E. D. Boeing went to Grand Forks Tuesday to look after the purchase of material for the public building which his firm is to put up at Keremeos.

## SHATFORD TAKES A HAND

Similkameen's Representatives Addresses Meetings on the Coast

L. W. Shatford, M. P. P. has been taking a hand in the campaign down at the coast where he addressed meetings in behalf of the government candidates in Westminster and Vancouver. The Province in speaking of the meeting which he addressed in the interest of his fellow member, Gifford, of Westminster said:

"Mr. Shatford went into a statement of the financial position of the province, showing what had been accomplished by the skill and business ability of the administration.

"I am sure," said he, "if you were shareholders in a company and had a manager who could make such a good showing, you would say let him stay there."

"Mr. Shatford also told the meeting some things about the richness of the Similkameen district, which he declared, would furnish the coast with plenty of peaches and other fruit as soon as railway connection was secured."

The Oroville Gazette conveys the information that the Great Northern have already let the contract of building 50 miles of road from Wenatchee northward to meet the portion built southward from Oroville two years ago. The contractors who have been awarded the contract are Guthrie & McDougall.

Archie McEachern, who was working at the Apex and had the misfortune to get a piece of rock in his eye was obliged to come back after his trip back to the mine. He remained in the hospital here a few days, but the pain in the eye continued, and he was advised by the doctor to go to Spokane and consult an eye specialist. He left for Spokane Monday and was accompanied by his brother Dummy as far as Oroville.

There was a fair turnout at the adjourned meeting of the Golf Club on Thursday evening last. The principal business transacted was that of amending the by-laws by making the annual dues for members \$5.00 for the season instead of \$1 per month as formerly and the joining fee \$1. The annual dues for ladies is \$1 and they are exempted from entrance fees. A special arrangement was also made for the benefit of members residing more than ten miles from Hedley whose dues are now to be \$2.50 for the season.

## AFTERMATH OF THE TRAGEDY

Details of the Capture--Bandits are Given Preliminary Hearing and Sent to Kamloops to Await Trial at the Spring Assizes

As the Gazette's account of the shooting affair given in last issue contained the more salient features of the occurrence and was in the main correct there is little to add further than to state details as to the capture with result of the preliminary hearing and the condition of the injured constable.

It was not until after the boat left Peachland where the prisoners, James and Wilson, escaped, that the tragedy which had been enacted on the boat was learned by those on board, but the suspicious of the purser, steward and a lady passenger had been aroused and on going to the stateroom where the constable had been with his prisoners the condition of the wounded constable was ascertained and reported to the captain who had the boat put in to Gellatley where he used the wires freely to post the constables up and down the lake, and Aston was taken on to Kelowna where he was conveyed to the hospital and has been there ever since.

His condition at the end of the week was considered almost hopeless but since then he has been gaining strength somewhat with occasional spells of semi-consciousness and on Tuesday there was some hope of his recovery.

One circumstance which was for a time a mystery to the police was the fact that Aston had been shot with a 22 calibre bullet and none of the revolvers carried by the prisoners or the constable were of that calibre.

James has now confessed that he had the smaller pistol under his arm tied securely with a cord round his shoulder, and that when he was searched upon being first arrested at Penticton it was not discovered. Early in the morning when the steamer was nearing Peachland, he asked for a drink of water. Aston got it for him and, as the constable was holding the cup to his lips, Wilson grabbed him around the waist and held him, while James shot him in cold blood. Then they covered him with blankets and rugs so that Aston was almost smothered when found a few minutes later.

Telling of the capture at Wilson's Landing the Kelowna Courier says: "Learning of the crime, Messrs. Seeley and Ramsay resolved to keep their eyes open for the fugitives and accordingly took their rifles with them when they went to work. Ramsay was some distance away from Seeley when he discovered the two men sitting on a log. He hastened back to Seeley and the two silently stocked their quarry. When within hailing distance, they ordered the men to throw up their hands. James made a quick motion for his pistol which he drew from its holster, but he was sternly told that he would be filled full of lead if he did not drop it at once. Seeley then searched the men, while Ramsay kept them covered, and in the process the tiny pistol was discovered which did the mischief on board the "Okanagan" Marching their prisoners down to the wharf at Wilson's Landing, which is about eight miles north of Kelowna, Ramsay and Seeley got their hired man, Lee, to thoroughly truss the men up just before the steamer came along. It is to be hoped the government will make suitable recognition of the bravery of the captors."

The men who made the capture do not appear to have belonged to any of the special constables who were out looking for the men. They nevertheless acted with discretion and nerve and by so doing no doubt saved the lives of others who might have been killed by the fugitives before they could be secured.

The preliminary hearing took place before Dr. Boyce at Kelowna the men being up on several counts, one of which was attempted murder. They were committed for trial at the assizes.

**Hard to Explain**

In a note received the other day from Mr. Finlay Fraser, he makes mention of the fact that he had met Angus Stewart on the 19th and adds: "He has an awful time explaining to his friends why he is not dead."

#### EDITORIAL COMMENTS

The Unionists in England appear to be doing a little too much swapping of horses while crossing the stream. Whatever defects they may have seen in the leadership of Bonar Law it would seem to be the poorest of bad policy to go back to the old leader, Balfour, whose resignation they had forced so shortly before by their clamorous complaints of his lack of enthusiasm.

The recent occurrence over in the Okanagan connected with the shooting of constable Aston should invite inquiry from the Attorney-general's department, and in making the inquiry it would be well to have some statistics prepared as to the number of cases where dangerous criminals and men charged with the most serious crimes have escaped while being conveyed to the jail in Kamloops. In Aston's case there is of course no one to blame but himself for he must have known the extent of the chances he was taking. Nevertheless he was only doing what nearly every other constable does who conveys a prisoner to Kamloops from Penticton and all south country points. Of course it is understood among constables that a man may size up his prisoners and know those with whom he may take liberties, but it has nearly always been those who have appeared to be the guileless ones who have given their captors the slip. Where there are good cells provided by the government within a few yards of the boat landing the prudent course would appear to be to keep prisoners in the cells even if that does necessitate foregoing the luxury of the night's sleep on the boat and the still greater attraction of a sleep in the morning undisturbed by the thought of turning out to catch a 5 o'clock boat. To avoid the recurrence of calamities like this last there should be some action taken to either provide a secure cell on the boat where prisoners could be kept without the necessity of a constable remaining with them, or if this be not done a little disciplining of the police themselves which will conduce to the exercise of a greater degree of caution would not seem amiss.

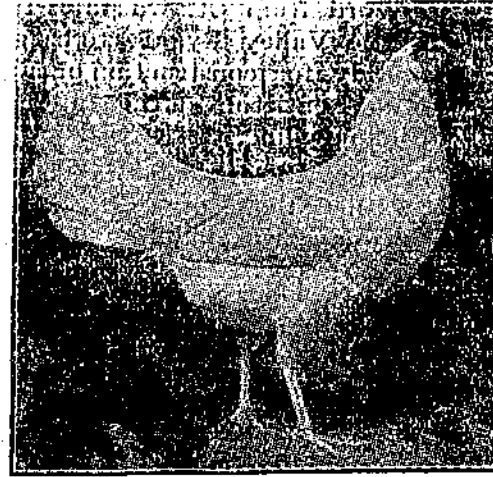

#### Synopsis of Coal Mining Regulations

Coal mining rights of the Dominion, in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the North-west Territories and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an acre.
