



MINING MATTERS

THE MINERAL INDUSTRY.

Supt. Lawrence of the C.P.R. says of the growth of the mineral industry: The Granby Smelter at Grand Forks closed down' recently for a period of ten days for the purpose of connecting up its new furnaces. By the 1st of Sentember the Granby smelter will be reducing 2700 tons of ore a day. "We are getting a portion of the haulage of this ore.

"The Dominion Copper Co. has taken over the smelter of the Boston directors revealed that the mine and and Montreal company at Boundary Falls and is getting ready to recommence operations, and I understand the intention is to add two furnaces to the existing plant.


