### A BUDDING INDUSTRY.

The Keremeos Canning Co. Actively Engaged, Stocking Local Market.

A busy spot these days is the embryo cannery at Keremeos, operated by D. F. Jelly for himself and associates of the Similkameen Farmers' Exchange in a building occupied by him on the lots leased from J. J. Armstrong.

The plant is not extensive but nevertheless the huge pile of canned goods stacked up shows that it is capable of turning out a good large volume of work.

The capacity of the equipment is nominally 1,000 cans per day, although Mr. Jelly says that comfortable working would result in an output nearer half that, but when the amount of eating in a 3-lb. can is considered, it will be seen how many hungry men could be satisfied with an hour's working of the machine.

The machine is known as the "Modern Canner" and consists of an upright boiler arrangement with boiler on the top, and arrangements for heating the soldering irons below.

Two processes in the machine are necessary to complete before final soldering. The cans are first filled to the top and a lid soldered on, but a small vent hole is left in the centre. These are then placed in boiling water for a certain time for the exhausting process when gases and steam escapes. The small vent hole is then soldered up and the cans are next fully submerged and boiled for a further period, after which they are set aside for some time before being put up in the cases.

For this season they have ordered 10,000 cans from the Western Canadian Can Co., of New Westminster, and this expense is one of the great items that contribute to the selling price of canned goods, for the freight on goods of this kind is high. Later on when the industry grows the cans may be made locally.

Last year the output was 2,500 cans, which was confined to tomatoes, and so successful was it and the class of goods turned out so satisfactorily that this year they expect to put up 7,500 cans of tomatoes; but this year cherries, apricots, peaches, pears, prunes and corn were added.

This season has been an excellent one for tomatoes so far as the productiveness of the plants was concerned, and the crop was enormous, but the unusually moist cool season effected the ripening and a smaller percentage of the total crop ripened. It is Mr. Jelly's impression that the Similkameen will down all other districts for the growing of tomatoes.

The output is handled now almost exclusively by local dealers, and in a very short time it is expected that their product will shortly shut out all other canned goods of this variety. This year the price of canned tomatoes supplied by outside houses has gone up about 28%, which will help the local trade.

The excellent character of the goods and the reputation for full measure will make the Keremeos variety a favorite wherever it is introduced.

Next year it is the intention to put up a proper factory building and increase the equipment. This year four girls keep one solderer busy, but in all probability next season will see the force quadrupled.

## ON V. V. & E. CONSTRUCTION

Working Force Is Gradually Getting in Shape to Make Railway.

### MEN AND SUPPLIES COME SLOWLY

Operations Thus Far Confined to Clearing Right of Way and Changing Wagon Road—The Latter Has Involved a Lot of Work.

A visit to the scene of operations in connection with extension of the railway grade between Keremeos and Hedley will find the first camp in charge of Superintendent George Cunningham pitched about a mile up the river above Webster's ferry. The right of way has been cleared to the point where the grade will cross the Similkameen river a short distance below the Keremeos Land Co.'s ditch camp.

But while as yet little has been done in shaping up railway grade there is evidence that the gang have not been idle, and a long stretch of excellent wagon road has been constructed to take the place of the old road which is being encroached upon by the railway right of way. This piece of new wagon road begins on the Price flat below the ferry and by an easy grade gets up on the hillside, where for a considerable distance it runs almost level and will prove an ideal piece of roadway.

Dump cars and trackage are now on hand at the ferry ready to use when the steam shovel can be brought up. This is the favorite method of the contractors, Stewart & Welch, in grading the portions that they do not sublet, nor give out on station work. As yet there are only a few teams, but stabling is being prepared to receive a shipment coming in. When the horses arrive to work the grader, a few days will suffice to complete the short, level piece of roadway intervening between the present end of the steel and the big cut near the ferry where the steam shovel will be first brought into play.

The engineers began cross-sectioning last week, and on Friday last Chief Engineer J. H. Kennedy, who had been at Keremeos for a few days, came on to Hedley to make arrangements for starting station work on the rock bluff opposite the Hedley Lumber Company's sawmill.

The contract for clearing right of way from the crossing of the Similkameen to Brushy Bottom has been let to J. M. Young who has a gang of men at work on it, and A. McDonald who accompanied Mr. Kennedy up on Friday is likely to clear right of way from Brushy Bottom to Hedley, and also put in culverts.

### GREEN MOUNTAIN.

Miss Ferguson of Port Arthur and Miss McLellan of Okanagan Falls were rusticated here for a week.

Mr. and Mrs. Farleigh, of Sunny-side ranch, and Rev. Mr. Cameron of Keremeos were visitors at Green Mountain this week. Mrs. Farleigh and Mr. Cameron had their cameras along and took some fine views.

This has been a busy week at Green Mountain. L. A. Clark is busy harvesting his potato crop, and they are whoppers. He has just finished cutting the second crop of timothy and clover, which was a bumper crop this year.

The railway does not seem to decrease the amount of travel this way, as there has been more than usual this summer, both commercial and freight. The weather so far this fall has been perfect; just enough rain to keep the winter feed growing fine.

Thanksgiving Day has been set for Thursday, Oct. 31st. This brings Thanksgiving Day and Hallowe'en on the same date.

### BRONCHO BUSTING.

Hans Richter Competing in the Contest at Victoria Fair—Likely to Retain Belt.

The Bronco busting competition in front of the grand stand provided some excellent amusement for the big crowd between the horse races. The rough-riding feats of the cowboys were of the stellar variety in the opinion of those who have had much experience in this particular variety of sport, were about as fine as could be seen anywhere. The judges were loud in their praises of the clever work of the contestants, stating that they had never witnessed better bronco busting.

Probably the most exciting ride was that put up by Hans Richter of Keremeos, who won the championship belt last year. He took the mount on Bill Miner, a broncho that had never been ridden before, and he stuck on the beast despite all its tossings, even crashing through a fence when the animal bolted for the corral and still retaining his seat. Neither horse nor rider was injured in the smash. He was received with vociferous applause by the spectators. Oliver Walker, of Douglas Lake, who was thrown by the roan on Wednesday, went down yesterday when he tackled Fish Lake Fox. Tom Graham, of Monte Creek, lusted the limit on Shuswap, and so did Francis Brazil, of Kamloops, on Chilliwhack Cherub, the broncho that took the prize last year. They both had their troubles, but managed to retain their positions in the saddle. Blackstock, of Calgary, tried to subjugate the roan and met the same fate as Walker, being thrown.

### CANADA'S FUTURE.

A decidedly cheerful and optimistic view of the financial situation is taken by Mr. H. Dunn, president of Bradstreet's Commercial Agency, who has just completed his first extended tour of the Dominion. He is convinced that the future of no country in the world is so bright as it is in Canada at the present moment. Most important, indeed, is the opinion held by so competent an authority, that the distribution of several hundred millions of capital in connection with the great railway undertakings to be carried on within the next few years, will prevent this country feeling any reaction which may be experienced elsewhere.

### MEETING AT KAMLOOPS.

Mr. R. L. Borden, Premier McBride and Others Address Greatest Meeting in Town's History.

Kamloops, B.C., September 27.—Mr. Borden's meeting to-night was attended by the largest audience ever gathered in the local hall. From every part of the Yale-Cariboo riding delegates, who were present at the annual convention of the Conservative Association, gathered to do honor to the leader of the party.

Premier McBride spoke after Mr. Martin Burrill, who, in one of his happiest efforts, enthused the audience to the highest pitch, and when Premier McBride began his address he had his hearers with him to a man. The Opposition leaders gave particular attention to local questions or rather provincial ones.

The Oriental immigration matter was handled in a way which won for the Conservative leader the hearty support of every labor man in the hall. His attack upon the Laurier Government for their stand upon this question was one of his best efforts during the campaign. When he took up the matter of government ownership of public franchises he took his hearers with him completely. On civil service reform and the other planks in the Halifax programme he was particularly explicit, and it is needless to say made a great impression. Although Premier McBride, so well known and so highly regarded, was well received, Mr. Borden's reception was more enthusiastic.

Mr. Bergeron was in his best form and kept his audience in an uproar from start to finish. Dr. Reid closed the meeting, which was undoubtedly the most enthusiastic ever held in the Yale-Cariboo. Ex-Premier Semlin, Mr. Price Ellison, M. P. P., and many other prominent Conservatives were present from all parts of the riding. After the meeting a complimentary banquet was held at which some hundred covers were laid. Speeches, songs and music helped the hours pass pleasantly before Mr. Borden and his party were obliged to leave.

### GIVEN A HEARTY SEND-OFF

J. J. Irwin, of Bank of B. N. A., Honored By His Friends

As evidence of the high esteem in which he was held, Mr. J. J. Irwin, teller in the Hedley branch of the Bank of B. N. ## AN EXPLANATION SHOULD BE GIVEN

The Toronto Globe thinks that some explanation is due from Lieutenant-Governor Dunsmuir of his action in withholding his assent from the Bower bill. With this we agree. Mr. McBride disavows all responsibility; yet some one else than the Lieutenant-Governor must accept it. It would be an unthinkable thing in Canadian politics that a lieutenant-governor can on his own responsibility prevent legislation from coming into effect. We have not the slightest doubt that Lieutenant-Governor Dunsmuir can give an explanation of his course, which will be perfectly satisfactory and wholly in keeping with the principles of responsible government, but we agree with the Globe that the explanation ought to be forthcoming, not to the public press, of course, but to the government at Ottawa, who must accept the responsibility of his act. It is possible that he may have been advised by high authority that in the event of such a bill passing the legislature he ought to reserve it until the pleasure of the Governor-General shall be known. It may be that as a Dominion officer he felt it to be his duty not to permit an act to come into force when he knew it was certain to be disallowed. Our institutions are not encased in ribs of inelastic steel. The incumbent of the gubernatorial office is supposed to exercise some discretion. He is not bound to do everything that his ministry tells him to do. If he were, a rubber stamp would be just as effective, and come a great deal cheaper. As we have already pointed out, he occupies a position which is dual in its character. He represents the Crown in regard to matters coming within the province of the provincial legislature; but at the same time he also represents the Crown through the Governor-General as the paramount power in Canada. When the two positions clash, one of them must give way to the other, and if in the case mentioned Lieutenant-Governor Dunsmuir deemed it advisable to give his character as federal officer pre-eminence, we think he did right. Certainly he took the course calculated to give rise to the least possible trouble, without interfering with the will of the legislature, if the Governor-General sees fit to allow it to prevail.—Colonist.

## EDITORIAL COMMENTS

Now is the time when Boundary shareholders of the three noted copper stocks—Granby, B. C. Copper and Dominion Copper—should stand pat and not think for a moment of parting with their holdings. All copper stocks have been tumbling during the past few weeks, which was to be expected as the natural response to the general tightening of money; and particularly so when so marked a decline in the price of the metal itself has taken place. While the lower price of copper will lessen the dividend-earning power of the stock, and shareholders will be effected in that way to a certain extent, the lower price of the stock will make no difference to the mines, which will continue their usual daily output, and it will only be a matter of a short while until copper regains its old price. Shareholders in the east who do not know the advantages possessed by the Boundary copper mines, may be frightened into disposing of their holdings; but those who know that Boundary mines can produce copper so cheaply that they can pay a fair margin of profit at a market price of copper which would shut down the mines of other large producers, will not be supposed to do anything rash, but will stand pat and wait for present difficulties to readjust themselves.

Seattle people must regard Vancouverites as particularly easy when an insane Seattleite can proceed to Vancouver and raise such a ruction as he did in the anti-Asiatic riots there a short time ago. It took a week or so after the riot for the Vancouver rioters and their sympathizers, lay and cleric, to let the fact sink in that Fowler, the modern Mark Antony from Seattle, had a pronounced case of "rats in the garret," and that by following him like the flock of goats that they were, they have made laughing-stocks of themselves. Neither is it to be expected that the same parties would not repeat the performance under like circumstances.

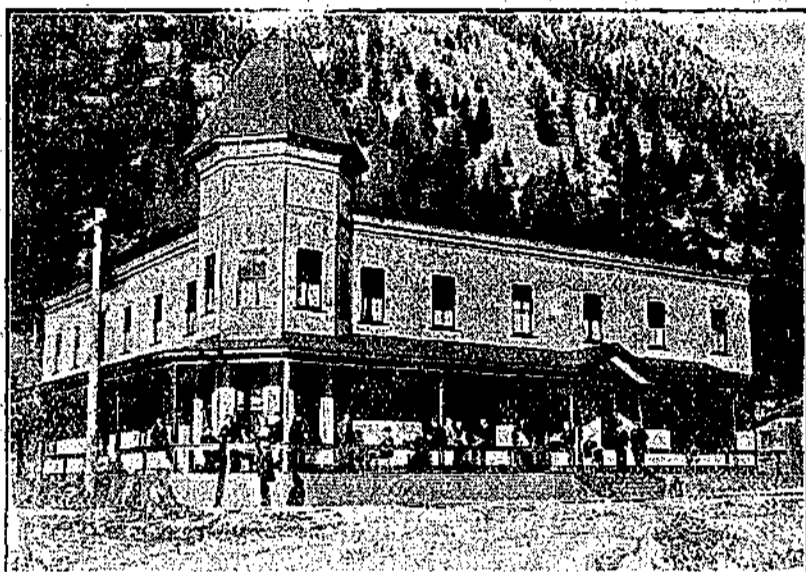

The canning business is going ahead in a very satisfactory way. Last week corn was added to the tin goods on hand for our merchants.

Mr. J. R. Shaw has part of the material on his fruit lot for a house. The building will be 30 x 36 ft. and 2 1/2 stories high.

Messrs. Quintan, Affleck and Orr were with Mr. McDonald viewing the fruit lands on Saturday. Mr. McDonald's motto is "Come, see and buy."

The Rev. Mr. Cameron held Divine service at Fairview at 11 a.m., and here at 7:30 p.m. on Sunday last. Next Sunday he expects to preach in Hedley.

Is this the much talked of accommodation we are to have by the all-rail route from Vancouver?

FOSTER'S WEATHER BULLETIN

Washington, D. C., Sept. 21.—Last bulletin gave forecasts of disturbance to cross continent 17 to 21, warm wave 18 to 20, cool wave 19 to 23. Next disturbance will reach Pacific coast about 22, cross west of Rockies country by close of 23, great central valleys 24 to 26, eastern states 27. Warm wave will cross west of Rockies about 22, great central valleys 24, eastern states 25. Cool wave will cross west of Rockies about 25, great central valleys 27, eastern states 29.

This disturbance will come between two periods of very low temperatures, and while, for a day or two, the temperatures of the disturbance will go to high degrees, the average of a few days of the highest temperatures will be only moderate. Before and after this disturbance passes the temperatures will be unusually low.

Much radical weather may be expected during the fall and winter months and this disturbance will be of more than usual force in all its features. Rainfall will increase over the two weeks preceding.

Last disturbance of September will reach Pacific coast about 26, cross west of Rockies country by close of 27, great central valleys 28 to 30, eastern states Oct. 1. Warm wave will cross west of Rockies about 26, great central valleys 28, eastern states 30. Cool wave will cross west of Rockies about 29, great central valleys Oct. 1, eastern states 3.

Temperatures of this disturbance will average much lower than those of the preceding, and the cool wave will be a cold wave causing a fall of 20 degrees or more and carrying freezing temperatures and frosts further south than usual for this season of the year.
