Inlet Waters Claim Victim Near Wharf

DROWNED NEAR SHORE

Chris. Matthews of Reserve Falls from Launch and Sinks.

BODY SOON RECOVERED

Efforts to Resuscitate Him Were Unavailing.

The waters of Masset inlet claimed another victim Saturday when Christopher Matthews, a member of the Haida band of Indians, met his death near the Masset wharf.

Matthews, Henry Edenshaw and Douglass Edenshaw left the Indian village shortly after noon on Saturday to transact some business at Masset. Just before reaching the wharf here Matthews came up from the cabin, and in some way lost his footing and fell overboard. Henry Edenshaw, who was at the wheel, heard some one shout that there was a man overboard and immediately put the boat around.

No one noticed Matthews fall from the launch, but several heard the splash. Matthews came to the surface once after falling overboard. He evidently could not swim and was thrashing the water with his hands in an effort to remain afloat. He was then seen to throw up his hands and his body sank.

C. M. Adam of Graham Centre was just about docking his launch when the accident occurred. He got his boat out to where Matthews had disappeared and after some time by the aid of a pike pole, located the body in about eight feet of water and brought it to the surface. The body was still warm. Arthur Robertson, James Cauthers, Al Orr, Sam Ives and several others began the work of resuscitation and Dr. Graves was at once summoned. The usual methods were employed by emptying the lungs of water and Dr. Graves and his assistants worked many hours in an unavailing effort to restore life.

The relatives of Matthews at the village were notified and a large number came from the village.

By this time Dr. Graves was convinced that Matthews had passed to the beyond but some of the dead man's relatives were not satisfied. The body was brought to Martin's warehouse where hot water and other appliances were used but by 5 o'clock in the evening hope was abandoned. Then followed the customary keening of the Indians — principally women — and

the weirdness of their moaning and sobbing was pitiful to behold and listen to.

The body was taken to the Indian village that evening and an inquest was held Sunday by Coroner Harrison and a jury. Some of the witnesses were inclined to censure Mr. Edenshaw for not having a dinghy with him, but it was shown that it was the custom of owners of gasoline launches, plying between the village and Masset, to use their discretion in this matter. A verdict of accidental death was returned.

The deceased was about 25 years of age and a stepson of Wm. Matthews, a well known resident of Masset reserve. The funeral was held yesterday afternoon from the Indian village and was very largely attended.

In The Leader's report of the hospital building meeting last week the name of Indian Agent Thomas Deasy was inadvertently omitted as a member of the building committee. This committee will begin work shortly after New Year's and contemplate doing much work before spring.

CHRISTMAS WEATHER.

Few sections of the earth were so nicely favored with fine weather as Graham Island during Christmas week and for many weeks prior thereto. There was just enough tinge of frost in the atmosphere at nights to make a blanket comfortable, but there was not a particle of snow and the sun smiled down o'days on a bright green-clad island that looked good to the man who had left his snow-covered home in the prairies to take up his residence here.

A number of pleasant Christmas dinners in Masset were features of the anniversary. The hotels kept open house and served splendid meals while a very large number of private dinner parties were given, the hosts excelling themselves in entertaining their guests. Wild geese, wild duck and turkey graced the board of many houses here on Christmas day.

Christmas services were held at noon today by Rev. W. Hogan at the Anglican church, the sacred edifice being comfortably filled with worshippers. Special musical numbers were rendered by a choir and Rev. Mr. Hogan delivered a powerful address, all of which was much appreciated by the large audience. The church was nicely decorated for the occasion.

Railway to Oil Fields on the Yakoun River

The Vancouver Sun of Dec. 13 contains an article stating that plans for a six-mile railway running from Rennell sound to the oil fields on the Yakoun river have been financed by San Francisco and Portland capitalists, the promoter being Mr. C. D. Emmons. The same interests, it is also asserted, are planning to start operations boring for oil near the Wilson and Robertson camps.

The Leader hopes that the news is true and that the capitalists mean business. We believe that oil and coal in paying quantities will be found on Graham Island but the finding will necessitate the expenditure of a very large sum of money. The people of Graham Island will warmly welcome capital to be spent in the development of legitimate industries and it is hoped that this new company proposing to develop the oil fields will enter upon the work as speedily as possible and make a success of the enterprise.

Services were held last Sunday evening in the dining room of the St. Ives hotel by Rev. L. A. Bygrave of the Presbyterian church, the spacious room being thronged. Mrs. O. W. M. Hughes assisted by Mr. Thomas and the congregation rendered several selections pertaining to the Yule festival. Another Sunday night service is being planned by Mr. Bygrave.

MIDNIGHT MASS.

Rev. Father McDonald celebrated midnight mass Christmas morning at Union Hall, Delkatlah. The attendance was large, it being the celebration on the island of midnight mass. Father McDonald delivered an eloquent sermon on occasion, taking for his text the birth of the child Jesus and exhorting his hearers to bring up their children in the fear of the almighty and teach them to be true in mind and heart. He also made a plea to all to give liberal support to the clergymen of the land who were combatting the powers of evil and the advances of atheism and concluded with his hearty good wishes for a Merry Christmas.

A special song service was one of the features of the mass, several ladies and gentlemen supplying the talent. At the close of the service Messrs. C. Harrison and C. M. Wilson made brief addresses eulogizing Father McDonald and his work on the island.

Ben. Edinger, a preceptor at Nadu, was in town last week. Mr. Edinger likes the country so well that he sent back to his old home in Idaho a number of copies of The Leader, with invitations to come north and grow up with the country.

Mr. and Mrs. Hauser and four children arrived on the last boat to take up a home at Echo Lake, near Woden. Mrs. Hauser is a sister of Mrs. Ries Dill of Woden.

Entertainment Was Splendid Success

The entertainment given Tuesday evening at the school house under the auspices of the Overseas club was a very successful affair indeed and afforded a great deal of pleasure, not only to the school children, but to all the older people who attended—and their number was gauged by the capacity of the school room.

Mr. C. Harrison acted as chairman and no better selection could have been made. His witty sallies brought down the house repeatedly and he entered into the spirit of the Christmas festivities of the evening with all the ardor of a school boy.

The program began with a song by little Misses Davis, Barrett and Carter, followed by a selection by Mr. Wilfrid Hughes. Rev. Mr. Bygrave gave a reading from Dickens and Mrs. Harrison read a tale in a pleasing manner. Harold Orr gave a recitation and Mr. Condon followed with two selections. Mr. Thorne accompanied on the piano. "On the Road to Mandalay" was rendered in an excellent voice by Mr. Davidson who was enthusiastically cheered. Selections were also given by Master Clarence Martin and by the Misses Kathleen and Rita Martin and by Mr. H. A. Lamb.

Father McDonald was called upon for an address and responded in a very happy manner. The speaker very cleverly handed the chairman, Mr. Harrison, a few verbal bouquets and feelingly referred to the pleasure all felt at having Mr. and Mrs. Harrison take such an active interest in everything pertaining to the welfare of our island here. Mr. Harrison, later, in fitting words, handed the bouquet right back to the reverend father and honors were declared even.

The distribution of presents for the school children from the overflowing Christmas tree was then made, with Mr. Condon in the role of Santa Claus.

Before closing Mr. Harrison referred to the efficient work being accomplished by the school teacher, Mr. Thomas Richards, and called for three cheers for the popular instructor which, with a tiger, were given with hearty good will by the children. The singing of the national anthem concluded the program.

ALBERT WILL ARRIVE JAN. 5

Schedule Again Changed After an Urgent Protest Is Made.

MESSAGE TO CLEMENTS

Brings Answer from Vancouver that Albert Will Be Sent.

When the Prince Albert arrived here on Dec. 18, the announcement was made that orders had been sent from headquarters cancelling her trip here on January 1, which would mean that the people of the island would be without mail and transportation facilities between Dec. 18 and Jan. 15.

Mr. C. Harrison, Mr. J. Martin and others, immediately began to begin to interest themselves, the result being that a lengthy wireless was sent to Mr. Clements, M. P., protesting against the action of the G. T. P. in withdrawing the Albert for the next run and citing the necessities of the people here in the matter of transportation and especially at this season of the year.

Yesterday morning Mr. Martin received a wireless message from J. O. McLeod, mail superintendent at Vancouver reading as follows: "Prince Albert leaving here New Year's day. Makes Rupert and Masset trip."

This response to the message sent Mr. Clements was pleasantly received by the people of the inlet. Allowing four days for the trip the Albert should touch at Masset on or before Monday, Jan. 5.

A wireless was also received by Mr. Martin from Albert Davidson, agent at Prince Rupert, stating that the Prince Albert would leave there for Masset at midnight January 4th, which would bring her here, with fair weather, early on the morning of Jan. 5th.

On behalf of the people of the northern end of Graham island, Mr. Martin wired Mr. Clement their thanks for the latter's interest in the matter of securing transportation at this season of the year. It was entirely due to his activity that the people of the inlet were not required to wait for a whole month to receive their mail and the merchants their supplies.

The ladies are organizing a masquerade to be held New Year's night. Everybody welcome and a good time promised. Lunch will be served by the ladies.

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Synopsis of Coal Mining Regulations

COAL Mining rights of the Dominion, in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories, and the portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the agent or sub-agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year. The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an acre.

For full information application should be made to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, or to any agent or sub-agent of the Dominion lands.

A New Transcontinental Railroad
 Edmonton, Alta., Dec. 5.—Private advices from London are that financial arrangements have been completed in England to build the Alberta, Peace River and Eastern railway, from Hudson's Hope to the Pacific ocean, 2,800 miles by way of Edmonton and Peace River Crossing, with a branch line to Fort McMurray. H. Musket King, vice president of the railway company and H. H. Williams, chief engineer, who have been in England since last summer, are expected to return to Edmonton the latter part of this month. A meeting of the shareholders has been called in Edmonton for December 29, but as all the stock is held in Great Britain, it will be adjourned to London. The promoters of the railroad claim it will be the shortest transcontinental line on the North American continent. The promoters have been over the project

ed line between Edmonton and the Peace River country and it is announced that everything is in readiness to begin work.

"Next time I saw the editor he was galloping along, followed by the schoolmarm, who was yelling at every jump, that she never taught a she bear in her life."

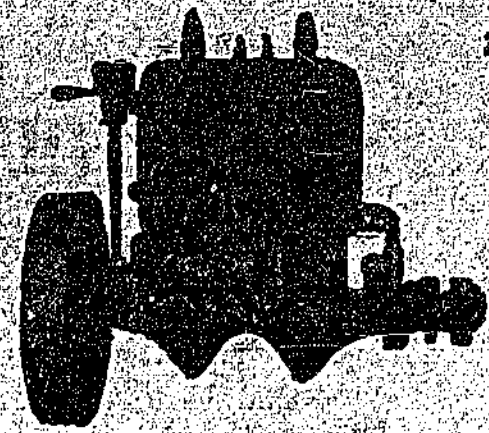
