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NOW SEE JIG IS UP

United States Manufacturers Who were
Holding Back for Reciprocity,
Now Getting a Move on

The Gazette received through the
mail the other day a circular an-
nouncement from the general offices
of the Yale & Towne Manufacturing
Co. at 9 Murray St., New York, man-
ufacturers of high grade locks. The
circular sets forth that the firm is
opening up a branch factory plant in
Canada which is to be in operation
early next year. They go on to tell
this time that the factory is to be lo-
cated in St. Catharines, Ont., and
that the new subsidiary company
which is to operate it, is to be styled
the "Canadian Yale & Towne, Limited."

Now this does not happen to be the
first circular received from this con-
cern about the proposed factory. It
is just about a year ago, or in the
closing weeks of 1910, when a some-
what similar circular came along but
did not give quite as much detail as
the present one. Meanwhile the reci-
procity proposal came up and there
was no more heard about the Cana-
dian Yale and Towne until the present
and neither would there have been
any more had reciprocity not received
its quietus.

In the neighboring town of Wel-
land, for the five years preceding
January 1911, there was one new Uni-
ted States factory built every ninety
days, and the fall of 1910 brought with
it the announcement of fourteen more
which were to be built there during
the present year; but the reciprocity
agitation came up and not one of the
proposed fourteen laid a brick or
drove a nail. That is why German
the member for Welland, although a
Liberal, refused to follow his party in
support of reciprocity; and now those
fourteen may put on extra building
gangs to make up for the time they
lost waiting.

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APEX TO WORK

Option Taken by Strong Com-
bination—Outlook Never
Brighter

DEVELOPMENT HAS BEGUN

T. D. Pickard Secures Option—With
Him are Associated M. K. Rodgers
and L. W. Shatford—The Property
Samples Well.

For several weeks past negotiations
have been in progress for a deal on
the noted Apex group near the Nickel
Plate, but it was not until Saturday
last that the matter had taken suffi-
ciently definite form to warrant an
announcement although the option on
the property had been obtained by
Mr. Pickard a few weeks before.

The ownership of the property is
really vested in Geo. F. Willey, of
New York who has given the present
option to Mr. Pickard, although a
company known as the Great Western
Mining Company had been formed to
take it over, but they apparently had
failed to come through with their
undertakings or else had given author-
ity to Mr. Willey to dispose of it.

It is not known what the price is
but it is admitted that the terms of
the bond are favorable in that ample
time is given the purchasers to fully
prove up the ore body to an extent
that will far overtop the purchase
price, before payment is required.
That is the basis upon which mining
properties nowadays are bought and
it is useless for owners (whether they
be individuals or corporations) to ex-
pect to sell on any other.

With Pickard are associated M. K.
Rodgers and L. W. Shatford, M. P. P.
and both these are names to conjure
by, for they are not the men to touch
anything that they are not prepared
to carry through providing it is pro-
ven to have sufficient merit to come up
to their expectation. The property
will be given every chance to prove
what it can show up and it will not be
turned down on any superficial or in-
competently conducted system of de-
velopment and examination. From
M. K. Rodgers' experience in the
Nickel Plate, Groene-Cannua, Hidden
Creek and others that he has picked
for mines and stayed with them until
he made them mines, there is the best
of reason to look for a successful out-
come in this case as well. And as for
L. W. Shatford, while mining is not
his specialty, he understands the con-
ditions obtaining in the field of min-
ing investment, and the same qualities
and training which have enabled him
to make a success of other lines will
carry him through in this as well.
Pickard too is a mining man with
practical experience and a record of
success.

A BIT OF HISTORY

Mr. Willey obtained possession of
the property from W. D. McMillan
who was the original locator in part-
nership with W. J. Forbes whose
partnership interest he obtained short-
ly afterwards and had been the sole
owner for some time previous to ne-
gotiating with Willey. Early in 1909
Willey gave a bond to a company
known as the Colonial Investment Co.
made up of New Englanders among
whom were some good men, but the
majority were men who had no exper-
ience with mines. Work was started
in the summer of that year but very
little was accomplished in actual
bona fide mining. The properties con-
sisting of five full claims and two frac-
tions: the Acacia, Apex fraction,
Acadia, Australian, Acacia fraction,
Alpha and Utopia were not then
crown granted, and that circumstance
led to a more or less amusing episode
later on that may have been altogether
the result of neglect and inexperience
on the part of the man in charge rather
than to any design to do up Willey
who would have been the one who
could have been made to suffer in
view of the fact that he had then paid
McMillan in full for the property.
Fortunately for him, however, T. D.
Pickard was made aware of what was
transpiring and knowing how much
was involved, played the good angel
even to the extent of using his wings

SOME GOLF NEWS

by night and was on the ground to
stake it after midnight while two other
parties of the opposing interest were
keeping up a lonely vigil in the shaft-
house waiting for daylight to do the
staking, but found "in the cold gray
dawn of the morning after" that some-
body had been ahead of them. Thus
the property was made secure for
Willey, and Pickard a few months
later, acting as agent for Willey,
obtained the crown grant for him and
the title is now perfect.

As for the property the wonder is
that it has lain all these years unwork-
ed in view of the excellent showings
and the genuine ore values obtainable
and shown up by 100 feet of shaft and
several hundred feet of drifts and
tunnels. The ore already put in sight
by the development which has been
done is not merely of payable grade
but a high grade average that leaves
margin enough to sweeten up thou-
sands of tons of under grade ore which
may yet be encountered in develop-
ment.

Plan of operation is a matter not yet
considered. The first thing is to prove
extent and value of the deposit as far
as may be done in the life of the bond.
In all probability the system of
operation and treatment which may
have to be employed may call for a
large outlay, but if so, the purchasers
can command it.

The purchasers have had possession
of the property for a fortnight or
more and have let a contract for 100
feet of tunnel to McEachern Bros.
who will push the work with all pos-
sible despatch.

LOCAL NEWS

Mr. D. M. MacPherson who has been
relieving in Hedley for the past six
weeks while the local staff of the
Bank of B. N. A. were having their
holidays, left on Friday for Rossland
to take his old position in the Bank
there. Mac made many warm friends
in Hedley who will be pleased to see
him back again.

Good morning, Prof. Holbrook. A
local paper from a town in Nova
Scotia tells of a professorship in a local
college being filled by E. A. Holbrook,
formerly mill and cyanide superin-
tendent at Hedley. F. A. Ross who
was of a more or less academic turn
of mind should be procured as dean of
the faculty.

Mr. I. L. Merrill, president of the
Hedley Gold Mining Co., came in on
Tuesday on a visit of inspection to note
the progress of development since his
visit in the spring. He was east a
considerable part of the summer. It
is to be hoped there will be good golf
weather during his stay, for we under-
stand he has brought his own clubs
along with him this time and has
some designs on a few of the choicest
local sculps to dangle at his belt.

M. K. Rodgers paid another visit to
Hedley last week but most of his time
was spent up at the Apex where he
met T. D. Pickard and together they
went over the property taking in all
the workings and geologizing the im-
mediate vicinity. So far as sampling
is concerned they had done that pretty
thoroughly before and knew all about
the values that a careful series of
sampling could give them. On Satur-
day evening they came back to Hedley
and were met by L. W. Shatford, M.
P. P. when there is every reason to be-
lieve that a momentous decision was
arrived at. On Monday Mr. Rodgers
left again for Seattle.

Hon. Martin Burrell left Ottawa for
his home in Grand Forks the end of
the week to attend to the matter of
his re-election. As yet we have not
heard of any move having been made
to give him back the seat by acclama-
tion. Yale Cariboo has been honored
in the appointment and it would be a
gracious act on the part of the riding,
towards Premier Borden from whom
the honor has come, to return the new
Minister of Agriculture unopposed. Of
course, it is a matter which does not
lie with Hon. Mr. Burrell's supporters
who are debared from even making
suggestions in that direction.

Work was discontinued last week
on the Sacramento although it is
claimed that on the upper showing
the work done had served to show up
an encouraging quantity of very fair
grade ore. It is generally supposed
that the Kingston situation domina-
ted the action of the bond-holders on
the Sacramento as the latter property
could be worked to better advantage
with the Kingston property than in
any other way. Up to the present
nothing further has been learned in
connection with the Kingston situa-
tion. There is every probability,
however, that the case will come to a
hearing shortly so as to enable it to
be settled either for or against the
Redeemable Investment Co. which
holds the bond.

L. W. Shatford, the indefatigable
representative of the Similkameen
made another trip through the valley
last week, passing up the river in an
auto in company with road supervisor
Turner and returning on Saturday.
On Sunday morning early they start-
ed out again bound for the eastern
part of the riding, expecting to reach
Beaverdell that night, which is cer-
tainly going some. Mr. Shatford is
making a trip to eastern Canada be-
fore the next session of the legisla-
ture and as he always makes a practice
of going over his riding before each
session of the legislature that he may be
in a position to know the require-
ments, he was anxious to get all his
data ready before starting east. Hav-
ing the chief engineer of the Public
Works department over the ground
to see the large mileage of road to be
kept in order, he will be in a better
position than ever to urge the claims
of the riding for an adequate approp-
riation.

EDITORIAL COMMENTS

A few weeks ago the Oroville Gazette had a sensible article on the matter of putting sign boards at the junction of all roads and trails in Okanagan county. It will be noticed also that the same idea is being favored by the association promoting the Pacific highway. The cost would be so trivial that it could scarcely be said to figure at all. All that is needed is simply to have some authority undertake it. If the Minister of Public Works will give the necessary order to district supervisors to see that at every road junction on a government road there is placed a sign showing where the road leads to, the job would be done; and as for local trails, wood roads, cattle and sheep trails and the trails leading to various mining properties, the prospectors themselves or some other local organization should undertake to provide the information. The editor of the Gazette remembers making his first trip through the Boundary country in the summer of 1893 when all was a dense mountain forest with a dozen or more small mining camps dotted over it at long intervals, but the prospectors were a level-headed lot and at their own expense of time and trouble they had provided little sign boards smoothed off with the axe, on which was placed the necessary information at every trail junction, showing where the trail led to and the distance in miles to its destination. To one journeying alone over the country for the first time, the convenience was not to be lightly estimated and we have never yet got over feeling a most kindly regard and appreciation of the good sense and thoughtfulness of those who provided them. By all means let us all take hold of this little matter and see that it is done.

Ulster is very much agitated over the prospect of having home rule forced on them by the Imperial parliament. We in Canada are not in a position to understand the situation and therefore should refrain from passing opinions and giving unsought advice. If the system of home rule which it is proposed to give them is at all like that which we enjoy in Canada it is difficult to understand why there should be so much objection to it. T. P. O'Connor tried to assure many of our public men that it is, but nevertheless there is reason to fear that it is not the same. When T. P. was in Canada he had just come from the United States where he had been passing the hat to the Irish-American tail-twisters across the border, and it is very sure that if the kind of home rule which he preached over there was not of the separatist variety the con-

tributions would not pour in very fast. Evidently the people of Ulster who understand the conditions know more about it than we do, and when they object so strenuously they must have good reasons for doing so.
