TO RUSH V. V. & E.

Will Press to Limit of Labor Market

VANCOUVER, April 30.—James J. Hill, Louis Hill, president of the Great Northern, Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific and a party of eastern capitalists today visited Vancouver to look over the proposed terminal site on False creek and the situation generally. The Great Northern railway magnates stated that work on construction on the Coast Kootenay line would be pressed to the limit of the labor market. It would be only a few years before his company would have a direct Canadian line between Winnipeg and Vancouver tapping Calgary and other centres en route. He spoke most enthusiastically concerning the prospects of the province saying his experience had taught him to expect that in the next few years there would be an unprecedented rush to this section on account of its many and varied resources; all now only waiting development and easy means of access.

As to Vancouver he said the future of the city as one of the greatest ports on the Pacific was beyond question. Within the next fifteen years he expected it to have a population of half a million people. The party left this afternoon to inspect the new property in Oregon.

GOLF SCORES.

Second Series of Foursomes Played on

The Hedley Golf Club had another field day on Saturday last when all the members of the club except those who were on shift and could not get off, were out.

To make it more interesting the handicaps figured out from the ladder competitions were employed, and the drawing for partners was done as before, but resulted in different combination.

The matches taking in the lady members, were made to include only one round of seven holes instead of the double round which the men were required to play in the ladder competitions.

The sets were H. A. Hincks and Miss McLean vs. S. E. Hamilton and Mrs. Jamieson, the scores after the handicaps were deducted being 41 to 50; E. H. Williams and Mrs. Jones vs. A. Megraw and Rev. A. H. Cameron who took the place of Miss Bond, 41 to 45; W. Martin and Miss Megraw vs. G. P. Jones and Mrs. Rotherham, 50 to 53; S. F. Chamberlain and Miss Jackson vs. F. H. French and Miss Snitheram, 50 to 53. This left Hincks and Miss M. McLean tied with Williams and Mrs. Jones for first place and A. Megraw and Mr. Cameron in third place. On a play-off Hincks and Miss McLean won out and their opponents dropped to a score which when their handicap was deducted would put them at the bottom of the list, thus illustrating the glorious uncertainties of the game.

WHY HE WASN'T INVITED

Government Feared Condemnation from
Kitchener on Its Military Ad-
ministration.

(Toronto World.)

A glance over General Lake's report may help to explain why Lord Kitchener was not exactly implored to visit Canada. The efficiency of the whole force, says Sir Percy, suffered severely from the decrease in the votes upon which it depended for maintenance and drill. Recruiting has been stopped. The barracks at Kingston, Toronto, St. John's and Quebec are distinctly discreditable to the Dominion. The garrisons at Esquimaux and Halifax are too small. Throughout the force the corps are weak in qualified officers. These are a few of the faults Sir Percy finds with Canadian military affairs. No wonder Lord Kitchener was not urged to view our nakedness.

PROROGUES THIS WEEK

Bills Being Rushed Through at Ottawa.
Fisheries Regulations. Time for
Veterans' Scrip Extended.

Ottawa, April 28.—In committee of the whole to-day the house discussed the bill to amend the Fisheries Act, the outcome of the international fisheries arrangement with the United States.

Mr. Taylor drew attention to the rapid depletion of the salmon fisheries of the Fraser river by the fishing methods employed by the Americans in Puget Sound. He said that under the proposed joint regulation the only deterrent to a raid at the close of the season such as last year yielded Americans \$800,000, was the proposed fine of \$1,000. How insignificant that was in comparison with the possible gain was shown by the fact that an American trap last year took \$22,000 worth of Salmon in one day in the close season.

There was a lengthy discussion of the bill to extend for one year the time within which South African grants may be located. Opposition developed from Western members on both sides of the house against the extension benefiting speculators. Several amendments were offered to limit the extension of grants still in the hands of veterans.

Four important government bills were disposed of and progress reported on a fifth in the house to-day, the rush for prorogation being in full swing. The legislation which passed consisted of the Combines Investigation Act, the amendment to the Industrial Disputes Act, the bill respecting the water carriage of goods and the Fisheries Act.

WOULD EXPLORE US

Shackleton Wants "To Hunt Up the
Rest of the Earth"

Toronto, April 28.—A strong inclination to settle in Canada and engage in exploration of the great stretches of land in the north and northwest possesses Lieut. Ernest H. Shackleton, the famous explorer of the antarctic. Sir Ernest arrived in the city to-day and is the guest of Mr. Byron E. Walker.

With a decided disavowal of his intention to go back to the navy or even take a hand in the formation of the Canadian navy, Sir Ernest expressed his desire, as soon as he gets through with his present affairs in connection with the expedition on which he reached a point ninety-seven geographical miles from the south pole, to come and settle down in this country, where he says there are great things for a man to do in twenty five years.

His idea is to organize a corps of trained mineralogists and prospectors, men who are accustomed to rough work, but at the same time experienced in scientific exploration to carry on a series of rapid survey. In these they would discover the real value of the different regions of the Dominion which are still scarcely scratched and make reports of the minerals, forests and places suitable for town sites, the information being reliable and a safe guidance for the public.

The question of finances being mentioned Sir Ernest said the idea some people had got that he was "feathering his nest" out of his exploring was entirely erroneous. He frankly remarked that he only wished it did bring in some handsome returns.

As a matter of fact he had been out of pocket by it, having had to negotiate large loans with London bankers a considerable part of which he was now repaying. The British government had given him \$10,000, but the cost had far exceeded the returns.

Suited Norah

WOULD CONSIDER SEPARATION

Geo. W.'s Bad Break—Some Senators
Would Give People a Chance.

Ottawa, April 28.—The Senate sat until midnight discussing the navy bill. Senator Loughheed said that in his opinion the establishment of the fleet proposed could lead to but one thing, and that was Canada's eventual separation and independence.

Senator G. W. Ross asked whether that would not be a good thing.

Senator Loughheed stated that if the object was Canadian independence the fleet was a good thing, but it was not a good thing if the object of Canada was to remain a part of the empire and share in the responsibility, duties and glories of that empire. The naval plan proposed by Canada would give no help to Great Britain and be of no benefit to Canada.

He thought that Canada could have better immediately contributed a grant and asked for an imperial defence committee to consider the future question of defence. In conclusion he moved that the Senate should not give its sanction to the naval bill until it has been submitted to the country. This was seconded by Senator DeBouchéville.

FATAL HOTEL FIRE

Hotel in Cornwall Burns With Serious
Loss of Life

CORNWALL, Ont., April 29.—A disastrous fire broke out in the Rossmore Hotel here and before the flames were quenched nine lives were lost and property valued at a quarter of a million destroyed. The victims were all sleeping in the hotel.

C. A. Gray, Montreal, his wife and two children.

W. Hulme, porter.

E. Bullen, bell boy.

Mrs. Taylor Archibald.

Charles Gagne, teller in the Sterling Bank.

Ben Fielding, accountant of the Bank of Montreal.

The flames leaped across the street and destroyed the Colquhoun Block.

Had it not been for the coolness and presence of mind of William Fitzgibbon, president of the Cornwall La crosse club, several more would have perished.

THREE GIRLS RESCUED

Fitzgibbon rescued three dining room girls by getting them out on the roof through a skylight. The fire gained great headway before being noticed.

Mrs. Gray was a delicate woman and in trying to save her husband perished.

CANADIAN NORTHERN BONDS.

Dominion Government Gives Further
Guarantee.

Ottawa, April 28.—The government has decided to guarantee the bonds of the Canadian Northern Railway Company for an extension of its line westward from Edmonton to the coal areas at the headwaters of the McLeod river, a distance of 150 miles, the guarantee being at 4½c for 50 years for the extent of \$13,000 per mile for the first 50 miles and \$25,000 for the remaining 100 miles. This is the guarantee authorized by parliament in 1908 to the Edmonton, Yukon & Pacific, the charter to which has been acquired by the Canadian Northern.

SIR W. VAN HORNE RETIRES

Montreal, April 28.—Sir William Van Horne yesterday announced that he has resigned as chairman of the board of directors of the Canadian Pacific railway. Sir William explains that the position was merely a nominal one anyway, and that it had led to confusion, as in Great Britain the chairman of the board is really the active head of the company. He would retain his seat on the board as long as the shareholders cared to elect him; but he was getting to be an old man, and he intended withdrawing as much as possible from active work.

That very significant question asked by Senator Geo. W. Ross in the Canadian Senate the other day when the Naval Bill was up for discussion conveyed a heap of meaning to anyone who has watched that gentleman's public career. George W. always was a gallery man with a touch of the rebel in his make-up; and yet when a little cheap glory was to be reaped by timely flap-doodle twanging on the patriotic horn on the occasion of some national demonstration he could be as fervid in his loyalty and imperialism as anybody else. In that semi-infamous but now almost forgotten campaign of 1891 when unrestricted reciprocity was the party slogan, who was bolder than he in the disloyalty of his utterances? But the sweets of office for his party brought about by the remedial legislation fluke of 1893 wrought a great change in his sentiments and the British preference and jubilee year found him the most ardent ultra-imperialist in the country. Now however, with the utmost sangfroid and without batting an eye he can ask a brother senator if "separation might not be a good thing" for Canada. In fact it need not take many breaks like that on the part of those who carried the naval bill through the House to show a discerning people that the old copperhead snake of 1891 was not killed but merely scotched.



The County Court of Yale is in session before Judge Brown as we go to press. The docket is a light one this time.

The dance given on Friday last under the auspices of the auxiliary netted the hospital \$10.50, and those who were there all report a good time.

Mrs. S. L. Smith, who has been spending a fortnight visiting friends in Vernon, Summerland, Penticton and Keremeos, returned home on Monday.

Oroville voted last week to keep the town wet, and now the liquor men encouraged by this success are going to moisten up all the rest of the county which had previously gone dry.

Breen is very much impressed with the richness of that camp but because of the unhealthy condition of the camp has decided to leave it before they get a chance to bury him as they are doing so regularly with many other miners and he is likely to be back in Hedley before long. Since going back east he has joined the ranks of the benedicts.

Mr. I. H. Hallett, barrister, of Greenwood, came in on Tuesday and is attending County Court. He is having a run through the Similkameen and meeting various old friends who knew him in the Boundary and on the coast. Twenty years ago he was Police Magistrate in Vancouver before he decided to throw in his lot with the interior of the province and time appears to have dealt lightly with him, for he looks as brisk and healthy as he did ten years ago.

Harry Rose who has been working in the company's blacksmith shop in Hedley, has again been appointed road foreman, by the new road supervisor, and quit work on Saturday to enter on the season's road work. District Supervisor Turner certainly, made no mistake in his selection of a foreman for this locality, for the work done last year amply showed Harry's fitness for the berth, and if the province got as good value all over for the money expended as they did here neither the works department nor the tax payers generally had any cause to complain.

Geo. B. Clark and Dr. Connelly, of Keremeos, were in town on Saturday between trains. Mr. Clarke is an old timer in B. C. having a residence of some 27 years to his credit and before taking up his abode in the Similkameen hailed from Cariboo. Neither can he be said to be altogether a newcomer in the Similkameen for his first acquaintance with the district dates back to the time of the Granite Creek excitement, but now he can see other possibilities in the Similkameen apart from the quest of the yellow metal, and will in future devote some of his attention to the cultivation of the golden peach and apple. Dr. Connelly has practised his profession for several years in the province, but principally on the coast where he has not found the climate to agree with him very well and his friends are in hopes that he may be induced to try the Similkameen.

Last week an Italian laborer in one of the Road Camps above Princeton fell in the Tulameen which was in flood, and was drowned. The body was recovered about a mile and a half lower down a few hours later and Dr. McEwen, coroner, happened to be up the river at the time, he was requested to hold an inquest which was done, and a verdict of accidental death by drowning was returned.

The monthly afternoon tea given by the Hospital Auxiliary on Friday last was one of the most successful yet held and the amount realized was \$18.55. The proceeds of these teas are expended in buying material for the hospital which the members manage during the month to make up into articles necessary for the efficient equipment of the institution. Already they have succeeded in supplying the institution with a lot of goods which would have cost the hospital board more money than they could very well spare had they been compelled to buy them.

Mr. and Mrs. I. L. Merrill left on Friday last for the State of Maine where they will spend a month or two. Their stay of a little more than a week in Hedley enabled them to devote a little time to golf occasionally, when the mine and works were not taking up Mr. Merrill's attention. During his stay here he went thoroughly over the mine with General Superintendent G. P. Jones on several occasions and a thorough and comprehensive system of development was determined on. The changes in the plant that have been made and undertaken appear to have had his approval while parts that had been left open awaiting his arrival may possibly be altered somewhat from what had been intended.

George Y. Bowerman came up from Oroville on Saturday last and stayed over Sunday, when he met a number of Hedley friends. He has recently had some tempting offers for his Osoyoos Lake property, but he has made up his mind to settle down to fruit farming and does not intend to sell, but on the contrary is adding to his holdings, having recently obtained a lease on the old Okanagan Smith place which over 20 years ago was famed all over the district for the fine fruit it produced but of late years has been neglected. By giving it a little attention the old place should respond in something like its old time productivity and give him immediate income while he is waiting for his own young orchard to come on.

Miss Bond, matron at the hospital has been having a busy time of it for the past few weeks. There are three patients there now all of whom require considerable care. Since the institution was opened nearly three months ago it has been the means of relieving a great deal of suffering and the operating room has been called into use for most of the patients who have been admitted. In fact it has been a sort of human dry-dock into which sundry human craft have been piloted by the doctor, overhauled and turned out seaworthy. "Cheap repairs for the cheap 'uns" was the motto of Kipling's old shipmaster, but whether they're "cheap 'uns" or with "marble and maple and all," it's all the same here, the only difference being the choice between the public and private wards.





The committee in charge of the Victoria Day sports at the centre are going about their work in a way that is certain to ensure complete success. As a rule the class of settlers from across the line are of a very desirable type and they should be encouraged to come across, not impeded.
