AFTERMATH OF FRUIT EXHIBIT

Further Details of the Fruit That Made Up the Similkameen Exhibit.

While the Similkameen exhibit sent out by the Farmers' Exchange, of Keremeos, was not fortunate enough to get a place on the prize list, among so many competitors, at the competition which formed a part of the big convention of the Northwest Fruit-growers' Association at Vancouver recently, it is important to know that it was not the fruit so much as inexperience on the part of the exhibitors, who did not make the selection of their fruit that would win the greatest number of points. The biggest apples of the tree are not of necessity the best, and connoisseurs in that line look for other qualities than bigness. Then again, there is the matter of packing and displaying to the best advantage. It is admitted that it was on these points that the Similkameen exhibitors fell down.

The Similkameen selection consisted of eight boxes of apples. One from Mrs. Lowe's orchard was the Bell-flower; one from Mr. Barcello's, a Blue Pearmain; one from C. A. McDonald's, a Wagner; one from F. Richter's, a Baldwin; and four from Mrs. Daly's, comprising Bell-flower, Northern Spy, Greening and Black Ben.

There were some excellent boxes left that on account of name of variety not being known could not be exhibited, one from Mr. Manery's being especially noticeable.

SOME CHRISTMAS DISPLAYS.

A neat piece of window dressing is to be seen at the big store of Shatfords Limited. With four large, roony plate glass windows to give elbow room, the artistic window-dresser was given opportunity to spread, and in this case some artistic effects are produced. The two windows in the dry goods department are rendered captivating by a particularly tasteful arrangement of the goods. One window of this department is reserved for gents' furnishings, but the "piece de resistance" is the window devoted to ladies' fancy wear, in which those airy creations that delight the feminine eye are grouped and displayed with the most artistic effect. Collars, belts, hand satchels, manicure sets, mirrors &c., were the articles used, but the grouping and marshalling was wherein lay the art, and suggested feminine assistance or counsel. The window in the grocery department is calculated to awaken yearnings in the small boy, for confectionery plays a prominent part. A big bucket of chocolates on the side illustrates literally and metaphorically the meaning of the word "profusion." The cutlery window shares with that of the ladies' department the honors for artistic grouping, all shades from the severe steel gray of the scissors and carving sets to the bright sheen of the silverware being blended.

At John Love's drug and stationery store, holiday goods have the call, and it is principally to the display of these that some effective window-dressing has been employed. The body of the store has also been made to take on a holiday appearance.

At R. G. Shier's a display of men's furnishings is made. Fancy vests, ties, collars, hats, handkerchiefs and other articles to deck out the Beau Brummels to the mashing point are laid out in tempting fashion.

DOMINION ESTIMATES.

Appropriations Made Bring Expenditure Beyond High Water Mark.

The estimates brought down at Ottawa have all the appearance of making this a pre-election session. As a rule the session immediately preceding a general election shows much greater appropriations for public works throughout the country than any other, but these are mostly done in the supplementaries which are brought in at the end of the session.

The estimates now brought down to the house show a total expenditure of \$119,237,001, or nearly \$14,000,000 greater than last year. There is a marked increase of the percentage of total estimates going this year into public buildings in the various towns and cities.

Among the towns whose appropriations for public buildings go to swell the general list are, Cranbrook, Cumberland, Fernie, Ladysmith, Quesnel, Vancouver, Vernon and Victoria.

The items which interest Yale-Cariboo most are:

Vernon, public buildings, \$5,000.
Salmon Arm, Shuswap lake, wharf, \$2,000.

Thompson River, removal of sand and gravel bars, \$3,000.

Woods and Long Lakes, Okanagan district, opening of boat channel between these lakes, etc., \$5,000.

Vernon, Kelowna - Penticton line, \$5,500.

Vernon to Lumby, telegraph, \$1,700.

How Financial Depression Increases the Woes of Mining Investors.

He has just wound up a tour that carried him to many of the supposedly solid financial centres of the land on a mission for money. He landed some, but he declares the struggle to have been as exciting as trying to land a whale with a hand line. People are adhering to ready cash like tangle-foot to a fly's pedals, and no matter what gilded song and dance one gives them as to swift and monstrous returns on a small investment, they are dead set in the belief that a dollar in the pocket is worth fifty in the hereafter. Stevey, we believe, could sweat money out of a miser, if he started in to do it, but he says if anyone thinks it is a spasm of sport to raise funds just now on any kind of proposition, even a gold brick, he is suffering from pressure on the brain. LICENCES FOR NEXT YEAR

List of Those Who Are Authorized to Sell Intoxicants in 1908.

The regular or semi-annual meeting of the Boards of Licence Commissioners, under the Liquor Licence Act, were held on Monday, Dec. 16th.

A notable feature of this meeting is that it is likely to be the last meeting of commissioners held under the Liquor Licence Act of 1900, it being currently reported that that act will be repealed at the coming session of the provincial legislature, and the whole machinery of the liquor traffic administered by a special department of the government at the head of which will be Superintendent. Hussey of the provincial police.

The present Act was first brought in by Joe Martin in 1899, he being then Attorney-general of the Semlin-Cotton administration. In April, 1900, it was found to be ultra vires, and from April to August of that year the unique spectacle was witnessed of the traffic running itself during the inter-regnum. Those who had been granted licences did not apply for rebate, but went on selling, and it did not appear that any others ventured to set up shibeus and sell without any authority. The first act of the new Dunsmuir government was to alter the Martin bill to conform to the requirements of the Federal authorities and the act then put through was known as the Liquor Licence Act of 1900, under which the traffic has been administered during the past seven years. As an act it had its good points and also its weak ones; although the main weakness could not be charged up against the act but against the commissioners and licence inspectors who failed to do their duty under it.

Until details are known of the scheme which is to take its place, no criticism of it is in order nor comparisons to be instituted. That will come later on when an opportunity is afforded of judging it fairly on its merits and the results which it may produce, duly weighed to see whether they be good or bad.

THE LABOR SITUATION

The labor situation is believed to have improved somewhat during the past week and some who a week ago had given up hope of any agreement being arrived at by which work would continue, have been encouraged by news from the Boundary where there is now said to be a possibility of miners and mine-owners getting together.

While that contingency is generally regarded as the first step towards clearing up the situation for Hedley, it does not, to our mind, necessarily follow that an adverse vote in the Boundary unions is to be taken as a signal for stopping all wheels in Hedley. Failing a favorable vote there for continuance on the same basis as Rossland, there is still the chance (and it should be a good one) that Hedley miners will work out their own problem in their own interests. They have been assured that it is not so much the Rossland scale that the Boundary miners object to or complain of, but of the manner in which Boundary mine-owners ignored them and also took advantage of them in shutting down without notice or consultation. Now in Hedley the miners have not been treated that way. They have had work and the high wage scale all through November and all December, and they are the only ones in this province or any of the adjoining states that have had it. These circumstances if duly weighed by the men should dispose them to a policy of give and take and aid materially in affecting an amicable settlement, seeing that the management here (both general manager and superintendents) have always shown a disposition to deal squarely with them and in this matter have already gone more than half-way to meet them.

Failing both contingencies already mentioned there may be a third slight ray of hope for possible continuance of work in Camp Hedley, even with the Boundary all shut down tight for a lengthened period. That hope arises from the impression that Mr. Ross has carte blanche to decide one way or the other, while in Boundary's case it was from New York that the flat went forth swift and inexorable to shut down tight. Mr. Ross being on the ground and understanding the whole situation knows the widespread distress that must follow a shut-down here, for not Hedley alone but the entire valley would feel the

closing down of this industry. His attitude in the past has been conciliatory rather than hostile, and the men themselves are ready to admit that he is fair. The notice which has been put up is not in the form of a peremptory posting of wage schedule but a general notice in compliance with the terms of the Lemieux Act for re-adjustment of wage scale. This in itself should constitute most favorable conditions for negotiation.

At Keremeos it is claimed that the people there have been assured by Duncan Ross M. P. that they were to have a daily mail service as soon as arrangements could be completed with the postal authorities of the United States. Surely Mr. Ross is not going to forget that there is a place called Hedley a little farther up the valley. If there were no existing means for conveying a daily mail between Keremeos and Hedley, failure to have daily service extended on up the valley as far as this town, might to a certain extent be over-looked, but when there is a daily stage connecting with Great Northern trains, it shouldn't be considered an unreasonable contention on the part of Hedleyites to hold that it is up to Mr. Ross to see that the daily mail comes on to Hedley.

FOSTER'S WEATHER BULLETIN

Warm wave will cross Pacific slope about 14, great central valleys 16, eastern states 18. Cool wave will cross Pacific slope about 17, great central valleys 19, eastern states 21.

This disturbance will not bring as high temperatures as the preceding disturbance did but the cool wave following it will go to much lower temperatures than the cool wave preceding, therefore you may prepare for a biting cold wave that will cross meridian 90 not far from Dec. 19. About that time the cold will be sufficiently severe in sections to form at least four inches of ice and this will raise a query with ice packers whether to attempt harvesting ice or wait till later. That query illustrates the value of good long range forecasts. Prepare for real winter and severe weather the last half of December.

Jupiter will control our weather during the thirteen days of which December 23 will be central. During the long evenings of Dec. 22 23 and 24 if you will observe the moon you will see it pass within one degree of Jupiter and you may charge to the effects of the conjunction of these two bodies all cold and storms and snows and cold rains that will occur about that time.

Saturn may be seen in the west in the early evening, but is not conspicuous. Her rings are edgewise toward the earth and cannot now be seen. Her rings probably lie in the plane of her equator and therefore she is near her equinox. I do not ascribe so much importance to the equinoxes as do other planetary meteorologists. The equinoxes alone do not count for much but when combined with other features of planetary influence they have some effect. Our solar system is a perfect piece of machinery and every body of that system is connected, magnetically with every body as much as every wheel of a great printing press is connected with every other wheel of it.

The following personal notice and appreciation of a worthy resident of the valley is received from Victoria, under date of December 11th, and the Gazette is pleased to publish it in this issue: Mr. Frank Richter of Keremeos, B. C. spent last week in Vancouver, attending the Fruit Growers' Convention held there, and was one of the speakers. His extensive knowledge of the ins and outs of the fruit growing industry, and bright and witty remarks made his speech very interesting. General regret was expressed that owing to the short time at their disposal, the Committee had limited the speakers to seven minutes each, but after the close of the meeting Mr. Richter was besieged with all sorts of inquiries regarding fruit raising from interested members of the Convention, and he received numerous congratulations on his fine address. Mr. Richter came to Victoria on Saturday evening on a business trip. He leaves for home on Thursday via the G. N. R.

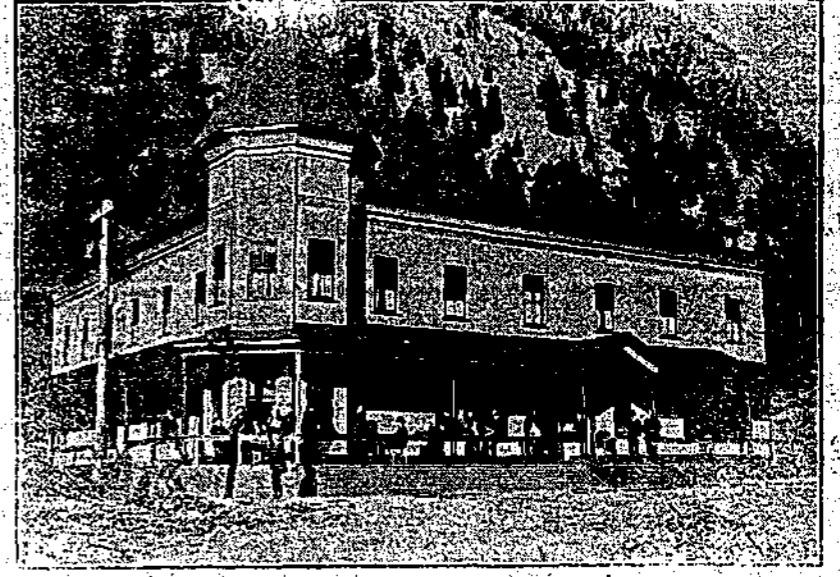
