WATER SUPPLY SHOCKING

Substantial Increase Made by Diversion of New Creeks.

The work of turning into the city water supply of two more creeks on the mountain overlooking Revelstoke has been successfully accomplished by R. Gordon, and the result is a substantial increase in the supply. There is now ample water both for the city and the C. P. R., who will connect their shops with the overflow from the city tank. The work was completed Tuesday, thus being carried out in a shorter time than estimated. The notice prohibiting the use of water for gardens was cancelled Wednesday to the delight of those whose gardens have been suffering during the prolonged dry spell.

What is wanted before next summer is increased reservoir accommodation, and with this provided the city will be able to tide over another dry summer with ample water for domestic and fire purposes.

TOURIST ASSOCIATION

Organised for Revelstoke.

On Tuesday evening a meeting was held at the Board of Trade rooms for the organization of a Tourist Association. There was a good attendance and a lot of interest was taken in the proposal. After a thorough discussion it was resolved to form an association and to raise funds for advertising the tourist attractions of the district and making them accessible. The following officers were appointed: President, Supt. Kilpatrick; vice-presidents, A. J. McDonald, M. J. O'Brien, C. P. Lindmark and J. Abrahamson; secretary, H. Floyd; treasurer, W. H. Pratt; executive committee, C. R. McDonald, G. S. McCarter, E. A. Hagen, R. Gordon, A. E. Phipps, W. Foote, A. Kincaid, F. B. Lewis and A. Johnson. A sub-committee consisting of Messrs. Lindmark, McDonald and Hagen was appointed to arrange for opening a trail to Eight Mile Falls and to select and have mounted photographs of scenes around Revelstoke, and to arrange for a special schedule and have them displayed in the principal tourist hotels, also to have a special, lively schedule prepared for use of tourists wishing to drive to the canyon, Williamson's Lake, Eight Mile Falls and other points of interest.

This committee met immediately after the meeting and put in hand the work entrusted to it. At the meeting mention was made of the desirability of C. P. R. trains stopping at Ross Peak water tank to give access to the cave, and Supt. Kilpatrick stated instructions had been given for trains to stop there when required by tourists.

Over \$500 was subscribed in the room to carry out the objects of the association.

CITY COUNCIL.

At the meeting last night all attended except Ald. McLeod.

R. Smith, C. E., reported the new water supply would give 170,000 gallons daily.

C. E. Proctor's request for extension of Second street sidewalk was granted.

It was decided to purchase the block offered east of McKenzie avenue at \$1,400 for school purposes, as Mr. Floyd, on behalf of the trustees, said it would be required by 1907.

Lights were ordered to put on 'side walk' to railway station, the C. P. R. putting in the poles.

It was ordered that R. Tapping's poles on Victoria Road be removed.

The mayor urged the reorganization of the city staff so as to place the responsibility for the definite departments. He suggested placing R. Gordon in charge of the power house, Lembeke on the wiring and a man in charge of the water service.

A long discussion ensued in which Ald. Field, Abrahamson and Foote supported the mayor. Ald. McCarter and Lewis considered the city should have a man in general control and Mr. Gordon should have increased power and be held responsible.

Ald. Field moved that R. Gordon be placed in charge of the power plant and finance, with the necessary help, and that Lembeke have charge of the wiring and other work.

Ald. Foote seconded, but after further discussion it was decided to drop the matter at present.

The members of the council excepting Ald. McCarter and Lewis, were appointed court of revision.

ACCIDENT

Little Girl Has Feet Cut Off by Reaping Machine.

A shocking accident occurred at Salmon Arm Saturday when the two-and-a-half-year-old daughter of J. Kew, who has a farm about a mile from the station, had both her feet cut off by the reaping machine while her father was cutting a crop of oats. The little girl was playing in the oat crop unseen when the reaping machine came along, the cutting knives catching her legs and almost severing both feet. Dr. Sutherland was telegraphed for and brought the child to the Revelstoke hospital, where the little one is receiving the utmost care. What makes the mishap the more sad is that the mother is ill in the Kamloops hospital.

PEACE

Proclaimed Between Russia and Japan.

The peace conference resulted Monday in a settlement of the differences between the diplomats by the abandonment of Japan of her claim for indemnity for the war and by the cession of half the Island of Sakhalin to Russia as a valuation to be determined by arbitration.

Japan has, therefore, abandoned aim at all her demands, and is satisfied with having acquired as the result of a terribly costly war, half the island of Sakhalin, control of Korea and Port Arthur and the removal of Russian influences in Manchuria.

RAIL AND STEAMER.

The Canadian Northern proposes building a \$2,500,000 hotel in Winnipeg.

The Edengraph complains bitterly of the service on the S. and O. branch. On Thursday as Engine 501 was backing up to the water tank at Revelstoke, Engine 874 collided with it, throwing the former engine off the track.

Thursday's No. 2 was delayed by an American Pullman conveying a party of tourists being found in bad shape and requiring repair.

The C. P. R. is now trying to block the V. V. & B. before the railway commission on the ground it has already made a survey of the same route.

The C. P. R. complained to the government that the Ross Trunk is paralleling their line west of Winnipeg, but the government have replied they approve the proposed route.

The C. P. R. is putting on 20,000 more cars and 50 new locomotives to handle the wheat crop.

The Laurier government is endeavoring to arrange with the C. P. R. to shorten the time from London to Yokohama to 21 days by putting faster boats on the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

The Midway, Vernon railway is going ahead all right and A. R. F. Lackie, of Baltimore, has been appointed engineer for the new road.

F. Julian has completed his contract for the cut on the A. & K. line at Green Slide and has taken a contract on the Nicola road.

POLITICAL.

There appears to be something fishy over the disclosures concerning the way in which the Alberni election was won by the government. The Liberals are prosecuting for impersonation and seek to summon Sergeant-at-Arms Saunders, a pet of Hon. Hugh Green, as witness, but it is stated he cannot be found since Friday. "For ways that are dark and tricks that are vain" the McBridge government beats the heathen Chinee.

MINING MATTERS

THE MINERAL INDUSTRY

Supr. Lawrence of the C.P.R. says of the growth of the mineral industry: "The Granby Smelter at Grand Forks closed down recently for a period of ten days for the purpose of connecting up its new furnaces. By the 1st of September the Granby smelter will be reducing 2700 tons of ore a day. We are getting a portion of the haulage of this ore."

"The Dominion Copper Co. has taken over the smelter of the Boston and Montreal company at Boundary Falls and is getting ready to recommence operations, and I understand the intention is to add two furnaces to the existing plant."

"The smelter at Greenwood, owned by the British Columbia Copper company, is being operated to its full capacity. The high grade belt around Greenwood is furnishing considerable tonnage for the C.P.R. and for the different boundary smelters."

"The Sloan is a little more than holding its own. The smelter at Trail is probably reducing more ore and handling more bullion than at any time in its history."

"The Rossland camp is furnishing it about 4000 tons of gold-copper ore a week. Larson, Idaho, sends in from 200 to 340 tons of ore a week. The St. Eugene supplies it with a large tonnage of lead ore, and in addition to this the Sloan and other sections are furnishing a good-sized tonnage of silver-lead ore."

"The Hall Mines smelter at Nelson keeps in steady operation."

GRANBY SMELTER.

Two More Furnaces in Operation

The two new furnaces added to the Granby smelter have been completed and the smelter again blown in. A new terminal to the Great Northern Railway has been put in at a cost of \$75,000; ore crusher with capacity of

150 tons an hour, ore bins capable of loading 100 tons—35 cars in 25 minutes; No. 3 tunnel double-tracked and equipped with a 75 h. p. motor. The smelter had six furnaces 44 inches by 160 inches. The two new furnaces have a capacity of 48 inches by 210 inches.

EVA MINE

On Profit Earning Basis—Stamps to be Increased

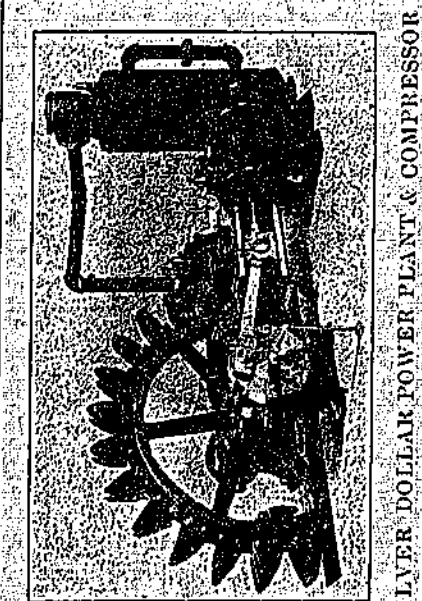
On Tuesday at Nelson a directors' meeting of the Eva Gold Mines was held. Reports submitted to the directors revealed that the mine and mill are being operated and that the affairs of the company are on a profit earning basis. Thirty-five men are working in the mine and the mill. The directors determined to submit the question of installing ten additional stamps to the present ten stamp mill to the stockholders' annual meeting to be held in September.

THE SILVER DOLLAR.

Power and Compressor Plant Being Installed.

One of the great expenses of mining in a mountainous country is fuel and power to operate the necessary plant. The Elwood Tinworkers' Gold Mining Company of Lardau, near Camborne, were fortunate enough to secure control of a mountain stream affording a constant supply at a minimum cost. In order to develop the power Allis-Chalmers-Bullock, Ltd., Montreal, who had the contract, built at their works in Montreal a compound duplex power driven Ingersoll-Sargeant air compressor with piston inlet valves. The cylinders are 12 and 20 and 14 inch stroke; the machine travelling at 130 revolutions per minute. Mounted on the shaft of the compressor is a Double water wheel, designed by the Double Engineering Company of San Francisco, which will develop 90 h. p. under the head of 170 feet, afforded by this stream. The wheel is fitted with a

patent needle nozzle fitted with hand control. The compressor will deliver 625 cubic feet of air per minute. The system of mounting a water wheel directly on the compressor is an ideal way of generating power, as the loss by friction is very slight, and all gearing, shafting, etc., is rendered unnecessary. In addition to the compressor Allis-Chalmers-Bullock, Ltd., supplied a complete outfit of drills, air receivers, columns, tripods, hose and mining sundries.

DRIFTS.

A new smelter is to be built at Boundary Falls. There are 200 tons of ore in sight on the Sullivan.

There are 20,000 tons of ore in sight on the Paradise at Wilmer.

Two tons of ore a day are being brought down from the Black Warrior.

A good strike of molybdenite ore has been made on the Tamarack near Ashcroft.

The Britannia mine at Vancouver is planning to handle 1,000 tons of ore a day.

Great Northern mining experts are looking over the Rossland camp with a view to investment.

Eastern capitalists have bought 30,000 acres of coal lands on Queen Charlotte Island for \$700,000.

W. Curnow this week made a shipment of copper ore from his claim at Origiellachie to the Trail smelter.

The Boston mine at New Denver has been sold. The purchasers are the Monitor and Ajax Fraction Company.

The Prince Mining and Development Company are placing a fine exhibit of Standard ores at the Hotel Revelstoke.

The Forest Rose property at Barker, B.C., has been acquired by Vancouver investors, who intend putting in a larger plant.

W. A. Foote has sold a twelfth interest in the Surprise Group on the North Fork of the Lardau for a good price.

A good body of ore has been struck in the lower tunnel of the Old Gold. It has now been opened up on the 250 foot level.

A body of ore has been struck on Nettie Mt. Wilmer which runs 300 ozs silver and 95 per cent. lead. The property is owned by Messrs. Washburn and Stark.

The Beatrice mines have made arrangements by which ample capital has been provided for operation of the property. Tenders for work are called for in this issue.

New York, Aug. 28.—Bar silver 62 1/2, casting copper 15 5/16, electrolytic copper 15 3/8 to 15 5/8, lead \$4.85. London, Aug. 28.—Silver 28 1/2, lead £14 5.

Work on the upraise of the Silver Cup mine will be completed in about three weeks, when a full force will be employed in pushing development. The magnificent ore showings already reported are holding out.

The Prospector remarks: There is an ever increasing demand for more smelter capacity in the Kootenays, and this demand will continue for the reason that thousands of men are prospecting and developing what is destined to be one of the greatest ore producing sections on earth.

In the suit, Batty v. Metropolitan Mining Company, at Nelson, Hodgson for plaintiff, Foin for defendant, plaintiff's application to strike out certain paragraphs of statement of defence, and the defendants application for security of costs of suit, both dismissed with costs.

The Free Press published a telegraphic account of the meeting at Duluth of shareholders of the Revelstoke and McCollough Creek Hydroelectric, which the president, W. M. Brown, considers a reflection on him and he intends entering suit against the Free Press for alleged libel.

A. J. McMillan has been relieved of his duties as managing director of the Le Roi, and as he was the obstacle to the amalgamation of the Le Roi with the War Eagle, Centre Star, Trail smelter combination, that deal will likely now go through. As a result the Northport smelter will be closed, and all ores will go to the Trail smelter.

The Review remarks:—Adjoining the Cromwell are the Alice and Alice fraction, owned by Abrahamson Bros. and J. O. Piper. On the fraction a rich vein of carbonates and galeum is being worked, the average values running \$168 in gold and \$10 in silver. Across the basin from this property is the Milloy I.X.L., on which preparations are being made to drive a 900 ft. tunnel.

W. M. Brown, president of the Revelstoke-McCollough Creek Hydroelectric Mining Company, returned Monday from attending a meeting of the shareholders at Duluth, J. D. Sibbald also attended from Revelstoke. The shareholders gave instructions that a detailed statement of the company's affairs be prepared and expressed their view in favor of raising the further capital required by other means than debentures.

Messrs. Sharp and Irvine, mining brokers, of Nelson, are getting up a collection of British Columbia ores for exhibition in Wall Street, New York, and we suggest that mine owners in this section send to Messrs. Sharp and Irvine samples of their ores for the exhibit, which will be displayed in one of the best of the world's financial centres for attracting the attention of capital.

The Journal of Commerce says:—The excitement that has possessed the copper industry during the last few weeks has attracted general attention. Industrial activity and the wage in the Far East caused a large and legitimate increase in the melting of copper, and the remunerative prices received by producers stimulated production enormously, until now American mines, including those of Canada and Mexico, as well as those of the United States, are pouring out the metal at the rate of over 45,000 tons per month. John Stanton, one of Wall Street's independent copper authorities, said copper might reach 17 cents a pound within a week, the scarcity of the metal being due to the excessive consumption.

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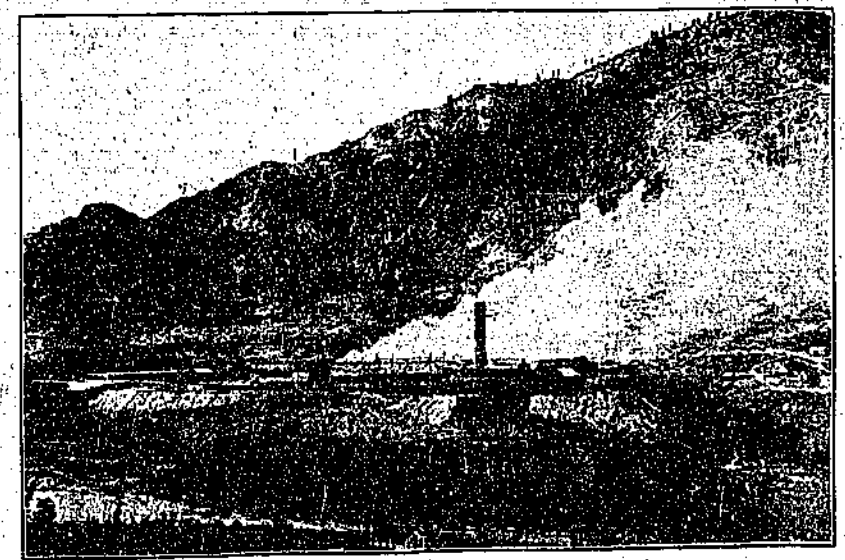
