THE WATER SUPPLY QUESTION

Pipe Line Fully Decided Upon—To be Connected up with Town System

The wise policy of fully considering a plan before going too far towards execution of the same has been demonstrated in the final decision arrived at for supplying the works of the Hedley Gold Mining Co. with an alternate water supply for the batteries, boilers, vanners and cyanide tanks independently of the flume.

The original proposition as understood was that of a pumping system down at the river which in addition to a somewhat heavy initial cost for installation meant also a very considerable fixed cost of operating, with the alternative of a ten inch pipe line up the creek for a distance of 7000 ft. to deliver the water in the mill a little above the battery floor. This latter looked to figure out a little heavier initial expense than the pumping system but a very great saving in subsequent operating cost, and for a time it appeared that the pumping plant would be the one chosen. Mr. Jones, however, kept his thinking cap on all the while and hit upon still another alternative which was that of making the present town system fit in as part of the scheme, which meant a big saving in cost of installation.

The plan is to run a pipe line up the creek 3000 feet above the highest point now served by the town system with its four inch mains. By going that far up, the water can be delivered on the vanner floor of the mill and at a point in the town about 15 feet higher than the roof of the hospital.

The water will be taken from the creek into an 8 inch pipe for a distance of 1000 feet then reduced to a six inch for another 1000 ft; then to a 5 inch before reaching the town four inch main.

This solution of the difficulty is a particularly fortunate one for both the company and the town.

With so effective a system as this will give, can it be possible that the town will tempt Providence any farther by remaining longer without hose and hydrants for fire protection.

HAS COME A TRIFLE LATE

United States Advocates of Reciprocal Trade Relations Not Meeting the Responsive Chord They Hoped For.

It is a rude awakening for the people of the United States, after nursing the delusion that Canada was to be an eternal suppliant for reciprocal trade between the countries to now find out that Canada is disposed to turn as deaf an ear to the proposition as they themselves did all the years that Canada wanted it. The following news despatch, however, tells its tale:

Boston, Mass., May 24.—"The movement in the United States for reciprocity with Canada will not, in my opinion, touch a responsive chord in the heart of the Canadian electorate," said Mr. J. Douglas Hazen, premier of New Brunswick, at the annual Victoria Day banquet of the Colonial club tonight.

Premier Hazen declared that Canada has developed her British market so enormously and has become so imbued with the idea of imperial preference that there is now, in the Dominion, little sentiment for reciprocity with the United States.

"Twenty years ago both Canadian parties declared for reciprocity; today, if a cabinet member did so, he could not remain in office five years," Mr. Hazen said.

Alfred B. Morine, former attorney-general and minister of finance of the province of Newfoundland, said that Canada, which dreams of becoming a great nation, would insist on being treated by the United States on terms of equality. Mr. Morine resented Congressman Eugene Foss' well-meant declaration that the attitude of the United States towards the Dominion ought to be that of an elder brother towards a young sister.

BUY COAL LANDS

Spokane Syndicate Purchases a Large Tract Above Princeton.

PRINCETON, May 25.—The largest single transaction in coal lands, near Princeton, was recently accomplished at Spokane, 12,200 acres en bloc being transferred. Andrew Laidlaw, representing a strong company, including the multi-millionaire tobacco manufacturer, J. Macdonald of Montreal, with Vancouver and Spokane capital, acquired the lands, the price being yet unknown to the public.

The major portion of the lands are those formerly held by the B. C. Colliery company, near Princeton; the Idaho Coal company, and certain of the claims held by C. O. French and J. B. Wood. The lands are handily situated for working purposes. It is said that the company will begin shipping as soon as possible. Mr. Laidlaw is expected to arrive in Princeton shortly, when, no doubt, a more definite statement of the company's intentions will be forthcoming.

OUTPUT OF OUR FORESTS

Statistics Compiled by Forestry Branch, Dept. of the Interior.

The Forestry Branch of the Dept. of the Interior has just issued its eighth bulletin, entitled "Forest Products of Canada, 1908." This gives the result of the first year's work by the Branch in the collection of statistics regarding the annual production in Canada of lumber, pulpwood, poles and other wood products. The figures have been compiled by Messrs H. R. MacMillan and G. A. Catches.

These statistics have been compiled from answers to circulars sent out by the branch to manufacturers in the different wood-working industries.

While it is not claimed that they are complete, yet the figures they give seem to be the most comprehensive yet published. The work was new, both to the manufacturers and to the officials of the forestry branch, and mistakes have no doubt occurred in it. The work is to be continued, however, and increasing familiarity with the work both on the part of the manufacturers and on that of the branch will doubtless bring about greater accuracy and completeness in the returns.

The total value of the production of lumber, lath, shingles, cross-ties, poles and pulp-wood during the year was \$67,425,044.

The production of sawn lumber is shown by the figures to be in the neighborhood of 3,848,170,000 ft., board measure, per annum valued at \$54,338,036. In this Ontario leads with a production of 1,204,704,000 ft. valued at \$24,308,077, Quebec being second with 600,135,000 ft., worth \$9,107,186. The other provinces rank in the following order:— N. B. 308,400,000 ft. valued at \$4,081,402, N. S. 216,825,000 ft. of the value of \$2,873,730; Saskatchewan, 91,166,000 ft. valued at \$1,370,820; Manitoba 56,477,000 ft. valued at \$807,960, Alberta, 41,382,000 ft. valued at \$503,244. The total production of pulp-wood is 303,079 tons valued from 482,777 cords of wood and made at \$2,931,653.

SHINGLES

B. C. easily leads in the production of shingles, producing 724,652,000 of the value of \$1,301,306. Its nearest competitor is Quebec, which produces 406,440,000, valued at \$849,787, and then follow in their order Ontario, with a production of 223,534,000 valued at \$401,155, N. B., 109,913,000, worth \$325,805; N. S., making 33,141,000 valued at \$60,370; Manitoba, turning out 1,125,000, worth \$3,150, and Sask., which produces 592,000, valued at \$1,363.

The total production for the Dominion was 1,490,306,000 shingles, the aggregate value of which was \$3,101,987.

The total number of laths manufactured was 671,562,000, of the value of \$1,487,125.

MACHINERY ARRIVING

Two Boilers For the New Steam Plant to Hand—Other Expected in a Few Days

The first of the new orders of plant for the Hedley Gold Mining Co. came to hand last week when two boilers of 150 horse power each arrived at the station, the third to complete the battery being on the way in. These three monster boilers added to the three already in the boiler house will give a boiler capacity of some 700 horse power.

It was no light matter to unload them from the cars and transport them to the works but this was completed by Monday of this week.

A good deal of the mill machinery is also on the way and from this out constant arrivals of machinery may be expected until the plant is all on hand.

Much of it will be very heavy stuff—notably the tube mill—but they are pretty well equipped for the handling of heavy pieces and little trouble will be experienced in getting it all to place.

The excavation work is pretty well finished for additional room to accommodate the new machinery and from now on the work of installing the plant will be a feature of the summer's work, for it is hoped that by the beginning of September most of it will be in place and the plant for the first time will hail the approach of winter without any misgivings.

BRITISH COLUMBIA GROWS

Population of This Province has nearly Doubled in Five Years.

British Columbia's remarkable industrial and commercial expansion is given latest expression in a volume of 1623 pages, the first B. C. Gazetteer and Business Directory which the Henderson Publishing Company has issued in five years.

In 1905 when the company issued its last Gazetteer, the twelfth edition, a volume of 782 pages was sufficient to cover the commercial and industrial province of that year.

In that issue 700 municipalities, villages, towns and cities were described. In 1910 these have increased to 1340.

The population of the province is shown to have nearly doubled within nine years. In 1901 it was 190,000. The new issue places it at 347,000 at the close of last year—white population 280,000, Indians 29,000, Chinese 17,000, Japanese 16,000 and Hindus 5000.

"The trade of British Columbia," says this issue, "is the largest of any country in the world per head of population. In 1904 the imports amounted to \$12,079,088 while the exports totalled \$16,536,323. For the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1908, the imports were \$24,180,452, and the exports \$23,941,157, an increase in the total trade of the province in four years of \$10,506,223."

Every industry is shown to be in a flourishing state.

Vancouver is growing so fast that the company has not attempted to record its population in this business directory.

WHO WILL SUCCEED LAURIER

Present Liberal Leader Contemplating Retirement—Party Discussing the Question of the Next Leader

Ottawa, May 27th.—A good deal of gossip is going about in a quiet way as to the future of the Liberal party. It is becoming clear that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is approaching the end of his tenure of the Premiership. He made the contest of 1908 on the plea that it was to be his last, and the Liberals, while keeping sedulously silent on the subject, are making quiet preparations for his retirement. With many of them these preparations are taking the form of anxious efforts to get under the cover of some good job. In part, however, they are taking the form of a study of the succession. Who is to be the leader after Laurier? One name which is heard a great deal is that of Sir Lomer Gouin. Quebec support, the Quebec Liberals argue, is the back bone of the Liberal party; therefore Quebec must nominate the leader. That is the present stage of the subject.

SOMETHING DOING IN SIMILKAMEEN

L. W. Shatford, M. P. P. Tells Coast Papers What is Going on in this Portion of Province.

The following interview with L. W. Shatford appeared in a recent issue of the News-Advertiser:

"Present prospects indicate that there will be a large crop of fruit of all kinds in the Okanagan and the Similkameen this season," was the statement made yesterday to the News-Advertiser by Mr. L. W. Shatford, M. P. P., of Penticton, who is in the city. "No damage was done to the trees during the winter, such as there was a year ago, and the spring weather has been very favorable. With a big crop and good prices, for the demand is always such that the market pays well for the fruit from the Okanagan and the Similkameen, it will help the interior along to greater progress."

"Every year now an increasingly large acreage is coming into bearing, and not any too soon, for last year many orders for fruit had to be turned down, simply because they could not be filled. Last year, though, the crop of apples and peaches was short, but even with a bumper harvest this year there will not be any more than enough to meet the demands. While the fruit-bearing acreage is steadily increasing, so are the markets, and the action taken by the provincial government to keep the growers in direct and close touch with the buying districts east of the mountains will be of great service and will be appreciated. It is pleasing to note, too, that each year large number of trees are being planted, so that in a few years the industry will have expanded enormously. The interior is not booming, but it is progressing rapidly and steadily."

"It is beginning to look as if Similkameen and other districts will soon have transportation facilities. The line from Princeton to Otter Flat is being built by the Great Northern, while the fifty-mile stretch from Orville to Penticton is being surveyed. The Kettle Valley line is being proceeded with from Merritt to Penticton and Princeton, and when this service is instituted it would mean that the time occupied in getting from Penticton to Vancouver will be only about fifteen hours. At present it takes thirty hours to make the trip so that the time will be cut in half."

MUST START SOON

Kettle Valley Company's Agreement Calls for Early Commencement.

By July 10th construction work will be started on the Kettle Valley line, the 250-mile railway to be built between Midway and Mettitt. Tenders for construction have been in the hands of Mr. J. J. Warren, president of the company, for about two months but no contracts have yet been awarded. Recently Mr. Warren was in Penticton, and his early arrival on the coast is looked for.

By its agreement with the Government of British Columbia—an agreement ratified by the legislature at its last session, and involving the granting of a subsidy of \$750,000 towards the cost of construction—the company undertook to start work within four months of the date of the passage of the bill of ratification. The bill was assented to on March 10, so that actual work must be commenced by July 10.

FEDERALISM vs. SEPARATISM

A phase of the Irish question that is beginning to attract a great deal of attention and to command the respect of the better class is the movement led by William O'Brien and supported by Healy with others of the more moderate and reasonable men among the Irish representatives in the British parliament. Briefly stated, the O'Brien scheme for remodelling the constitution so as to give Ireland a measure of autonomy that would be at once healthy and sane is to adopt a system of federalism as opposed to the Redmondite doctrine of nationalistic separation. O'Brien is not an extremist and has only the best interests of his country at heart—at least as he sees it. Furthermore he has the experience of Canada, the United States and others of the most progressive governments and peoples in the world as an example of how the federal principle has worked out in practice and under all manner of varying circumstances, for while all of them recognize the federal principle no two of them are exactly alike, and thus they are enabled to see the working of the principle with the greatest possible variety of detail. Canada's constitution, however, seems to be the one that O'Brien favors and he wants to see Ireland with the status of a Canadian province having a legislature of her own and bearing the same relation to the Imperial parliament of Great Britain which a Canadian province does to the central or federal authority at Ottawa. Such a policy is constructive and patriotic as distinguished from the offensive separatist propaganda of the Redmondites. It is a strange thing indeed that Britain the mother of modern parliaments should cling to the archaism of having a body like the Imperial parliament wrestling with details of domestic government that are in no sense more national or imperial in their bearing than many of the things that in this country are considered *INFRA DIG* for even a provincial legislature to deal with but are left to our county councils or other municipal authority, and that the same archaism is being perpetuated in the constitution of the new confederacy of South Africa in which the former governmental units of Cape Colony, Natal, the Orange River Free State and the Transvaal are not to have legislatures of their own but all have their domestic as well as foreign affairs regulated by the one central parliament. O'Brien's plan would give to England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales each a legislature of its own to deal with its own domestic affairs and leave matters of imperial import for the Imperial parliament. If Irish home rule will take the form indicated by a proposal of that kind there will be lots of Irish home rule sympathisers in Canada.

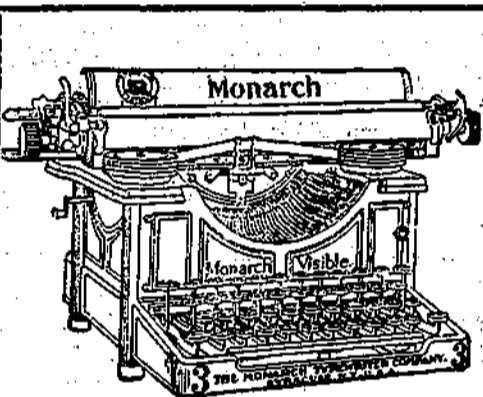

While Hedley golfers are making fair progress at the game, they realize on reading reports of scoring in old golfing centres, that they are as yet the merest tyros in the game. Fancy seven ladies in Victoria, B. C. playing a match against a team of seven officers from the garrison, all of whom were old experienced players and beat them. The match also was a 36 hole match and yet most of our lady players think they have performed a physical feat of some importance when they go one round of our course of seven holes and the men a double round of 14 holes.

A baseball team went from Hedley to play the Princetonians on Sunday last and judging from the score which was said to be 26 to 13 in favor of Princeton at the end of the game it is quite evident that Princeton played with Hedley. The hardest thing to understand about it is how that Hedley bunch managed to chase themselves around there for 13 runs. Whether it is sinful to play ball on Sunday or not may be a question for moralists to thrash out, but little doubt can remain that that class of ball might be deemed a sin any day in the week.

The small attendance of Hedleyites at the Victoria Day Celebration in Keremeos last week was no fault of the people of Hedley. All were depending on the trains running as they had been doing for a couple of weeks before—going down in the morning and returning the same evening—and no one was prepared for the sudden change. When they attempted to get rigs it was found that the livery stables had been fooled in the same manner and were not prepared to supply rigs for those who tried to get them. Those who did drive down had to go borrowing horses from the Chinese and Indians.

United Wireless stock is now \$50, the raise having taken effect yesterday morning. A few days ago a loud mouthed gam, was entertaining a few listeners in one of the hotels damning wireless stock and Vancouver real estate which he said was the cause of money being scarce in town. Most of the holders of wireless stock in Hedley got their stock at from \$20 to \$25 per share and now it is \$50; there are also not a few who can count their gains in Vancouver real estate at 100 per cent. These can afford to smile good-naturedly at the gam's imprecations and are not disturbed if the gam, should go threaddbare or have to go to work and try to earn an honest living like the rest of us.

For ghoulish coarseness in its expression of disloyal sentiment the article in last week's Penticton Press headed "Mock Loyalty and Mock Mourning" was the limit. In it the Canadian press and the Canadian people are given a calling down for expressing sorrow at the death of King Edward. If that is the sentiment of its editor towards monarchical institutions and a monarchical form of government, then his place is across the line among the tail-twisters. Many a community has resorted to violence before to-day by way of protest against sentiments not one quarter as rank. LATER—Word has reached us from Penticton that an outraged community has expressed its disapproval through the duck pond, and that several citizens are summoned to appear on a charge of assault.

We were in error last week in saying that it was a Stone & Wellington shipment of fruit trees consigned for Hedley that had been destroyed by the express agent at Keremeos. It appears now that the trees destroyed were some that were shipped from Oroville. The Stone & Wellington shipment came later from the fumigation station at the coast but were in such bad shape that none here to whom they were shipped were justified in accepting them for they were about as dry and lifeless as last year's prunings. Whoever is to blame for this we are not prepared to say and it may be that eastern nurserymen are getting a hard deal in the matter, but it is certainly rough on those who placed the orders and have lost a year thereby. When there are reliable nursery firms close by it is risky work placing orders with those on the outside.

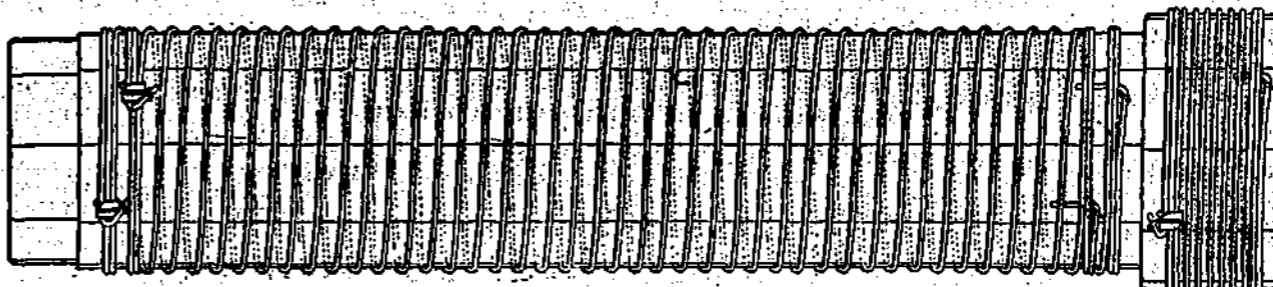

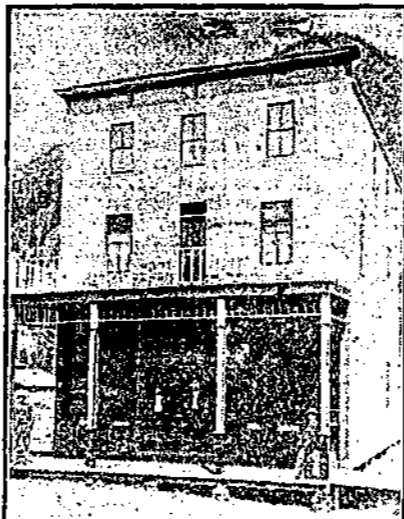

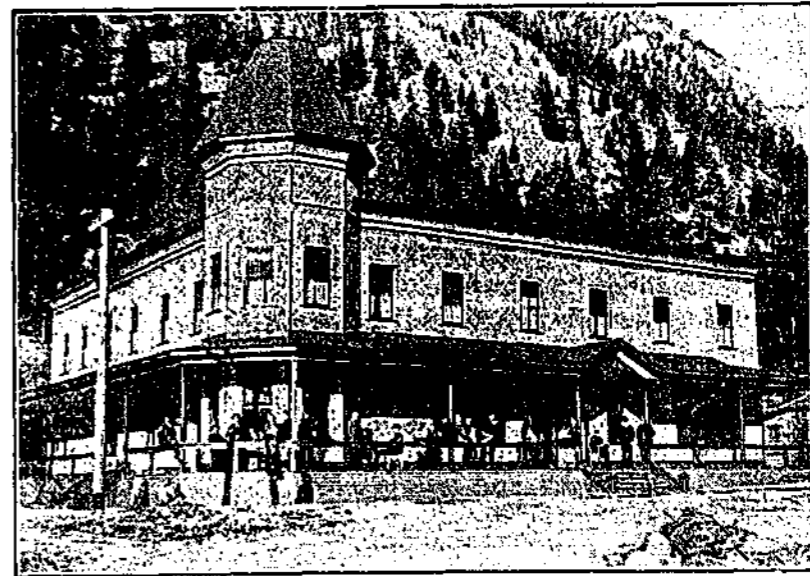
