LEAVES FOR DENVER

T. Walter Beam Completes Work for Season on Red Mountain, Florence and Duffy Groups

On Saturday last Mr. T. Walter Beam left with Mr. Merrill for his home in Denver. Since his arrival here early in the spring to take charge of the exploratory work in proving up the ground upon which options were taken by him earlier in the year, he has given his undivided attention to the work in hand. Two months or more were taken up with the preliminary work in getting ready for drilling operations and what that involved could only be appreciated by those who saw the obstacles to be encountered from the deep snow and inaccessibility of the canyon. Two pipe lines, one for air and the other for water, had to be carried over from the Nickel Plate more than a mile distant and sites made for the camp. This left a little less than four months of actual drilling, and but for the convenience of being able to obtain water and compressed air from the Nickel Plate very little could have been done in the portion of the season that remained to them. Three shifts were employed and the crews kept manned to full strength all the time. Three holes were put down, two of which were deep, and perfect records were kept of the geology and values as shown by the cores. The charts upon which the records were kept are models of neatness, thoroughness and engineering skill, and no information which the drill could give was omitted to be noted, for Mr. Beam in addition to knowing himself how to go about it, is remarkable for his success in choosing his men, and he found in Mr. Prior a very capable man whose work would be hard to beat.

When asked about his plans for next year Mr. Beam would not state very definitely and the inference is that it will depend largely upon the reasonableness or otherwise of the owners of the property. If they had shirked any of the obligations as to work which they undertook under the bonds there might be reason for refusing extension of time for payments, (if such be asked) but when they have expended about \$40,000 in the one season without reaching the goal they were in quest of and are still willing to spend further time and money to prove the truth or otherwise of the belief they had when the bonds were taken, it would seem an unwise thing to insist that they make any substantial cash payment to secure the privilege of expending \$50,000 more on the mere chance of catching an ore body of sufficient extent to justify the expense of opening it up.

Fortunately Mr. Beam is no pessimist and it is pleasing to note that he is free to admit they found nothing in the holes that were put down to disturb their belief in the possibility of the ore still being encountered, even if they are disappointed in not finding it with the extensive expenditure that has already been made. If he were a pessimist it is a very sure thing that there would have been a different tale to tell in Hedley to-day, and it was a fortunate thing that he was first induced to give his attention to the camp four years ago. That he may come back in the spring and resume operations is the wish of all who have the interest of the camp at heart.

A LITTLE WA WA THEN SKIDOO

Is the Decision Handed Out by President Wilson to Madame Pankhurst

The United States has allowed Emmeline Pankhurst to land in that country after all.

And in view of the leniency that has been extended to her in England the president was averse to giving her any claims to martyrdom so far as the United States was concerned.

He therefore decided that she be allowed to enter the country and deliver her lectures but to leave as soon as her lecture engagement was completed.

RUSHING COQUIHALLA WORK

Only Eight Miles Not Now Under Construction

Work is in progress now on the K. V. R. line for a distance of about 19 miles from Hope, starting from McDonald's ranch. From the summit the work is opened for seven miles. The unbroken gap between is eight miles in length. This gap, Superintendent Tinkler states, will not be touched until the spring. Throughout the winter the work at the two ends will be separate but at both progress will be made as fast as possible.

Mr. Tinkler also states that in spite of initial delay the work has been got under way even faster than the company expected.

The hospital at Five Mile will soon be completed. It has been built substantially and will be thoroughly modern in arrangement and equipment.

It has been found that from a few miles out the work of construction is almost uniform and the rate of progress can be estimated pretty accurately. The progress made in clearing has been particularly rapid, and grading has begun over half the distance. West Yale Review.

A LUCKY TURN DOWN

What Canada Benefits Under New U. S. Tariff By Rejecting Reciprocity

If Canada desires free trade in wheat and flour she can have it. This country can have also free trade in fruits, vegetables, cattle, lumber and some other things. We can select from the list such articles as we chose. We can make them free in Canada when we like and for so long as we wish. If any remissions of taxation do not work well the duty can be restored. The people of Canada retain absolute control over their own tariff and are compromised by no reciprocity agreement. The situation is highly satisfactory inasmuch as there is no coercion, no surrender of control, and no cause of friction. Never since Confederation have the Canadian people done a better thing than when they killed the reciprocity treaty.—News-Advertiser.

SCATTER-BRAIN OFFICIOUSNESS

There is an officer in the United States immigration department located at Oroville who is the limit for senseless officiousness. Last week Miss Mackenzie of Keremeos, a trained nurse and sister of Rev. G. T. Mackenzie, had occasion to go to Oroville and took with her a girl of 14 or 15, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Gibson. When they reached Oroville they were pounced on by this immigration official who had all manner of impertinent questions to ask (some of them even indecent) and when he found out that the little girl was not in charge either of parent or guardian, insisted on taking her away from Miss Mackenzie. He continued to follow them around and annoy them most of the next day. Fussy half-baked regulations are had enough at any time but when played in the hands of a fool official who has not sense enough to try to ascertain the intent of the law and use some discretion, it is a condition of affairs that the public should not be required to put up with, and this instance is about one of the rankest we have ever heard of.

MINING NOTES

It would look as if the Nighthawk mine is being abandoned by the owners. The Oroville Gazette tells of the sale of the assay office and other loose property which has been disposed of and is being removed.

Under the management of Alex. Robinson the Sally mine near Beaverdell has nine men at work. This force will be increased in a short time. A carload of second-grade ore has been shipped from the Sally and Bell to the Trail smelter. There are a score of properties around Beaverdell and Carmi that would pay one to two thousand dollars a month if the owners had money and energy to make them producers.—Ledge.

GRAFTER FOUND OUT

Frank Pedley of Indian Department Trafficking in Indian Lands:

Ottawa, Oct. 13.—As a result of the inquiry of Mr. T. R. Ferguson, K. C., into the alienation of the public domain under the Laurier regime, Mr. Frank Pedley, who has been superintendent of Indian affairs since 1902, has handed in his resignation. His resignation was at once accepted, and Mr. Duncan Campbell Scott, the well known Canadian poet, who has been connected with the department for years and has a splendid record both for integrity and ability, has been appointed in his place.

As a result of the revelations of Mr. Ferguson, it is expected that there will be several other resignations and possibly some prosecutions.

Mr. Pedley was appointed by the Liberal Government in 1897 as superintendent of immigration, and was transferred to the Indian department in 1902.

The evidence taken before Mr. Ferguson alleged that Mr. Pedley, while in the immigration department, and later, as head of the Indian branch, trafficked on Indian lands, and in one transaction alone, with two other associates, made no less than \$80,000.

This report of Mr. Ferguson, which has resulted in the resignation of Mr. Pedley, is but a preliminary one, and it is expected that there will be still further startling revelations before he finishes his inquiry.

MR. MERRILL'S VISIT

Mr. I. L. Merrill, president of the Hedley Gold Mining Co., went out again on Saturday last after five busy days around the mine and works. So much was his time taken up that he was only able to take one round of the Hedley golf links. The mine was carefully inspected the first day after his arrival and the various power sites on the Similameen river were given considerable attention. His trip to the British Isles in the early summer with Mrs. Merrill and party in which he toured by auto 900 miles through England and Scotland, playing twenty-five golf matches on seventeen different courses afforded some rare enjoyment and he came back with a much higher appreciation of Britain, her institutions and the hospitality of her people, than ever he had before. He thinks that if Britain and America would each study the other more and copy from each other in the things that each is deficient it would do both a good deal of good.

On his way home to Los Angeles he intended to take in Victoria where he had some departmental business to attend to, but possibly he might find time while there to look up Mr. Hincks and have a round of golf there in memory of the time when they both played on the Hedley links and things were in more primitive shape than they are now.

Mr. Merrill was well-pleased with the arrangement which had been made in connection with the Hedley golf links and gave some valuable suggestions for improvement of the course. An instance illustrating his fondness for the game is the fact that the day before he left New York for Hedley was the first day of the world's series in baseball, and having to choose between the ball game and a round of the links he chose the latter.

WEDDING BELLS

A popular wedding took place in Hedley on Thursday October 16th when Rev. A. H. Cameron united in marriage Mr. John Wighton Grieve of the Nickel Plate and Miss Ellen Dalley. The marriage ceremony was held in the dining room of the Grand Union Hotel and was witnessed by a large company. The bridesmaid was Miss Rutherford and Geo. Boxall of the Nickel Plate mine acted as best man. A number of handsome wedding presents attested the popularity and esteem in which the bride and groom are held. A dance was given by their friends in Fraternity hall in honor of the event. The Gazette extends congratulations.

TO MAKE ACT WORKABLE

Important Changes Recommended For Lemieux Act

After three months of investigation and cogitation in regard to the labor troubles on Vancouver Island, Samuel Price, K. C., of St. Thomas, law partner of Hon. T. W. Crothers, Minister of Labor, has presented his findings as a Royal Commissioner, to Mr. Crothers.

Mr. Price recommends: (1) That the meaning of "strike" be more clearly defined, as the miners at Nanaimo claimed simply to have gone on a holiday; (2) that agreement between employers and employees should have the sanction of the law; (3) that a change should be made in the present law so as to prevent discrimination against any employee who exercises the right of joining a labor union; (4) that it be made an offence to call a man a "scab".

Mr. Price confirms what has been said for months past as to the cause of the strike—namely, that it was due to the refusal of the mine operators to grant recognition to the United Mine Workers' Union. He finds that the Minister of Labor, under all the circumstances, could not compel arbitration of the differences to induce either side to recede. He says that Mr. Crothers strongly suggested to the operators that arbitration proceedings should be instituted, but that it met with no response.

Whether or not any legislation to amend the Lemieux act along the lines suggested by Mr. Price will be introduced, is not stated by the Minister of Labor.

MINING NOTES

The Consolidated has recently declared a dividend by which they disburse \$110,000 to shareholders. This enables the Goldfields Syndicate to declare a dividend of 1½% on its capital stock.

The Jewel mine in the Boundary is also a gold producer with no copper output and pays the wage scale received by the miners in the copper camps. Both the Nickel Plate and the Jewel were paying the advanced scale last year and until the price of copper took the slump last spring, when they reduced to be in line with the producers in the copper camps.

Oliver Durant who opened up the Centre Star Mine in Rossland is now a resident of Washington City.

In its annual report for the financial year ending June 30th, 1913, the Granby Co. shows a surplus of \$783,149.00 against a deficit of \$17,000 for year ending June 30th, 1912. The cost per ton for operation has been the lowest in the history of the mine.

The Ottawa mine at Slocan City owned by the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. is being worked.

Rosland Miners are being lectured by a travelling delegate from Fernie who says he is not canvassing for financial assistance to strikers in Michigan but the object of his talks is their duty in that connection.

The Boundard District established a new record. Last week thirty babies were on exhibition as competitors for the \$20.00 gold prize.

EDITORIAL COMMENTS

Some of the platform echoes from Chatagnay that have filtered through to western papers indicate that sundry orators have been wading into deep water and were taking too great chances on the possibility of a saving lack of intelligence on the part of the electorate. Even Sir Wilfrid Laurier ventured the gambler's chance when he hinted to the electors of Chateaugay that the existence of a slight financial stringency was due to the fact that he and his colleagues were not on the treasury benches. When the full import of this suggestion is examined it was a rather bold compliment which Sir Wilfrid was trying to pay to himself. Other countries as well as Canada are feeling the effects of the same money stringency and the war in Europe is pretty generally credited with being the cause. In what way then could Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues have warded off this world-wide money tightening, when he was unable to turn aside a worse stringency in 1907 at a time when there was no war in progress to disturb financial conditions? Farmers in the province of Quebec who are getting top notch prices for the produce of their farms in 1913 with a very passable crop will be slow to hand out to Sir Wilfrid the compliment he was fishing for. There would be more reason in the United States to blame Woodrow Wilson and his party for the same depression in the United States for he has interfered with the tariff, but the tariff under which Sir Wilfrid wants the electors of Chateaugay to think that Canada is going to the dogs is practically the same as what it was when he left the treasury benches, and so well was he himself satisfied with it that he maintained it in force for fifteen years. Sir Wilfrid of course forgot to tell his hearers how much better off financially the people of Canada are for having to pay out to the Grand Trunk Pacific that ten million dollars of hard-earned money which Sir Wilfrid caused them to part company with in order that he might learn the meaning of the English word "implement" when used as a verb instead of a noun. A cheaper and more effective way would have been to have looked it up in any standard dictionary.

A week from to-day the second test of the Borden government's strength since the naval programme of last

session was brought forward, will take place in an Ontario constituency. The field will be South Bruce and already both parties are claiming victory and with some degree of confidence. It is a constituency that is pretty evenly divided and has the reputation of going more often against the government of the day than with them. In the last two elections it has gone conservative. Both candidates are residents of the constituency, that of the Liberals being a man who in former days carried the riding and his voting strength is to a considerable degree known, while the Conservative candidate is a new man in politics although his father formerly represented it in the Conservative interests until his death. The present vacancy was caused by the transfer of the sitting member to the Senate. This move is declared to have been unpopular and if so, may effect the result. The late member, J. J. Donnelly, was in the prime of life and the popular conception appears to deny the right of the Senate to recruits of that kind. It is an illogical prejudice at best, for it seems inconsistent to rail at the Senate as the refuge of political senility and at the same time blame the government of the day when they appoint men who are in the prime and vigor of manhood and will help to remove from the upper chamber the stigma which, rightly or wrongly, at present attaches to it. Another circumstance which lends an air of uncertainty and is the feature upon which the Liberals base their strongest ground for hope, is the fact that some of the townships in the riding are almost exclusively German and to these the appeal is being made which was tried two years ago by McKenzie King in Waterloo. If W. D. Cargill, the Conservative candidate, possesses anything like the personal magnetism of his late father, it will be hard indeed to beat him even if his opponent is a German and every German in the riding is told that Borden would tax Canadians to build warships for Britain to use in fighting the fatherland.

The Jewel mine in the Boundary is now reported to be on a paying basis. The working force is 35 men which number is to be increased as soon as accommodation can be provided.
