## ICE HARVEST HAS BEGUN

One Thousand Tons for a Starter.

## MAY GET BIG CONTRACT

Messrs. Hawke & Brenton and Mr. Niederstadt form Partnership to Operate.

The ice harvest on Moyie lake has commenced. Messrs. Hawke & Brenton and Joseph Niederstadt have formed a partnership. They already have contracts for one thousand tons of ice. Some of this, of course, will be shipped to outside points, a good portion of it going to Cranbrook and Marysville. The same parties still have the 50,000 ton contract from the C. P. E. in view and the chances are favorable for their getting it.

Only married men who are residents of the town will be given employment, and 30 cents an hour will be the wages paid. They are getting 70 cents a ton for their ice loaded on the cars here.

### Cronin "Jollied" the Reporter.

James Cronin, manager of the St. Eugene, is at the Fair, and reports that there is considerable excitement over the large crop of ice on Lake Moyie, on which the town is pleturequely located, says the Nelson Miner. Some of the prospectors are studying out plans for taking up mineral claims on the lake in order that they may be able to harvest the ice. The stakes will stand while the ice lasts all right, but the trouble is that a thaw sets them afloat and some are thinking of getting out piles and hiring a pile driver so as to get over the difficulty. Mineral in place is another difficulty, but it is suggested that divers can locate the ledges, which, it is alleged, cross from one side of the lake to the other. The ice crop is very large and profitable one considerable of it is being harvested, and one large contract is being negotiated with the Canadian Pacific Railway company for several thousand tons.

Mr. Cronin said he was much pleased to see lead advancing and when it reached about the \$13 per ton mark, he thought that shipments would be recommended by the St. Eugene.

There is in the neighborhood of 180 men employed at the mine in Frank and the best of feeling prevails between the men and the management, general manager Gobo and assistant manager Henrietta being especially popular. Sutherland, corresponding and financial secretary; David Thomas, conductor; Richard Robinson, treasurer; and A. M. Campbell, warden.

## CLARK VINDICATES BOARD

Denies that They Have Boodled.

## TOOK LEGAL FEES ONLY

"Rumor Has Neither Body to Be Kicked Nor Soul to Be Damned," He Says.

There has been considerable unfavorable criticism lately regarding the actions of the license commissioners and other officials of this district. Two of the three commissioners have already made reply to those attacks. Fred Stork of Fernie had a letter published in the Cranbrook Herald last week, and this week A. T. Clark, the Moyie commissioner, has an ably written letter published in the same paper over his signature. He says in part:

"I wish to state once for all, that I have not been a party to any corruption whatsoever directly or indirectly. That I have not received one cent in money or kind for either granting or refusing any application, and that I am absolutely ignorant of any money having been paid to or taken by any commissioner (other than the legal fee) and further that I do not believe such has been paid to or taken by a commissioner.

"Now, sir, if a denial can be more explicit and absolute than this I desire to make it. You say that 'rumors are floating over the district' and you know, sir, that 'Rumor' has neither body to be kicked nor soul to be damned. It is a despicable and cowardly form of attack. If any one can make any definite charge against the commissioners, collectively or individually, let him come out like a man and expose the evil deed, in the name of honesty, for the love of fair play, and in common justice, I appeal to all. Enough of base insinuation and groundless rumors. Let us now have facts, accusations, specific charges if they can be made, and if not, then the silence which is golden.

"For the benefit of future applicants I may state that the only cost of obtaining a license is the license fee—regulated by scale in the Liquor Act—and if applied for at a special meeting the cost of calling the commissioners together and advertising (this amount being divided among the applicants at such meeting). It is not necessary to make any application through a particular solicitor, or through a solicitor at all. In most cases it is probably advisable for applicants to employ a solicitor to insure the application being in proper form, and in this the applicant must use his own judgment, choose his own solicitor and pay his (the solicitor's) fee, a matter of which the commissioner has no concern or knowledge.

The Leader is pleased to see Mr. Clark come out and declare himself. And this he does in such a manner as to leave no doubts as to his being able to defend his position. Mr. Clark is an old resident of Moyie and South East Kootenay and his reputation for truth and veracity has always been above reproach.

## GENERAL NEWS NOTES.

The Payne mine has installed electric drills.

Lord Strathcona is reported again seriously ill.

Engineer Blakemore says that the Smilkameen Valley coal will give 75 per cent fixed carbon.

C. M. Keep, formerly of Fort Steele, is now proprietor of the First National bank of Kendrick, Idaho.

John L. Sullivan, who is playing Simon Lagree of a Boston production of Uncle Tom, has sent the "Uncle Tom" to the hospital by putting too much realism into the whipping scene.

Constable Wilson, of Kuskonook, took to Nelson on Friday night Edward Moore, who had been taken in charge as a person of unsound mind. The prisoner was brought before Police Magistrate Oresca who remanded him for medical examination. Later he was seen by Drs. LaBan and Hawkey, the result of their examination bring that an order was made out for his admission to the asylum for the insane at New Westminster.

Owing to the extreme cold weather and the freezing of the water in the flumes and the mills nearly every producing mine in the Coeur d'Alenes is closed. At the Warden end of the district the Bunker Hill & Sullivan has entirely suspended operations and will continue shut down until the weather moderates. The last chance, however, continues to run. All the mines are closed in the Mullan district and on Canyon creek. For nearly a week past the thermometer has ranged about the zero point and many times considerably below.

The Canadian Pacific railroad has completed arrangements for building immense locomotive and car works in the east end of Montreal. It is said that 7000 men will be employed and 35 acres of land has been acquired for the site. The company already has locomotive works in that part of the city, but they are entirely insufficient to meet the needs of the system. It has also a number of car shops at various points, but these are to be concentrated at Montreal. It is proposed that every engine and car needed by the road will be built in the future in its own shops.

Mr. Murphy has all the engineers, firemen, conductors and brakemen from Cranbrook to Kootenay Landing and Mr. McKenzie has the line east of Cranbrook to Medicine Hat, and all the station agents on the Crow. It is estimated that their school will last about two months.

TOUGH BILL OF FARE

MESSES THAT ARE SERVED ON BOARD A "MEAN SHIP". Queer Names the Sailors Give to the Unpalatable Food—Dog Chowder, By the Wind Soup, Topgallant Tea and Cow Jipper.
