COAL STRIKE SETTLED

Hon. Robert Rodgers Was Peacemaker.

The first intimation received in the Interior of settlement was a wire from Hon. Robt Rodgers to Hon. Martin Burrell, then at Nelson on his way home to Grand Forks.

These telegrams show official announcement at Ottawa and reply from Labor department.

From Hon. Robert Rodgers, minister of Interior, Lethbridge, Alta., Oct. 26, 1911: "Have succeeded in getting full and complete settlement of strike signed by both parties."

To Hon. Robert Rodgers, from F. A. Acland, deputy minister of labor: "I am directed by the minister of labor to convey to you his utmost cordial congratulations on the splendid success resulting from your efforts in the cause of industrial peace, thus bringing to a close the prolonged dispute in western coal mines. I am also to request you will kindly convey the minister's best wishes on behalf of the parties and the expression of his desire that the settlement effected may bring a season of extended prosperity and good feelings."

HANDING IT TO AMBY

The following from the Oroville Gazette shows how a former Hedleyite has been faring in a foreign land and illustrates the inadvisability of being an alien and some other things. The Gazette says:

"According to the Republic Pay-streak, Andy McDermott, formerly of this place, has got in bad with the authorities. THE COAST CONNECTION

The Railway Programme East of the Hope Range

In his editorial correspondence to the Victoria Colonist, Mr. C. H. Lugin touches on the railway construction progress in the valleys of the Hope mountain region, which is of much interest for people of the lower mainland. The Victoria, Vancouver and Eastern railway, a subsidiary line of the Great Northern, he writes, will be extended from Princeton to Coalmont next month. He also reports a conversation with Mr. Kennedy, engineer in charge of the Great Northern surveys, who ventured the information that the work of surveying the grade of the V. V. & E. through the Hope mountains would be completed this autumn, and that he expected the railway to be completed to the coast in two years. Mr. Kennedy also expects that a grade of two per cent. to the Fraser valley will be obtained, but only at great cost, many short tunnels having to be driven. Later a great seven-mile tunnel, which will reduce the grade to one per cent. will be put in, but how soon will depend on circumstances. The editor of the Colonist then adds: "This authentic statement as to the plans of the Great Northern's people will be of general interest. It is understood that the plans of the company contemplate a railway from Winnipeg through the mountains by way of Pincher Creek to connect with its British Columbia line, and this will give us another trans-Canadian road. Several years ago I wrote to Mr. Jas. J. Hill, asking him what would be the east and west terminal points in Canada of his system. His reply was brief. He said 'Winnipeg and Victoria.'"

The active work on the part of the Great Northern has doubtless caused other railway interests to direct their attention to the Similkameen Valley. Mr. Lugin notes that Canadian Pacific engineers are examining the route between Penticton and the valley of the Similkameen, an indication, he takes it, that this company will not allow a section of the country, where extensive coal and metalliferous mining will be carried on, to remain the exclusive territory of a rival corporation. Reference is all made to the proposals of the Canadian Northern to build south from Kamloops. From this Mr. Lugin concludes that "we may look forward to seeing at no distant date three great railway systems competing in the development of this interesting region, which lies just east of the mountains flanking the Fraser Valley on the east."

CANADA'S TRADE INCREASES

More Evidence of Benefit to Accrue from Defeat of Reciprocity

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 23—During September, 1911, the total trade was \$69,808,420 as against \$64,459,495 in September, 1910. For the six months ending September 30th, 1911, the total trade was \$400,270,855 as against \$360,277,270 for the same period in 1910.

The imports during September, 1911, were \$43,378,164 as against \$38,363,685 in September, 1910. The imports for the six months were \$258,406,004 as against \$223,466,647 in 1910.

The domestic exports during the six months were 120,606,982 and foreign exports \$12,257,770 as against \$127,525,432 and 9,285,197 respectively last year.

Since the election the customs department is receiving brisk inquiries about the valuation of plants from American firms intending to establish branch factories in Canada. While reciprocity was pending these inquiries almost ceased.

APPRAISING ESTATE

(Vernon News)

F. Billings, who has been appointed by the Provincial Government as commissioner to adjust a dispute over the assessment of the Richter estate at Keremeos, in connection with the succession duties, left on Monday for the lower country. He was accompanied by Messrs. Larxton and Robinson, of Victoria, counsel respectively for the estate and the government, and Mr. Reynolds, who acted as secretary to the commission.

A PLEASANT VISIT

It was quite a pleasant surprise we had on Thursday last in receiving a visit from Col. Cartwright, of Summerland, who had come over to Keremeos by Studebaker's auto line on his way south by the Great Northern; and having to wait at Keremeos for the afternoon train going south, he very kindly decided to take the run up to Hedley and spend the wait-over with the editor in renewing old friendship. It was over twenty years ago when we served the Queen together in Wolsley Barracks, London, Ont. Since then we have only met for a few minutes at a time on one or two occasions, and during the interval also he rose by merit to a point very near the top of the military ladder in Canada, when he had to resign because of ill-health and seek a climate more suitable to his ailment than that to which he was subject with the headquarters staff at Ottawa. His complaint is bronchial-asthma of a rather exceptional type which will only yield to the healing influence of the Okanagan for the summer season which is generally the most trying with many others who have the same complaint. For the coming winter he decided to try a point in Texas about 150 miles from the Gulf of Mexico and 150 miles above sea level, to which place he was then en route. This location may prove the very thing necessary to his case and it is to be hoped it may. The Colonel was looking very well and in excellent spirits. Of course we had to chaff each other a bit about the election, and the Colonel, as a son of the old Liberal war-horse, Sir Richard, as may be expected, is a loyal supporter of that party; but the curious part is that when we began to discuss the situation it was surprising how closely together we were on the question of how things ought to be, for chaps on opposite sides of the political fence. It was unfortunate that he was unable to stay over for another day, for the time was altogether too short to do justice either to the sights of Hedley or the discussion of old times. Nevertheless it was most kind of him to remember the old friendship and come for the few hours we had.

PROGRESS TOWARDS COALMONT

(Nelson News)

Messrs. Kennedy and Hale, of the Great Northern engineering staff were visitors in Coalmont last week. While there they made arrangements with the Columbia Coal & Coke Co. for the laying of a "Y" for the turning of the Great Northern engines. The railway company have already made arrangements for the building for a station, two houses, coal bunkers, tank, etc. This work will be prosecuted immediately upon the arrival of the railhead at Coalmont. Work is now progressing favorably on the last crossing of the Tolameon river, a few miles below town, and the middle of November should see track laying completed. Eight or ten teams have been kept busy for the last month or more grading the site for the station buildings and sidings.

GENERAL NEWS

F. T. Congdon has been defeated in the Yukon by Dr. Thompson. Congdon was a man who would never elevate public sentiment, but the reverse. The Yukon is well rid of him.

Parties in Ontario are lining up their candidates for the Provincial election there in December.

Earl Grey has been given the Grand Cross of the Order of the Bath.

Lord Strathcona has presented the museum aboard Nelson's Victory with a handsome painting representing the fleet leaving Gibraltar in 1812. The King telegraphed his appreciation of his generous gift.

Henry B. Clark, who was arrested in New York for embezzlement in St. John, was manager of the Bank of New Brunswick, up to a few months ago when he disappeared and it became known that he was \$50,000 short. It is said that Clark lost heavily speculating in cotton.

ELECTRIC LINE FOR OKANAGAN

Construction Will Be Started Next Spring—Will Ship Thousand Carloads of Fruit

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 26—There is much satisfaction in the Okanagan valley over the announcement by Sir William Mackenzie that he will start the construction next spring of an electric railway in the valley. The news was especially gratifying to the farmers and fruit growers as the proposed line, when completed, will greatly facilitate the distribution of the produce of their farms and orchards, according to R. H. Agur, a prominent fruit grower of Summerland. A careful estimate shows that there are 1,500,000 apple, peach, cherry, plum and pear trees in the valley and new orchards are constantly being planted," he said "The valley would ship 1,000 carloads of fruit next season. A large shipment of selected apples was sent to Australia this fall."

A GOOD DAY'S WORK

Big Game Hunter Kills the Stanley Park Marander

Vancouver, Oct. 26.—The big cougar which has been roaming the jungles of the city's 1000 acre Stanley park for 10 days, was despatched by John Shannon, a big game hunter, late this afternoon. Shannon is one of a score of marksmen who have been on the animal's trail. The cougar turns out to be a mountain lion, measuring from tip to tip, seven feet.

Shannon only entered upon the chase this morning. His hounds caught the trail, which led to some dense undergrowth, where evidently the lion had been in hiding during the day, seeking his prey, which has included three of the park's finest deer and half a dozen goats, by night. The lion sought safety in a tree and the rest was easy for Shannon.

The lion is believed to have come out of the North Vancouver mountains, swimming Vancouver's three mile wide inlet, and for nearly two weeks has had full possession of Stanley park, which was practically deserted by frightened citizens and tourists. It is the first instance of its kind in Canada. Shannon reaps a reward of \$150.

FOR GOOD ROADS

Extensive Scheme On Foot—Convention Next Week

An important step towards the improvement of existing roads in western Canada will be taken on November 3rd and 4th, when meetings of all interested in this movement will be held in New Westminster, B. C. The meetings will be called by Mayor John A. Lee, and will be attended by a large number of the members of the Westminster Automobile Club, the Vancouver Auto Club, the Victoria Auto Club, the Seattle Automobile Club and other automobile associations.

The Pacific Highway Association will be represented at the meetings by a strong delegation, including prominent San Francisco, Portland, Tacoma, Seattle, Bellingham and Spokane men. These men will come prepared to urge the extension of the Pacific Highway, which now stretches from Vancouver, B. C., to Tia Juana, Mexico, a distance of 2009 miles. The scheme favored by the Highway enthusiasts is the building of the Pacific Highway through British Columbia, via Hazelton, and on to the Yukon.

The extension of the Canadian Highway with the object of eventually making it a good road from the Atlantic to the Pacific will also command much of the attention of the meetings. Resolutions asking the Federal Government to assist in this scheme will be introduced during the convention.

Other matters to be discussed include the placing of signs and guide posts along all travelled roads, the standardizing of legislation regarding the speed of automobiles and the "rule of the road", and the planning of a campaign in favor of better roads.

Winston Churchill is now first lord of the Admiralty.

PROVINCIAL ARCHIVES

The report of the provincial archivist issued from the department of the Hon. Provincial Secretary is a document that will be perused with special gratification by lovers of literature who may be specially interested in history and particularly that of their own province. Not only are the contents of the report most interesting in themselves but the satisfaction of knowing that the early documents (or at all events so many of them) are extant and will furnish data upon which future historians as well as writers of fiction may find material for books that will both entertain and instruct, is of greater importance still. If ever a country was shabbily treated in the matter of preservation of its early records it was the treatment received by British Columbia at the hands of the United States historian Bancroft who was intrusted with documents for the preparation of his history of the province and never returned them, claiming that they had been mislaid and lost. His history is grossly unfair to the province and he apparently took good care to make away with the evidence which would prove him unfair. The documents he failed to return covered the period of the Spanish occupation.

Doubtless there is much matter that is still in possession of private parties through the province and outside of it which should be preserved and the press of the province should urge upon all who have documents in their possession dealing with the early history of the province to communicate with the provincial archivist and let him know any particulars concerning them.

A GOOD APPOINTMENT

In the appointment of R. W. Leonard, of St. Catharines, to the chairmanship of the National Transportation Commission is to be seen an earnest of the clean, capable government which Premier Borden is going to give Canada. Leonard is admitted by impartial critics to be the fittest man in Canada for the position, barring none. He is a graduate of the Royal Military College at Kingston and one of the ablest men the institution ever turned out. Besides that he is a practical railroader who has done things and has won his spurs both in the employ of the C. P. R. and the New York Central. Had he been chairman of the Commission from the first it would have saved the people of Canada millions that have been wasted on the G. T. P. through dishonest greed on the part of partisan contractors and an incompetent Commission. He is a wealthy man who has made his own money and made it squarely and is in

the enjoyment of an income that exceeds the salary of \$10,000 which goes with the chairmanship; so he is not attracted to it by the salary, but solely because of the important service which the position will enable him to render. He has been too busy a man in his own profession to have attracted any notice in the political world. Col. Cartwright who went through R. M. C. at the same time as Leonard and has had opportunity to note what he has accomplished since, bears testimony to his eminent fitness for the office, and we are sure the Colonel will not mind us referring to him in this connection. A few appointments like this will soon show the public that Borden is going to prove a safe and capable leader.

It is pleasing to note that the Canadian manufacturers themselves have taken steps to correct the falsehood so industriously circulated by the Grit press that the defeat of reciprocity will mean a higher tariff wall. President Rowley, of the Canadian Manufacturer's Association, stated officially that the Association did not ask for an increase in the duties and did not want such. He also officially disposed of another fib when he denied that the Association had taken any part in the election. They believed in protection but only sufficient to enable them to hold the home market and they consider the present 35% duty ample to do that. Let the U. S. keep their 75% wall if they want it, or make it 300% if they like that better. It is a matter of indifference to Canada.
