Class 2.-For the best display of fresh fruit (any design of stand not nore chan 10 feet high and ocenpying a flome Face of not miore than 5 feet square) : Finst prize, gold medal-value $\$ 100.00$; value $\$ 50.00$; third prize, the "Birks" ilveri medal-value $\$ 25.00$.
