ORANGEMEN GO TO CHURCH.

And Listen to an Eloquent Discourse on Orangeism by Rev. McIntyre.

Sunday being the anniversary of the decisive battle between King William and James at the Boyne in Ireland, the Orangemen of the city attended the Methodist church where a special sermon was preached by Rev. R. J. McIntyre, pastor. As a brother of the society he understood his subject well and gave a very entertaining and instructive address well worth listening to. He took his text from Deuteronomy, and dealt chiefly on a remembrance of historic events, reviewing history bearing on the question of British civil and religious liberty and showing the several attempts the Roman Catholics had made to bring England again into subjection to the Pope. The Spanish Armada, the gunpowder plot and other attempts which had all been, by God's special providence, total failures, while the persecution of our forefathers through the Spanish inquisition were touched upon. The constitution of the Orange order received the greater share of his discourse. The aims and objects were forcibly brought out, showing the order to be founded upon broadminded and liberal principles. He expressed his regret that all Orangemen were not as good as they ought to be, but what society can lay claim to perfection in its members? Even among Christ's disciples there was a black sheep. The objection of some people to keeping in remembrance this day he met strongly, by showing from scripture that the Passover was a remembrance of the freedom of the Children of Israel from the bondage of Egypt by God's special providence.

He next compared the other benefit and kindred societies in their relationship to one and another and their influence in the world, and the good the L. O. J. had done, he concluded by calling upon all Orangemen to let their lives be more in keeping with their constitution and reform.

It is not publicly known, but the Slocan district has in prospect a smelter and refining works somewhere adjacent to its mines. If the parties who are now in the country looking quietly over the field with a view to the erection of both lead and zinc smelting works are fully impressed with justification for such works, one will be built not many miles from Sandon. The people who are at the back of the proposition are from New York City and have abundance of available capital to carry through successfully any such undertaking. We are not at liberty to give any particulars than those already mentioned, but if the encouragement looks anyway bright to them next spring at the latest, will witness the comstart on smelting works of sufficient proportions to reduce and refine any tonnage that can be produced from the mines of this camp.

Last Chance Again Works.

The Last Chance mine after a years period of idleness has resumed operations and is now added to the regular working mines of the district. A force of ten men were put to work on Monday and will be gradually increased as room is made for them in the workings.

The St. Leon Hot Springs.

The St. Leon Hot Springs has been opened and is now ready to accommodate visitors.

Liberals to Meet.

There will be a meeting of the Liberals in the city hall on Tuesday evening next at 8 o'clock. All Liberals and others in sympathy with the Liberal party are cordially requested to attend.

Mines and Mining

The Boundary mines complain of car shortage to ship their ores.

The Antoine mine in McGuigan basin is to have a 1600 foot tunnel run to tap that well known property at greater depth. Tenders are being called.

The Wakefield mine will shortly increase its force to 70 miners. Manager Lane expects to ship 250 tons of ore per month and will make the first shipment next week, when the car will be sent to Nelson.

The idle handroaster at the Trail smelter will again be in operation in a few days, followed by the blowing in of another furnace as the ore is again being shipped to their works.

The United States is beginning to purchase large quantities of silver for Philippine coinage and if continued which there appears to be no question, will be the means of sending up the price of silver.

B. C. Riblet, of Nelson, the well known constructor of aerial tramways and the largest operator in this line in the west has obtained the contract to build the line for the Nettie L. His success with the Eva and Ophir-Lade and others is well known.

Tin was discovered in Alaska about two years ago. Various samples assayed show no gold of commercial value. One sample gave metallic tin, 49 per cent, iron 3.70 and copper 3.00 per cent. Efforts will be made this fall to thoroughly examine the tin finds to see if they can be made to pay.

The total ore shipments from the Boundary district mines for the first six months of this year, from January to July, inclusive, were 274,265 tons. Although this is not what might have been shipped owing to the Coke shortage, it is nevertheless a substantial increase for the same period of last year.

Capitalists of Minnesota are having their attention drawn to the Poplar Creek district, the recent gold district, and reports from private sources state that a great amount of Minnesota Capital will go into the district if the reports of their representative, who is already in the field investing, are at all encouraging.

The Mining Review.

SATURDAY, JULY 11, 1903.

The general losses sustained throughout Canada by the depreciation of industrial stocks in this country has not brought the Ottawa government to a realization of protecting her steel and iron industries. When urged repeatedly to give the fullest measure of protection, the government has invariably turned a deaf ear to appeals. In consequence of this negligence millions upon millions of dollars have been lost to the country, and industries representing an investment of immense sums are threatened with utter destruction. The iron and steel industries are on the verge of collapse, yet the Liberal government stands idly by gazing upon the impending wreck. The production of iron and steel has been largely instrumental in placing Great Britain, Germany and United in the front ranks of the commercial world, and it is from these countries that Canada derives her supply of such commodities. A few years ago great works were erected at Sydney and the "Soo" with the expectation and cutting out foreign importation of securing the trade within the Canadian borders. All that was requisite to make them prosperous was "adequate protection. This has been denied and the men who hope to become a public benefactor by building up Canada have been penalized for having faith in Canada's future.

When the Liberals came into power the taxes of the people were to be reduced. Since coming into power what do we find? For the past twelve months they have been from Customs alone \$26,619,659 or \$4,566,867 more than in 1902. That is the result of a tariff for revenue only. In 1896 under a protective tariff Canadians were called upon to contribute \$20,255,335 in Customs taxes. So that under the new order of things our taxes in one department alone have gone up \$16,364,314 a year. These facts pretty thoroughly dispose of the specious argument that increased duties mean increased taxation. The very reverse has resulted under the Liberal regime. And the worse feature of the fiscal policy now in vogue, is that the people are paying millions more each year for the privilege of enriching foreign manufacturers whose wares they purchase. The whole system is bad and under its vicious principles taxation must continue to grow.

A rumor has been current this week in the camp to the effect that the Canadian smelters are about to raise the smelter charges on the treatment of

Slocan lead ores, presumably in consequence of the Dominion government not allotting the smelters any portion of the bounty just granted. To say the least the report should be put down as absurd. Of all times to raise the smelting rates the present is the most inopportune, as they have the attention of the public over the question of already charging exorbitant prices, and if they were inclined to do so now it is reasonable to suppose they would seek a more fitting time when circumstances were more favorable for it.

The Conservative Platform.

(Adopted at Revelstoke, September 12th, 1902.)

1. That this convention reaffirms the policy of the party in matters of provincial roads and trails; the ownership and control of railways and the development of the agricultural resources of the province as laid down in the platform adopted in October, 1899, which is as follows:

"To actively aid in the construction of trails throughout the undeveloped portions of the province and the building of provincial trunk roads of public necessity.

"To adopt the principles of government ownership of railways in so far as the circumstances of the province will admit, and the adoption of the principle that no bonus should be granted to any railway company which does not give the government of the province control of rates over lines bonused, together with the option of purchase.

"To actively assist by state aid in the development of the agricultural resources of the province.

2. That in the meantime and until the railway policy above set forth can be accomplished, a general railway act be passed, giving freedom to construct railways under certain approved regulations, analogous to the system that has resulted in such extensive railway construction in the United States, with so much advantage to trade and commerce.

3. That to encourage the mining industry, the taxation of metalliferous mines should be on the basis of a percentage on the net profits.

4. That the government ownership of telephone systems should be brought about as a first step in the acquisition of public utilities.

5. That a portion of every coal area hereafter to be disposed of should be reserved from sale or lease, so that state owned mines may be easily accessible, if their operation becomes necessary or advisable.

6. That in the pulp land leases provision should be made for afforestation, and that steps should be taken for the general preservation of forests by guarding against the wasteful destruction of timber.

7. That the legislature and government of the province should persevere in the effort to secure the exclusion of Asiatic labor.

8. That the matter of better terms in the way of subsidy and appropriations for the province should be vigorously pressed upon the Dominion government.

9. That the silver-lead industries of the province be fostered and encouraged by the imposition of increased customs duties on lead and lead products imported into Canada, and that the conservative members of the Dominion House be urged to support any motion introduced for such a purpose.

10. That as industrial disputes almost invariably result in great loss and injury to the parties directly concerned and to the public, legislation should be passed to provide means for an amicable adjustment of such disputes between employers and employees.

11. That it is advisable to foster the manufacture of the raw products of the province within the province as far as practicable by means of taxation on the said raw products, subject to rebate of the same in whole or part when manufactured in British Columbia.

Conservative Conventions.

At a meeting of the executive of the Provincial Conservative Association, held in Vancouver, the province was divided into five divisions for organization purposes. The Kootenay Division division is made up of the following provincial election districts: Revelstoke, Columbia, Fernie, Cranbrook, Ymir, Kaslo, Shuswap, Grand Forks, the City of Rossland and the City of Nelson. At the same meeting the following resolutions were adopted:

1. That conventions for nominating candidates for members of the legislative assembly be made up of delegates chosen as follows:

(a) In city electoral districts, one delegate for every fifty and fraction of fifty votes polled at the provincial election held in 1900, and if the city is divided into wards, the proportion of delegates for each ward shall be based on the vote polled in each ward at the last municipal election.

(b) In other electoral districts, one delegate for every fifty or fraction of fifty votes polled at the provincial election held in 1900, the delegates to be apportioned to polling places, or as near thereto as will be fair to the voters of the different neighborhoods.

2. The election of delegates shall be at public meetings held at a designated central place in each polling division, or in each ward in city electoral districts, if the city is divided into wards. At such public meetings only those who pledge themselves to vote for the candidate or candidates elected at the nominating convention shall be entitled to a vote for delegates.

3. Two weeks notice shall be given of the public meetings at which delegates are to be elected, and nominating conventions shall be held in city electoral districts two days after the day on which delegates are elected, and in other electoral districts seven days after. All nominations throughout the province to be made at a designated central place in each electoral district and on the same day.

4. All notices of the date of public meetings for the election of delegates to nominating conventions, the apportionment of delegates, and the place and date of nominating conventions in the several electoral districts shall be prepared by the member of the executive of the division in which the electoral districts are situated, and issued over the names of the president and secretary of the Provincial Conservative Association.

A meeting of the provincial executive will be held at Vancouver within a month, and the date for holding district nominating conventions will then be fixed.
