## GENERAL FLOAT

The Phoenix Pioneer says that one tie making concern in the Boundary is expected to clean up about \$10,000 for the winter's work.

Maxime Phillipps, who is accused of the murder of Montey Lewis, a prostitute, at Blairmore last December, was arrested over in Alberta last week.

The other day in Seattle 2,500 able bodied men marched to the city hall and demanded from the mayor bread and work. Unfortunately the mayor was unable to comply with the demand and those men are on the verge of starvation. Seattle is in bad condition from a commercial standpoint of view, but the citizens live in the hope that times will improve.

If reports are correct, there will be little or no construction work done in this province by the C. P. R. this year. It is generally understood that the company has entered into so many engagements for building lines on the prairie to points occupied by settlers for the taking out of wheat that the company will find its hands sufficiently full and the needs of this province will have to stand over another year.
