The force of men on the Eva will be increased now that the trail is open and supplies can be taken in. The owners of the Black Bear and Eclipse are calling for tenders for tunnelling on their respective properties.

A crew is at work getting the sawmill in shape and it is expected that they will be ready to start cutting next week.

Last week Messrs. Rowlands, Butler and Derosa made a big strike of free gold on the Lucky Jack, a property located near the Eva.

Angus McKay and J. B. MacKenzie made a strike while doing assessment on their property at 7-Mile showing up native copper. Assay samples have been sent out.

J. A. Magee has sold a half interest in his pack train to J. A. Shields and they intend putting on more horses and a freight team this summer. The pack train is now busily engaged taking in supplies to the properties.

The Minnesota Mining & Development Co., which is being incorporated under the laws of British Columbia, has bought the Nellie

group of claims owned by Messrs. Magee and Bostock. The company expects to work its property this summer with J. B. MacKenzie, local representative and manager, in charge. This is a well known group in which all mining men who have seen it have great confidence.

F. R. Blockberger is expected in before the end of the month to do development work on groups of claims in which he is interested. Mr. DeStelmor, who is associated with Mr. Blockberger, has been in the old country during the winter and it is reported that he has succeeded in interesting considerable capital in this section and will shortly return to the camp.

THE BAND STAND.

Unsuccessful Attempt at Removal. ---Petition Circulated.

Some of the residents of the upper town being of the opinion that the band stand was not situated in the proper locality formed a party for its removal during the small hours of Saturday morning. Shortly after midnight two of our gallant young men appeared on the scene of action each armed with an axe and after sizing up the situation proceeded to business. These were followed by others, and in a short time about twenty men and two teams were to hand. Next came the difficulty of removing the flag staff, which it was found would interfere by catching on the electric light wires, and after discussing the question of who was to remove the staff a ladder was procured and one gentleman mounted it reaching the top in safety bringing down the offensive pole with an axe. Skids were soon in place and the team hitched on but after two or three trials it was found that they were not equal to the occasion. The party then decided that rollers were necessary and started out in search of these but as yet have not returned.

The episode of Friday night was not all, however, as the following morning R. Tapping, espied the disfigured structure and at once started out with blood in his eye having taken up the original subscription towards the erection of the stand. He then started a petition which was circulated amongst the subscribers, of whom expressed their wish that the stand should remain on the present site.

It is now up to the band which it may be said, are the principal, he members having done the major portion of the work of construction besides contributing about one third of the cost in cash.

NOMINATION AND ELECTION

Contests in Election for Mayor and Aldermen.

Nominations for mayor of the City of Revelstoke and an alderman to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Ald. Newman were held on Tuesday there being a contest in each case. For Mayor, W. S. Newman was nominated by C. B. Hume, and R. Howson, while W. M. Brown's papers were signed by R. S. Wilson and W. Cowan. For Alderman, John McLeod was brought out by Jas. Mathie and H. J. McSorley, and M. J. O'Brien by C. B. Hume and F. B. Lewis.

The election was in progress today and was warmly contested, teams and vehicles being on hand early this morning hauling voters to the polls. The vote was not a large one owing to the number who had neglected having their names placed on the voters list at last revision. The usual feeling of town versus C. P. R. was very much in evidence during the few days which elapsed between the nomination and election and very few ventured any odds on either side in the mayoralty contest, while but very little interest was taken in the aldermanic election.

SCHOOL ELECTION

Secretary Graham's Term of Office Expires on June 30.—\$8000 For New School Building.

There being some doubt as to the dates of expiration of office of the trustees on the local school board now that the amended act is in force, the matter was referred to the superintendent of education who replied as follows:—

T. J. Graham Esq., Secretary School Board, Revelstoke, B. C.

Sir,—Your letter of the 6th inst. has been duly received.

Enclose copy of the Amendment to the School Act. Your term of office expires on 30th June next. If you are re-elected, you, as well as the other Trustees, will hold office only until the 31st December, 1901, when a new election will be held.

In reference to the corner piece of ground adjoining the school grounds I am informed by the Lands & Works Department that the land does not belong to the Provincial Government. It probably belongs to the Dominion Government.

A sum of \$8000 has been provided for the erection of a new school building in Revelstoke.

TEACHERS EXAMS.

Dates and Places at Which They Will Be Held.

The annual examination of candidates for certificates of qualification to teach in the public schools of the province will be held as follows, commencing on Wednesday, July 3, at 8:15 a.m.: Victoria, in South Park school building; Vancouver, in High school building; Kamloops, in public school building; Nelson, in public school building. Each applicant must forward a notice, three days before the examination, stating the class and grade of certificate for which he will be a candidate, the optional subjects selected, and at which of the above-named places he will attend. Every notice of intention to be an applicant must be accompanied with satisfactory testimonial of moral character. A fee of \$5 must also be forwarded with each application.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

Close of the Session.

Address to the Finance Minister—

Presentation to Government

Whip.

VICTORIA, May 14.—Parliament was prorogued Saturday night by Justice Walker, administrator, acting for Lieut.-Governor Sir Henri Joly, who is in California, trying to regain his health, which has been much impaired during his residence in British Columbia.

During the session, just closed the house passed 81 bills, which were assented to, carrying appropriations amounting to \$7,475,335.50, five millions of which is for railway subsidies. Fifteen of the bills passed were measures incorporating railway companies and carry charters and building powers.

The members found time during the last few days of the session to give some attention to pleasanter things than law making. Thursday night Price Ellison, East Yale, the government whip, was the recipient of an address from the party and was presented with a purse of gold in appreciation of his services during the session just passed. Friday afternoon Finance Minister Turner was presented with an address signed by every member of the house, recounting his many services to the province in the years gone by, expressing their regrets at the prospect of his retirement, and their hope for his success and happiness in his new field of labor in London, as agent-general for the province. Friday night after adjournment, the Speaker gave a banquet to the members and recording angels, otherwise the members of the press gallery, and on Saturday everyone attended the gymnastics of the Victoria Hunt Club at Colwood Park.

However, the last few days were not all given to making merry, tarrying with the wine and forming mutual admiration societies, and a great deal of work was finished by holding morning, afternoon and night sessions and orders were discharged and bills passed at a rate which taxed the ability of the angels to record.

Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and until his final passage Friday afternoon a continuous fight was kept up on the loan bill, by Smith Curtis and a few V. V. & E. sympathizers, and at every stage Curtis and Neill offered amendments which were aimed to defeat the purpose of the bill, but all were lost by majorities ranging from three to thirty. Thursday afternoon an attempt was made to insert a clause prohibiting the C. P. R. from tendering for the construction of the line from Coast to Kootenay, and as admitted by its supporters, was intended to force the government to give the contract to the V. V. & E. regardless of other tenders. This really proved the fight of the session, all the heavy weights taking part in the debate. At one time it seemed that the V. V. & E. people might win until they were unmasked by the attorney general in a short speech which proved that the promoters of the latter company were pure and simple fakirs and placed their supporters in the house in a very unpleasant position to say the least, that of aiding charter dealers to loot the treasury. McPhillips had demanded the reading of the contract which the government desired to make, and wanted to know if the V. V. & E. people were not prepared to accept it, and also desired to know the result of the last conference between the government and the promoters. Fresh from a conference with E. V. Bodwell, solicitor for the V. V. & E., Mr. Elberts was prepared to give all the information desired, and his speech proved the death warrant of the hopes of the promoters. The company refused to accept the contract as drawn. They would not accept it unless modified so as to give them the subsidy at once on thirty miles of road to be built this year from Midway to Cascade, and another thirty miles from English bluff to Cloverdale, on the line of the Great Northern running from New Westminster to New Westminister. The Company to be allowed to take its own time in building the balance of the road, some three hundred miles, and would not build it at all unless they received the Dominion bonus of \$8,000 per mile in addition to the provincial subsidy. They would build the two short lines with provincial subsidy alone and take chances on securing the Dominion subsidy. This was the proposition submitted to the government by the V. V. & E., or rather by the Great Northern officials Monday. The building of the first line of road mentioned would make connection at Cascade with the line of the Great Northern now building from Marcus Falls to Cascade, would tap the Greenwood and Phoenix camps

and give that road ingress into the whole Boundary country and enable them to feed the Montana shielers with B. C. ores, while the latter road could be cheaply built across the level prairie to Cloverdale, make the connection desired, and by putting a steamboat on the Victoria run for a year, the promoters would pull down the bonus of \$475,000 voted by Victoria in its famous ferry by-law. This amendment, offered by Tallow, Vancouver, was defeated by a vote of 12 to 25.

It is now said that the members will not be allowed to remain at home many weeks before being summoned to the capital to ratify a contract for the construction of the Vernon-Midway railway which will be commenced this year and pushed to completion as soon as possible. This road when built will reduce the time from the Coast to Kootenay by 24 hours, will give the farmers of the Yales a market for their produce and enable the miners of Boundary, Rossland and Shewan to secure home grown supplies at much lower rates than they now pay, and at the same time satisfy the constant demand for quicker communication with the southern interior. If all these things can be accomplished by the construction of this line of one hundred and thirty miles, and there is no doubt that they can be, it should stop the clamour for the immediate construction of a direct Coast-Kootenay line.

A visit to the agricultural department yesterday repaid us by giving us the information that the C. P. R., influenced by representations made by the government and interested shippers, had so greatly reduced the freight rates on produce from the Okanagan valley that a saving of \$80,000 per year would be made to the ranchers and fruit farmers of that district, basing the shipments on those of last year. This reduction it is claimed will enable the producers to place their products in markets which have heretofore been barred to them.

This week the government was pleased to say, "Well done good and faithful servant, enter thou into the place we have prepared for you." Alex. Lucas, of Revelstoke and all over, heard these words and has packed his grip for Kaslo, where he will serve the government as mining recorder.

MINING NOTES

The shareholders of the Jordan Pass mine met Wednesday evening and decided on crown granting their property. It is expected that a trial shipment will be made this fall.

On Monday last T. R. Davey brought down a piece of quartz, containing a considerable amount of ore, from the Amy group of claims he and Archie McDonald staked on April 27th last at the mouth of the canyon about a half mile away from the town. The lead is about eight feet wide between walls. On the footwall there is about 2 1/2 feet of decomposed quartz carrying considerable galena and carbonates. Above this a little is exposed a lead carrying quantities of galena and copper. The owners are working daily on the claim and expect, if surface indications go for anything, to expose a body of ore. P. Culkeon has a claim on the same lead, but on the opposite side of Jordan creek and last Monday he commenced work on it.—Trout Lake Topics.

TETE JAUNE MICA.

It is reported that a syndicate has been formed in Revelstoke to prospect in the Big Bend for the purpose of examining into the mica deposits recently found in that district. There are two claims carrying mica situated on the north side of Sand creek, about two and a half miles below Tete Jaune Cache. The veins are reported to be about 15 feet wide and are traceable for a considerable distance on the surface. A number of chutes of excellent mica have been found, and many samples have been taken from 3 to 5 to 10 feet of very fine quality. The two claims referred to are located not far from the Bonanza property, which shipped about \$30,000 worth of mica in 1900 at a big expense in the way of transportation. It is expected that better communication will be made between Revelstoke and Tete Jaune Cache, and when this is brought about it will help greatly in the development of these mica deposits.
