SHUT UP OR GET OUT

The "powers that be" in the Presbyterian church in Canada owe it to themselves and to the church to tell the public whether Dr. J. A. McDonald, editor of the Toronto Globe, is still on the rolls of the church as a licensed preacher; and if so, what he is doing gallivanting through the United States, uttering falsehood and slander on the people of this country? If what he has been reported in the newspapers to have said on various platforms across the line be true, it is certainly up to the church authorities aforesaid, to make him either shut up or get out. On one platform in Kansas he was reported to have said that the people of Canada were in favor of reciprocity but they had been bought with \$1,500,000 in cash sent over by the American trusts to turn it down, and a few days ago he told a Chicago audience that "it was the unintelligent emotion of the crowd that swayed the vote against reciprocity and that the people are now sober and regretful." His usefulness either to Canada or the Presbyterian church is gone. His aims and sentiments proclaim him to be with the United States. Why then, does he not stay there and quit palming himself off as a Canadian? Ed. Farrer, the traitor of 1891, was a man compared with McDonald in 1911. It is a well-known fact that for all the years between 1878 and 1896 while the Liberal party in Canada kept talking free trade, commercial union, unrestricted reciprocity and other similar rot many United States manufacturers who wanted the Canadian markets refrained from moving their establishments or starting branch factories in Canada, but after they were given some evidence that protection had become a fixed principle in Canada's fiscal policy they did begin to move factories over to this side. It is also well known that immediately after Laurier and his associates accepted the reciprocity pact, that movement of United States manufacturers abruptly ceased and it will never be resumed as long as this man McDonald, bearing the prestige of the church, is permitted to go over there ranting his lies and Laurier and his henchmen (as they appear inclined to do) keep up the agitation for reciprocity from the opposition benches. Now there are thousands of good presbyterians in Canada who are not traitors to their country like McDonald, and it is up to the church authorities to see that he is either officially repudiated or restrained, or they must choose between him and thousands of better men who are members or adherents of the church and who will not stand for his traitorous work.

EDITORIAL COMMENTS

The question of church union between the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational bodies in Canada which has been before the church courts has finally come to the point when the people must pronounce upon it, and we hope the verdict will be such as to open the eyes of the opposing minority which developed in the church courts. If the members of all the churches (and especially those in newly settled districts) do not carry union with an overwhelming majority they will not be acting in their own interests.

There has always been a certain section of the British public who were disposed to make a demi-god of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. What do they think now of his proposal to ask the Duke of Connaught to disapprove of the personnel of the cabinet which Mr. Borden has framed to conduct the business of the country with him? To do so the new representative of the Crown in this country is asked to take a position unattempted by any sovereign of Great Britain since Charles I had his head chopped off. The thing is so preposterous that it begins to look as if the old gentleman's anger at his defeat has made him a bit batty.

The people of Yale Cariboo have still greater reason to feel proud of their representative at Ottawa and the honor done him in giving him a portfolio when they note the great compliment paid Hon. Martin Burrell by the Canadian Fruit-grower's Association of Ontario which has so warmly expressed its appreciation of the appointment. This recognition of British Columbia and her men on the part of the people of the east is in most marked contrast with the condition of affairs when Sir Wilfrid Laurier took office and formed his first cabinet in 1896. Although British Columbia had enjoyed cabinet representation in the previous administration there were no cabinet honors for this province in Laurier's first ministry nor for some time afterwards, but the unique honor attaching to the present situation is the fact that Ontario, the largest and most influential province of the Dominion, comes forward with this grateful tribute to the cabinet representative of another province.

It will be remembered that when Bonar Law was chosen as leader of the Unionist party in Britain, Winston Churchill expressed the opinion that from a party standpoint Bonar Law was the most dangerous man the Liberals could have opposed to them as leader. That opinion on his part was to a greater or less extent looked upon as a good natured but somewhat extravagant compliment on his part, but subsequent events go to show that he was about right and that the Liberals have already begun to feel the weight of the new leader's personality. Since Bonar Law has assumed the helm of the opposition ship two by-elections have taken place in comparatively safe Liberal seats and the Unionists have made gains of both of them. In the case of the South Somerset gain in which Henry Vivian went down to defeat the constituency had been held by the Liberals for a quarter of a century. What the new leader wants is a free hand to inaugurate needed domestic reforms and a vigorous imperial policy and the party will win out. There was always a big church steeple over the heads of the Cecilis that more than offset the advantage of a sound foreign policy and if he will only sever the cord which binds the established church millstone to the neck of the Unionist party he can easily ride out any Home Rule storm with which Asquith or Redmond may attempt to overwhelm him and the country.

Miss Grathwohl, of Oroville, was elected as queen of that town at the Spokane Apple Show and will proceed there to "queen it" during the continuance of the Fair. She was one time a resident of Hedley.

J. J. Campbell, blacksmith in the machine shop, has purchased Harry Swan's residence on Cawston Street. Harry is now building a bridge for Foley, Welch & Stewart on the Grand Trunk Pacific at Skeena crossing.

G. H. Whiteman, formerly teller in the bank here, came in yesterday. He has quit the bank and is going into the office of the Princeton Coal and Land Co. His many friends were pleased to have a hand shake with him again.

The Sunday boat question is a burning one in various lake towns and those along the S. & O. as well, for the Sunday boat also means a Sunday train. The clergy are as a rule strongly against the innovation and are beating the C. P. R. and the Boards of Trade that have favored the movement.

Charlie Reveley, who has been in charge of the company's store at the Nickel Plate and time-keeper at the mine for the last five years has taken a position in Victoria and quits here the beginning of December. The company is fortunate in having a fully competent man to take his place, as Herb. Freeman, motorman, has been promoted to the vacancy.

The Church of England Ladies' Auxiliary will hold a social evening on Tuesday the 5th December at eight o'clock in Fraser's hall instead of the usual fortnightly meeting. All are cordially invited. The ladies take this opportunity of thanking their Hedley friends for their kind support and hope for a generous patronage on this occasion to close the season.

The Bank at Oroville has changed hands. Apparently banks over there are not the big institutions they are on this side of the line and can be bought and sold with the same freedom that we observe in the case of a livery stable or a grocery.

The Gazette congratulates Mr. Hincks on being promoted to the full status of bank manager. Heretofore he has only had the rank of acting manager of the branch here, but a couple of days ago he was notified of the promotion.

Hedley Camp No. 15062 of the Modern Woodmen of America are going to give a dance in Shatford's hall on Friday evening December 15th which is to be made an annual event. Committees are now at work perfecting arrangements.

Dr. Jackson, dentist, expected to come down on Monday's train from Princeton but had to go to Tulameen instead and will arrive in Hedley today. Those who require work done should see him at once as he only intends to remain a couple of days.

The break in the flume last week came at an awkward time as it deprived them of the use of the water during the few days of mild weather when they could have easily cleared out all the ice. By the time the break was repaired which took the greater part of a week the weather had stiffened up again and the frost was ready to begin its old tricks again.

Messrs Boeing and Brass have the building of a bridge over the Ashnola river on the new road built up that stream, and they went there on Monday to begin operations. It is pretty cold weather for outdoor work of that kind. The bridge will be about the same size as the structure over Twenty-mile creek on the new road to the station put in last spring.

Rev. A. H. Cameron announced at his service on Sunday evening that the vote on church union was now to be taken in the various congregations. Some time ago he preached a series of sermons on the subject in which he gave the movement his cordial support. Nevertheless he does not believe that anyone should be coerced into supporting the measure against their own views and inclinations and to be fair in the matter he has decided that before the vote is taken he will
