### City Council Meetings.

Continued from page 1

was instructed to write the applicants, giving them the fee charged for a license to sell in the city.

The Canadian Fairbanks Co. wrote re power plant and asked if all was going satisfactory now a new amateur had been put in the exciter. They also wished to again draw their account to the attention of the council. It was mentioned that a remittance had been sent during the past week for \$1,500 in part payment of their contract and that no further steps need be taken by the council in respect to the account.

As far as the generator was concerned, Ald. Ball said it was supposed that the Can. Fairbanks Co. would re-place the plant as it was before the fire. He did not consider the generator was the same.

The mayor, however, considered that the machinery was as near the same as possible, and very little difference was to be found between the two installations.

A letter was received from Mr. G. A. Fisher, stating that he had finished the work of auditing the city's financial statement, and finished up with the following words: "I would say that the precise manner, and the amount of detail in the books has greatly simplified the work, and the neatness and accuracy of the city clerk is certainly commendable."

The mayor and aldermen signified their pleasure at this remark by a warm applause which caused Mr. G. H. Dunn's face to beam with a crimson glow.

A letter from the Thompson Stationery Co., re an electric light book, was filed.

The mayor suggested that the matter of the Royal Hotel, License should be taken up, and some definite move made. He stated that advice had been received from both Mr. Burne and Mr. Billings, and both had stated that the action of the commissioners in the matter of turning down the license was illegal, and that if a renewal was refused an application could be made for an order in council which would cost the city between three and four hundred dollars.

Mr. Billings, however would not give a definite decision as to the city's liability, but both Mr. Billings and Mr. Burne were of the opinion that the Royal would obtain a renewal of license if an application was made to a higher court. After further discussion the following motion was carried unanimously, in view of the opinion of the City Solicitor, supported by Mr. Billings of Vernon:

That the city clerk be empowered to accept the half yearly fee for the renewal of the liquor license, now held by Mr. J. E. Wheeler in connection with the Royal Hotel, if such fee is presented.

A motion was then put forward that By-laws Nos. 68 and 69 be re-considered and finally passed—carried. These by-laws were to empower the council to issue debentures on local improvements.

The following accounts were referred to the finance committee, to be paid if found correct:

- T. Lawson, Soap and Oil..... 4 45
- Collett Bros., hire of rigs..... 19 50
- Morrison-Thompson, Dec. Acct..... 9 60
- F. McClure, teaming..... 1 50
- Kel. Sawmill Co., hauling sawdust... 91 00
- Kel. Carriage Works, supplies for Park..... 1 25
- Imp. Oil Co., lubricating oil..... 15 00

Mention was made of the \$1,000 due the Canadian Fairbanks Co., it being agreed that the account should not be paid until a test of the power plant had been made.

It was decided to ask Mr. Russell to make a test, including the amount of load on the board and also the water plant, and to give a written report to the council.

The account of the A. & T., for \$21 was recommended not to be paid as it was considered that the expense was incurred in the interests of that society, being one for watering the track for the benefit of the fair.

An account for the hire of rigs was discussed, it being pointed out that Police Hidson missed the boat one morning and had to take his prisoner by rig to Vernon. The matter was considered the fault of the chief, and the council agreed that the account should be referred back to the policeman and that he should be allowed a payment of a single and one return fare as the city's part of the liability.

The council then adjourned, to meet again on Tuesday at 8 p.m.

The City Council met again on Tuesday last to severely study and criticize the financial report, just completed by Messrs. G. A. Fisher and the city clerk. The meeting did not publicly open until well after nine o'clock, and although the mayor explained that the meeting was only in order to have a 'chew the rag' over the financial report, very little of this was done, and other business was attacked.

A letter from the Orchard City Record, agreeing to print 4 electric light book with index for \$20, was read, the contract being made with this firm to have the work done.

The mayor asked what the council contemplated doing with Mrs. McGee, who was at present in the hospital unprovided for. He stated that Mr. Davy was willing to give her the use of his shack next to Anderson's, and that possibly the Ladies' Aid in town would provide for such a needy case. He suggested that the city should guarantee milk and bread. The matter was left in the hands of Ald. Cox, as Health Inspector, to take up with power to act.

A motion was next passed receiving the financial statement as presented by the City Clerk and audited by Mr. G. A. Fisher.

A letter from Mr. Russell, reporting on the power plant, in which he pointed out that except for the crank shaft, the plant was now in a serviceable condition. He, however advocated the change to a 7 1/2 K.W. exciter. The switch board was reported as better than the one in use previous to the fire.

Ald. Ball suggested that the letter should be laid on the table, as it was impossible to do anything with the account of the Canadian Fairbanks Co., until a reply to the last letter written them was received and an agreement made to furnish the 7 1/2 K.W. exciter. He mentioned that the plant did not fill the bill as Mr. Smith had promised, and the Canadian Fairbanks Co., in their last letter were trying to get off sending a larger exciter.

The mayor considered that the account should be settled up by the present council, and that a note for \$1,000 should be given on condition that the 7 1/2 K.W. exciter was installed, and was in satisfactory working condition.

A motion to adjourn until 8 p.m. on Friday was carried.
