ANOTHER DOUBLE HEADER

Nickel Plate Mine Pays Regular and Special Dividends at the End of March.

LOOKS LIKE 20% PER YEAR

Stock is Quoted at \$20 Per Share and Hard to Get as Very Little is Offering—Everybody Sitting Tight With Mine and Plant in Good Shape.

The directors of the Hedley Gold Mining Co. at their head office in New York on March 8th, declared the usual quarterly dividend of 2% and an extra dividend of 2% on the outstanding stock of the company payable on March 31st. The books close to-day, Thursday March 16th at 3 p. m. and will remain closed until April 1st at 10 a. m.

When the extra dividend of 2% was paid at the end of December last it was thought that this extra bon bon was given during the Christmas period as a sort of holiday gift to stockholders, but its repetition now, three months later, puts a different face on the matter and indicates very clearly that this is the gilt they have struck under present operating conditions and the present condition of the mine.

Five per cent quarterly is certainly hitting it off to a lively tune that must appear catchy and attractive to the fortunate stockholder and the concerns which are paying 20% today are few and far between.

The new plant is now in operation and while a few weeks may yet be required for adjustment in order to get their full duty, there is no doubt that the effects in the way of securing a material saving in extraction are already apparent and accounts for the increased dividend. When the water supply increases sufficiently to enable them to dispense with the steam auxiliary plant the profits will be still greater.

TORONTO'S BIG KICK

Mass Meeting 5000 Strong Condemn Reciprocity—Most of Speakers Prominent Liberals

Toronto, March 9th—Five thousand people occupied Massey Hall this evening at the meeting to protest against reciprocity and a great many more were turned away. Sir William Mortimer Clark, formerly lieutenant governor of Ontario, occupied the chair. The meeting was announced as a non-partisan gathering intended to inaugurate a campaign to protest against the agreement. With the exception of T. G. Blackstock, the speakers were all Liberals.

The resolution, presented by Z. A. Lash, K.C. and seconded by W. T. White, managing director of the National Trust company, was passed without a question. After setting forth the same arguments against reciprocity contained in the protest of the "4000 Liberals" the resolution declared that before the agreement went into effect it should be passed upon by the people and that to prevent the continuance of the disturbance of trade already caused by the action of the government, the election should be held without delay. The other speakers were Arthur Hawkes and W. K. George.

Mrs. J. A. Brown has decided on Friday, April 28th as the date of her concert in Hedley when our townspeople may look for a musical treat. It is Mrs. Brown's intention to give the Hedley Hospital the benefit of proceeds over and above expenses which is very generous indeed on her part and more than anyone was expecting. Her system of vocal instruction aims at thoroughness and pupils are not given tasks they have not been prepared for by suitable instruction. For this reason it is not improbable that only those who have had an opportunity of becoming fairly advanced in their studies may be asked to sing. In any case the public may look forward to a program of special merit.

ALL THING TO ALL MEN

Freak Movements Require Freak Arguments to Boost Them

(Nelson News)

Liberal papers on the prairie tell their readers that the coming in force of the reciprocity agreement will be a great thing because it will lower the price of fruit.

In the fruit growing districts they say that the fruit grower will get more for his fruit than he does now.

In the cities the working man is told that it will reduce the cost of living by reducing the price of farm products.

In rural districts the farmer is told that it means higher prices for the same products.

The prairie wheat grower is told that the price he can get in Minneapolis is better than the price he can get by exporting grain to Europe. Figures are published showing how much more per acre the land will be worth when all the wheat goes to Minneapolis and brings in six cents more per bushel.

In Vancouver and Fort William and in other railway towns, they say that the wheat and other traffic will continue to go east and west as at present and that these towns and railways will not be injured.

Everyone who ships into the United States will be enriched by taking off the duty, because it is the producer who pays the duty.

Everyone who buys from the United States will get goods cheaper because it is the consumer who pays the duty.

Good results will come from taking the duty off fruit, from leaving it on implements, from keeping lumber on the tree list and from keeping coal off, from having reciprocity in wheat and from not having it in flour.

Truly it must be a magnificent agreement that can produce all these contradictory results at one and the same time; and the statesmen who can invent legislation that will perform all these stunts simultaneously are, indeed wonderful statesmen. Also the good people who in each part of the country believe all these things are wonderful believers.

FATAL FIRE AT PRINCETON

News reached Hedley on Monday morning of the burning of the Princeton hotel owned by James Wallace and the death of one occupant. The fire took place at 4 a. m. (Sunday morning) and the origin is unknown. The main part of the hotel being a log building it was easier to keep the fire from spreading than in the case of a frame structure. The most regrettable feature of the fire was the fatality which attended it. The victim was an Austrian named Joe Galitzky, who had been working at the Nickel Plate before he went to Princeton a couple of weeks ago. The man had been intoxicated to the degree of helplessness the night before and in the excitement of the fire he was forgotten. There was said to be \$4000 insurance on the premises and the owner had been offered \$12000 for the property a while before.

Among the fuel producers of the district that will henceforth cater to the warning up of British Columbians is the Osoyoos Coal Co. on the Similkameen about five miles above Princeton. By the by, the name is the most objectionable feature about the whole concern for like the appending of the name Ashmole to the same locality a few years ago, the use of the name "Osoyoos" for the coal property is another geographical misfit that is calculated to do mischief by needlessly confusing. Fortunately, however, the coal is of a character that will carry its own recommendation and W. C. McLean who has had charge of the opening up of the property is in receipt of numerous bouquets (metaphorically speaking) from those who have used it. About 25 car-loads were taken out during the past winter and shipped to various parts of the interior by way of introducing it and a carload brought into Hedley by A. Winkler is said to have given good satisfaction to those who obtained some of it. Whether it is used to cook the "parritch" or warm up the toddy Mac can fully recommend it to his friends.

AFTER THE HEN TOO

Sir Wilfrid Has a Crow to Pick With Her as Well as With the Fruit Grower.

Those who keep hens and sell eggs in this province have a personal interest in the reciprocity treaty. This agreement makes eggs free. The present Canadian duty is three cents and that of the United States five cents. According to the trade tables Canada imported last year 893,324 dozen eggs, of which 757,316 came from the United States. Canada exported only 160,650 dozen, of which 35,732 went to the United States. The blue books no longer give the importations of particular articles by provinces, but it is certain that a large part of the imported eggs come to British Columbia. Kansas eggs are delivered in Vancouver less than a week from the henery and are thus classed as new laid. They are now offered in retail shops here in large quantities, after paying the duty. Under free trade they will compete on still more favorable terms with the local product.

THE COLONEL HITS BACK

To my Old Friend Megraw
Editor of the Hedley Gazette

Dear Sir:

You do your contemporary, the Editor of the Summerland Review, a great injustice in your issue of March 2nd in assuming that I (Colonel Cartwright) was responsible for his sensible and patriotic stand in favor of reciprocity.

I have no doubt that he consulted some of the Conservative and successful fruit growers of this place before expressing himself in the able way he did. Taking his cue from them,—do you know that our good pieces of fruit land are bringing from \$1,000 to \$1,400 per acre for orchards not yet in full bearing? Last year one conservative fruit grower netted \$4,000 from twelve acres, while two others realized half that amount each from about the same area. They sold privately, shipping only fully ripened fruit and getting cash in advance.

It is true that our poor fruit may need protection, but it would need treble the present protection to help it. Next year we won't have any poor fruit from Summerland, we need not. We want Chicago and New York markets for our high grade apples. Moreover, we desire both English and American buyers to take in our district after taking in Oregon and Washington.

I do not remember exactly what all my 1891 views referred to in your March 2nd editorial were, nor does it matter. At present I favor reciprocity, not so much for its immediate good effects, but more particularly because it will open the eyes of the farmers on both sides of the line, and show how little protection can ever help them. This will undoubtedly start high protection on the down grade. You know the rest, or my efforts towards redeeming you from your ways in 1891 have indeed proved futile.

I am sorry that you should have referred to my father. He is not responsible for me although he started me in the right direction. Henry George has to answer for my opinions on trade, transportation and real estate matters.

You will agree with me that the world has moved in our direction since the year referred to, and is still moving with accelerated speed. Had you not better get into our band wagon and move along to the tune of "Progress" rather than be left behind in the slough to die, or do you not believe in death-bed repentance!

A FRIENDLY TILT

In another column will be found a letter from our old and highly esteemed friend, Colonel Cartwright of Summerland, in which he shows that we were in error in laying upon him any responsibility for the editorial apostasy of the Summerland Review on the subject of Reciprocity.

Also before going any further we wish to congratulate Colonel Cartwright on having advanced the first real argument which we have yet seen in favor of Reciprocity, for in doing so he has accomplished more than his chief Sir Wilfrid Laurier whose defence of the proposal was unworthy the man and unworthy the position he holds. Colonel Cartwright's argument, however, is substantial and supported by an instance which there is no gainsaying, for when we tell us that "one Conservative fruit grower netted \$4,000 from twelve acres" he deals with accomplished facts instead of visionary hopes, and when the Summerland Review referred to the high-class market across the line which awaited our better class of fruit we were disposed to regard it as more or less of a pipe dream. Of course the case may be exceptional and we do not know what all may be implied in the admission "sold privately, shipping only ripened fruit and getting cash in advance" but nevertheless we believe the Colonel thinks it can be repeated by those who can produce the quality or he would not use the example.

The occasional vigorous prod which he gives us we rather enjoy, for it brings back recollections of his old time aptitude to turn an argument; besides it assures us that the intervening years have not had too mellowing an effect and there is still plenty of the old fighting spirit left.

But there is one thing we must not let him get off with. Like many other Liberals he is very fond of pointing at the progress made by Canada during the past decade or two and patting his party on the back in consequence of it, forgetting all the while that Canada has been under the same fiscal policy as that inaugurated by Sir John Macdonald after the general election of 1878, and that although his party opposed that fiscal policy in 1878 and again in the elections of 1882 and 1887 and still embodied their opposition to it in the anti-protection plank

of their platform of 1893, they either showed that they had not believed the anti-protection doctrine they had been preaching or they had not the courage of their convictions, for when they got into power by a fluke in 1896 on the "remedial legislation" cry with the trade question temporarily shelved they accepted the National policy and its high protection and have kept it in operation ever since. It is true there was a revision of the tariff in 1897 but no appreciable lowering or re-adjustment of the duty further than the Conservatives had themselves already begun to make as announced by Foster in that noted speech in which he quoted from Tennyson:

"That man, the best Conservative
Who lops the moulder'd branch away".

It is true Canada has prospered under Laurier's regime, but prospered mainly by virtue of the Conservative trade policy, and that is the policy the Liberals now propose to destroy on the instalment plan with the present reciprocity proposal as the first instalment.

Times and scenes have indeed changed since Colonel Cartwright and the editor discussed some of these questions in Stanley barracks in the long ago that seems only such a short while. As politics were tabooed in the ante-room other opportunities had to be sought. A full captain then in the permanent force and a life-long student he has since risen to nearly the top of the military ladder; and it was with mingled pleasure and regret that we learned two years ago he had taken up his abode in British Columbia after failing health had compelled him to resign his position on the staff at Ottawa. And now it seems to us that we could rather enjoy resuming some of the old discussions, for when we judge the present and the future in the light of the past the old time Liberal who will attempt to justify the course of his party is covered with confusion at nearly every turn of the road. All we need to do is to mark the effects of the trade and transportation policies which that wise old statesman, Sir John Macdonald, put through in the face of the most determined opposition of the Liberals. The National Policy and the building of the C. P. R. were the "open sesame's" to Canada's present greatness. Kipling in "One Viceroy Resigns", makes Dufferin say of India:


"I took a country twice the size of France
And shuttered up one doorway in the North,
I stand by those. You'll find that will pay,
I pledged my name on them—they're yours
to-night,
Hold to them—they hold fencerough for two"

In like manner we, the Conservatives, took a country many times the size of France and soddered up the leak in the bottom to the south while with the C. P. R. we made the Liberals' "Sea of Mountains" (British Columbia) a veritable Arcady where Colonel Cartwright can come (none more welcome) and for something over \$100 per acre buy good fruit land that is now found to be worth from \$1,000 to \$1,400 per acre and he can sit in peace and plenty under his own vine and fig tree with his army field glass trained on New York and Chicago looking for a high-toned market for his high grade fruit. The National Policy and all-Canadian transportation lines, Colonel, we "stand by those" "they're yours to night". "Hold to them—they hold fame enough for two" so drop your Reciprocity.

But we do not want Colonel Cartwright to feel that all his efforts of 1891 were futile, for the seed sown by him on the subject of single tax evidently made some impression. At all events a little further reading on the subject later on found us very strongly inclined in the direction of single tax and opposed to the absurd principle now in vogue of punishing theft and enterprise by taxing improvements instead of levying the rates on land values.

During its time it wielded considerable influence and Duncan Ross gave the town a good paper. Like many other heavenly bodies it shone with greater luminosity at some times than at others. Bro. Lowery and the Ledge, may, however, be counted on to keep the town from getting too lonely.

Though Easter is still a month distant the price of eggs has dropped to what is about the low water mark for this valley—35c per dozen.

The profits derived from the potato crop last season is inducing planting on a very large scale here this spring, notwithstanding the fact that seed potatoes are costing from \$10 a ton up.

T. S. Drennen, who has been spending the winter at the coast, returned to Keremeos on Saturday and will spend the summer cultivating and improving his property here.
