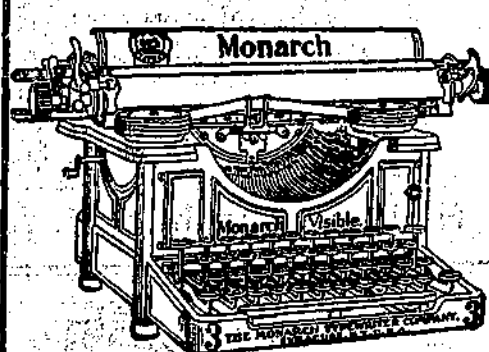

## INDIAN KILLED PLAYING HOLD-UP

Tragedy in Nicola County Results from  
Attack on Hunter—Fatal Shot  
Fired in Self-Defence

Merritt, B. C., Oct 18.—Jas. Sneed  
shot and killed Bill Swackham, an In-  
dian, witnesses say in self defence,  
early Saturday night. The tragedy oc-  
curred about three miles from town in  
the vicinity of the reservation.

Sneed and a boy named Hols-  
worth were returning from a hunting  
trip when they were held up by  
Swackham just as it became dusk.  
The Indian used a club and succeeded  
in getting all the money young Hols-  
worth carried.

He next attacked Sneed, hitting  
him over the head. After vain warn-  
ings, Sneed fired his shot gun, the  
charge entering the Indian's body be-  
low the right breast. He galloped off  
on his horse for a distance of 150 yards  
when he fell dead.

Sneed is now held by the police,  
but will likely be released.

## CHINESE LAUNDRY BURNS

About 4 o'clock on Tuesday morn-  
ing fire broke out in the building in  
Chinatown owned by Sam Lee Ling  
and used by him as a laundry. J. R.  
Edmunds was awakened by the blaze  
and immediately went to arouse  
the chinamen, five of whom  
were asleep in the building. After  
much effort he managed to arouse  
them and get them out of the burning  
some of them being almost overcome  
by smoke and heat.

The building and contents, together  
with bundles of laundry collected from  
townspeople, were completely destroy-  
ed.

This fire is just a gentle reminder to  
Hedleyites that something should be  
done at once in the way of providing  
adequate fire protection. Had the  
wind been from the south the whole  
town would have been in danger, and  
without a hydrant or a single length  
of fire hose all that could be done  
would be to "let it burn."

## HEDLEY NOT ALONE

This is the way the Rossland Miner

"The Miner received a bill in excess of  
\$100 from a certain Rossland business

by an Eastern mail order concern.  
And so it goes. The local newspaper  
is supposed to do the shouting in the  
effort to impress upon the public the  
patriotic pride which should induce  
them to spend their money at home,  
but one half of the Rossland business  
community send east for their print-  
ing, buy an order large enough to  
make up a freight shipment, and then  
wonder why the local printer cannot  
make a retail price to meet the whole-  
sale price of the eastern dealer. Better  
get together, Messrs. Merchant, talk  
over your business conditions, and set  
a good example to the public by pat-  
ronizing your home institutions.

## NEITHER SATISFIED WITH TRANSFER

Sale of Dunsuir Coal Properties Leads  
to Litigation—Syas Ships Were  
Concealed.

Victoria Oct. 21.—Neither William  
Mackenzie nor James Dunsuir ap-  
pears satisfied with the present state  
of affairs in connection with the re-  
cent sale of the Dunsuir coal prop-  
erties to Mr. Mackenzie. In a suit enter-  
ed by Mr. Dunsuir, it is alleged that  
Mr. Mackenzie is holding back assets  
worth about \$1,000,000 belonging to  
Mr. Dunsuir.

On the other hand Mr. Mackenzie  
has brought suit to recover \$400,000  
which he says Mr. Dunsuir secured  
by improperly declaring dividends on  
shares of the Wellington Colliery Co.  
after Mr. Mackenzie had been given  
the option. Mr. Mackenzie also al-  
leges that certain ships and other parts  
of the colliery plant have been concealed  
by Mr. Dunsuir and not turned over.

## ROBBERY AT NOME

Gold Dust Amounting to \$150,000 Stolen  
in Northern Mining Town

Seattle, Oct. 15.—Approximately  
\$150,500 worth of gold dust has been  
stolen from the Pioneer Mining Com-  
pany at Nome during the past two  
years by an organized gang of sluice  
box robbers, three of whom have been  
arrested. This is the estimate placed  
upon the company's loss by recent ar-  
rivals from the north. The arrest of  
John Tiberg at Seattle with over \$4,  
000 worth of stolen dust in his posses-  
sion and the detention of John Erick-  
son at Nome are more incidents of a  
big conspiracy that is gradually being  
unfolded in the north and which im-  
plicated superintendents, straw-bosses  
foremen and others engaged in oper-  
ating rich placer deposits owned by the  
Pioneer Mining Company.

The plan of the robbers was to seize  
a few handfuls of the concentrates,  
richly laden with glittering particles  
of gold, and drop it into the leg of the  
gun boots at a moment when the  
officials of the company directed their  
attention to something else. This gold  
afterwards was pawned out in private.  
A handful of sluice box concentrates,  
at the time when it is partially wash-  
ed down, would contain about \$150  
worth of gold, and by repeating the  
operation a few times every week, and  
in a number of different places, the  
amount of loot would soon run into  
thousands of dollars.

## THE PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

Will Meet for Business on the Eleventh  
of January

Victoria, Oct. 15th.—The legislature  
of British Columbia will meet for the  
transaction of business on January 11.  
Among the matters to be dealt with  
at the approaching session are the  
revision and codification of the sta-  
tutes and the reports of the forestry  
and insurance commissions. It is ex-  
pected also that the legislature will be  
asked to make provision for an addi-  
tion to the administrative buildings,  
which have become too small for the  
rapidly increasing business of the  
province.

The province's financial affairs are  
in excellent condition and the govern-  
ment intends to bring forward a pro-  
gramme of public works commensurate  
with the growing needs of all sec-  
tions. It is not expected that any im-  
portant measures of railway assistance  
will be proposed. The most important  
private charter to come up for consid-  
eration will be that for the extension  
of the Portland Canal Short Line to  
the eastern boundary of British Co-  
lumbia.

## THE EDITOR'S SNAP

Every once in a while some cheerful  
individual remarks to us: "Well now  
that the paper is out I suppose you  
can take it easy for three or four days."  
Yes, how delightful it is that a country  
editor has nothing to do between press  
days. Business runs along automati-  
cally. When paper bills come due  
money drops off the trees with which  
to pay them. Subscribers vie with  
each other to see who can pay the  
farthest in advance. Advertisers beg  
for additional space. And the way the  
news hunts up the editor is  
also pleasant to contemplate. There  
is something really strange about the  
way the news items act. When the  
paper is out the editor simply goes to  
his desk and leans back in his easy  
chair and looks wise and waits for  
next week's press day. The day before  
press day the people line up in front of  
the office door and then they file past  
the desk and tell him all the news of  
the week. He writes it up in fifteen  
or twenty minutes, takes it back and  
hangs it on the hook. The composi-  
tors take the copy and shake it over  
the type cases, say a few mystic words  
the type flies into place, and after a  
few passes by the foreman the forms  
are ready for the press again. And  
the editor goes down and deposits  
some more money in the bank. It is  
the greatest snap in the catalog. Now  
if the editor could only do away with  
press day his job would be complete.

## LOCAL NEWS

Fred Leonard returned on Saturday  
after a three months' visit to his home  
in Lockport, N. Y. While in the east  
he visited the Toronto exhibition and  
noted that the B. C. exhibit was not  
nearly as well looked after as those  
from other provinces.

The many friends throughout the  
province of Mr. Robert Stevenson will  
be sorry to learn that he was brought  
from Princeton to the Hedley Hospi-  
tal on Saturday last, suffering from a  
carbuncle on his neck. Dr. McEwen  
is in attendance and it is to be hoped  
that Mr. Stevenson will soon be restor-  
ed to his usual good health.

The stamp mill was shut down all  
day on Thursday last owing to a  
break in the flume. The break was  
caused by a rock slide about 6 a.m.  
when the carpenters were called out  
and worked all day before the damage  
was repaired. This is the first break  
in about ten months.

The Hon. Price Ellison, minister of  
finance and agricultural, came up  
from Victoria yesterday, and accom-  
panied by Mrs. Ellison, will leave  
Saturday for England on business in  
connection with the provincial exhibit  
of fruit in Great Britain. He is re-  
ceiving many hearty congratulations  
from his host of friends here upon his  
new appointment.—Vernon News.

Rev. A. H. Cameron held service in  
the church on Sunday evening last,  
while Mr. Kinney preached in Prince-  
ton. Mr. Cameron drove up from  
Keremcos on Sunday afternoon after  
holding his regular service there in  
the morning.

Mrs. J. H. Bromley and son Jack  
left last week for the coast. Mrs.  
Bromley will visit friends in Victoria,  
Vancouver and Westminster, after  
leaving Jack in St. Louis College,  
Westminster.

A Kellett, general superintendent  
for J. W. Stewart & Co.'s construc-  
tion work came up the line on Wed-  
nesday's train. He now resides in  
Spokane and his attention is given to  
the company's construction forces in  
the Pacific Northwest generally, in-  
cluding the V. V. & E. He disavow-

completion of the V. V. & E. but said  
he would not be surprised for news  
any day of a general advance for com-  
pletion of the line. He also reports

**EDITORIAL COMMENTS**

Once more there is a "school question" in Canadian politics, though so far it is confined to Ontario. A large number of French Canadians have settled in the counties adjacent to the southwestern boundary of the province, as well as in the eastern counties. They have "bi-lingual" schools: that is, the teachers are supposed to know both French and English and the pupils are supposed to be taught both.

It is stated that this has worked out very much like "Hertzogism" in the Orange River. Teachers who possess a thorough knowledge of both languages so as to be able to speak both correctly and fluently are not available in sufficient numbers at the salaries paid in the elementary rural schools of that province. The result is said to be that the teachers as a rule have a very imperfect knowledge of English and also of many other subjects to be taught.

Obviously this is bad for the children especially for the children of English speaking families. That does not seem to be a matter of much concern to the "Nationalists" of Quebec who are quite willing to sacrifice the welfare of other people's children,—and perhaps, in some cases, even of their own,—on the altar of their sectionalist sentiment. But it is a matter of concern to Bishop Fallon of the diocese of London.

The Globe thinks that the bi-lingual system should be continued because the children of French speaking families cannot be taught in English until they have learned that language, and therefore they must be taught in French. That is plausible only at first glance. What do children learn when they first go to school? Not advanced subjects but elementary reading and arithmetic. They do not learn more than a few words or numbers in a day, and in practical experience it is found that it is quite feasible to give this teaching in English, so that they are learning English at the same time they are learning to read, and as they become more advanced they are able to study the other subjects in English also.

The experiment has been thoroughly tried both ways in Winnipeg, where there is a large population of children who hear no English in their homes. It has also been tried both ways in American cities where similar conditions prevail. The consensus of opinion is

that better progress is made by having the teaching in English from the beginning.

That is not theory: it is a fact demonstrated every day in the Winnipeg schools. But even if having all the teaching in English involved a little less progress in learning geography or some similar subject, there would still be a clear gain. For a knowledge of English is more value to any child in Canada than a knowledge of the geography of Asia or Africa, more important even than a knowledge of algebra or of decimal fractions.—Ex.

We are pleased to be able to report that Miss Margaret Shaw is convalescent after her illness from fever.

The carpenters are busy erecting a comfortable frame house for E. M. Crooker on his lot across the track.

A. D. McLean who has been visiting J. J. Armstrong for the last few weeks left on Thursday for his home in Vancouver.

Miss McLean and Miss Bradshaw, of Hedley spent a couple of days in Keremeos this week the guests of Mrs. J. A. Brown.

Mrs. Nuri (nee Miss Ida Griffin) has been visiting her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Barcello during the past week.

Geo. Woolgar and family moved to Molson last Monday where Mr. Woolgar has taken a homestead, high up on the hills.

Rev. Mr. Cleland, of Penticton, will conduct church of England service in Keremeos on Sunday next 30th inst., morning and evening.

Though rather late in leaving Keremeos, the car of fruit for the big apple show made good time enroute, reaching Vancouver in good shape on Tuesday last.

James Callahan of the firm of Evans Coleman & Callahan, of Vancouver, is in the valley this week. Last spring Mr. Callahan purchased lot 15, formerly owned by J. C. Woodrow.

The harvesting of the potatoe crop in Keremeos this year shows some exceptionally good yields and some very large specimens. Potatoes weighing from three to four pounds each are not uncommon.

Among the visitors to the big apple show at Vancouver next week will be the following from Keremeos: Mr. and Mrs. P. Richter, Mrs. Daly, Albert and Arthur Mattice, Wm. Manery, Rev. A. H. Cameron, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Brown, Mrs. and Miss Reta Kirby.

O. H. Carle has secured the contract of providing all G. N. Railway camps in the southern part of the province with fruit and vegetables. Who mentioned difficulty in finding markets for our produce? The difficulty is to find sufficient produce for the markets we have.

Miss M. Armstrong who has been visiting friends in Winnipeg arrived in Keremeos last week and will make her home with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Armstrong. She is accompanied by her friend, Mrs. (Dr.) Brighouse of Vancouver.

Richard Cawston is in the valley on business connected with the sale of the of the Lowe ranch. With him is Geo. Heggie, of Enderby, an expert on lands. Richard Lowe is also home from the coast and the general impression here is that the noble old ranch down the valley, is at last to be sold and sub-divided. It is understood that old country capital is back of the deal.

H. A. Turner, road supervisor was in town Monday evening on his way up the valley. Mr. Turner has had a busy year for his first but it will soon be over as far as road work is concerned and he will have a few months of comparative rest. H. A. certainly looks as if the out-door life of a supervisor agreed with him and as if the perplexities of the job worried him but slightly.

General Manager Gruber and Superintendent Morgan made a trip up the valley in their private car on Sunday going to the end of the line. While at Princeton they wired agent Emory at Keremeos asking him to secure them some good apples. Though the time allowed was short he proved equal to the occasion. Neither did he quit with the articles asked for but with the able assistance of Wm. Frith and O. H. Carle gathered in a collection of tomatoes, celery, green corn, carrots and other vegetables which could only be secured in the Similkameen at this advanced season of the year. We opine that when the general manager got his molars busy on the delicacies provided it would set him thinking that the company which he represents is making a serious blunder in so long delaying the connecting up of this productive valley with the civilized world.

Mrs. Carmichael, of Princeton, arrived on Friday on a visit to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Armstrong. Mr. Carmichael was making a business trip to Grand Forks at the time.

Engineer Baskin, of Penticton and his assistant H. C. N. Elches who have been engaged locating a wagon road up the Ashnola have finished that job and are now engaged connecting up some roads on the sub-division across the river south of town. They report no great difficulties in running a road up Ashnola, the greatest difficulty to be encountered being at the canyon near the entrance to the valley.

C. A. McDonald was a welcome visitor to the valley again this week and accompanying him was Mr. La Page, of Vancouver, a land seeker. Owing to obstacles and discouragements which Messrs. McDonald and Lawrence have met with in their real estate operations they had practically quit the valley this year and were pleased to note their revival of interest in it. Success to their efforts and more power to their elbow.

Arrangements are about complete for the taking over of the business of the big store from J. R. Shaw by Fernin Sauve and Robert McCurdy on the first of November. The new firm are taking over as much of the stock as they can handle to advantage, while the rest will be taken east by Mr. Shaw. Both young men are well and favorably known in the valley and will likely adapt themselves to the business conditions existing here at present. We wish them every success.

The sad news was received here on Friday morning of the death of Mrs. Kyle, of Medicine Hat, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Robertson, of this place. Mrs. Robertson was at the death bed having left here on the Monday previous in response to a wire announcing the serious nature of the illness. Mrs. Kyle was expected in Keremeos on a visit about the time the first news of her illness was received here. On previous visits to Keremeos she made many friends all of whom will sincerely regret her sad and sudden death.

We have frequently heard complaints from ranchers along the valley of the inconvenience and trouble they are subjected owing to the work of beavers. Usually it is the flooding of land by dams built across the water water courses and no matter how often the rancher may destroy the dam the industries little rodent will repair it. There is no redress as the beaver is protected by law and severe penalties provided for shooting, trapping or otherwise taking him. The limit appears to have been reached in the case of Dan McCurdy at Similkameen. There the beavers have backed the water up alongside an orchard and commenced cutting down his apple trees for timber. As Mr. McCurdy is not permitted to protect his property by destroying the pests we would suggest that he do like a farmer down east, whose grain crop was annually destroyed by deer, which on account of protection for a number of years grew very numerous and also very bold. Each year the farmer sent in an account to the government for damage done, and the justice of his claim being apparent received his cheque regularly.
