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FISH CREEK

Visit of American Mine Investors.

Compressor Plant to be Put in at the Eva.

On Friday about 30 gentlemen from Michigan and neighbouring States arrived on a visit to the Fish Creek camp in which they are so heavily interested, being directors and stock holders of the Northwestern Development and Calumet mining companies. The party was accompanied by A. F. Rosenberger, promoter of the companies, and by the President of both companies, A. J. Scott, of Hancock, Mich. The party included several gentlemen who have extensive practical mining knowledge, and the result of the visit will be of great value in determining the future management of the mineral properties in which they are interested.

The party was accommodated at the new hotel erected and furnished by the Northwestern Development Company at Goldfields.

CAMBORNE GROUP

The visitors first examined the Camborne group, the property of the Northwestern Company. They were much pleased with the power plant installed by Mr. Brock on Menhick Creek, and give him great credit for his work in this respect. They were, however, disappointed over other matters.

NOT IN TOWNSITE BUSINESS

They disapprove most strongly of the company being launched into the townsite sawmill and hotel business at Goldfields and say it was no part of the object of the company, or of the policy of the directors, to go into this sort of thing, and they are very sorry that so much of the capital of the company should have been applied in this direction, instead of to the legitimate mining development and equipment of the Camborne group, for which their capital was intended.

ANOTHER DISAPPOINTMENT

was in the mining conditions in the property itself. Six crosscut tunnels have been run with drifts on the supposed course of the vein, but with the result that quartz has been found in only two of the openings and then in small and irregular quantities. They saw the foundation for the stamp mill being put in and the mill plant on the ground. It had been expected this mill would be in operation by Dec. 1st, turning out gold bricks. Now this is a matter of impossibility, and no results can be expected in this direction before June or July. It is not that the property does not possess as much merit as ever, for the large showings of gold-bearing ore on the Goldfinch are there. The trouble is no development has been done on them, and there is consequently no ore available for treatment at the mill.

AN AERIAL TRAMWAY

is in course of construction and when completed will enable ore to be shipped from the Goldfinch, but considerable development must be done to enable that ore to be stopped and sent to the mill. It is this feature of the company's property on which the directors pin their faith, and to which they will require the whole attention of the management to be given between now and next spring.

THE SITUATION

were delighted with the results of the test which Mr. Brock had made at the Granite mill, and as a result the stock, which was originally sold at 50 cents, went up to \$5.00, and is still quoted on the Lake markets at \$1.50. The directors were to hold a meeting at Nelson today, when it is probable instructions will be given to drop entirely the townsite and sawmill features of the enterprise, and that all energy be devoted to the development of the large showings of ore on the Goldfinch, with a view to getting the property in shape for the economical handling of ore for the mill. The directors are determined to have the property handled in as legitimate a manner as possible, and while they recognize the mill has been put in before the conditions of the proposition warranted it, they will spare no efforts to make the mine a producer of dividends to the shareholders as soon as possible.

THE EVA

the party was well pleased with, and it is proposed to get a small compressor, boiler and engine brought in over the snow and placed in position to push development work in the spring. A small experimental stamp mill will also be put in to make a test run for

several months so as to prove whether the average values are such as to warrant the erection of a large plant. The first payment under the bond has been made by the Calumet Company, and the directors are determined by safe, economical, and conservative management, to make the venture a successful one if possible.

A WILD SCENE.

Mr. Scott, president of the Calumet Company, says the scene, when the subscriptions for stock were opened at Hancock, was one of the wildest he ever saw. Men, women and children crowded the street eager to invest from \$10 up in the new company, and so intense was the competition that the people were buying each other's places of vantage in the crowd so as to make sure of getting stock.

THE DIRECTORS



REVELSTOKE.

Ancient Prophecies Fulfilled.

Some men see far ahead of their times. Judge Sprout is one of them. In the early eighties he and A. S. Farwell applied for 150,000 acres of timber land at Revelstoke, believing there was an immense future for the lumber industry here, but the scheme was afterwards abandoned.

We have just run across a pamphlet written by Judge Sprout and published in 1885 dealing with Revelstoke. The title page refers to Revelstoke as "the future chief city of the interior of British Columbia." Regarding the future value of the

LUMBERING RESOURCES

of the district Judge Sprout said: "The topography, waterways, and railway lines of the country mark out Farwell (by which name the townsite was then known) as the sole place in the south-east part of British Columbia for extensive permanent lumber manufacturing. The lumber supplies are inexhaustible, and will be in great demand in the treeless regions of Central Canada and the United States."

CHIEF RAILWAY POINT

And again, while the headquarters of the C. P. R. for the Shuswap and Mountain division had not been decided upon, and were afterwards fixed at Donald, Judge Sprout had a better prescience of the future of the city as a railway point than the railway officials will be said. "Farwell, probably will be the headquarters of the Mountain division of the Canadian Pacific Railway and of an administrative district of the British Columbia government."

Not only did Judge Sprout foresee more than even the C. P. R. officials at that time, but he pointed out the advantages of Revelstoke as a centre for the tourist traffic.

THE TOURIST TRAFFIC

He said: "For travellers, tourists, sportsmen, Alpine climbers and invalids, Farwell, when accommodations are provided, will be the choicest on the continent." In his report to the government on Sept. 7th 1884, Judge Sprout said: "The lumber business on the Columbia River will be one of the greatest industries in the province within a few years."

NAKUSP.

CITY COUNCIL.

Reduction in Electric Light Charges

Regular meeting held Friday. Present: The Mayor, Ald. Manning, Law, McLeod, Hume, McLaughlin.

GRAVEL SUPPLY.

Supt. Kilpatrick allowing city to take gravel for street from Molson's Bank to freight shed.

ELECTRIC LIGHT.

Supt. Kilpatrick complained of electric light at shops. In reply to the Mayor Mr. Gordon said the wiring in the shops was too light.

A long discussion took place on the charges for electric light, and the rates at Kamloops and Vancouver were quoted, showing the latter were higher than the Revelstoke rates, while the Revelstoke rates were higher than Vancouver, except for domestic lighting.

It was stated the C. P. R. intended putting in their own plant, unless the city reduced the lighting rates.

The matter of reducing the rate for hotels was also considered but Ald. Manning said hotels would not be burning light at night if they were not getting money out of it. If a reduction was given to the hotels it should be given to every working man in town.

The Mayor said he did not propose to single out hotels alone for reduction but that it should apply to all consumers using meters. The domestic rate in the city was a very low one.

Ald. Law suggested adopting the Vancouver rate and it was resolved on motion of Ald. Hume, seconded by Ald. McLeod, to reduce the charges for electric lighting to the same rates as were in force at Vancouver.

Ald. Manning suggested placing two arc lamps on McKenzie Avenue, but Ald. McLeod opposed the extra expense as some of the town was not well lighted now.

ANXIOUS TEST.

Ald. Hume asked what could be done about avoiding the electric plant being shut down because of anchor ice in winter.

R. Gordon said he had a scheme which would assist by putting in a long rack but the only way to deal with it effectually was by having an auxiliary steam plant.

Mr. Gordon was authorized to have the rack put in as suggested. On Ald. Manning's request Mr. Gordon was instructed to put a light at corner of Third St. and Robson Ave.

BY-LAW.

A by-law was introduced to amend the regulations re traders and professional licensees, and bring it in accordance with the act. The council then adjourned.

London and Glasgow are advocating a new form of civic taxation by which land shall contribute in proportion to its improved value. The principle is much the same as that of the frontage tax which has been advocated for this city.

The absurdity of the conservative cry for high tariffs is evident from the flourishing state of industries at Hamilton, where the limits of the city will have to be extended owing to the development of additional industries under liberal rule.

The disastrous fire at Fairview shows the necessity of strict regulations being made by law for the equipment of hotels with convenient and safe fire escapes. Had this precaution been taken at the Fairview hotel, no life need have been lost.

The life of the west is threatened with the high tariff cry. British Columbia pays seven times as much taxation as some of the other provinces, and this mainly through the custom house. A rise in tariff would mean this province paying 25 per cent to 50 per cent more taxation. A Montreal paper now wants the tariff raised on hams and bacon, the staple food of the miner and lumberman, to protect the Canadian farmer. Where do the workers get off at?

The Sandon Prystreack gives a striking instance of the high tariff fallacy when it points out the Deering Harvester Co. of Chicago has a branch in Canada and is represented on the manufacturers association, yet hollers for more duty. Our contemporary remarks: "Obviously, somebody is getting the worst of it. Certainly it is not the Deering Company, for they are protected both in Canada and the United States. Then it stands to reason that it must be the farmer who buys the machine and pays the freight. If this is true of the farmer it must also be true in the case of the lumberman, the fisherman and the miner."

THE IRISH QUESTION.

The Irish cause has no nobler champion than Hon. Edward Blake. The cause which he champions is a cause worthy of that for which a statesman should give his life. Edward Blake is a man of the keenest reasoning and logical power and no one can read or listen to a speech on the Irish question by the celebrated Canadian without feeling ashamed of the narrowness, bigotry and tyranny which has characterized the British Parliament in its dealings with Ireland. Every colonial legislature recognizes this, and there is scarcely a legislature in the British possessions but has appealed to the mother parliament to extend to Ireland and the Irish that freedom of government in internal affairs that has been the secret of the success of British colonization the world over. Ireland has furnished the ablest statesmen, the bravest soldiers, the noblest generals and admirals the Empire has known, and yet is held under the iron heel of a tyranny which would have generated rebellion in any other part of the Empire. Ireland asks only the rights and privileges of freedom that have been extended to Canada, and Australia and South Africa and New Zealand—only that and nothing more.

MR. TARTE.

Much interest attaches to the course likely to be taken, by Hon. J. I. Tarte, now that he has retired from the Laurier cabinet. It is stated that Hon. Sifton, Mulock, Fisher, Templeman and Paterson, threatened to resign unless Tarte were dismissed. Whether that be so, or no, his conduct made it impossible for Sir Wilfrid Laurier to retain him as a colleague. Mr. Tarte himself recognizes this, for in an article in La Patrie, which he is now editing, he refers to Sir Wilfrid Laurier in a eulogistic manner, and expresses gratitude to the Premier for all that he did for Mr. Tarte. The ex-Minister says he will remain a supporter of Sir Wilfrid, though on the tariff question he will hold to his own views.

PROSPEROUS OUTLOOK.

From all parts of the province comes news of the renewal of prosperity. The mining and lumbering industries are showing special activity. The outlook has never been more encouraging. E. J. Copley, the popular passenger agent of the C. P. R. is one of the most wide-awake men in the west. He knows well the value of the passenger service, and he is in gratification from Manitoba to British Columbia. Mr. Copley's views are confirmed by T. J. Greenaway, of Manitoba, who says if the proper steps were taken many of the farmers who have made a competency in the Prairie country could be induced to locate in British Columbia.

ABOUT TOURISTS.

The tourist traffic is going to be one of the most valuable assets of the province and should be encouraged in every possible way. It can be made worth as much to the province as the fisheries industry. A tourist association should be formed in Revelstoke to provide attractions for and interest tourists. A steamer trip up Big Bend is a treat of a life time and side trips could be arranged to such Alpine heights as Begbie and Nason, and to the big glacier on the summit of the Shuswap range—one of the most extensive glaciers in the world.

FIRE VALLEY ROAD.

The government deserves great credit for the improvements made on the roads in Fire Valley this season to assist the farmers there. From a mining point of view also the work is of great importance, as the most convenient means of access to the scene of the rich strike on the north fork of Kettle River is by Fire Valley and already one of the biggest mining deals of the season has been effected on a property there. We hope that government will make further provision for the Fire Valley road, so that by next spring a first-class means of access may be provided that route to the Thunder Mountain field.

The irrigation scheme at Kamloops is an enterprise which cannot fail to be attended with magnificent results to the neighbouring city.

THE VISITING BOERS.

Hon. J. D. Prentice has received notice from Ottawa, that the party of representative Boer farmers touring Canada will arrive at Revelstoke about November 5th. Mr. R. M. Palmer will meet them here and show them the agricultural, ranching and fruit districts of Salmon Arm and Okanagan. We suggest that the mayor and aldermen will take the initiative in welcoming the delegates of the latest addition to the British Empire, and show them the hearty goodwill which has greeted their new citizenship even in this far-off section of the Empire.

SELF SACRIFICE.

In a manly, kindly editorial, the Colonist, the leading conservative organ of the province, urges financial provision should be made for Sir Wilfrid Laurier as a duty the country owes him for his public services. Our contemporary says: "Those whom the people delight to honor, it also pleases them to starve. A statesman generally is able to measure the extent of his devotion to his country by the decline of his private fortune. Men may live above money, but they cannot live without it. The honest statesman lives above money, and in ill-health or declining years he has usually to try the hard experiment of living without it."

THE CITY FATHERS.

We believe in giving public men credit when they deserve it, and in showing that their efforts for the public good are fully appreciated. The mayor and council deserve the thanks of the citizens for the way in which they have handled the water and light business, and for extending to the city a reduction in rates to the tariff of Vancouver which is the most up-to-date city in the province. The prompt and progressive action of the council is referred to in the report in another column.

The Victoria Times has made an ass of itself over provincial politics, and its course of action has alienated from it many friends in the interior who are disgusted with the gross unfairness of its editorial columns toward the Dugsmuir government. The last batch of charges it brings against the government is that it is "reckless, incapable, extravagant and corrupt." Now when a newspaper makes charges of that kind it may reasonably be expected to offer some proof, but none is forthcoming. The fact is the Times has been "non compos mentis" since the slating of its Bodwell idol and is hardly responsible for its insane ravings.

The presentation by the trackmen to Bro. Jos. Lennon, of Agassiz, is a fitting recognition of the able service rendered that branch of the railway service by Mr. Lennon both during the strike of last year and the arbitration proceedings this year. Bro. Lennon was a cool-headed loyal representative of his fellow-workers, and he well deserved the honor paid him.

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

T. Ludgate, who is interested in the big sawmill project at Arrowhead, arrived in the city on Sunday.
