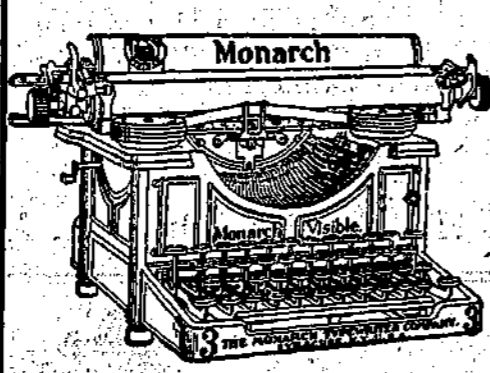

FOR FIRE PROTECTION

Property Holders Meet to Consider Ways
and Means.

During the past week the town has
had three sharp warnings to get ready
for a visitation by fire. The burning
of the Sam Lee Ling laundry in China-
town was serious enough in itself and
it was by the greatest good fortune
that the wind was as favorable as it
was or a considerable portion of the
town would have gone. Next Loomer's
house caught fire and only prompt
action saved it from destruction.

The next was when the roof of the
annex to the Hotel Hedley took fire in
close proximity to the chimney. This
occurred shortly after 7 o'clock on
Thursday evening and the fire had
gained so much headway before it was
noticed that the flame broke through
the roof. In this case the chemical
fire extinguisher scored a point. The
one used was a small cylinder machine
owned by T. H. Rotherham. He took
it over as soon as the alarm was given
and a hole being cut to permit inser-
tion of the nozzle under the roof the
stream of gas was turned on when the
fire very soon went black. It was of
course a case where the chemical had
a good chance to do its work for the
air was excluded and the gas confined
to the region of the fire with the mini-
mum amount of interference from the
oxygen in the air but it did the work
in a most effective manner and again
the town was saved from impending
disaster.

Next day word was passed around
for a meeting of property-holders and
others interested in the welfare of the
town, and on Friday evening there
was a fair turnout at the meeting in
the dining room of the old commercial
hotel.

F. H. French was appointed chair-
man and after desultory talking a
committee consisting of the chairman
and Messrs. Schubert and Rotherham
were appointed to communicate with
fire departments in other places to as-
certain what would be required in the
way of equipment and cost of same,
and report at a meeting to be called
later.

Another committee to consider and
prepare plans for organization of a fire
brigade was appointed, the members
being W. J. Forbes, E. D. Boeing, J.
Fraser and G. McEachern.

When the cost of equipment is laid
before another meeting they will be
able to tell how much will be required
and take steps to provide funds for
purchase of same.

GOLF

The addition of two new holes to

but both of them are holes of great

They fit in well with the other holes

REVISITING OLD SCENES

Vernon's Growth in the Last Decade
Proves a Revelation.

Since the building of the Great
Northern up the Similkameen valley
the people of this part of the district
are becoming more out of touch with
affairs in the Upper Okanagan and it
is difficult to believe that the expan-
sion of the section of country to the
north of Okanagan Lake has been as
great as it really is.

The entire Okanagan from Dog
Lake northward seems to have shared
in the general betterment of trade
conditions. At Penticton, perhaps,
the growth has been more remarkable
than at any other point and particu-
larly within the past year for at that
point a boom seems now to be on al-
though doubtless the residents would
indignantly deny this for "boom" is an
opprobrious word and all towns re-
gard their growth as being too steady
and substantial to warrant application
of the term. Summerland and Kelowna
have also made wonderful progress
and the increase in population and
amount of building done no more than
keep pace with the increased produc-
tion. At Kelowna they claim that
there is a population of 4000 within an
area of four miles surrounding the
centre of the town.

Vernon, however, was the one place
in the Okanagan that the writer had
an opportunity to note more particu-
larly the changes that have taken
place and institute comparisons be-
tween present day conditions and
those that existed when he was resi-
dent some seventeen years ago. Then
the population was considerably be-
low the thousand mark and to-day it
is said to be nearing 4000 for the town
alone, without counting that outside
the town on the numerous smaller
fruit farms which have followed the
subdivision of the large ranches of an
earlier date.

In public buildings Vernon shows
the fastening care of its wide awake
representative, Hon. Price Ellison,
who, like our own representative for
the Similkameen, takes good care that
his constituency will have its full
share of all the good things that are
going. As a result, in addition to im-
portant improvements on the high-
ways of the immediate vicinity the
town has fine public and high schools,
an asylum for the insane and a large
new hospital beautifully situated on a
hill overlooking the town that was a
wheat field in the earlier years of the
town's history.

A very pleasing thing to note was
that most of those who were in busi-
ness there in those early days and
who have stayed with the town have
prospered in like measure with the
town itself. Of these we might enu-
merate W. R. Megaw who has flourish-
ed like a green bay tree, and may be
said to have outstripped all the others
in the degree of expansion attained
(and who by the way has been the
most persistent advertiser); Campbell
Bros., furniture; S. C. Smith, sash and
door; T. E. Crowell, contractor; the
Vernon branch of the Bank of Mont-
real which opened out there in the fall
of 1892 in the old Schubert block but
now occupy their own new palatial
quarters that would do credit to any
city in the province, while a large
army of bank clerks do the business
of the branch which was transacted in
the olden time by Messrs. Henderson
and Germaine, the first manager and
teller who opened up the branch and
Mr. Henderson is still at the helm;
Fred Billings, barrister, who has for
years had the cream of the legal busi-
ness from Sicamous to the American
boundary; and last but not least we
may mention the Vernon News which
never lagged behind, extending their
business plant from time to time to
meet altered conditions and now have
ideal quarters in the old Bank of
Montreal block which has been moved
back to make room for the new block.

An evidence of the general prosper-
ity of the town is seen in the large
number of private owned autos in
the town in addition to the large gar-

M. K. WOULDN'T SELL

But Now Becomes Partner With the
Granby in the Hidden Creek
Property

Spokane, October 25.—The Granby
Consolidated Mining & Smelting com-
pany today closed a deal for the pur-
chase of 80 per cent of the capital stock
of the Hidden Creek Mining Company
owning a big copper mine on Observa-
tory Inlet near Prince Rupert, B. C.,
on a basis of half a million dollars for
the property. The interests acquired
were held by J. M. and Ralph Hogens
of Butte and New York, M. K. Rodg-
ers, manager of the mine and owner of
the remaining 20 per cent of the stock
refusing to sell at any price. The
mine is considerably developed and equip-
ped. The property covers 6000 acres
of mineral claims, mostly patented,
and a thousand acres of town and
smelter site. The mine is located a
quarter of a mile from tide water.

SHIP TO GRAND FORKS

The Granby propose to equip the
property with a matting plant and
will ship low grade matte to its Grand
Forks smelter for conversion. The
estimated tonnage of ore in sight at
the mine is 400,000 tons of average
value of 3 1/2 per cent copper. The ore
has a high excess of iron and sulphur,
rendering it very valuable to Granby
as an aid in reducing metal losses in
slag, and coke consumption and in-
creasing the tonnage of silicious ore
which can be handled at the Grand
Forks plant.

FINANCING A HOSPITAL

Even the Old Established Concerns Have
Little Margin to Go On.

(Vernon News.)

The directors of the Vernon Jubilee
Hospital deemed it advisable to in-
form the public each month as to the
expenditure and receipts in connection
with the hospital and also to afford
such other information necessary. For
the month of September there were in
the hospital as patients, 78. The re-
ceipts from paying patients were \$957-
65, while the expenditure, including
salaries and running expenses, is
\$1250.35. From the above it will be
seen how necessary it is that the hospi-
tal receives its per diem grant from
the government; for the month this
grant when received will amount to
\$55.00.

Victorians Jubilant That Question is Fin-
ally Settled.

Victoria, Oct. 26.—The Songhees
Indians have after many years of ne-
gotiations at last agreed to give up
their reserve in the heart of Victoria.
The agreement provides that each of
the 43 heads of the tribe shall receive
\$10,000 and that provision be made for
a new reserve. The premier signed
the agreement last night.

to board years ago when he kept the
Victoria. He too has kept up with
the procession and his guests have
their wants well attended to.

EDITORIAL COMMENTS

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's coquetting with the question of reciprocity with the United States is apparently falling far short of meeting the reception he had anticipated. The wonder is what has become of all the reciprocity sentiment with which the air was surcharged in 1891, for even the Globe which at that time supported the 'Ras Wiman and Ed. Farmer propaganda has now begun to apply the wet blanket.

In towns and cities through both eastern and western Canada there is a strong agitation to do away with the system of ward adermanic representation and vest the matter of expenditure in a Board of Control which will have power to say how and where money is to be spent independent of the wishes of the people in any particular ward. There is no doubt the adermanic system has been productive of grave abuses and civic funds have in many cases been squandered with but little return.

The diplomacy displayed by Premier McBride as demonstrated by his courteous treatment of Sir Wilfrid Laurier during his recent visit to the province was good seed well and wisely sown and already the harvest therefrom is being garnered as seen by the speedy settlement of the Songhees reserve difficulty at Victoria. With Victoria and Ottawa pulling at different angles and officials swayed by party prejudices giving counsel to the Indians that was neither in the interests of the Indians or the province it was not much wonder that progress in the matter of settlement was slow and unsatisfactory. Taking advantage of the psychologic moment Premier McBride has been able to effect a settlement with the Indians that leaves the dusky braves comparatively wealthy men and their kłotchmen free to indulge to the full their fondness for bright colors, as well as putting the province in possession of a most valuable piece of property which when wisely handled will prove a most important asset for the province and a boon to the city of Victoria. Already the government at Ottawa have ratified the agreement and now that each side is in conciliatory mood it would seem an opportune time for an adjustment of other outstanding differences. It is an old and true saying that you can do more "with an ounce of sugar than a quart of vinegar" although chemically the two are very closely allied.

Town and District.

Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Boeing and daughter Lois spent Sunday with Mr. Mrs. Bowerman on Osyoos lake near Oroville, returning on Monday.

John Neill arrived in town last week from Bow Island, Alta., and may spend the winter in the Similkameen, work being slack in the prairie province since the completion of harvest.

Burns Dowerman came up on Monday from Oroville to visit his sister, Mrs. Boeing. This is his first trip to Hedley since he left in the spring of 1907 for the north country, in company with Lou Anderson.

The leading hotels in town carry Estimo cigars because they are good and what the public want. If you want them you must ask for them.

The Ladies' hospital Auxiliary have several high-class entertainments to present this fall and winter to Hedley audiences among which will be the old famous Shakespearian comedy "Twelfth Night", to be put on by a troupe of eminent English players. The date will be announced shortly for this and other attractions.

Thanksgiving day passed off quietly in town, nothing to mark it except the closing of business places and an occasional drunk on the streets. The weather was well-nigh perfect and the day was taken advantage of by local golfers in a general match.

Work is progressing as quickly as possible over at the mill and power house in getting the new plant in shape for work. All the machinery is now to hand except some of the electric motors for the mill. The big generator and waterwheel have been put in position and the steam connections are being made between the new boilers and the Goldie & McCulloch engine. The steam pipe is 12 inch running the entire length of the power house. In all probability the new generator will turn over before next issue but it will be run light for a few days to fully dry out the cells before any load is turned on. The Double waterwheel will have the honor of the first waltz with the new generator which is scarcely a fair shake for the Goldie & McCulloch which was first on hand. When the new generator has assumed its duties the old Ball engine will in all probability form a partnership with the old 100kw generator and be ready to supply extra light when required. The only part of the old equipment left unattached will be the old waterwheel.

On Monday Mr. Sheridan, adjuster for the Hudson Bay Insurance Co., paid Hedley a visit and viewed the ruins of the Chinese laundry, completing his report to the company. While here he noted the unprotected condition of the town which he thought inexcusable in view of the ease with which the domestic water supply could be made effective for fire-fighting purposes. He also bore testimony to the efficiency of chemical engines, particularly the "Ever Ready" which is manufactured at Brandon and which differs from the ordinary variety in that pure carbon dioxide conveyed in liquid form to the fire is used as the extinguishing agent instead of the impure article generated from carbonate of soda and sulphuric acid, which he says often does as much harm to the stock by staining and acid burning as water would do. He only had a short time between trains to finish up his business here or he would have liked to go around to business houses, and discuss the matter of fire protection and the most effective means of securing the same at a cost which would not be beyond Hedley's ability to handle.

The Gazette was in error last week in stating that H. A. Hincks had lost his place at the top of the ladder in the local golf standing. The competition with E. H. Williams in which he was alleged to have lost was not a ladder series match but a handicap and he remains as before at the top, the nerveless scratch man as imperturbable as the mythical bogey itself.

Provincial Licence Inspector Colin Collin H. Campbell accompanied by chief constable Bunbury was in town the beginning of the week inspecting hotel premises. This inspection is said to be far reaching in its effects and upon it will depend largely the attorney-general's action in cases which may arise later affecting the standing of hotels under the new licence act.

Word has been received from Mrs. Whillans, of Victoria, telling of their fortunate escape from being burnt out in the disastrous fire which occurred in that city last week. The apartments they occupy belonging to Dr. Robertson were in what was described in the newspapers as the burnt area, being near the corner of Fort and Broad. They had to leave the house and considerable of their belongings were removed but although buildings were burnt adjoining their apartments were snatched from the general destruction which was reported to have laid waste the entire area bounded by Broad, Fort, Government and Trounce Alley. Victoria Fire brigade have certainly made a record for themselves in being able to stop such a conflagration at a narrow lane like Trounce alley as well as saving individual buildings out of a burning block when buildings on either side have been destroyed.

Five years ago when W. B. Haynes was constable in Hedley a man named Ed. Dunn set the authority of the constable at defiance and lived and behaved generally in a manner which made him amenable to the vagrancy act. He had no money to pay a fine and wouldn't work to make any. He was accordingly brought up by the constable and given one month in Kamloops although there was no overt act on his part or violence in conduct which warranted giving him any more than one month. Nevertheless H. A. McLean, the deputy attorney-general remonstrated on the lightness of the award and in doing so based his objection solely on mercenary grounds, stating that the cost of taking him to Kamloops was so great that he should have been given more than the one month. In compliance with his wishes no more one month sentences were given, and afterwards many men who were more deserving candidates for the vagrancy act than Dunn were tolerated and allowed to go unmolested rather than put the province to the expense of shipping them to Kamloops. Had Mr. McLean impressed others who are responsible for the administration of justice with similar ideas of economy and consistently practised them himself the province would have been saved a good many hundred dollars that has been squandered on the Cawston case. The acquittal of Cawston at the assizes in Vernon last week showed that the local magistrate was amply justified in taking full precaution to ascertain the facts before allowing the affair to advance to a stage where the province should be let in for a big sum of useless law costs.
