## SILVER KING DEAL IS FIXED

## THE OOMPANY IS ORGANIZED WITH A CAPITAL STOOK OF $\$ 2,000,000$

The Delay Was occasioned by geeason of the Death of Dre Who was Interested. The Terms of the Sale will Nett diach of the thirteen molders of the Hall Enterest $\$ 33,000$ in Cash.

The incorporation of the Silver King Mining Company will shortly be announced. The company has at last been successfully organized with a capital stock of $\$ 2,000,000$.
Of this stock Franklin Farrel and Ebenezer Ramsay control $\$ 500,000$ worth.

The recent delay has been due to the death of one of the wealthiest capitalists interested. His holding was $\$ 400,000$ worth of stock. He unfortunately met with a fatal accident while out riding, and the negotiations were delayed for about a month, while the matter was being arranged with his executors.
The original holders of the mine have been bought out on a basis of half stock and half cash, the purchase price being $\$ 1,800,000$. This will nett each to the owners of the Hall interest $\$ 34,000$ in cash, and a like amount in stock.

A letter was received from J. Macdonald last night in which he says he expects to be back in Nelson within a few weeks.

## CHANGES BN MINBIRAE ACT

It is probable that three stakes will be required in locating and that the prospector will be required to sink a discovery shaft, having sixty days to perfect his location hefore coding.

By an order-in-council the Federal government has placed a reserve on certain Dominion land at Moss Creek, B. C. This is for the pur pose of establishing a reservoir and other works to further the breeding of salmon in the province.

W. Springer has just concluded a deal in the interests of P. Porter and J. A. Finch, of Wallace, Idaho, with Aldric Dalpe, P. Augrignou and S. Roy, theowners of the Royal Canadian. He has secure an option on that property till April 15, when a substantial payment is to be made according to the conditions of the agreement.
There is little doubt but that the bond will be taken up and the property worked in the begining of the spring.
The Royal Canadian was located on Dec. 20, 1889, and is still held by the original holders. It is situated between Forty-Nine and Eaglecreeks, about seven miles south west of Nelson. and has always had the reputation of being one of most promising prosects on the gold belt.
Very rich free milling gold specimens have been taken from it, and the considerable developement work done on the claim gives every indication of a continuous ore body of fair size.
This bond is one of the many symptoms which point to a revived interest during 93 in the wonderfal gold belt which exists a few miles sonthwest of Nelson,

Speculators who are looking for gold in West Kootenay will do well to overhall the developed prospects around Nelson before they hunt for miraculons surface showings in other parts of the country.

## WEST KOOTGNAY'S APMPIEOPDEIATIGNS

Fhe Latest Arvices from the capitai Say Thatenf District is to Mave But $\mathbf{\$ 3 0 . 0 9 0}$.
West Kootenay has been placed in the Gov ernment Estimates for $\$ 30.000$. This is the lat est advice from the capital. The sum may be increased in the supplementary estimates, but little reliance can be placed on such a hope, as the District has not a sufficient "pull" with the powers that be to gain much in the reneral scramble for appropriations to secure such pub lic works as are needed in every District in the Province.
The small amount of the appropriation will be a sad disappointinent to the people of West Kootenay, who expected at least double the amount of the appropriation. No District in the interior contributes one-third of the revonue that West Kootenay does, and it is much to be regretted if the Government does not undo the wrong has done the District in the first daft of the estimates.

AN $\$ 8,000$ doulit T HOHSE FOR NELSON.
Winl Salve to some megrec the Feelings of the people of Rootenay's Leading City.
There is one item in the estimates which will prove very welcome reading to the people of Nelson. That is the provision for the erection of an $\$ 8000$ court house in this city.

Whether this amount is covered in the $\$ 30$, 000 appropriation for the district, or whether it will come in under the head of sopplementary estimates is not known.
The Government will appoint a Supreme Court Registrar for West Kootenay, and will station him in Nelson.
This will prove of great convenience to the District and will enable persons so wishing to issue writs here.

Sam I. Silverman, of Spokane has sold a one twelfth interest in the Slocan Boy to William Lynch for $\$ 5,000$.
A mining exchange is again talked of for Spokane. The plan suggested is an exchange with fifteen or twent y seats, and a capital stock of $\$ 25,000$ for the first banking account.
The company which lately purchased the War Eagle mine for $\$ 420,000$, are arranging for the erection of acomplete smelter at Fort Sheppard, which is to handle the ores of that vicinity.
Aclan $G$ Thurman, the ex-United states Senator has hit upon what he terms the solution of the silver question. He would make the standard silver dollar the basis for national bank note circulation. This, he holds, with a free coinage law, would bring silver at a parity with gold at once.
The low price of silver is the reason assigued for the closing down of the Bunker Hill and Sullivan mines in the Cour d'Alene. Eight hundred are throwa out of elliployment. They are non-union men who took the striker's places after the recent labor disturbance. Many of the higher grade mines are expected to follow the example of the Bunker Hill and Sullivan.
Hoke Smith, a member of the Cleveland Cabinet, in what many consider an inspired editoral in the Atlanta Constutition outlines the silver policy of the new administration: "The president has served distinct and emphatic notice that he would hammer with his veto every free silver bill that congress might pass, and there will be the crucial test of the administration.
There is nothing in Professor Peters opinion of Butte mines which can be taken as pleasant medicine by their owners: "The richer ores found near the surface and resulting from the action of the elements on sulphide ore are nearly worked out. "All Butte mine owners must be prepared to handle an ore that does not give above five per cent of copper and possibly five ounces of silver."

 Hor Working Dry Filacers.
A transfer of a seventh interest in the Tom Gawley, Katie C., Lizzie, and Azelia placer claims was recently made in Butte to Cal G. Pingle, a jeveller, and J. H. Leyson. The claims are situate about five miles southwest of Butte, and are said to be very rich in gold and sapphires, but the lack of water in that neighborhood is a serious drawback to their being protitably worked.

Pingle has been working for some time on a machine to extract the yellow metal from the ground without the aid of water. He thirks he has been successful. He will experiment this spring. If the machine accomplishes one-half of what he experts it will there will be a bonanza in it for the jeweller.

## INCORPORATION.

Incorporation has been booming in Nelson this week. The number of people who are begining to see of how much importance incorporation is to the town, is increasing. A good fat subscription list has been worked up, and there are many promises of doubled subscriptions if necessary.
R. E. Lemon will leave in a day or two for Victonia. When there he will arrange for having the necessary work of searching the records done. He will also give some of his own time toward putting the matter in shape.
A little public spirit, a little nnanimity, a little liberality, and a great deal of energy will put the matter through, and Nelson may congratulate herself that these are forthcoming.

## CREDITABLE PROCEEDINGS.

Two things have happened last week in which the people of West Kootenay must take great satisfaction and for which credit is, due to the Provincial and Dominion legislators. The one of these is the course adopted towards the burning question of the New Denver townsite, by the Provincial government, and the other, the anomoncement by Sir John Thompson, that the Dominion government would not oppose the granting of Dominion charter to the promoters of the Nelson \& Fort Sheppard railway.
Regarding the first of these we consider the action of the Government very satisfactory. The question might have been settled, so far as the legality of the disputed claims was concerned, in the recesses of the land office. The Government, in the now repealed statue, regarding the purchase of land, while it apparently contracted to grant land under certain conditions, really reserved to itself the power to reserve the land or grant it. away from the original locator, or in short do as it thought fit with it.
This particular dispute was however investigated by a Parliamentary committee, a tribunal eminently qualified to give an unbiassed judgment on the evidence submitted. It points to a healthy condition of public affairs that the question was ventilated in this way, and not smothered in the intricacies of a department.

As to the N. \& F. S. railway's Dominion charter, when Sir John Thompson, chairman of the railway committee, refused to grant the charter last year, it was on the ground that the country's obligations to the C. P. R. required the Government to protect the company's West Kootenay preserve for one year longer.
It was of course very pleasant and just that West Kootenay should have to pay off Canada's obligations to the C..P. R. in this way. The political logic that the necessities of the West
should be made to meet the convenience of the East, is we believe not altogether confined to Canada.
The great point however is that the year has elapsed, that the N. \&.F.S. railway is now to have its charter. For all the advantage taken by the C. P. R. of their privilege Corbin's road might just as well have had it last year, but the road in afl probability would not have been built any sooner. So alls well that ends well.
Let Corbin get in and build his road and then we shall see the C. P. R. in the unusal position of having to recover lost ground.

## CURRENT COMAENTS.

Grover Cleveland's cabinet seemingly does not altogether jibe with the Republican idea of what a cabinet should be. Once it was labeled a servile party heeler's cabinet, and now it is denounced as an altogether personal combine of of Girover's.
Albert Grignard, of Ottawa has invented a process affecting the lithographic art which can produce pict ures embracing 15 and 18 colors in one, and at the inost, three impressione. The process has been sold to an American syndicate for $\$ 1,000,000$.
The Provincial Legislature has resolved to petition the Federal government on behalf of B. C. Southern railway to secure if possible the customary subsidy of $\$ 3200$ per mile. The company's lines as proposed amount to something over 200 miles.
Now that the promoters of the Nelson \& Fort Sheppard railway have received Sir John Tompson's assurance that the government will not oppose their application for a charter they can have no other excuse for delaying the work of construction.
The Provincial courts have decided that owing to a defect in Vancouver's charter the bonns of $\$ 300,000$ voted by the people to the Northern Pacific railroad cannot be paid. It remains with the government now to say whether the wishes of the people shall be carried out or not.
Brown, the New Westminster member in the Provincial Legislature is a bit of a socalist in his way. This session he endeavored to establish manhood and residential suffrage in the municipality of Westminster, so that those who have no property interests may have the power of encumbering the property of their more wealthy neighbor. Brown's scheme was promptly sat upon by the government.

It occupies a sheet $40 \times 26$ inches, and is the most complete map of any district in B. O. The centre of the map is taker up by an index map of West Kootenay, from longitude 116.30 to 118. 30, and from latitude 49 to vorth of 51. This plan shows the geological formation, and the directlon and localities of known minerel belts, railway routes actual and projected are markad; also thatelephone system, and on the lakes the also thetelephone system, and on the lakes the
routes of the navigation companies. All trails routes of the navigation companies. An tra
and known passes have alsobeen indicated. and knowu passes bave a the located in the Lardoand Duncan The claims located in the Lardo and Duncan
river country, so far as they are known have been placed on the index plan, and also the Spillinichene river and the McMurdo inineral district.
An error of two and a half miles was discovered between the river Colmmbia and Kootenay lake, and by accepting Dawson's longitude of Sproat's landing as correctit has shifted Kootenay lake three miles east of the 117 th meridian. It was fonnd that a true azimuth of Kootenay lake from Pilot Bay to the boundary, and a through traverse from Kaslo to Nakusp agreed with the alteration, and the N. \&. F. The remainder of the right hand side of the map is monopalized by the Toad Mountain district, embracing from Ward's Fery to Nelson, and as far south as Red Monitain. "This is on a scale of one mile to the inch. Some idea of the minuteness of the work on the plan may be gathered from this fact, the townsite of Netson is accurately plotted, and the churches, ganl, motor-house, reservoir, school-house, depot, lamber- yard, and sawnill are all located on it,
