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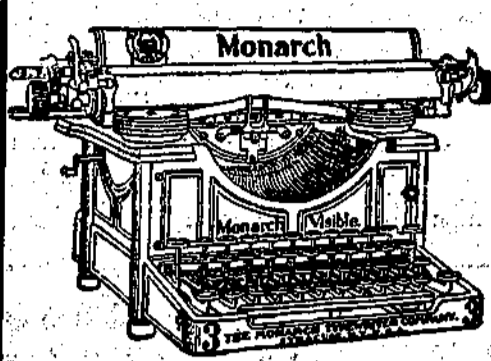

McKINNEY REDIVIVUS

Work to Begin on Waterloo and Fon-
tenoy Properties in a Few Days

After long waiting and much negoti-
ation a bond has been secured on the
Waterloo and Fontenoy properties in
Camp McKinney by Victoria parties,
and the work of unwatering is to be-
gin this week.

The Waterloo was owned by the
Waterloo Gold Mining Co. of which
the controlling interest was vested in
the Clark family, the late Dennis
Clark holding a large amount of the
stock and his demise was the cause of
the long delay in getting things in
shape to resume operations. A great
deal of stock was also held in Spokane
outside the Clark interest. The Fon-
tenoy which adjoins the Waterloo on
the east, and the west line of which is
less than 100 feet from the Waterloo
main working shaft, is owned by the
Fontenoy Mining Co., the leading
stock holder in it being ex-Lieutenant
Governor Dunsmuir. The claim had
been held for many years by the late
Hugh Cameron who sold it for \$20,000
cash to the company formed in the
late fall of 1898 to take it over and de-
velopment began in the spring of 1899
but internal friction led to a protract-
ed shutdown.

The Fontenoy deposit upon which
all the development work was done
consisted of a white quartz vein well
mineralized with galena and carrying
values in both silver and gold the
former being the leading value al-
though the gold contents were often
shown to be good enough of them-
selves. But the main value of the Fon-
tenoy in the opinions of old-timers in
the camp was in its position to catch
the Waterloo vein which ran east and
west, carrying high gold values and
followed by underground drifts of the
Waterloo almost is not actually up to
the western boundary line of the Fon-
tenoy itself.

It was this state of affairs which
made the Waterloo interests headed
by the late Dennis Clark anxious to
secure the Fontenoy and relying upon
the disorganization existing in the
Fontenoy, negotiations to that end
were constantly kept up until his
death a few years ago and since then
hope of amalgamation of the two in-
terests which was for years a fond
dream in the old camp was almost
abandoned by the most optimistic.

The Waterloo was developed to a
depth of 250 feet; it has a fairly well-
equipped stamp-mill which turned out
considerable bullion between the years
1900 and 1904 and paid some dividends
to stock holders. It had its difficulties
to contend with in the matter of faulty
ground like all other properties in
the camp upon which development to
any considerable depth was attempt-
ed; but when it is remembered that
the Cariboo encountered something
like 300 of these faults in its career
during its production of \$1,700,000 in
bullion, and every one of the 300 faults
obedient to "Schmidt's Law of the
Hade" their existence in the Waterloo
(troublesome as they were at times)
were regarded more as testimonials of
good character than otherwise.

The present deal under which work
is being resumed was effected by Louis
Hind and his partner C. A. Cane and
the development work under the bond
will be under the direction of Mr.
Cane. Mr. Henry Nicholson also lent
valuable aid in bringing negotiations
to a head.

MORE CONTRACTS LET

Kettle Valley People Make Move for
Start on East End Section from
Rock Creek to Bull Creek

Much dissatisfaction has been felt in
the Boundary because of the delay on
the part of the Kettle Valley people to
get to work on that end and the dis-
satisfaction was not lessened at the
manoeuvre of the railway in putting
on a man or two in June to observe a
little technicality in the matter of
commencement. Over at Grand Forks
they held an indignation meeting
but now the railway has at last decid-
ed to get busy as will be seen from the
following news item appearing in
coast papers.

Victoria, Aug. 18th—A contract for
the extension of the Kettle Valley
Railway line from Rock Creek to Bull
Creek, on the West Fork of Kettle
River, a distance of thirty-five miles,
has been awarded to Messrs. L. M.
Rice & Co., contractors of Vancouver
and Seattle. The grade has already
been completed from Midway west for
ten miles. Construction work will be
started within three weeks. Mr. J. J.
Warren, of Toronto, president of the
railway company, has left here for
Midway.

The building of a twenty-five-mile
section of the same road from Merritt
south through Nicola Valley is now in
progress. The company has authority
to extend its line from a point south
of Merritt, across the Hope mountains
to Ruby Creek, below Hope. At Ruby
Creek after bridging the Fraser River
connection will be established with
the Canadian Pacific Railway, whose
tracks it already connects with at
Midway and Merritt. The distance
from Midway to Ruby Creek is about
271 miles. By means of its connec-
tions the Kettle Valley route will af-
ford as direct a line between the coast
and Kootenays as the V. V. & E. rail-
way, a Hill road.

DEATH OF A PIONEER

Angus Lamont, Another of the Old Cari-
boo Miners, Passes Away

(Similkameen Star)

Last Thursday night at 12 o'clock
one of the oldest of the pioneers of the
province, in the person of Angus La-
mont took his last long ride over the
Great Divide. Deceased had been ill
for about two years, gradually declin-
ing until he literally fell asleep, ap-
parently without mental or physical
pain. His end was peace, for so he
lived, without an enemy. An honest
and just citizen, good neighbor, his
money and his hand were always
ready to help. Born at Eramosa, Ont.,
some 72 years ago, he came to British
Columbia as a young man, when the
gold fever was at its height. He went
to Cariboo in the early sixties rang-
ling in the great stampede of gold-
hunters which was then taking place,
finally, after a varied run of luck in
mining he settled down on his ranch
at Ashnola. The deceased sold his
ranch some four years ago, which gave
him ample to retire on and leaves his
wife well provided for in terms of the
will, the executors being W. C. Mc-
Dougall, W. C. McLean and J. B.
Wood. The funeral was at 4 o'clock,
Saturday, from the courthouse, service
being conducted by the Rev. J. Thur-
burn-Conn, (Presbyterian.) Four of
the pall-bearers were fellow gold-
diggers in Cariboo, their combined ages
stretching back nearly three centuries
viz: Hon. Edgar Dewdney, ex-Minister
of the Interior and former Lieut-Gov-
ernor of the N. W. Territories and also
of British Columbia; Col. Robert
Stevenson, Hugh Campbell and Sam-
uel Pearce. The deceased leaves a wife
and sister in Ontario, and other rela-
tives, to whom Star extends sincere
sympathy.

disembowelling Motia. Immediately
after the deed Dizio was overpowered
by the bystanders and prevented from
getting away until he could be taken
into custody under the strong arm of
the law.

The principal witnesses were Giusto
Nico and Joe Pelocci. The case was
heard before C. E. Thomas, J. P., who
suspended sentence for a few days
awaiting the outcome of the establish-
ing which it was feared might terminate
seriously.

TROUBLE ON WEST END

V. V. & E. Suspend Operations between
Abbotsford and Chilliwack

Chilliwack, Aug. 19.—The suspen-
sion of construction on the V. V. &
E. section of the Great Northern be-
tween Abbotsford and Chilliwack has
evoked expressions of regret in this
city, it being the hope of the citizens
that this fall would see the comple-
tion of the extension from New West-
minster to Chilliwack. It is reported
that the Great Northern right-of-way
agent, Mr. Simon, has stated that the
cause for the temporary suspension
of construction is owing to the com-
pany not being able to make satis-
factory settlement of the right-of-way
with the property owners of the val-
ley, the prices asked being, as the
company thinks, unreasonably high.
The trouble up to the present is on
this section between this city and
Abbotsford. No attempt has been
made to purchase right-of-way
through Chilliwack municipality un-
til adjustment of the Sumas section.
There were along thirteen miles of
this section six construction camps
with a force of 350 men. In addition
to the ordinary equipment the con-
tractors were using three steam
shovels and six dinkies.

Unable to secure a satisfactory
price, the V. V. & E. will be com-
pelled to leave the matter to a board
of arbitrators. In that case the com-
pany's officials declare the farmers do
not fare as well as they would had
they settled with the company in the
first place. The farmers claim their
property is steadily advancing and
from \$100 to \$1000 an acre they con-
sider none too much. The railway
officials reply that the coming of the
railway has advanced the value of
property along the line and that the
company should not pay for values
the railway has created.

The Canadian Northern Railway
Company, which is building through
the same section of country is ben-
efiting by the Great Northern shut-
down, as they have been able to se-
cure most of the men who have been
discharged from the latter company's
works.

EDITORIAL COMMENTS

Much was expected from the recent gathering of the General Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, in the matter of the impending union between the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregationalist bodies, but the attitude of Dr. Carman, chairman of the Conference did not leave much to hope for from that quarter. If he had come out in pronounced opposition and given reasons for his attitude, little fault could be found, provided the reasons given were sane and sincere; but the antipathy which manifests itself in "damning with faint praise" and the doubts he expressed on grounds that could not be dignified as reasons but bore more the semblance of prejudice were unworthy the man and unworthy of the office. They were clearly the utterances of a man who had put his hand to the plow and was looking back and they struck the keynote for the smaller fry to raise the old cry "great is Diana of the Ephesians." When one considers that the present union movement emanated largely from the late Rev. Dr. Sutherland, a pillar in the same great body of which Dr. Carman is now the head, and that the basis of union agreed upon by the joint committee appointed to arrive at such, was largely the work of Dr. Sutherland, the greater surprise and regret must be felt that the wet blanket is now being applied by Dr. Carman. One of the so-called reasons he gave was the difficulty of rending old associations and the disposal of old assets and relics. Among some others of these belongings he mentioned the book-room. "What would they do with the book-room?" It is much to be regretted that the strong Dr. Carman of a decade ago should exhibit so little hope and confidence as to worry over insignificant details at so critical a moment and endanger the consummation of a movement which he admitted was the most important that had confronted the church for a hundred years.

On the south bank of Rock Creek between Myncester and Bridesville some of the mineral claims over which the railway were given free right of way have been fire swept and much valuable timber destroyed. That was certainly poor return for the courtesy shown them in the matter of free right of way.

Kereneos fruit continues to arrive and is being marketed as rapidly as the fruit growers can dispose of it. As one party remarked "Kereneos begins to look like a fruit town when you see from 200 to 300 boxes going out every evening on the southbound train." Fruit-jobber Carle tries to keep the stores in Hedley supplied with fresh fruit and obtains a ready sale for all he brings in. The first peaches he brought in a few weeks ago were the clingstone, but now the better varieties are beginning to come in. Ripe tomatoes are also meeting ready sale.

NOW, WHAT DO YOU THINK OF THAT?

That it is illegal to shoot bear anywhere in the province of British Columbia between July 15th and Sept. 1 and that it is unlawful to trap bear south of the C.P.R. mainline at any time was the statement made yesterday by J. T. Black, chief provincial constable.

Considerable doubt has been expressed by miners and ranchers and others who came in contact with members of the Bruin family whether there was any law on the statutes prohibiting the killing of bear, and the above was Mr. Black's reply when questioned on the subject.

A large black bear a few days ago appeared during the night at a cabin occupied by some men at work on the Golden Fawn Group of Mines at Sheep creek. Evidently drawn by the enticing odor of the miners' bacon and beans bruin succeeded in forcing open the door of the cabin with one of his front paws, and walking inside confronted the two astonished and somewhat scared occupants.

One ineffective shot at a distance of about 15 feet, was taken at the intruder who succeeded in making a noisy escape into the brush. Not content with the unsatisfactory ending to his first visit the bear again appeared on two successive nights, but got clean away each time.

The staff on the Golden Fish wish to know what they should do in cases of this kind. Should they set aside a steaming hot dish of bacon and beans for the refreshment of their somewhat dangerous visitor, or should they break the law by peppering him with a 30-30? -Nelson News.



Mr. G. B. MURPHY

News has been received here of the death of Mr. G. B. Murphy which occurred at his home at Carberry, Man., on Monday morning last. Mr. Murphy was married to a sister of J.
