GIVE INVESTORS SQUARE DEAL

Extravagant Boosters of Unproved
Camps Are Worst Enemies to
Legitimate Mining.

There is no industry in existence which requires as much optimism as mining, but we should be sure that the term is not misapplied and that nothing be allowed to pass for optimism that might more correctly be designated by another name. The right kind of optimism can be as cold blooded as that which is popularly supposed to go only with rank pessimism, and that is the kind of optimism that should obtain in mining.

The Gazette does not believe in knocking and does not make a practice of doing so and neither do we believe that blind folly should ever be allowed to masquerade as optimism. Extravagant unverified statements about any new discovery will never deceive the true optimist who is in the mining business and understands what he is doing, but there are many who are disposed to try their luck in a mining venture who do not possess the knowledge of mining or of the conditions which should exist in a mining proposition to give an investor a fair run for his money. In the interests of such as these and in the interests of mining generally it is only right for the press in mining districts to sound a note of warning when they have evidence that there is danger of the innocent being imposed upon and another blow given to the industry as the result of unwise boosting of unproved discoveries.

At present there are brokers and newspapers in Vancouver and elsewhere engaged in what seems to be an altogether unwarranted boosting of Steamboat Mountain. Although brokers are asking the public to buy stock in companies organized to exploit properties in that locality no public official or mining engineer of repute has yet been asked to stake his professional reputation on the indorsation of the new camp and from what we have learned from some who have seen the layout, who have had sufficient experience in mining to judge a prospect on its merits, and who are leaving it severely alone, it does seem that much of the boosting which has been done is altogether premature. It may be possible that something may be found there which may make it a producing camp but it is unfair to the camp itself to circulate extravagant statements concerning it in order to sell stocks to those who are unable to weigh evidence and thus protect themselves. There are plenty of mining properties through British Columbia in proved camps that have sufficiently well authenticated merit to warrant the investing public to take a chance on them and the money is needed to develop such instead of being squandered in schemes where not one of the slightest or commonest safeguards to protect the public appears to have been taken.

MORE V. V. & E. SURVEYS

Lower Grade Obtained East of Hope
Summit

Plans of a revised survey of the route of the V. V. & E. Railway from the summit of the Hope Mountains at the headwaters of the Coquihalla River down the eastern slope to Otter Flat, a distance of forty miles are now being prepared at the office of the company in Vancouver. They will be forwarded and filed at once with the minister of railways at Ottawa as required by law.

Two survey parties spent the past season on the east slope of the Hope Mountain, with the object of securing a lower grade than has been obtained in the previous year. Successful results were achieved, according to the report made to the chief engineer, Mr. James H. Kennedy.

For the entire distance of forty miles there is only a small section with a maximum grade of 1.2 per cent, and less than ten miles of a 1 per cent., the remaining and major portion proving a gradient of only eight-tenths of 1 per cent. This would indicate that the problem of building westward from Princeton to the summit will not present any serious engineering difficulties and will not be nearly as expensive as had been expected.

The road is now completed west from the Boundary district to Princeton in the Similkameen and is in operation, and ten miles of roadbed has been graded west of Princeton.

It is understood that construction of the forty mile section from the end of the graded section at Otter Flat to the summit will be started early next spring and will be prosecuted with vigor. Construction of the section from the summit down the western slope to Hope may be postponed until a later date as the original survey has not yet been finally revised. The grades being steeper than on the other side of the divide. Two years, it is expected, will see the completion of the gap between Vancouver and Princeton.

WEST YALE ELECTION

Lucas Gets It By Acclamation—Neither
of the Self Nominated Candidates
Face the Polls

Alexander Lucas the choice of the Agassiz convention has been declared representative of the provincial riding of West Yale by acclamation. J. P. McConnell and T. E. Julian had each announced themselves independent candidates in opposition but the electorate did not regard either of them seriously and they withdrew before polling day which was to have been held on Monday had there been a contest.

The choice of Lucas gives to West Yale an able representative who will be able to look after the interests of the riding at Victoria.

FIRST SCOTT ACT VOTE

Prince Rupert and Chilliwack Chosen as
Battle Grounds

Victoria, B. C. Nov. 23.—The first public and official intimation that has been given in this province of a definite consummation of the attempt to have the provisions of the Canada Temperance act (more commonly known as the Scott act) made applicable in British Columbia, appears in the Gazette of today in a re-publication of a Dominion proclamation containing petitions in its behalf, presented from Prince Rupert and Chilliwack, and announcing that a poll of the qualified voters on the subject will be taken at Chilliwack on Wednesday Dec. 14, and at Prince Rupert, both the interested cities. The petition in order to secure the submission to a vote of the question as to whether the theoretically prohibitory law shall be locally substituted for British Columbia's present drastic and rigorously enforced high licence and strict regulation plan are by law required to represent in signatories one-fourth of the qualified voters, while a bare majority is sufficient to carry or reject the proposal at the polls. The Prince Rupert petition contained 24 names and that at Chilliwack 140.

"TWELFTH NIGHT"

Those who looked forward to a treat in the presentation of "Twelfth Night" were not disappointed for of all the entertainments that have been given in Hedley there have been none that have amused and at the same time afforded the intellectual treat which was enjoyed in listening to this fine old comedy by the master of dramatists in all ages. While there was a fairly good house yet Hedley really owed it to herself to have done better, for there were quite a number absent who generally turn out to entertainments much less deserving of patronage, and if we are to expect the best troupes to include the town in their itinerary it is policy to patronize the best when they do come since by that means we may encourage good companies to visit us instead of giving us the go-by. The troupe presenting the play in this instance were fully able to handle the Shakespearean drama as it should be given and their performance here was from start to finish a source of delight. Even if their presentation of the play in Hedley had been a trifle off color, which it did not in the least whit appear to be, there would have been ample excuse for it when it was known that they showed in Penticton the night before and left there at midnight to drive to Keremeos (an all night drive) to catch the forenoon train to Hedley, and then all the sleep they had was the few hours they could obtain here on Friday afternoon. Nevertheless everything went off smoothly as became an aggregation which concentrates effort and attention on one production, and that a classic, instead of dissipating their talents over a varied repertoire of modern pieces often devoid of any special merit and indifferently studied out which might enable them to bring out any special merit which a piece might accidentally contain or carry with them the requisite scenery to stage a mixed repertoire.

In putting on "Twelfth Night" certain scenes were cut and altered to suit modern tastes and modern social requirements and to a certain extent re-arranged for stage convenience but nevertheless the text of the immortal William was preserved with extraordinary faithfulness and given in a manner betokening careful study of it, while costumes and scenery were specially apt as an aid to bring out the meaning and produce the right effect. Especially well taken were the parts of Viola and Sir Toby Belch by Violet Eddy and William Yale and neither was their any fault to be found with the acting of Orsino, Olivia, Malvolio, Maria or Sir Andrew Ague Cheek.

After all it is no wonder that this has been one of the most popular of the Shakespearean comedies and in the great centres held the boards for so many nights in succession when played by great artists.

THE BRITISH ELECTIONS

Interest Not as Intense as a Year Ago—
Possibilities of Important Liberal
Defections over Destruction
of Veto

With the dissolution of the House on Monday 28th, the British campaign was on in earnest. The number of uncontested constituencies on both sides is taken as evidence of the unpreparedness of both parties for a contest so soon after the struggle of a year ago. In point of plentiful supply of the sinew of war the Irish appear to have the credit of being the best heeled, T. P. O'Connor's American tour appearing to have been particularly successful. The Unionists have to make that circumstance tell against the government, by showing foreign dollars are interested in keeping Britain free trade.

Evidence is accumulating of a pact between the Irish nationalists and the Liberals to give Ireland home rule after the Redmond model as opposed to the O'Brien model. Redmond's appeal to the Irish in Australia in which he assures them that a Liberal victory will mean immediate and full home rule for Ireland will be difficult to explain away on any other conclusion than that a hard and fast compact has been entered into between Asquith and Redmond and the fact that Redmond is opposing O'Brien in Cork shows that it will not be the O'Brien idea of home rule which will be followed. O'Brien is not a separatist but wants home rule for Ireland on the same lines as we have it in Canada. If this kind of home rule would satisfy Redmond he would not be opposing O'Brien's election.

Joe Martin is again the Liberal candidate in St. Pancras where his denunciation of the government does not appear to have made him any the less popular.

Of the other Canadians who are running Bonar Law in Lancashire seems to be in the storm centre and is fighting it out on tariff reform.

Several important defections from the Liberal ranks have already occurred, the principal cause being alarm at the threatened total destruction of the Lords' veto power and there is also evidence that for the same cause many of the Unionist free traders will regard tariff reform as the lesser of two evils and no longer allow the trade question to influence their votes, preferring maintenance of the constitution to that of adherence to a single plank like the tariff. Rudyard Kipling is the latest to point out the danger to the constitution in robbing the second chamber of its power to safeguard.

K. V.'S EXTENSIVE PROGRAM

Application to Parliament for Enlarged
Charter Powers

The Kettle River Valley Railway Company is applying at Ottawa for increased powers among which is for permission to change its name to the Kettle Valley Railway Company and to construct branches as follows:

(1) from Penticton by the most feasible route to a point on the International boundary at or near the shore line of Osoyoos Lake; (2) from a point on the company's line already authorized, by the most feasible route, to a point at or near Allison or Princeton (3) from a point on the company's line already authorized from Coldwater river to the Fraser river, by the most feasible route, to Steamboat Mountain Mining Camp.

ULSTER TALKS SECESH

Declare Their Intention to Rebel Against
Domination from Dublin

The pact between Redmond and Asquith has aroused Ulster to fighting pitch and a mass meeting held in Belfast passed resolutions expressive of their determination to fight rather than submit to a home rule arrangement which would place them in the hands of the nationalist and compel them to pay taxes to Dublin which they say they will never do.

The meeting even is said to have gone so far as to subscribe £50,000 to purchase arms.

A CONSTITUTIONAL WEAKNESS

The present difficulty between Mexico and the United States leads the Mining and Scientific Press to state editorially with commendable frankness that "thinking Americans must recognize that in this affair we are deeply in the wrong", and deplores the fact that a lawless mob in Texas will precipitate trouble of this kind which not only brings discredit upon the whole country but endangers the lives of Americans in Mexico who are there peaceably pursuing their work of mining. The Press further, with most remarkable honesty and candor, says:

"It is expected that the Mexican government will effectively protect the Americans in Mexico, and it is believed that it will do so, but in the United States the national government is practically powerless to protect Mexicans or any others, including its own citizens, against mob violence. Preservation of the peace is a function of the State and local governments, and when public opinion in any district condones the act of a mob, as it often does, there is small chance of bringing anyone to justice."

A late president, Benjamin Harrison, argued that when the federal government has the power to make treaties with foreign countries the same government should have power to enforce treaty obligations upon its own citizens and to that end he recommended the passing of a federal law giving the federal government power to interpose in the administration of justice in any matter where the enforcement of treaty obligations is involved, but his recommendation was never considered and no such law has ever yet been passed.

In Canada we have reason to be thankful that so much care and consideration was given to the matter of the Canadian constitution as embodied in the British North America Act. Of course the fathers of the Canadian confederation had the advantage of seeing the weakness demonstrated in the working out of a legislative union as opposed to a federal union, for when the B. N. A. Act was being considered, the war between the north and the south had just closed and was an object lesson before them of a grave inherent weakness to be avoided; for therein lay both the cause of the war itself and the disadvantage of

prosecuting it as effectively when once launched as it might be done under a federal union. But apart altogether from the question of war there is involved the greater consideration of the maintenance of peace and order at all times among our own citizens. In Canada the federal government maintains control of the administration of justice although the provinces foot the bill and have the appointing of the minor peace officers, but the courts are controlled and all the judges appointed by the federal power whose strong arm is pledged to the enforcement of the laws; and after all it is the certainty of punishment for the violation of the laws of any country which makes it a safe wholesome country to live in.

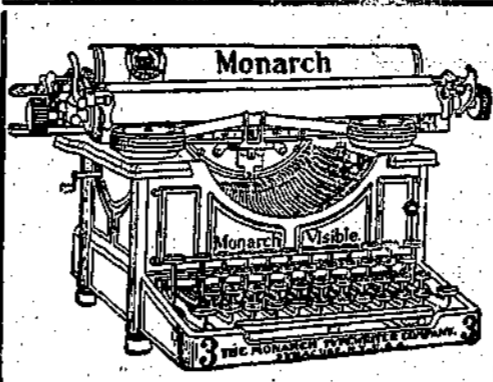

The new generator took its first load on Sunday although it had been run light for several days to ensure being properly dried out. It will be some time before all the motors in the mill are in place so as to give it a chance of showing what it can do when it full load is on. The new engine thus far has been supplying the motive power.

The Star says that Mr. and Mrs. Hale have removed from Princeton and will spend the winter in Vancouver.
