RESULT OF ELECTIONS

Held in the Province
on Jan. 15.

ROSS WON IN NELSON

Dean won in Rossland, Schofield in Trail, Archer in Kaslo, McCandless in Victoria.

Nelson, Jan. 16.—Dr. W. O. Ross was elected mayor of Nelson yesterday by a majority of 179 over his opponent, W. W. Beer.

Rossland, Jan. 15.—The municipal elections here today resulted in the election of ex-Alderman John Dean as mayor. J. S. Clute, who ran for a second term, was defeated by 30 majority. The campaign was fought out largely on the gambling question, and mayor elect Dean stands pledged to wipe out professional gambling.

Trail, Jan. 15.—At today's election James Hargrave Schofield, C. P. R. agent, was elected mayor by a majority of 57 votes. One hundred and fifty-one votes were polled.

Kaslo, Jan. 15.—The civic elections which took place here today resulted in the return of F. E. Archer as mayor by majority of 12 over A. T. Garland. Total vote, 190.

Victoria, Jan. 15.—Alderman A. G. McCandless, who has been in the position for three years, was elected mayor in today's municipal elections by a majority of 55 over Charles Hayward, who has been mayor for three years.

GENERAL NEWS NOTES

Items of Interest Se-
lected

FROM ROUND THE WORLD

News Selected from Many
Sources and Compiled
with Pen Scissors
and Paste.

Cranbrook has organized a hockey team.

Moyie is losing \$30,000 a month or \$300,000 annually by the St. Eugene mine being closed down.

The firm of Beale, Hutchison & Elwell will open an office at Morrissey in a few days. Mr. Moffatt, at present in the Cranbrook office, will have charge of that branch.

An order has been issued by the government agent requesting the removal of the tenderloin district in Cranbrook from its present location to the valley west of the hospital.

The recent preliminary exploration of the route of the Kootenay-Central railway indicates that a grade of less than one half of one per cent can be obtained from Elko to Golden.

Financial arrangements are being made to provide \$100,000 to carry forward the building of the Sullivan smelter at Marysville, B. C., and to provide it with working capital. The work of reconstructing the plant will begin early in the spring and should be finished in three months.

A terrific explosion occurred at the Hamilton Powder company's works at Nanaimo Wednesday. George Simonetti, James Fulford and 10 Chinamen were killed. Only one body, that of a Chinaman, was recovered. The others were absolutely blown to fragments.

The gunpowder storage house exploded first, the concussion exploding the gelignite mixing house, 400 feet away, where the greatest loss of life is supposed to have occurred. The ground was excavated to a depth of six feet where the buildings were blown into kindling and scattered with fragments of human flesh over several acres. The trainway was torn up and a length of steel rail twined squarely around a tree, like a whip lash.

MARKETS.

Compiled from The Commercial

Manitoba wheat has been dull but firm this week, and prices have only declined 3c to 4c on the week, as against 1c to 2c decline in United States markets. There is steady demand for wheat, both for nearby and future delivery, and it is only resisted by the unwillingness of farmers to let go of more than they are doing. At the close of business last week prices were: No. 1 hard, 70c; 1 northern, 68c; 2 northern, 67c; 3 northern, 65c. For February delivery: 1 hard, 70c; 1 northern, 68c; 2 northern, 67c; 3 northern, 65c; and for May delivery: 1 hard, 74c; 1 northern, 72c; 2 northern, 70c; and 3 northern, 68c, all in store Fort William, Port Arthur or Duluth.

FLOUR.—Demand is active and prices steady. Best Hungarian Patent is worth \$2 per sack of 98 lbs. delivered to the trade; Glenora patent, \$1.85; strong bakers, \$1.55; and XXXX at \$1.25.

MILLFEED.—Bran is quoted at \$15 per ton in sacks and shorts, at \$17 per ton.

OATS.—The price of oats keeps high notwithstanding the current belief that stocks in farmers' hands are very large. Car shortage is the principal reason given for continued high prices, and no doubt this has a good deal to do with it. If transportation were easy to obtain, distribution would be free and prices lower. While there is a good demand for oats there is also a large supply, and an outside market will have to be found for some of these. This will probably be forthcoming, as already some inquiries have been received from foreign ports and at least one large order placed. No. 2 white oats are worth 28c per bushel, at Fort William. On track at Winnipeg this grade is worth 27 to 28 cents per bushel, and about 25c is the price for feed white. At country points farmers are getting 20c per bushel at central points.

BALLETY.—The market has declined as local brewers have about all the barley they want at present. The best price they offer today is 28c for No. 3 extra in carlots on track. Feed barley is worth 25 to 26c.

FLAXSEED.—Market nominal.

SPELTZ.—The market holds steady at 30c per bushel of 50 pounds, delivered in Winnipeg.

HAY.—Feathers are paying 86 to \$6.50 per ton for carlots on track.

POTATOES.—35c per bushel.

BUTTER.—Creamery—Creameries are asking 26c per pound from city customers for choice makes.

BUTTER.—Dairy—Very little butter is coming in and the market is quiet at unchanged prices. Dealers are paying 21c per pound net at Winnipeg for dairy separator butter in bricks, and 14 to 17c net for choice tub butter.

CHEESE.—The price is firm at 13 to 15c per pound.

EGGS.—Eggs are scarce and have advanced to 22c per dozen, net, in Winnipeg, subject to candling.

PIESSESSED POULTRY.—Dealers are offering in a wholesale way 10c per pound for chickens, dressed; 9c to 10c for ducks and geese, and 15c for turkeys.

PIESSESSED MEATS.—Beef, city dressed, 6 to 6½ per pound; country stock, 4½ under these figures; mutton, 8 to 9c; lamb, 11½; hogs, 7c.

HIDES.—Country frozen hides are bringing from 6c to 6½ per pound, delivered at Winnipeg, less 5 pounds tare, sheep pelts, 50 to 60c.

WOOL.—Market nominal.

SENECA ROOT.—Last purchases were made at 58c per pound for clean dry root, delivered at Winnipeg.

LIVE STOCK.

CATTLE.—The market is quiet. Finest steers are worth 4c; butchers' ordinary, 3½c, and from that down to 2c according to quality. There is nothing doing in stocker cattle.

SWINE.—Worth 3½c per pound on cars here. Lambs, 4½ to 4c.

HOGS.—The market is unchanged at 6c per pound for hogs weighing from 100 to 200 pounds. Heavies and lights are worth 4 to 1c less.

MILCH COWS.—There are very few milkers to be had, and prices are firm at \$30 to \$45 each, for such as are to be had, according to quality.

HORSES.—There is a good demand.

TRADE.—Trade is now confined to a limited demand for general purpose horses, for which prices still rule high. Good teams of work horses are worth \$300 to \$400, according to weight and quality.

If the Liberal party will not give an increased duty on lead, then the people will have to look to the Conservatives for relief. If the Liberals wish to ent any figure in British Columbia at the next general Dominion election they will enact legislation favorable to the wishes of the residents of this province.

Trail is very indignant.

Trail, Jan. 13.—The statements of Smith Curtis, member of the provincial legislature for this district, as set forth in the pamphlet issued by him, were repudiated and roundly denounced as antagonistic to the welfare of the lead industry at a largely attended mass meeting here this evening.

The sentiments expressed in resolutions to the trade and labor council brought out a great number of the laboring class, and a resolution on the subject was passed with enthusiasm.

Omitting a lengthy preamble, the resolution is as follows:

Resolved, that we, the citizens of Trail, in mass meeting assembled, do hereby repudiate absolutely the pamphlet in question, and condemn the motives which prompted it, that we do heartily endorse the action of the silver-lead miners whose interests we believe to be identical with ours, and we do further urge upon the Dominion government the necessity of granting such duties as the silver-lead miners have suggested, thereby placing our mines on as least as good a basis as those in foreign countries working under similar conditions, particularly those to the south of us, in Idaho and Montana.

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
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
