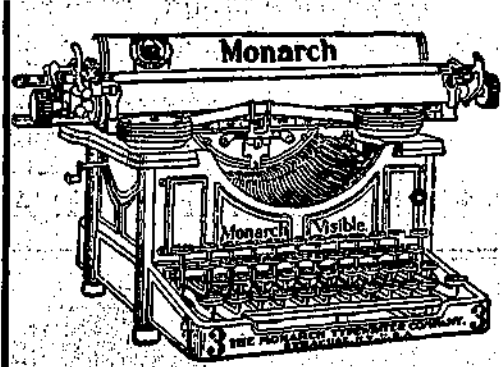

## THE APPLE SHOW

C. P. R. Lends a Hand to Make It a  
Success

Vancouver, Oct. 15th.—With the  
success of the first Canadian National  
Apple show from an exhibition stand-  
point now assured there is every in-  
dication of a large attendance of visi-  
tors from the entire Province and  
even throughout the Dominion. The  
engagement of the 48th Highlanders'  
Military Band, a leading band of Can-  
ada and one of the world's best musi-  
cal organizations, has added very  
much to the attractions of the Big  
Show.

The 48th Highlanders' Band which  
has never been west of the Rockies  
will play twelve concerts, two daily,  
with an entire change of program at  
each performance.

The Management believes that every  
obstacle to the success of the big  
undertaking has now been removed  
by the Canadian Pacific Railway Co.  
granting a one-way first-class fare for  
the round trip from all points in the  
Dominion of Canada, and in addition  
to that have granted selling dates in  
advance of the regular selling dates to

## ROBT. MEIKLE CONCERT

The Ladies' Hospital Auxiliary pro-  
vided concert-goers in Hedley with an  
excellent entertainment in the Robert  
Meikle Scotch concert given under  
their auspices in Fraternity Hall on  
Monday evening. The hall was well  
filled and the company put on an en-  
tertainment which showed not only  
their talent but their appreciation of  
the patronage given them. The re-  
pertoire embraced many of the old  
Scotch gems, interspersed occasion-  
ally with Irish songs like the "Low  
Backed Car." Robert Meikle is a  
pleasing baritone with voice under  
excellent control, and whether in  
martial pieces like the "Cameron Men"  
and "Bonnie Dundee" or modulated  
for a sentimental ballad he gives evi-  
dence of fine vocal powers. Miss Nan-  
nie Strachan sang a liberal number of  
selections most acceptably to the  
audience and proved herself an artist  
of no mean order. Her best numbers  
perhaps were "Tost's Goodby" and  
"Callie Merrin" although her singing  
in the duets with Meikle, and notably  
in the "Crookit Bawbee", were enjoyed  
equally with her solos. The comedian  
of the company was Frank Lloyd  
whose vaudeville talent was unmis-  
takable, and he gave the audience a  
sample of modern Scotch comedy,  
which was amusing and at times dis-  
played excellent vocal talent. The ac-  
companiments were played by Miss Nel-  
lie Malcolm, who is an expert and tal-  
ented pianist. The auxiliary netted  
on their percentage of the house about  
\$25.00.

## MORE MACHINERY ARRIVES.

The New Generator and Doble Water  
Wheel for the Hedley Gold Min-  
ing Co. Arrived This Week

The big new generator for the Hed-  
ley Gold Mining Co. came in last  
week and has been moved down to the  
works. The only thing now lacking  
for this part of the plant is a load of  
steam piping to make connections for  
the new Goldie & McCulloch engine.  
With the generator here and both the  
engine and the big Doble waterwheel  
to drive it, everything begins to look  
as if all our troubles are nearly over,  
and in rain or shine, wet spells or dry  
spells there will be abundant juice to  
keep the lights shining brightly and  
the motors purring cheerily. Mr. Jones  
has become almost exasperated with  
the repeated delays and postpone-  
ments on the part of machinery men.  
Material that was contracted for on  
70 days delivery is now 170 days and  
not here yet, for some of the mill  
motors, the order for which was plac-  
ed at the same time as the others, are  
not here yet.

## COUNTY COURT

His Honor Judge Brown held court  
in Hedley on Thursday last. The main  
case on was that of hog impounding  
between Felix (Indian) and A. J. King.  
A band of hogs that had belonged to  
Geo. Cawston got loose from the  
slaughter house and made a descent  
upon Felix's potato patch and Felix  
locked them up and put in a claim of  
\$100 for damages and \$10 for keep.  
The hogs had been turned over by  
Cawston to A. J. King who brought  
action against the Indian for their  
recovery. In British Columbia the  
poundage law and that relating to the  
taking up of stray animals is not de-  
fined as in the older provinces back  
east and those who attempt to exer-  
cise the same powers as existed back  
east are apt to land into a peck of  
trouble. The Judge reserved decision  
and next day gave judgment which  
amounted considerably in the nature  
of a compromise. Indian agent J. R.  
Brown and chief Charlie Allison were  
on hand to watch the Indian's inter-  
ests.

## PROVINCIAL ROADS

Government Adopts Broad Policy

Victoria Oct. 14th.—An interesting  
announcement of the government's  
trunk road building program in the  
province was made at the board of  
trade quarterly meeting here today by  
C. H. Lugrin who stated that he had  
been informed by the minister of pub-  
lic works, that not only would trans-  
provincial roads be connected up so as  
to make a continuous highway from  
the coast to Alberta but that also a  
north to south transprovincial road  
would be built. The latter will be a  
continuation of the old Cariboo trail  
which will follow the east bank of the  
Fraser to a point opposite Fort George  
thence by the Nechaco valley to the  
divide separating Nechaco from Bur-  
kley and by the Burkley valley as far  
as Hazelton. The north and south  
road would be between 500 and 600  
miles in length. The provincial trunk  
road building policy involves the con-  
struction of over 1000 miles.

## GOLF NEWS

The principal golf events of the  
week was the play-off between the  
winners of the mixed foursomes and  
the winners of the "defeated pick-  
ed winners" consolation and in it the  
eternal fitness of things was main-  
tained by the original winners, Williams  
and Miss McLean winning out over  
Rolls and Mrs. Rotherham by 5 holes  
up. A few few single matches among  
the ladies also attracted considerable  
attention. About three weeks ago  
Myrtle McLean was challenged by  
Mrs. Rotherham in the latter series  
but maintained her standing by win-  
ning the match six holes up. Last  
week another trial of skill took place  
when the former verdict of the ladies  
was reversed and Mrs. Rotherham  
won the match 5 holes up. Since then  
Mrs. Rotherham was challenged by  
Emily Jackson who won the match  
from her 3 holes up. Among the men  
Hinks was again challenged by Rolls  
and the match resulted in a tie. An-  
other round was played to decide the  
tie and that also resulted in a tie. A  
fourth round was then played to de-  
cide and in it Hinks won 6 holes up.

## THE YALE SEAT

An Election Likely to Take Place at an  
Early Date.

Vancouver, Oct. 11.—Not only in  
Fernie, where a by-election is neces-  
sary in order that Mr. William R.  
Ross, who is to be appointed this  
week as minister of lands in Premier  
McBride's cabinet, may be confined in  
his seat, but in Yale the political pot  
has begun to simmer. The Fernie  
by-election is announced for October  
22nd; and likely to be held early in No-  
vember; and it is probable that the  
seat of Yale having been in the mean-  
time declared vacant, the necessary  
by-election in this second district will  
be held a short time later. Premier  
McBride, as is well known, has been  
sitting member in the Legislature  
two constituencies, Victoria and Yale.  
It is understood that, as he is a resi-  
dent of Victoria and for other reasons,  
relating variously to politics, senti-  
ment and expediency, he will resign  
the Yale seat and continue to be one  
of the representatives for Victoria.

## REPRESENTATIVES

APPRECIATED

In the current number of "Man to  
Man" magazine both L. W. Shatford,  
the representative of the Similkameen  
in the Legislature and Martin Burrell,  
representative of Yale Cariboo in the  
Federal House, come in for apprecia-  
tive notice. Of the former the article  
accompanying an excellent photo says:

"Lynton W. Shatford, member of  
the provincial parliament for the Sim-  
ilkameen electoral district, one of  
the most important fruit growing dis-  
tricts in the province. Mr. Shatford  
and his brother, W. T. Shatford, in  
1905 made an important contribution  
to the fruit-growing industry in Brit-  
ish Columbia by organizing the  
Southern Okanagan Land company  
to purchase and irrigate the now fer-  
tile south Okanagan valley. He is  
largely interested in a number of the  
companies operating in his district.  
He was elected to parliament in 1903  
and re-elected in 1907 and 1909. He is  
a director of the new Bank of Van-  
couver and of the British Columbia  
Life Assurance company."

And of the latter it says:  
"Martin Burrell, member of the Do-  
minion parliament for the Yale-Cari-  
boo district, is an extensive fruit-  
grower of Grand Forks. He is regard-  
ed as an expert on horticulture, and  
his opinions carry weight with them  
throughout the Dominion."

**EDITORIAL COMMENTS**

The success of Kelowna fruit-growers at the Westminster fair is merely an earnest of the struggle which they are going to make at the big National Apple show in Vancouver next month. The Similkameen will have their work cut out for them to meet the opposition they are likely to have from various fruit growing sections in the province as well as from the adjoining states, for it is well known that the fruit-growers of Washington and Oregon are going to be represented at the Vancouver show and will do their best to capture all the honors they can. Much depends on it. Washington state is our worst rival for the fruit markets of the prairie provinces and not Ontario as formerly. It is true the British Columbia fruit grower has the tariff in his favor to give him a certain amount of protection from the foreign grower, but the duty is but slight and falls far short of shutting out the foreign grown product. The greatest protection which the B. C. apple grower must look forward to is that which he must create for himself by every effort in his power to raise and maintain the highest possible standard of his output. He must lose no opportunity to down his rivals by demonstrating on every occasion the superiority of the British Columbia grown article. Commissioner Metcalfe is doing good work on the firing line by his weekly reports on market conditions and his plain talks to shippers on their shortcomings. Then there is the British market to be considered. At home we can help things out by sticking on a little duty by way of handicap for the other fellow but that privilege is not to be allowed us with the British market and the only plan is to beat out rivals in competition at apple shows and pay strictest attention to maintaining the highest possible standard of the fruit sent to the British market. The old superstition may obtain to a certain extent among some of the prairie farmers who hailed from Ontario, that the British Columbia fruit has not the flavor of the Ontario apple but most of the fruit dealers have long since abandoned the superstition and call for the apple they find to be the best, whether it may come from British Columbia, Ontario or Washington state. It is to be hoped that in the

coming National Apple show Kere-meos growers will succeed in covering themselves with honors and thus maintain the reputation of the Similkameen.

To make matters worse one of the youngest children was asleep in the house and the mother was not allowed by him to re-enter the house to get the child before she fled for shelter to chief Charlie Allison's. It is about three years ago that in a similar brawl their cabin was burned down and it was generally believed at the time that he had deliberately burned it down in his drunken rage, for members of his family expressed their belief that he had, although they were unable to swear that he had been seen to do it. His drunkenness and his vicious disposition under liquor are well known to every hotel-keeper in Hedley and the man who, knowing this, and for the sake of the paltry gain there may be to him in the money he gets for the liquor supplied, will sell to him on the Sunday in defiance of the law evidently is not particular whether he has his licence renewed or not. It is a matter for the licence inspector to investigate and from the information obtainable it should not be difficult to locate the offending party.
