Mining Notes.

W. Blakemore, the expert of the Similkameen Valley Coal Co., reports that he has struck two seams of coal, one six and one four feet thick, on the company's property. These seams were located with a diamond drill.

F. Bailey reports an important find of grey copper on his Gold Braid claim, near the Providence, in Providence camp.

The Sunset smelter at Boundary Falls has decided to order a second furnace which will be installed and in operation early next January. This will give the plant a capacity of 800 tons daily.

The Monitor and Ajax Fraction.

The Monitor and Ajax Fraction are being written up in the London mining press, and the record of the Three Forks property justifies it. The ore chute is holding its own, and for the 11 months ending July 31st the total shipments were 903 tons, and its value \$71,363.

The crosscut tunnel being driven at the foot of the shaft on this promising property is now 20 feet in, all in ore with no sign of a wall. The character of the ore continues of the same high quality, and the owners, who have a strong force of men at work on the property, are naturally feeling jubilant over the continued evidence of the value and permanent nature of their find. Iron Deposits at Crawford Bay.

Geo. W. Taylor and E. Peters returned Tuesday to Nelson from Crawford Bay, having located a number of claims on a large lead of iron carbonates. They went in the week before from Crawford Bay, and although greatly hampered by the weather encountered were most successful in finding what they were searching for. The lead is 100 feet wide and the ore on the surface is 30 per cent iron. The strike of the lead is north and south, which is different from the hematite iron leads discovered to southward of Crawford Bay, which run east and west.

COUNCIL MATTERS.

The main cause leading to the city council's present discomfiture is its dominating spirit of prejudice and fight. It must not be understood that in this connection we refer to the members personally, nor to even all of them officially, for as citizens many of the members are respected men, and some of them present and past have been regarded as capable officials. What we refer to is the dominating spirit of the board. For instance, so prejudiced against this paper for simply doing its duty to the public, as we see it, but not as they see it, have been the leading spirits of the council, that they stultified their own records and resolutions, in fact, repudiated them, that they might reach this publication financially. Next they put the city to heavy expense, ignorantly, it is true in bogus elections, water right preparations, &c., &c., without any audit of the clerk's accounts since March last, though the law calls for it quarterly, for personal gratification. They even yet propose to sink the place in an extra water system that can never pay one per cent interest on the money, to reach J. M. Harris with a poisoned dart. Of course the people will never carry the bylaw, but all the same like certain fish going up a creek to spawn, they will climb the rocks as far as possible to give vent to personal animosity. Gentlemen, unless you want to become the laughing stock of the country, drop this, and come down to reasonable business. None of the most responsible taxpayers of the place will take office in the council while this spirit of prejudice is paramount, and no city or town can prosper while the proverbial Kilkenny cat element leads in public matters. A pull all together can make Sandon a smart business place, but with personal dynamite ever exploding in the centre fragments will be all over, and may at any time be found. We may not be thanked for this advice, but it is not thanks we are after, simply a discharge of duty.

A Mistaken Notion.

Taking as a text the line "a little learning is a dangerous thing," a contemporary argues unless that one can get a complete scientific education he is better off with none at all. This is a mistake—a little learning is not "a dangerous thing." It beats none at all; and the more scientific knowledge one has in mining or metallurgy the better miner or metallurgist he is. Nowadays science is required in everything. There is a science in buying a burro or sinking a shaft or making an ore car or building an air compressor. There is nothing secret or sacred about science. Whenever one gets a new idea of any value he has acquired just so much more practical science. Science is simply organized knowledge, and the prospector and miner who never saw the inside of a "scientific" institution may exercise the latest scientific methods in his work—if he knows them. Ordinarily those scientific methods are learned by study and experience, by practice and observation; and whether the college or university be a crowded building or a lonely cabin or the 1,200 foot level of a shaft, the real student is acquiring and learning "science" that will stand him in good stead all his life. The time has gone by when the present scientist can sneer at the "common man," or the rank and file can justly hold aloof from the benefits conferred by real science. The true scientist is always anxious to have all enjoy the advancement afforded by general knowledge, and the progressive miner or mechanic or metallurgist is always eager for the further knowledge that can be acquired only by assiduous scientific study. And when it comes to terms, what is meant by "a little?" Were any of us able and willing to acquire continuous knowledge for a century of existence, he would then be possessed of but "a little," comparatively. Encouragement and not discouragement to scientific research is needed, and that silly line about "a little learning" being "dangerous" should be blotted out.—Mining and Scientific Press.

Where Our Labor Leaders Go.

Professor Felix Adler thinks that the labor movement in this country suffers from the poor quality of its leaders. "The rank and file, he says, "are superior to the rank and file in England, but English leaders are superior to the labor leaders in this country. The success of the movement depends on evolution to a higher type of leader."

In that case the success of the movement is problematical, for there is one insuperable bar to the development of the higher type of labor leadership in America. It results from the very superiority of American conditions. There are no fixed classes in this country, and there is no limit to a workingman's possible advancement. In England, the ablest members of the working class only aspire to the leadership of trades unions. In this country they cease to be wage-earners and become managers of factories, heads of trusts, or capitalists. In England Mr. Schwab would probably have become a president of a union. In this country he has been entrusted with the control of \$1,400,000,000, of capital, and is an opponent of the unions.

In the new organizations of American industry every workingman is under the continuous observation of his superiors, who are constantly on the lookout for ability. Every one who shows more capacity than his fellows is promoted. When the cream is thus continually rising and being skimmed off there must naturally be skim milk behind. In a country in which class lines are permanent, and in which a man once a laborer is always a laborer, this disadvantage, of course, does not exist, but most Americans would think an ably managed system of labor organizations dearly bought at the cost of the division of society into petrified castes. They prefer to leave the marshal's baton in the knapsack of every private in the industrial army, even if the leadership of the unions should suffer a little in consequence.—Saturday Evening Post.
