August 15th Is the Date Mentioned for Regular Train Service to Keremeos.

The railway force at Keremeos have been as busy as nailers ever since the tracks reached that point. In fact, many of them have been nailers, and the speed with which the station and water-tank have been shaping shows that they are rushing their work. The is getting a coat of paint.

The telegraph line reached Keremeos about a week ago and the fence gang has got up as far as Manery's school house.

Ballasting has been completed right up to the Keremeos yards, but the ballasting trains are still at work filling in the grade to the south of the Armstrong bridge, where the track had to be raised.

It has been expected ever since the track reached Keremeos that regular train service would begin on August 15th, but some are of opinion that a week earlier will suffice to have everything in readiness for traffic.

PASSENGERS RESTRICTED

On D. R. Co.'s Gravity Tramway From This Out-Was Proving Hindrance to Work.

For several weeks past the men in charge of the gravity train have been complaining of the way in which their work was hampered by the almost continual string of passengers over the route. It is not a passenger road and was never intended as such, although the Company have been in the habit of allowing anyone to go over it who would sign a pass, relieving the company of any responsibility in case of accident. The orders to the head-gear men have always required the man at the tipple to notify central station and central station to notify ore bins when passengers are on, and the head-gear men must run slow. When there is a larger number of cars than usual to go down in any single day, it is a great hindrance to have to slow down the speed for passengers. Last week after the broken shaft was replaced with a new one, it was heating and retarding the runs to such an extent for two or three days that the ore began to run low in the bins, and when the trouble was overcome and it was necessary to put on extra speed to catch up, the passenger draw-back was there in aggravated form to prevent it. The result was an order to issue no passes. except for very urgent cases. The restriction may prove inconvenient at times, but when privileges are abused, restriction and sometimes absolute prohibition becomes the only remedy.

RIORDAN MOUNTAIN PROPERTIES

Gold Commissioner Publishes Report By R. W. Northey-Large Bodies of Low Grade Ore A Characteristic Feature.

(Continued from last week.)

The following is a report sent in by R. W. Northey, who has been in the Keremeos valley for the last seven or eight years, and has had every chance the valley at intervals; and while of visiting the various mines and President Louis W. Hill, the official claims :_-

RIORDAN MOUNTAIN CAMP.

"The Billy Goat and Shamrock are owned by Jas. Riordan and the Olalla Copper Mining & Smelting Company. The work done includes a 47-foot open cut 15 feet deep, a 16-foot shaft, a 10foot shaft, a 50-foot tunnel and a deep cut into the side of the ore-body, leav ing a vertical face of 25 feet.

"Afterthought, Resort and Resort No. 1 claims on the western and northwestern slopes of the mountain are owned by Jas. Riordan. Same class of station at Delmar was completed and ore as on Billy Goat. Discovery was made last year of a ledge of chalcopy rite in contact with a granular lime dike, being covered by only three feet of red oxidized soil. Work done-two large open cuts on the Afterthought, a 40-foot cut on the Resort (the discovery) and a 10-ft. shaft on Resort No. 1

"Homestake and Andover claims on the southern half of the mountain, and joining the Billy Goat, Shamrock and Grandview, are owned by R. W. Northey and J. H. Hayes, of Olaila. Rior dan mountain is a small double mountain, the Billy Goat, Shamrock and Afterthought occupying the northern promontory and the Homestake and Andover the southern. The ore is precisely the same as on the Billy Goat with pretty much the same values Work on the Homestake includes a 10foot tunnel all in ore, with 20 feet of rock cutting at the entrance. There is a good-sized ore dump on a crib-work flat built at the tunnel entrance, 50 feet above the proposed wagon road to the Billy Goat.

"Grandview and Portland, situated on the western and south-western slopes of the mountain, and adjoining the Billy Goat and Homestake, are owned by John and Colin McKinnon of Hedley. Work is done in open cuts some of them exposing the ore-body at a depth of 15 or 20 feet. The ore is similar to that on the Billy Gost and Homestake.

NORTHEY MOUNTAIN CAMP.

"Three full-sized claims, Rio Grande, Lorna Doone and Sharpshooter, are on the northern slope of Green mountain, and within half a mile of Keremeos; creek and the Penticton-Nickel Plate wagon road. A huge ledge of pytrhotite and mispickel outcrops through all three claims, and this outcrop of brilliant red (the effects of oxidization) can be seen miles away. This ore-body runs N.E. and S.W., and on the centre | claim—the Rio Grande—two 20-foot tunnels, about 200 ft. apart, have been run into the capping about 50 feet below the apex. Previous to starting No. 2 tunnel, all the red oxidized stuff was stripped off clean down to bedrock for a length of 50 feet, from the apex | The Great Northern trenches are at to the tunnel level, and for a width of 8 feet, while the depth varied from a few inches at the apex to 8 feet at the tunnel entrance; thus the tunnel was started in solid ore and no timbering was required. Work was stopped at the first heavy fall of snow, late in October. There are about 200 tons of ore on the dumps. From the outcrop, the ledge appears to be not less than 50 feet in width. Great Northern Officials Visit | Another Important Ore Body The Similkameen.

MEN WIIO MAKE THE WIIEELS TURN

The Operating Department Takes a Look In-Geography of the District Noted and the Immediate Business in Sight Sized Up.

While for the past two years or more the Great Northern Railway's engineering department have been giving the Similkameen their attention and have made various trips through head of the system, honored us with a visit; the people of Hedley and the Similkameen generally, have this week had another opportunity of seeing that the Great Northern people had them in mind. This time it is the operating department which is investigating; for in about a fortnight more the road will begin to handle traffic, and it is desirable that the men who make the schedules and fix the rates should understand the situation; and the way to understand it is to see. It was, however, three years ago that J. C. Eden, Assistant Traffic Manager, paid a visit to the Similkameen, and in company with Mr. M. K. Rodgers did the district thoroughly, from the Lower Similkameen through to Otter Flat.

The present party was composed of W. W. Broughton, of St. Paul, General Traffic Manager; W. P. Kenney, St. Paul, Assistant Traffic Manager: H. M. Adams, Seattle. Assistant Traffic Manager; M. J. Costello, St. Paul, General Industrial Agent: Max Bass, Chicago, General Immigration Agent, and W. T. Clark, of Spokane, who has charge of extensive irrigation schemes for the Great Northern and who put in the irrigation system at Wenatchee for them. The party reached Keremeos in their priyate car about one o'clock on Tuesday morning, and about 5 o'clock in the morning left for Hedley in two conveyances provided by J. F. Royer, Mr. Royer driving one and Bert Reith, of Keremeos, the other. They reached Hedley for breakfast and spent the forenoon here, making good use of their time seeing the town and the works of the Daly Reduction Co.

A trip was made up the tramway by Messrs. Broughton, Costello, Adams and Clark, who were piloted up by Mr. Ross and shown the sights. Messrs. Broughton, Costello, Kenney and Bass made a friendly call at the Gazette office and were supplied with such information concerning the district and its resources as were available.

They went up the river to Princeton and were intending on their return to drive over into the Okanagan, so as to get a comprehensive idea of the whole territory from which the road will draw traffic.

Opened Up on the War Horse

COPPER IS THE DOMINANT METAL

Ore Body Large and Occurrence Ideal-Dump Room at a Premium—Business in Sight for the Railway.

A massive chunk of beautifully mineralized copper ore which had been brought down from the Kingston was in evidence in town last week and as it was said to have come from a new ore body opened up on the Kingston the Gazette proceeded up the hill on Saturday morning to examine.

Instead of being a distinctly new find just uncovered, it was found to be a much more important lay-out than that. It is true it was separated from any of the other workings on either the Kingston or War Horse, but instead of it being an exposure of ore in a prospect hole that a lucky stick of dynamite had laid bare, the Gazette was surprised to find that it was in a tunnel in which the men had been working several weeks and from which a large dump of fine-looking ore had been taken, the tunnel face being insomething over 20 feet with ore in the face, top, bottom and both sides. A body of undesite eruptive intervenes between it and the tunnel lower down the hill, which was described in the Gazette several weeks ago. Mr. Wells, the local manager, when asked what relation this ore body had to that described before, said he was not yet certain that he was prepared to commit himself to any definite statement concerning it. That, he said, would have to be determined by further development. The steep hillside makes the disposal of ore taken out in the course of development a difficult task at times, and when the storage facilities are over-taxed there seems to be no alternative at the present stage of the game than to quit extracting ore and look for another place to open it up. The ore contains as gangue, considerable calc spar with the altered sedimentaries, and is heavily mineralized with chalcopyrite, pyrrhotite and mispickel. The mineralization although heavy is very evenly distributed through the gangue.

Such a showing, or rather series of showings, as may be seen from the various openings on the Kingston group should encourage the Company to go in for extensive work. It is understood that all the treasury stock was taken out of the market over a year ago, and a good deal of what had been sold was gathered in by the principals who have themselves put up the money that has been expended in development during the past year.

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A FALLEN CHERUB

To speak derogatory of the Toronto Globe or to in any way gainsay its teachings, would, a few decades ago, be considered by the average Liberal as being nothing short of sacrilege, even if done by a Tory, but now it has become impossible for even the most case-hardened Liberals in British Columbia to refrain from speaking out in condemnation of the Globe and its views.

Instance after instance has come up! to show that the Globe is the ayowed ! enemy of this province, and it is therefore not to be wondered at that the Liberals' bible is again out flat-footed against British Columbia in her demand for fair treatment from the Federal government.

While Liberal papers in British Columbia in commenting on the views of Winston Churchill with reference to elimination of the words "final and unalterable" from the bill introduced in the Imperial House of Commons at the instance of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, were ready to admit that he had done the proper thing and that there was no other rational course open to him. it is quite different with the Globe which insists that Sir Wilfrid Laurier was right in putting those words in the resolution, and that Winston Churchill had no right to strike them out. In its discussion of the question of British Columbia's claim for "better terms" the Globe shows itself to be devoid of all sense of justice, but the moral turpitude it displays therein is is overshadowed by its lamentable ignorance of the whole question,

In the Boundary country are many Liberals that are Liberals because their grandfathers were; but even they are prepared to rebel when asked highly of the work. to swallow the Globe. Less than a year ago some of them thought that the Globe should publish matter furnished to it showing the progress that had been made in the mining industry in the Boundary, but their confidence received a rude shock when a coldblooded reply came declining to do so, and giving as a reason therefor that so many of their readers in Toronto and through the province of Ontario had lost money in British Columbia mining stocks, that they didn't want to hear anything more about mining in British Columbia or to learn of any prosperity falling to the lot of others who had exhibited more business sense and discrimination in mining investment than they had done themselves.

To show that this was a rebuff which even a hardshell Liberal could not stomach, the Boundary Creek Times which voices the sentiments, of Duncan Ross, M. P., had in its last issue the following :

"Mr. McEwen of the Toronto Globe, was in town early in the week soliciting patronage for his paper. After telling some of the paper's supporters of the great national character of the Globe, he was confronted with that paper's refusal a few months ago to publish Greenwood news. Doubting the existence of any letter declining to publish Greenwood correspondence, he found the man who had the letter. And the words he said would not do for a benediction.

Now the facts are that there was very little of the wild-catting of British Columbia mines through which any Toronto money was lost that was done by British Columbians. In almost every case it was Toronto men themselves who did up their fellowcitizens and British Columbia should not be held responsible for it. The same men have turned around, and repeated it in Cobalt. If the Globe wants to be consistent in playing the baby it should shut down on publishing Ontario news, for Cobalt is in Ontario.



MINING IN OSOYOOS DISTRICT.

Continued from First Page.

nabar an immense bluff of almost solid pyrrhotite and arsenical iron is a distinguishing feature from the wagon road, which passes about half a mile south. The owners, Louis Goodehap, of the Khyber Pass ranch, and R. B. Venner, of Camp McKinney, did considerable development work during the summer, chiefly a long cross-cut tunnel low down on the slope. Both groups in this camp can obtain waterpower from Keremeos creek.

RED MOUNTAIN.

"Beaconsfield is a large group comprising 600 acres on Red mountain. The work includes no less than five long tunnels, half a dozen shafts and a great number of open cuts. The tunnel on the Beaconsfield, in 175 feet, showed up small veins of copper ore; from a 45-ft, tunnel on the Guinevieve the rock went \$5 in gold; in a 65-foot tunnel on the Keremeos a lode was intersected, but the grade was low; and from a glory hole on the Pontiac about 200 tons of low-grade ore was taken out. There are thousands of tons of low-grade pyrrhotite all over the property that can be mined cheaply, on the glory hole plan. The Gibraltar shaft is down 55 feet. The work done in 1906 included a 60-foot tunnel on the Standard, where another 40 feet should intersect a good-looking ledge which outcrops on the ridge. a 24-foot shaft on the Kenilworth, a 20-ft. shaft on the Lady Bertha, and a glory hole on the Standard, where about a ton of high-grade arsenical iron was taken out. Seven men were worked during the season of 1906, from June till the end of October. The company (Keremeos-Pontiac Mines) has erected a combined boarding and bunk-house, a storehouse, powder house, stable and three blacksmith shops.

"McNulty's Group consists of eight claims, situated on the north-eastern slope of Red mountain. Nearly all the work has been done on the Gem, where there is an immense outcrop of pyrrhotite, or magnetite iron pyrites, averaging nearly 200 feet in width. Last year's work opened up some garnetite carrying yellow copper. The workings include a 100-foot tunnel with a crosscut of 80 feet and several large open cuts into the ledge, the strike of which is N. E. and S. W., with a trifling dip to the S. E. The owners, James Mc-Nulty and Thomas Roderick, of Phoenix, erected a substantial cabin, and put in nearly all the summer of 1906 developing their property,

GREEN MOUNTAIN CAMP.

"The Black, Alfred and Green Mountain are three Crown-granted claims owned by Black Bros. and others. Work done includes three long tunnels and a number of open cuts.

"The Tiger mineral claim is owned by James Black, of Olalla. Quartz veins, five feet wide, carrying free gold and native copper. Work done, three large open cuts and several smaller ones,

DIVIDEND MOUNTAIN.

"The Dividend Group consists of seven claims, owned by the Olalla Copper M. and S. Co. Large bodies of magnetic iron and pyrites. Values are chiefly in gold, but garnetite with yellow copper occurs in some of the workings. Work done includes several long tunnels, shafts and open cuts. Cabins and blacksmith shops have been creeted. The group has been Crowngranted.

"The Scotia Group of five claims, on the northern slope, are owned by J. A. McDonald and Ed. Wheadon, of Olalla. There is a 35-foot tunnel on the Scotia and a big open cut 100 feet higher up the hill, both workings showing up some very fine ore, which, as usual, is in contact with a granular lime dike. The strike is N. E. and S. W., with a slight dip to S. E. The ore is chiefly garnetite, impregnated with yellow copper and interspersed with pyrrhotite and some mispickel. About 500 ft. cast of this ledge there is a parallel one of about the same width, 15 feet. same class of ore and same strike and dip. This has been opened by three large cuts across and into the ore-body.

"The Maple Leaf and Last Chance are situated on the western slope and owned by W. J. Garbutt and partners. A body of ore, chiefly pyrrhotite, is noticeable for a long distance by its bright red oxidization. Work done, cross-cut tunnels and open cuts.

"The Nellie is owned by Jas. Black, of Olalla. Ore-body, pyrrhotite. Work done, three open cuts, 45 feet, 28 feet and 25 feet long.
