until last year. There were some of them dry also that held out last year. Apparently there is a dry time ahead.

Mr. W. A. McLean was awarded the contract for putting in the irrigation works for the Southern Okanagan Land Co. This is a very extensive contract which will keep him busy for the balance of the year or more. His experience in this sort of work enabled him to figure closely on the cost of work, and the Southern Okanagan Land Co. are a business institution and appreciate close figures provided they go with good work.

Complaints are made to the Gazette of shooting out of season. It is said that a party down on Sixteen Mile were slaughtering birds last week in a shameful manner. The season for grouse does not open until September 1st, and this year it is claimed that the birds seem to be two or three weeks later, which would have made Sept. 15th a more suitable date this season. On Twenty Mile lake fool-hen chicks were seen on Sunday last that were not much bigger than an ordinary sized apple.

Jas. Hislop, P. L. S., received notice last week to report at Winnipeg for construction work on the Grand Trunk Pacific and on Thursday morning took the flyer to go out by way of Midway where he had to turn over his field notes to the Chief Engineer of the Great Northern for whom he had been doing work down in the Similkameen. Mr. Hislop's departure from Hedley at the present time is to be regretted, for he was a good citizen, but railroad engineering has always been his strong point and hence his impatience to go back to it.

Reggie Shatford, the little son of L. W. Shatford, M. P. P. was playing on Monday afternoon near the Hotel Similkameen where they are stopping, and in climbing a small tree he fell on a hornet's nest and was badly stung about the face and all over the body. The shock was enough to have killed many a grown up person, but he is a sturdy little fellow, and a strong constitution with prompt medical assistance brought him through all right.
