WHERE LAND RAISE APPLIES

Recent Decision Will Not Apply to Lands
on Which Deposits Have Been Made

Victoria, May 11.—By an order-in-council approved by the Lieutenant Governor today the enunciated policy of the Provincial Government with respect to the recent doubling of the prices of first and second class crown lands throughout British Columbia have been modified to the extent that it will not be held applicable to lands applied for and upon which the required deposits of fifty cents per acre had been paid prior to the decision arrived at in respect to the increase of price.

The order-in-council reads as follows: "that the order-in-council approved on April 3, 1911, increasing the minimum price of first and second class lands from \$5 and \$2.50 per acre respectively to \$10 and \$5 per acre respectively, shall be held not to apply to applications to purchase such various crown lands which were received by the assistant-commissioner of land on or before April 3, 1911, and with respect to which the required deposit of fifty cents per acre had been received by the said commissioners on or before April 3, 1910."

Orders-in-council have also today been approved reserving all unalienated crown lands in the north division of East Kootenay electoral district or within the Municipality of Richmond in the latter case whether or not such lands be covered by water.

MAKING THE ROUND

Similkameen's Representative Welcomed
By His Constituents on His Annual
Tour Among Them

Following his usual custom of making a visit to all parts of his constituency one or more times a year Mr. L. W. Shatford is again at the present time about completing a fairly exhaustive tour through the riding.

This plan of his is becoming more appreciated year by year by both his supporters and those who politically do not see eye to eye with him for they see that it is in the interests of the community that the representative should have the accurate knowledge of the wants of every part of his district which can only be obtained at first hand. Costly mistakes are often made by representatives through acting on information supplied by parties whose self-interest prevents them from being fair. The representative who never looks near his constituents except when an election is coming on is at the mercy of ward-healers and schemers and would be more than human if he did not make serious mistakes that would operate both against himself and the interests of the community. In the House Mr. Shatford has been blamed by impertinent meddlers for doing as he has done and it is all the more pleasing on this occasion to note that he is not allowing himself to be influenced by any meddling criticism of that kind.

On Thursday Mr. Shatford arrived in Hedley on his return from the western part of the district where he had spent several days above and around Princeton, visiting Coulmont, Tulameen and Granite Creek where he met most of the electors and saw the progress being made.

While the appropriation which he has obtained this year again for his district has been a most generous one it is the intention as much as ever to see that it is all wisely expended and made to do the greatest amount of good; and in the road supervisor for the district, Mr. H. A. Turner, he is fortunate in having a man who has both the business training to look after the financial end of it and the practical knowledge of handling men in directing work which enables him to keep tab on the operations of the various road foremen.

The work to be done this year will be largely made up of repairs and improvements with an occasional piece of new road here and there through the district, and all will be done with a view as much as possible to permanency. The improvements are mostly in bettering the steeper grades and cutting out as much as possible the more dangerous spots.

In all probability the principal new work to be undertaken in this part of the valley, although it is not in the immediate vicinity of Hedley, will be the construction of a new road for a certain distance up Ashnola Creek. The number of new ranches located up there would in themselves justify the expenditure and in addition to this there is the chance that a road up there would be the means of establishing for the Similkameen valley on this side of the line the advantage of being the outlet of the tungsten properties on the American side of the line owing to the difficulty of obtaining access to them from any point on the Washington side.

From here Mr. Shatford was going through the lower valley and from there over into the Okanagan valley and afterwards over the Rock mountain section and up the Kettle River.

OFFICIALS VISIT MINE

The stock-holders of the Hedley Gold Mining Co. were represented this week by a visit from I. L. Merrill, president of the Company, and by Mr. T. Walter Beam, who although not on the Board of Directors is nevertheless close to the executive officers and had a great deal to do with their purchase of the property.

Messrs. Merrill and Beam came in on Wednesday's train and next day went up to the mine.

This was the president's first visit since last December and Mr. Beam has not had an opportunity to examine the property since he left here in the early fall of 1909. He was in once last year but only a brief run to accompany Mr. Fraser out after his illness.

The amount of development which has been done and the working of the improved plant were matters of special interest to them and everything was given thorough inspection. It is safe to say that there never was a time when the mine and plant was doing better work than at the present, for while earlier operations had the benefit of the rich gossan nearer the surface, the closer saving and increased crushing capacity now will more than overcome the difference in the character of ore, and the management has the additional satisfaction of knowing that the deplorable waste which resulted from the faulty extraction is now a thing of the past and good values are no longer thrown away in the tailings.

As an evidence of their satisfaction with the success of their first investment in this camp we take the following from the Spokane Spokesman-Review.

"Since the present owner, the Hedley Gold Mines, Limited, took over the Nickel Plate mine at Hedley, B. C., it has been paying quarterly dividends at the rate of 20 per cent per annum, at the same time that it is building up a good cash surplus," said I. L. Merrill, of Los Angeles, Cal., president of the company at the Hotel Spokane last evening.

"At the same time, we have been putting into sight a little more ore than we have been extracting. The mill now is treating 140 tons of ore daily and we expect to work up to a capacity of 100 or 170 tons with the present plant. We did not enlarge it materially, but added a tube mill. The extraction, which used to be poor with coarse crushing, is very satisfactory since we inaugurated fine crushing."

The Hedley Gold Mines, limited, is capitalized at \$1,500,000. Since its incorporation, a little over a year ago, it has paid dividends of \$263,520, the regular quarterly disbursement being \$60,000. President Corey of the United States Steel Corporation, and the widow of the late Marcus Daly are two of the principal stockholders.

Mr. Merrill was formerly a prominent mining man of Butte, Montana, where he was connected with the Butte and Boston. With Capt. J. C. Hoatson, he became interested in Arizona copper properties and made a large fortune out of his holdings in Calumet and Arizona. On his return from Hedley in about a week, he will go to Maine for a month's salmon fishing.

TRIAL BY JURY

Every once in a while cases crop up which make thoughtful people doubt whether the old time-honored custom of trial by jury has not outlived its usefulness. The Nabunshan trial at Vernon last week when a Vernon jury declared that the prisoner was not guilty after he had himself pleaded guilty and the Judge had charged strongly for conviction, was another instance. This, however, is not new for a Vernon jury which has already established the record of never having hung a prisoner charged with murder no matter how strong the evidence was. In some cases the killing was done in broad daylight in presence of several witnesses who told the court plainly what they had seen, but nevertheless the inevitable verdict "not guilty" was brought in and the prisoner got off. As the result of so many occurrences of that kind in the assize court at Vernon it is well known that the best class of Vernon citizens feel the situation and are in a measure humiliated at what they regard as grave miscarriages of justice in their midst. Apparently there has been too much criminal law in that community and a crop of hayfield, carpenter shop and bar-room lawyers has been developed who feel their legal outs (so to speak) to such a degree that when they are summoned as petit-jurors they are prepared to arrogate to themselves the wisdom and prerogatives of supreme court judges and the legal acumen of renowned counsel for the defence. In October last there was witnessed the instance of a murder trial in which a change of venue had been applied for and granted from the Cariboo district to Vernon. The prisoner had already been tried twice. In the first case the prisoner had been convicted and condemned to be hung and the day of execution set when a new trial was allowed and in the second case the jury had disagreed, ten jurors saying he was guilty and two holding out that he was not. Then came the Vernon hearing when a jury acquitted him. Thus 22 jurors said he was guilty and 14 said he was not and what the 14 said went for he was turned loose. Right after that trial the editor of the Gazette sat in the court room when the jurors were all gathered ready to be empanelled for another case which was about to be called and

overheard a conversation between a couple of jurors who were discussing criminal law and evidence. The Crippen trial was on in London at the time and the papers were full of the report of the trial. One man spoke very positively that Crippen should not be convicted on the evidence produced for he (the juror) "would not hang a dog on that evidence." Well, a London jury hung Crippen and he is dead now, but if he had been tried in Vernon instead and that big burly juror had been on the case he might have been alive to-day. But what is to be done about it? If a community establishes a reputation of this kind and lawyers for defence can get change of venue from other districts to Vernon, where is the end going to be!

The Mining and Scientific Press makes the following sensible observation concerning the Los Angeles dynamiting case: "Arrest of the alleged Los Angeles dynamiters has attracted wide attention. We regret to see that persistent efforts are evidently being made to try the case in the newspapers. The defence has employed an authorized publicity agent, and on the other side there has been no hesitation to come within the light of the calcium. We commend the reported statement of the prosecuting officer to the effect that he is not concerned with what public opinion in the case may be: "If we have the evidence, the men will be convicted. If not, they won't." It would be well to remember that this is a trial, not of organized labor, but of dynamiters."

R. T. Barclay came up from Kereameos on Saturday and remained over Sunday. He is working there on the Presbyterian church which he is painting. In his ad. which appears in another column the item of "paper-hanging" was left out. This is a branch of the painter and house decorator's art which he is prepared to execute with all other work in that line.

A correspondent from Okanagan Falls writes the Greenwood Ledge that Mr. Blackie of Hedley had opened a blacksmith shop in that town. If the item of chicken-raising had been included as part of the vocation, there would be no doubt left that it was our friend Mr. Bannan who was meant.

A couple of Salvation Army lasses were in Hedley on Monday between trains and succeeded in collecting considerable money for the provincial children's home conducted by the Army. As collectors the Army lasses are all business and waste no time in getting after funds.

A wedding party from the other side consisting of a prospective bride and groom arrived in Hedley on Saturday and sought the aid of Rey. A. H. Cameron to start them off in double harness. They expected to find him in Kereameos but ascertained on reaching there that Mr. Cameron had gone to Hedley. The marriage laws of Washington are not popular with the young people and the effect is to make points in British Columbia along the border a sort of Gretna Green.

Owners of horses in the Similkameen would be pleased to have the Indian Nahumshan take up his residence in the upper Okanagan and devote his attention in the future to the nags of the men who said he was not guilty after he had himself pleaded guilty. It is poor encouragement to constable in this part of the district to exert themselves collecting evidence to stamp out horse-stealing and cattle-lifting when such active sympathy for offenders exists among the class of men who appear to be constantly chosen for jury service in the court at Vernon.

Constable Sproule and the other witnesses who attended the assizes in Vernon last week returned on Tuesday. Constable Sproule was disgusted with the result of the Nahumshan trial when a Vernon jury brought in a verdict of "not guilty" and had the prisoner turned loose after he had himself pleaded guilty, and the judge in his summing up indicated very plainly to the jury that the verdict brought in should be one of guilt proven. The jury, however, got it into their heads that the constables had not exerted themselves sufficiently in gathering up evidence in the prisoner's behalf. This is the first case sent up from Hedley for trial at a higher court which was not followed by conviction. The fellow who stole Patten's horse also came very near getting off as well. The first jury disagreed and a second was empanelled which brought in a verdict of guilty and the prisoner got a year.

The snowfall at the Nickel Plate mine last week was a particularly heavy one. For the week ending May 13 it reached 28 inches. The week before it was 8 inches, making a full three feet for the first 13 days of the month. If the rest of the month has anything like the same amount of precipitation it will make the month a record breaker. For a considerable part of the spring the precipitation was unusually light but this month should bring the season's supply pretty well up to the old mark.

The heavy rain on Friday night had a tendency to loosen rocks on the mountain side and occasionally they could be heard rolling down over the talus nearer the bottom of the slopes. Occurrences of this kind in the past have generally been attended with injury to the flume and a consequent temporary stoppage of operations but they have been running in luck for the past year and not until Saturday when a rock came down and bowled out a portion of the flume where it was strung up by means of a cable has there been any trouble. The damage was immediately reported by the flume tender and a gang of men put on and it was ready to carry water again after an interruption of some five or six hours. This time came in handy about the mill to do some necessary repairs.

Right now is when the spraying should be done for protection against a recurrence of the caterpillar nuisance of last year which killed a number of fir trees in town. We were shown the other day some evidence which proves that the warnings given from time to time in these columns have not been too urgent. A knot or ball of young caterpillars which, although not much larger than a large marble or alley, must have contained thousands of them that were not much more than an eighth of an inch in length but everyone of them living, was taken from a young fir tree. Spray pumps should be procured at once and the spray for which the recipe was given in the Gazette a few weeks ago should be applied. That recipe is 2 lbs arsenate of lead to 40 gallons of water sprayed on the trees, with the first appearance of the caterpillars.

Hedley friends of Mr. T. Walter Beam were pleased to have an opportunity of renewing acquaintance with him last week on his brief visit in with Mr. Merrill who prevailed on him to come along. There is a kindly remembrance of him in Hedley from his former sojourn both when aiding in conducting the examination of the Nickel Plate mine prior to its being taken over and during the few weeks following the taking over when he was in full charge of operations and gave us an introduction to the broader and saner policy which has characterized the operations of the new concern. Since then Mr. Beam has covered a wide scope of country spying out possibilities for profitable mining investment but he doesn't find many Nickel Plate plums as ripe and luscious for the picking in other parts of the continent as this one was.

Keep in mind the celebration at the Centre on Wednesday next, the 24th. A good programme of sports is being arranged and a rattling good time assured all who attend.

Mrs. (Dr.) McLellan, of Oklaboma and three children arrived in Keremeos last week and with her sister, Miss McConnell, will take up residence on their fruit lot west of town.

Tuesday, May 30th has been fixed as the date for the commencement of Entrance Exams. Two candidates from Keremeos will go up to Hedley to write.
