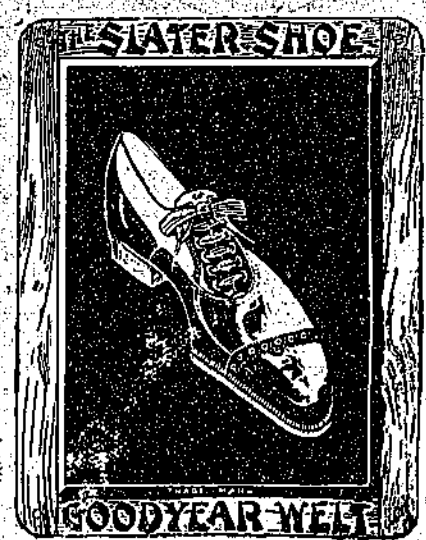

LATE WAR NEWS SCHOOL

Japs Lose Ships.—Japan will Dictate her own Terms.

Tokyo, May 16.—The Steamer Kile, of 1,178 tons capacity, struck a mine and sank off Port Arthur on the night of May 11. The crew were rescued and brought to Osaka.

The steamer Nikko, is ashore at Fusan. She has not sustained damage, and it is expected that she will be floated off at full tide.

New Chung, May 15.—A steamer reports sinking of the Japanese transport in the Gulf of Chih-Li by a mine.

This was also coincident with the sinking of the Japanese transport Shoyutsu, which struck a mine on May 4, near the Miao Islands (at the entrance of the Gulf of Chih-Li), and was reported to be in a sinking condition.

Russia is sending out another squadron to support Rojstevski.

Concerning peace Count Okuma declared that Japan would neither demand a cessation of hostilities nor consider any proposition leaving Russia an opportunity for future vengeance. Japan must become the arbiter of the far east.

It is reported Admiral Rojstevski is suffering from nervous exhaustion, and has asked the Czar to relieve him.

FIRE AT BEATON

At two o'clock Wednesday afternoon Robert Stevens' general store at Beaton was burned to the ground, the occupants saving only the clothes they stood in.

How the fire originated is a mystery, but it is presumed it was brought about through a defect in the brick chimney.

Mrs. Stevens went to visit a neighbor and was not away ten minutes before smoke and flames were observed bursting from the building. Seeing it was useless trying to quench the flames, efforts were confined to prevent them from spreading, which was a difficult task owing to the high wind blowing and it was with much exertion the Hotel Beaton and other structures were saved from sharing the same fate as the store, the hotel being on fire twenty times in many different places. Nothing was saved from the burning building. In addition to losing their general stock and personal effects, Mr. and Mrs. Stevens lost \$150 in currency which was in the cash register. The telephone and postoffice were situated in the destroyed building everything being a total loss in these departments.

The loss is estimated at \$6,000. The stock was covered by insurance to the extent of \$1,200, and the building \$800; the building being owned by A. G. Fraser of Trout Lake.—Miner.

ARROWHEAD.

D. McCarthy, of Revelstoke, has done a record piece of building. He took a contract for erecting an addition of 20 ft. by 32 ft. to the Union Hotel. The addition provides bar, wash room, liquor warehouse and cart room. The interior is finished with wood fibre plaster, giving a handsome appearance. Mr. McCarthy finished his contract in ten days from time of starting on it.

NEW PATENTS.

Rowland Brittain patent attorney, Vancouver, reports: H. Harris, manager, Hall Mines Smelter, received last week a Canadian and Belgian patent on an improved separating and distributing box for smelting purposes. This invention is an important one in the industry to which it pertains and as the title implies is designed to permit a continuous flow of matte and slag from a smelting furnace while preserving the separation of these materials, which has been effected in the furnace, distributing them through separate outlets. An additional advantage, and one that will be apparent to all acquainted with smelting practice, is that with this invention the heat of molten material is maintained in the furnace at a constant level.

Joseph Morton and Henry Carson, of Vancouver, received last week a British patent on an improved railway signaling system.

SCANDAL.

Principal Wallace Guilty of Serious Misconduct.

On Sunday Enderby was shocked when facts leaked out of a most deplorable nature relating to the conduct of A. B. Wallace, principal of the public school, towards the little girls under his care. Just how far he has gone in his unmentionable evil-doings cannot be ascertained, but apparently the offences were many, covering a period of perhaps three months. From what the little ones say, it appears he has not respected even the tenderest age, conducting himself in the most unseemly manner with girls from five to thirteen years of age.

A meeting of the school board was held Saturday night, and Wallace summarily dismissed. A warrant was sworn for his arrest on Monday morning and Constable Gardom succeeded in locating him at Salmon Arm and brought him back to Enderby for trial.

CURIOUS ASSAULT CASE

Hon. J. D. Prentice Arrested.

Ashcroft, B. C., May 18.—J. D. Prentice while on his way to Ashcroft and very drunk stopped at Jim Campbell's "wayside" house, Cache Creek. Mrs. Campbell and her daughter, Mrs. McGillivray, were alone. He beat Mrs. McGillivray about the face very badly. He was arrested and jailed in Ashcroft today, and came up for hearing, but the case was adjourned until tomorrow. Mr. Prentice is out on bail. Mrs. McGillivray is the wife of Duncan McGillivray, provincial constable at Lytton.

CHURCHES.

St. Andrew's.—On Sunday, May 21st, the 400th anniversary of the birth of John Knox will be celebrated throughout the Presbyterian church in Canada and the world. The memory of the great Scottish reformer will be duly commemorated in St. Andrew's Church. In the morning at 11 a.m. there will be a children's service, the subject being "John Knox, his life and work." Special prominence being given to his influence on education.

Knox Church.—Rev. Mr. Madill, who has been attending the synod meeting at Victoria, will preach morning and evening.

At the Vernon Assizes the principal cases were the shooting case at Enderby and a horse stealing case. In the former the accused was found guilty and sentenced to seven years imprisonment, and in the latter the accused was discharged, the accused being tried twice owing to an irregularity on the part of the sheriff on the first trial. J. M. Scott, of the law firm of Scott and Briggs, Revelstoke, acted as crown prosecutor.

Brutal Treatment of a Poor Girl

York, Pa., May 18.—To be branded on the back with a red hot iron; to be scalded with boiling water, and half naked in cold water, to be stripped naked and lashed with a horsewhip until the blood spouted from the whipper became breathless, to be fed on red pepper and knocked down with stonewood, to receive an ordinary whipping every day for four years, and to have her hair yanked out by the handful—these are some of the cruelties that thirty-year-old Elsie Jacobs, a daughter of E. W. Jacobs of this city, says were practiced upon her by Mrs. John Laird, wife of a wealthy farmer of Fairview Township, this county.

The Lairds were arrested by detectives and will be prosecuted on several charges growing out of their alleged inhuman treatment of their little servant.

Toronto, May 13.—Dr. W. Sprinkle, M.P., will retire from the sovereign grand mastership of the Orange Order in British North America.

K. J. Burns son of Mr. Burns, of the Normal school, and brother of R. R. Burns, of Armstrong, has been appointed general agent at Vancouver for the Great Northern.

Abraham Anderson, father of Messrs. Abrahamson Bros. of Revelstoke and Trout Lake, is visiting his sons at the latter place, and though over four score years he is doing the journey well.

Jack Fidler one of two best engineers that ever worked on the C. P. R., passed through Nelson yesterday en route from Calgary to Revelstoke. He has quit running on the road, having in his time taken too many chances. Tribune.

The Calico Ball given by the Ladies Auxiliary of the B. of R. T. on Thursday, in Selkirk Hall, was a great success about 100 couples taking part. Excellent music was supplied by Mrs. Lumb and Mr. Doyle. The refreshments supplied by the ladies formed a special feature of the ball. All who attended thanked the Ladies Auxiliary for affording them such a treat. The extras played by Miss Shook were much appreciated.

E. C. Fromey has received from the east his machine for manufacturing of cement bricks and will shortly inaugurate this industry in the city. Several buildings will probably be erected of these bricks this season.

Trout Lake is becoming famous as a resort for big fish, fishermen reporting catches of single salmon trout that weigh from 16 to 34 pounds. It is claimed these big fish never leave the lake, and can only be caught in the forepart of the fishing season.

A. Johnson has completed the addition to his house on Third street of a veranda and conservatory, the work being the most handsome of its kind in the city. The work was carried out by D. McCarthy, and the fretwork, which is of pretty design, was cut by Sawyer Bros.

Senator Bostock has relinquished 818 acres of his 868-acre tract in the British Columbia railway belt, sold to him last spring at \$2 an acre, it having been ascertained that it was suited for homesteading purposes. Adjoining land has been given him instead.

Forest fires have again been spreading on Fish Creek, threatened the Eva train, and did considerable damage to the limits of the Bowman Lumber Co. The government have evidence as to the cause of these fires, and will probably make an example of the men responsible for their origin.

In giving evidence before the Telephone Committee of the Commons, C. M. Hays contended it was in the interest of the railways and the public that there should be only one telephone system. Telephones were in their nature a monopoly. On Mr. Hays's showing then the "only one" telephone system should be owned and operated by the government.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR.

It is not to the credit of the Department of the Interior that that department should have spent \$60,000 in Chicago last year for printing, which could and should have been done by Canadian printers. Another absurd arrangement of the government is that which requires the whole of the electoral rolls for the Dominion to be printed at the government printing office at Ottawa. That office cannot do the work, and has to let it out to eastern concerns. The printing should be done in the respective provinces.

We object to this excessive centralization policy. If maintained it is going to prove the curse of federation. In no department is the absurdity of such a policy more absurd than in the land administration. If a man in British Columbia wants a few acres of land he has to write to Ottawa, and the ponderous machinery of the big Department of the Interior has to be held up to attend to a matter that could and should be dealt with at the land office of the district where it arises.

If any satisfaction could be derived from Ottawa it would be a different matter, but days and months and years roll on till in many instances an intending settler may become grey-headed before he can obtain any satisfaction from Department of the Interior. And the reason is that the officials of that department are so far removed from the locality affected they know little and care less about it. Nor can they be expected to know. What Canada wants from the Dominion is the recognition of greater local responsibility, and

land boards should be created for each province to deal with such matters. The men composing such boards would have the advantage of local knowledge, would be gettable, and the public business would be transacted with greater expedition and public advantage.

BREWERY SCHEME.

M. J. O'Brien Organising the Industry for Okanagan.

(Vernon News)
M. J. O'Brien, of Revelstoke, came up on Tuesday's boat from a trip down the lake, and, joined by his wife and family, who have been spending a few days in the city, passed through to Revelstoke. Mr. O'Brien states the carrying out of his brewery scheme on the large scale announced depends upon railway development to the south, as the success of the project demands direct connection with the Boundary and Similkameen country. If the C.P.R. build to Pentiction, the new industry will be started on the original lines, and Vernon has been selected as possessing the central location required for such an enterprise. Tests have been made of the water, and it has been pronounced excellent for the purpose. In the event of the C.P.R. not building to Pentiction, the lack of the desired connection with the south country will diminish the market naturally commanded by the brewery, and necessitate the carrying out of the scheme on a much smaller scale. Mr. O'Brien's visit to the Similkameen was partly with the object of endeavoring to obtain some inside information as to the probabilities of railway building. He says he still hopes that the C.P.R. will take the desired action.

MINING MATTERS

LARDEAU INVESTORS

Are Well Pleased With Their Properties.

The Nelson News says: "A party of Minnesota capitalists were in the city on their way east after a visit to British Columbia properties in which they are interested. The party, including John H. Morton, of Havana, William White, of Duluth, and J. D. Forbes, of Marshall. All have interests in the Reward Mining Company and the Triune mine, of which Mr. Morton said:

"We have just come back from Ferguson. We went to confer with R. H. Batty, manager of the Triune, and to consider plans for the Reward Mining Company. The Reward company owns 20 mineral claims, all on the Nettie L. mountain and not far from the Triune. We have lately been running a tunnel, hoping to tap the lead on all the claims. It is not complete yet, and I cannot tell you anything about the result. But we expect great things from our claims. They are surrounded by mines that have paid well, and are still considered valuable properties. The Triune is doing well. There is no discovery. But the veins that have been worked steadily for over a year are still yielding satisfactory returns.

The majority of foreign capitalists with investments in British Columbia, especially mines, are well pleased with their prospects. Many of the claims in the Lardeau district, which have been developed from prospects into dividend-paying properties, have been operated wholly or very largely with American capital."

DRIFTS.

\$22,000,000 in gold will come from this spring.

The Montreal and Boston Consolidated has provided \$250,000 working capital for its properties at Phoenix.

George Alexander, of the Ruth Mine, has assumed position as general manager of the Ferguson Mines Limited.

Tripoli, a valuable polishing material, and mineral ink, have been discovered on the San Juan river, Vancouver Island.

Mr. Alfred J. Deacher, of Denver, Colorado, representing the American Zinc and Chemical Co., is touring Socon in the interests of his firm.

A meeting of the Great Western Mines was held at Ferguson on May 15th to wind up the company and appoint E. G. Hadow liquidator.

The big mine consolidation proposed at Roseland has fallen through, as the representative of the Le Roi considered the valuation put on that property too low.

A car of Silver Cup concentrates from the 5-mile plant went into the Kootenay Lake at Lardo last week. The C. P. R. have divers at work raising it.

Crawford & Co. have secured a contract from the Beatrice Mines to haul from Camborne to Beaton the ore that was hauled last winter over 100 tons—Miner.

Dan McIntosh has struck a new lead on his claim, the Independent, adjoining the Goldfinch above Camborne. The new strike makes a rich showing of free gold.

Joe Decelles and Charlie Larson encountered a body of high-grade galena in this considerable grey copper in visible on the Spider, on Pool Creek. Recent assays yielded \$100 to the ton.

The Tropic says Mr. Leval, who is in charge of the placer operations on Lardeau River, after carefully sampling 400 feet of the creek bed estimates that \$100,000.00 can be taken out of that number of feet.

Operations at the Eva mines are in full swing and the stamp mill is daily pulling away on a good grade of quartz. It is reported the value of the gold brick, resulting from operations during the month of April, was \$4,200.

We are glad to learn that W. B. Pool has been successful in raising a large sum of money for the development and equipment of the Great Northern Company's mines at Camborne and Poplar, and experts will shortly examine these properties in connection with the deal.

C. P. R. EXTENSIONS

Will Build into Nicola.

Ottawa, May 17.—The Canadian Pacific Railway Company has let a contract for the construction of a line of railway from Nicola to Spence Bridge, a distance of forty-five miles.

While the present contract calls only for forty-five miles of railway, it is stated that the intention is that the line will ultimately run through the Similkameen and on to the Boundary country. In the meantime the new branch will give the people of Nicola an outlet, with direct connection with the coast.

The building of the line will commence immediately and is to be carried out during the coming summer. It is expected a large business in connection with coal mining and other industries will be built up by the new line.

NEW C. P. R. STATION

Victoria Firm Gets the Contract.

It is understood the C. P. R. have let the contract for the new station at Revelstoke to Messrs. Smith and Sherbourne, of Victoria, and that work will be pushed forward as soon as possible. The station will be built on the site selected by the company between the sites of the old stores of Messrs. Bourne and Hume, on the north side of the track.

RAILWAY NEWS

ON SHORE AND AFLOAT.

The C. P. R. has acquired the Victoria end of the Alaska Steamship Co.'s business.

The Marine Department intend placing buoys at Cariboo Point on Arrow Lake.

C. P. R. Engineer Lou Patrick has a railroad curiosity in the shape of the first time-table issued west of Winnipeg.

The Transportation Commission will hold its sittings at Port Arthur and Port William end of the present month, and will then go to Winnipeg and Pacific coast.

The Kootenay Express, left the rails between Lethbridge and Medicine Hat, running into an open switch three o'clock Sunday. No passengers were injured. The engineer was scalded.

Mr. Whyte, of the C. P. R. announces it has been definitely determined to double track the company's line between Port William and Winnipeg, a distance of 427 miles. The work will occupy three years.

The Order of Railway Conductors in convention at Portland has adopted resolutions disapproving President Roosevelt's stand in the matter of railroad rate legislation and opposing regulation of rates by government commission.

The motive power of all trains on C. P. R. system between Rossland and Nelson may be electricity, derived from Thompson Falls, before the end of the present year. The railway company has completed arrangements with the West Kootenay Power and Light Company by which the power now being developed at the upper falls will be chiefly devoted to hauling cars of the route as above stated.

LUMBERING.

Thursday, May 11th, was a record breaker for the Bowman Lumber Co.'s Mill at Revelstoke, 51,300 feet being cut for that day, 90 per cent. of which was inch lumber.

Duncan Macdonald, who purchased K. W. G. block at Nelson for his brother and himself, brought out 40 laborers from Winnipeg, on their way to Arrowhead to work in the Arrowhead company's mill, in which Mr. Macdonald is interested.

RIFLE TROPHY.

Presented by the St. Charles Condensing Company.

The Province remarks:—The British Columbia Rifle Association should be greatly related to the generous trophy the St. Charles Condensing Company has been pleased to present to them, to be competed for at the annual shoot of the British Columbia Rifle Association.

Mr. P. G. Shalleross, of the firm of Shalleross and Macaulay, is the man the Vancouver rifle shots have to thank for interesting his principals to present this shield. Probably six or eight men from every company in British Columbia will have an opportunity of shooting for this shield.

The shield will cost somewhere in the neighborhood of \$750, and will be quite the handsomest shield in Canada.

Synopsis of Regulations for Disposing of Minerals on Dominion Lands in Manitoba, the Northwest Territories and the Yukon Territory.

Coal—Coal lands may be purchased at \$5 per acre for surface and \$10 per acre for the coal. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of \$1.00 per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected from the miner. A free miner's certificate is granted for one or more years, not exceeding five years. Payment in advance of \$7.50 per annum for an individual, and from \$20.00 per annum for a company, according to capital.

A person having discovered minerals, may locate a claim location, marking out the same with two lines, one on each side of the discovery, each end on the line of the survey. The claim shall be recorded in the office of the Minister of the Interior, within 30 days of the date of discovery. A free miner's certificate is granted for one or more years, not exceeding five years. Payment in advance of \$7.50 per annum for an individual, and from \$20.00 per annum for a company, according to capital.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid for by mineral order in lieu thereof. When so has been expended or paid the location is extended or renewed for another year, by paying a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, the claimant shall be entitled to a free miner's certificate. The patent for a mining claim shall provide for the payment of a royalty of 10 per cent. of the sales of the products of the location to the Minister of the Interior, for the Yukon Territory, excepting the Yukon Territory. The location shall be extended for another year, by paying a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, the claimant shall be entitled to a free miner's certificate.

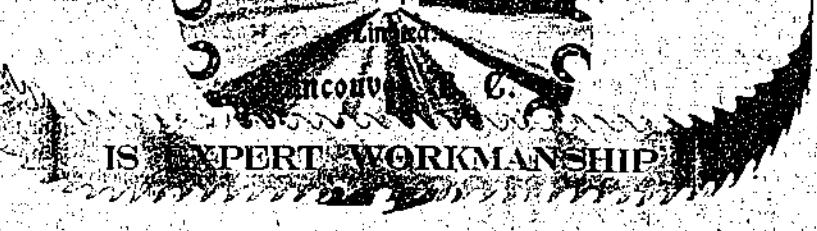

Starchy Foods.

Too much starchy food is eaten in many households. Potatoes are served with every meal, and they are usually mashed or boiled. It is well to substitute rice, hominy and macaroni for potatoes two or three times a week at the very least and better still to omit any of these at many meals. Fried hominy is a delicious substitute for potatoes when chicken is served. Boil the hominy in the usual way, pour it into a shallow dish to cool and slice pieces half an inch thick. Flour lightly and fry in chicken fat or butter and drippings. This is an excellent breakfast or luncheon dish served with made sirup or chicken gravy.

Lather and Shaving.

"It always makes me tired," said an old barber, "when a man tells me to quit wasting so much time rubbing in the lather and hurry along with his shave. If he only knew it, he is laying a sure foundation for a chapped and sore face. The reason for using soap in shaving is to remove the grease always close to the skin and on the surface of the beard.
