corder's office. One extra day allow for each additional ten miles or fract in The person or company staking a ciaim must hold a free miner's certificate.

The discoverer of a new mine is entitled to a claim of 1,000 feet in length, and if the party consists of two, 1,500 feet alto gether, on the output of which no royalty shall be charged, the rest of the party ordinary claims only.

Entry fee, \$10. Royalty at the rate of two and one-half per cent on the vain of the gold shipped from the Yukon Thirtory to be paid to the Comptroller. No free miner shall receive agrant a more than one mining claim on each set crute river, creek or gulch, but the same miner may hold any number of claims by purchase, and free miners may work their claims in partnership by filing notice and paying fee of \$2. A claim may be abandoned, and another obtained on the same creek, gulch or river, by giving notice and paying a fee.

Vork must be done on a claim each year to the value of at least \$200.



The boundaries of a claim may be 10 fined absolutely by having a surgery made and publishing notices in the Yukon Official Gazette.

Petroleum.—All unappropriated Dominion Lands in Manitoba, the North-wee Territories and within the Yukon Territory are open to prospecting for petraceum, and the minister may resert, focan individual or company having an chinery on the land to be prospected, an area of: 60 acres. Shoule the prospector discover oil in paying quantities and satisfactorily establish such discovery, an area not exceeding 60 acres, in cluding the oil well and such other land as may be determined, will be sold to the discoverer at the rate of \$1.00 an acre, subject to royalty at such rate as may be specified by order-in-council.
