## OTTAWA AND THE JAPANESE

Dunsmuir Is Federal Officer, and Ottawa Must Take Responsibility.

### TEMPLEMAN FEARS MCBRIDE

And Takes Advantage of Senator Scott's Dotage in Shallow Attempt to Fix Odium Upon B. C.'s Premier—Likely to Prove Boomerang That Will Cost Templeman and McPherson Their Seats.

(Westminster Columbian.)

Notwithstanding the wite saying that you cannot make a silk purse out of a sow's ear, one would have been justified in expecting better from even the most uncouth Privy Councilor than the exhibition now being made by the Honorable William Templeman. This gentleman is retailing a private conversation said to have taken place at Ottawa between the Premier of this province and the Secretary of State for Canada, and adding to Mr. McBride's alleged statement his own ignorant "presumption" of the case. Taking the Victoria Times' verdict of the story to which the Vancouver World has been devoting the poster type that is the most attractive feature of its front page, we read:

"The World stated that when Hon. Mr. McBride reached Ottawa on his way to London on his better terms mission, that he told Hon. R. W. Scott, Secretary of State, that Mr. Bowser's bill would not become law, but would be disallowed by the Lieutenant-Governor on his advice, and suggested that the Ottawa authorities in turn reciprocate by dropping the words 'final and unalterable' from the proposed amendment of the B. N. A. Act.

"It further stated that reference by wire and letter to the Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia confirmed this intelligence, and that copies of this documentary evidence were in the possession of Hon. W. Templeman, who is now in Victoria.

"The latter was interviewed this morning with reference to the authenticity of the report.

"The World's story is partly correct and partly incorrect," he said. "The facts are that while on his way to London Mr. McBride called upon the Secretary of State, Hon. Mr. Scott, and procured from him credentials which it was necessary he should have in appearing before the colonial office, as a representative of British Columbia. He was given these credentials as a matter of fact, and without any proposition being made, or any suggestion of bargain and sale, in respect to either the reserved provincial act or the Imperial Better Terms Act.

"The provincial legislature was sitting at the time, and Mr. McBride was asked by Mr. Scott if the bill affecting Japanese which had passed the House was likely to become law. Mr. McBride assumed the Secretary of State that the Lieut.-Governor would not give it his assent, the presumption being that the Premier had so advised the Lieut.-Governor.

"The Lieut.-Governor on the 23rd of April was asked by wire to corroborate the statement made by Mr. McBride, and on the 25th Mr. Dunsmuir did so, and in an official letter of the 20th of April stated his reasons for withholding his assent, the grounds being that the act was a modified form of other acts dealing with the same subject which had already been disallowed, and also because were it to become law it would seriously affect international relations.

"The provincial act was reserved, therefore, at the instance of Mr. McBride, and the Ottawa government had nothing whatever to do in influencing the Lieut.-Governor or Mr. McBride in the decision arrived at in Victoria, that the bill should not become law.

"The story that Mr. McBride would agree to kill the provincial bill if Sir Wilfrid would agree to strike out of the British North America amendment bill the words 'final and unalterable' carries with it its own refutation. The provincial bill was killed by Mr. McBride of his own volition, while the words 'final and unalterable' remained in the Imperial act."

Boiled down, we find the case of this Liberal statesman against Mr. McBride is that when he was asked by the Secretary of State about the anti-Japanese legislation then before the legislature, he was polite enough to calm the agitation of the venerable gentleman by telling him that the Lieut.-Governor had signified his intention of referring this bill for the consideration of the ministers at Ottawa instead of assenting to it along with the other bills of the session. It was natural that the Lieut.-Governor should have acquainted his chief adviser of his intention, instead of allowing Mr. McBride to leave Victoria in ignorance of the course to be followed; and it was not improper for Mr. McBride to pass on the information to the Secretary of State when questioned on the subject. But so far as published there is nothing to show, or is it reasonable to infer, that Premier McBride was in any sense a consenting party to the course adopted by the Lieut.-Governor, much less the adviser of His Honor in the matter. Nor did he suffer loss of prestige by accepting the situation caused by the Lieut.-Governor's independent action. It was perfectly well known to all concerned that the Ottawa government would not permit this bill to become law without the strongest pressure being brought to bear upon them, and it was natural that the Lieut.-Governor should prefer to leave the whole responsibility with Ottawa rather than give assent in the King's name to a measure which would be killed by the Ottawa veto as soon as received at the federal capital. The bill is still before the ministers at Ottawa, and is held up by them. The reckoning of the people of this province is with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues for their neglect to give effect to a measure which the legislature of British Columbia considered imperatively necessary, and which the McBride government are prepared to put into effective operation whenever royal consent is signified.

### POWER OUTLOOK BETTER.

Twenty-Mile Lake is Reported in Good Condition as Result of Recent Rains.

Things are looking very much better at present with regard to power to keep the works in operation, and the condition of Twenty-mile lake is most favorable. In fact, there is claimed to be more water there now than at any time since the spring of 1905.

The sudden falling off in water supply which took place during the latter part of July was not encouraging, and with the large amount of exploratory work that was being carried out together with the ore extraction to keep the forty stamps in operation, it was found necessary for a few days to begin drawing on the reserve supply from the lake. Fortunately, a timely rain came along which gave the creek a boost, and with occasional rains at well-timed intervals since then, the creek has been able to handle the work of itself. Meanwhile the rains which were helping out the creek were also adding to the reserve supply in the lake, until now there is sufficient water which can be run off into the creek to keep everything going from six to eight weeks without any pumping whatever.

This year with three diamond drills in operation most of the summer in addition to the numerous power drills in the mine, much more power was required, and that this work has been accomplished with so large a surplus of water to the good, is a matter for congratulation.

E. A. Ross, general manager of the Daly Reduction Co. drove out to Penticton last week with his son Bradley Ross, who is going back to Worcester, Mass. to go into a technical school. While in Penticton Mr. Ross was driven over the lands of the S.O.L. Co. and expressed his surprise at the large area of fruit that had been planted and the fifty miles of flume already erected to irrigate it.

## HORSEFLY BONDED

Noted Property Near Nickel Plate Attracts Attention of Outside Capital.

### WOLLASTON & ARUNDEL LOCATION

Property Is Situated on Line of Electric Tram—Expected That Work May Soon Begin.

For years the old-timers of the camp have turned expectant eyes upon the Horsefly mineral claim which is crossed by the line of the Daly Reduction Co.'s electric tramway between the ore-bins and the switch-back. This was one of Wollaston and Arundel's original locations and held by them after they disposed of the Nickel Plate, Sunnysides, Bulldog and Copperfield to M. K. Rodgers.

At various times parties have tried to negotiate with the owners for its purchase but as a rule they were too high-priced to permit of a deal being made by any except those who were flush. It is true they got a nice figure (variously stated at from \$60,000 to \$80,000) for the group sold to M. K. Rodgers, but that was for four claims upon which there was splendid surface showings and which they had only held two months, but when it came to buying a single claim that was not so fortunate in the matter of showy outcrop, and upon which a very limited amount of work had been done, it became a more difficult task to bag a similar wad to that which came out of the Nickel Plate group which paid so handsomely both the sellers and the buyers; but after paying Wollaston and Arundel the purchase price of the Nickel Plate Mr. Rodgers found that he could buy from others additional claims galore at far smaller prices, and hence, while others were being gathered in, the Horsefly has been left out in the cold, for its owners being well provided for by their former sale could afford to be independent and hold out for their price.

Some time ago a bond was taken on the property by F. M. Wells with whom was associated A. B. Clabon and others. Last week Mr. Wells obtained the interests of some local parties in the bond and it is understood that things are shaping for active operations on the property.

Mr. Wells did not give details nor mention amount of consideration but those are details that do not concern the public so much as to know that definite arrangement has been made looking towards the prosecution of development work in the near future; and the confidence in the merits of the property which has always been regarded most favorably here, as such that important results are expected to follow any well-directed work.

Mr. Wells had nothing to give out concerning when development work would be undertaken, but it was clearly seen that he expected work to go on this winter.

### THE DALY STATUE UNVEILED

On Sept. 2 an impressive ceremony was witnessed in Butte, Mont., when a statue in memory of the late Marcus Daly was unveiled. The statue was the work of the late Augustus Saint-Gaudens, the noted sculptor, and the fund for the erection of this memorial was raised by popular subscription from the citizens of Butte and residents of Montana, in the material advancement of which he was so great a factor. The statue was erected in 1906 but the unveiling was deferred until Labor Day of the present year, for the late Marcus Daly toiled at manual labor early in life and rose from the masses to become one of the greatest employers of labor in the country.

A communication in reply to the Boundary Creek Times' reference to the Rock Creek bridge, came too late for this issue but will appear in next. The Times article was certainly a piece of gratuitous impertinence that merits calling down.

### WORLD-TEMPLEMAN CANARD

That professional libeller, the Vancouver World, to whom Hal B. Donley's epithet of the "bedraggled slut" would most aptly apply, has been at it again, and this time has chosen Premier McBride as the object of its slanders. In this instance, however, the whole blame cannot be charged up to the World, for the subsequent actions of Templeman and McPherson show very plainly that the World's yarn had been inspired and the canard hatched out in Ottawa. From the fact that the World was chosen as the vehicle for giving it first to the public instead of his own paper the Victoria Times, Mr. Templeman has shown that there is some little sense of propriety left in him, but not much. The fitness of the World for the job, is seen in the time selected for launching the canard, when Premier McBride was out of the capital on a fishing trip and out of reach of telegraph. In concocting it the services of the World's roorback artist must have been called into play, for the story, built up on the framework supplied from Ottawa, was put together with all the reckless abandon which only the roorbacker can employ, and which in some features was too coarse for even Templeman to accept in silence as is shown in his interview in the Times. Now it is a well-known fact that among the Liberals themselves Hon. R. W. Scott, the Secretary of State has been regarded as a source of weakness in the Dominion cabinet, his extreme age and the evidences of dotage of the "sore and yellow lead" type, making him unfit for so responsible a position, and helping to account for numerous resignations from the Dominion cabinet, of men who were tired of being associated with incapables that were fit only to grace a "cabinet of antiquities". He is old enough to have been the father of the Scott Act; he was among the old men of the House during the Mackenzie regime, and with Sir Richard Cartwright divides the honor of being the last parliamentary rose of summer. But it was cruelty itself for men like Templeman and McPherson to use him in the manner in which they are doing in order to trump up a cry against Premier McBride, who is not the man to place himself in any such position as that which they hope to establish by manufactured evidence put in the mouth of the ancient Secretary of State. It is quite natural that Mr.

Templeman should experience a certain amount of perturbation at the prospect called up by the rumors that he might be opposed in Victoria by Premier McBride at the next general election, and in the Liberal code of ethics which makes the end justify the means, anything which offered a chance of blackening a likely opponent was not to be passed by. Before the present smoke has cleared away, however, it may be found the very means which will bring McBride out for vindication at the hands of the electors of Victoria, in which case both Templeman and McPherson stand to end their political careers in ignominious defeat. In spite of this bluffing about asking for the resignation of Premier McBride, the opening of a single constituency in this province is the very contingent they could least afford. Were such a thing done there would be a straight issue of provincial rights. The electors would be asked to choose between the Conservative party in this province which passed the Natal Act, and the Liberal party championed by the Ottawa machine which has time and again turned down the Natal Act and which was represented at Ottawa by seven members from this province, not one of whom opened his mouth in protest when the Laurier government asked that Canada be included in the Japanese treaty that gave these orientals equal privileges in this province with white residents: to choose between the Conservative party led by Premier McBride who was forced to journey to England to protect the province in the matter of better terms, and the Liberal party under the thumb of Sir Wilfrid Laurier who asked the Imperial Parliament to pass his bill containing the words "final and unalterable" to prevent British Columbia forever from getting her rights and who succeeded in having these words "final and unalterable" re-embodied in the preamble of the bill after Premier McBride had induced Winston Churchill and Lord Elgin to strike them out of both the body of the bill and the preamble. With such issues in a contest there wouldn't be enough members to the left of the speaker to form a corporal's guard in opposition to the present government.

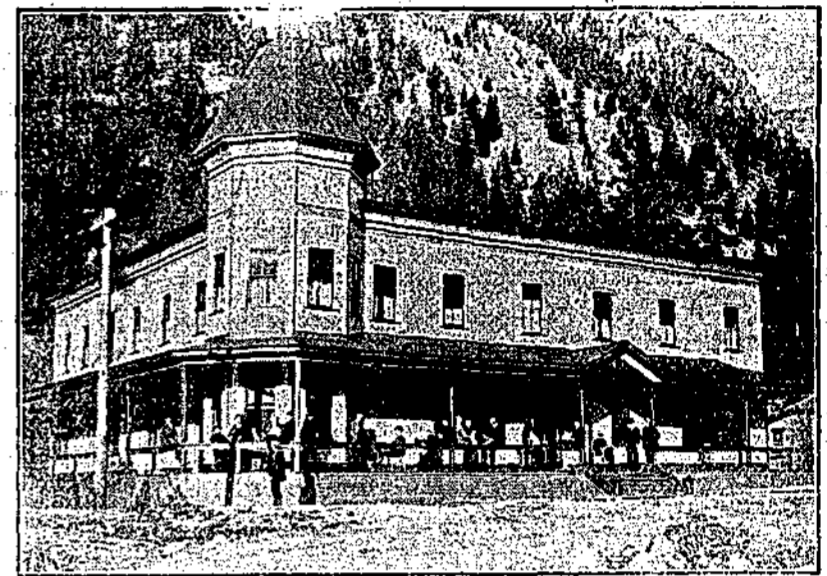

This disturbance will follow a long period of very cool weather, and will bring a return to seasonable temperatures and moderate changes; but about and following Sept. 14 look out for rough weather and severe storms.
