WAITING FOR FIR TIMBER.

Track-laying Machine Held Up on Myers Creek-Three Weeks' Waiting for. Douglas Fir

(Spokesman-Review)

Molson, Wash., Aug. 14-For nearly three weeks the V., V. & E. track-laying machine has been at a standstill on the east side of the long trestle which crosses Myers creek. They have plenty of rails and plenty of ties and a crew which is large enough to allow them to proceed at the rate of a mile a day, but are held up on account of the lack of stringers for the trestle. While the trestle itself is composed largely of tamarack and native fir, it is desirable that the stringers used on it be made of Douglas fir grown on Puget Sound. Orders for this were placed a long time ago, but for some reason have not yet been delivered. logical Survey, arrived in Hedley, accompanied by Mr. Duncan Ross, M.P., the representative of Yale-Cariboo. This, so far as we are aware, is the

first time that the Similkameen has ever been honored with a visit from the Director of the Survey, for when Dr. Dawson was here in 1877 he was not yet the Director, but was occupying a subordinate position under Dr.

The fact that Mr. Lowe has taken in hand to visit personally the various out-posts so shortly after his promotion to the headship of the department, is evidence that no mistake has been made in his selection for the position and that henceforth the work of the department will be prosecuted with vigor.

### A CARGO OF STEEL RAILS.

To Be Used on the V. V. & E.—Enough for 42 Miles, Anyway

(Province)

Seattle, Aug. 14-The British steamer Boveric is due at Scattle with a cargo of Six thousand tons of steel rails, coming from Nova Scotia mills, for use in the construction of the Victoria, Vancouver and Eastern Railroad. The rails are turned out at Sydney, Cape Breton, mills and brought by the new Hill line to save duty. They will be held at the Smith Cove docks under bond until required in construction work, and then shipthat the change had been made, and ped north by rail or steamer line as is most convenient. ### HOSPITAL MEETING

Attendance but Considerable
Business Transacted Small

The special general meeting of the Hedley General Hospital Society was held on Monday night at which a very slim attendance of the members was noticed.

In the absence of Mr. G. P. Jones. President of the provisional directors, Mr. Harvey Tingley was appointed chairman, and Mr. Frank H, French. secretary of the provisional board discharged the duties of secretary.

The minutes of last general meeting being duly disposed of, the chairman gave a resume of the work that had been done, explaining that in order to comply with the conditions upon which the special appropriation had been granted, it had been necessary to incorporate under the Benevolent Societies Act and that this had been done. He explained why the annual meeting had not been held at the time specified in the by-laws, and the imperative reasons for present meeting.

Mr. L. G. MacHaffie, treasurer presented the financial statement showing total amount raised to be \$1014' and expenditures amounting to \$169 leaving a balance of \$845.

Messrs A. Megraw and E. D. Boeing moved that all the assets of the Hedley General Hospital Society, be transferred to the Hedley General Hospital Society, incorporated August 11th, 1908, and that the secretary be authorized to make such transfer, which motion was carried.

MORE FINDS ON GOLDEN ZONE Another Important Discovery Was Made

Last Week.

Last week another important find was made on the Golden Zone group, and the discovery was quite accidental.

The owners, in prosecuting work, found it necessary to burn a pit of charcoal, and J. Murphy in preparing the pit had removed only about two feet of earth when strong signs of the covering of a vein were evident and on breaking into it a little farther a new vein was discovered running in a southeasterly and northwesterly direction, and intersecting the old vein at an angle of about 45 degrees. The new vein is about five feet wide, the rock being quartz carrying arsenopyrite, Three samples were taken from the vein, and the values were found to be most encouraging. Assay for gold only was made. The quartz carrying arsenopyrite went \$30 per ton in gold; a general average gave \$13.60 and the quartz itself \$2.80 per ton. The gossan pans quite freely. From the bottom face of a very deep cut on the old vein, the new one should be reached by driving a little over 20 feet, and this should strike the new vein at a depth of about 30 feet.

The owners, Messrs. Marks, Brodhagen and Murphy, are finding in the Golden Zone group a property that gives fresh surprises for every piece of work that is done on it.

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### GEOLOGICAL SURVEY.

The figures given by Mr. A. P Lowe, Director of the Geologi-cal Survey, published in another Is this matter of having, in column, should furnish a text Canada, a properly equipped, Survey is placed on the proper umbia press? footing to do genuine work in economic geological research, in this and other provinces. Mr. Lowe by diving into figures compiled in his department for Hon. Mr. Templeman, who requested them, ascertained that while the mineral production of Canada had increased between six hundred and seven hundred per cent, the increase in expenditure on the Geological Survey to keep pace with this enormous sources of the Dominion, had to South America. been only thirty per cent. These are telling figures and they certainly bear out the contention that heretofore the Geological Survey has been only the tail end of the Department of the Interior.

The fact that Hon. Mr. Tem pleman has requested the compilation of these and other figures, is evidence that he recognizes the necessity for a change. This would indicate that he means to ask parliament for an increased appropriation for the Geological Survey in order to extend its sphere of usefulness. This is, or should be, a question of public administration rather than of party politics, and until the Minister in charge shows by his actions that he means to introduce politics into the work of the Survey, it is proper that the entire press of the province should assume that he intends to keep politics out of it, and give him all the assistance that they can.

British Columbia being the greatest mining province of the Dominion, stands to benefit most by any movement calculated to accelerate the development of the mineral resources of Canada, and money expended on the Geological Survey is undoubtedly a gilt-edge invest-ment, not only for this province but for every portion of Canada, for every province is interested, both directly and indirectly. If the mineral production of Canada increased over six hundred per cent. with only thirty per cent. increase on the amount expended on the Geological Survey which is supposed to keep pace with the development of the mineral resources (but in)




