MEMBERSHIP REARRANGED

Redistribution Bill Introduced.

WILL MAKE CHANGES

Victoria Retains Four and Vancouver Gets Five. Esquimalt Loses a Member.

Victoria, March 20.—The redistribution bill submitted today increased the members of the house to 42. Victoria retains 4 and Vancouver gets 5. South Victoria and Vancouver island are united and part of North Victoria is merged into Saanich, while all islands of the gulf are made into the Islands constituency. North and South Nanaimo become Newcastle. Esquimalt loses a member. Nanaimo City, Alberni, Cowichan and Comox remain the same as before. Delta, Chilliwack, Dewdney, Richmond and New Westminster has each a representation of one, while Cassiar is divided into Alton and Skeena, with a member each. Cariboo retains two while the remaining ridings are: Lillooet, two ridings combine; Yale, Kamloops, Okanagan, Similkameen, Greenwood, Grand Forks, Ymir, Revelstoke, Stocan, Nelson City, Rossland City, Kaslo, Columbia, Cranbrook and Fernie. It is believed to be generally fair, although an increase in representation is regarded as a step in the wrong direction. The opposition will likely hold for a reduction in committee, while approving the general principle of redistribution.

THEY CLEARED \$41.40

Money will Be Used in Purchasing Hose Cart and Other Necessary Equipment.

One of the most successful dances ever held in the town was given by the Moyie Fire Brigade on the 17th of March in the Odd Fellows hall. The boys left no stone unturned to make the affair a success, and thanks to the generous assistance of Messrs. Soper, Reid and Couborn the dance surpassed anything of the kind given in the town this season.

A large number were present, and the best of music being furnished by Miss Soper and Mr. Harry Schorlemmer, the light fantastic was well tripped by all them present, young as well as old. At 12 o'clock a light lunch was served, after which dancing was resumed and kept up until the early morning hours when all went home well satisfied with having passed a most enjoyable evening.

The object of the dance was to raise money to purchase a hose cart and other necessary articles for the brigade and the affair was a success both socially and financially as \$41.40 were cleared after all expenses were paid. The necessary equipment will be purchased immediately when Moyie will have one of the best fire departments in the Kootenays.

Legally Dead, Cannot Wed.

St. Paul, March 18.—Jim Younger wishes to marry. He cannot, because legally he is dead; and hence unable to enter into any contract. Younger submitted the question of whether or not he could marry to Governor Van Sant, who has looked into the matter with surprising results. In Minnesota a man who is a life prisoner is civilly dead. The only way he can make any binding contract, in the eyes of the law, is through the board which paroled him—in this case the state board of control—which board is empowered to enter into a contract for him. It is not probable, however, that the three members of the board of control, separately or as a whole, will agree to enter into any marriage contract with any woman for the benefit of the paroled life convict.

Fight Ended a Draw.

In the fight between Jim Burrows and Coolgardie Smith at Fernie last Monday evening it was decided by Referee Tuttle to call it a draw, both men being on their feet at the end of the 20th round. The contest was the best ever witnessed in East Kootenay. It is said to have been strictly on the square and both men went in to win. Burrows was in much the better condition at the end and held his own well throughout the fight. It is said that Smith figured on making some easy money, but was badly disappointed.

It is again rumored that the Gooderham-Blackstock syndicate, is negotiating for the purchase of the Trail smelter.

C. A. Gregg formerly of the Rossland Miner may go to Nelson in connection with a newspaper enterprise there.

Tuesday the Northport Smelting & Refining Company paid to its employees \$50,000, which amount was due for salaries during the month of February.

It is announced that the Northern Pacific road is soon to erect a magnificent station in the city of Butte, Mont. The Great Northern trains may also use the new depot.

A ghost of a man of prodigious height is causing trouble to the engineers and switchmen in the railway yards at Anaconda, Mont. They have tried running over him but the experiment only seems to make him more full of devilry, says the Butte Miner.

The Spanish Gazette, at Madrid publishes a decree establishing an eight hour day for all working people on the state domains and in the state mines, workshops, etc., and providing that each hour of overtime is to be paid for at the rate of one eighth of the daily wages.

An exchange says that Chicago unionists charge that railroads centering in that city refuse to hire men in their shops who have reached the age 45 and sometimes 55 and that they actually discharge men of that age because they can secure younger men who are presumed to be more active.

Half a million of London's poor will be the guests of King Edward during coronation week. His majesty has notified the mayors of the metropolis that the sum of £30,000 was placed at their disposal and he invited them to make the necessary arrangements to entertain the very poor to the number of 500,000 at a dinner in celebration of his coronation.

The Nelson Tribune is in the hands of the sheriff, the Nelson Miner is offered for sale by the Imperial bank, the Sandon Mining Review is worrying along between life and death on government paper, and the Lardeau Eagle is looking for a purchaser. The newspaper biz in the Kootenay has its cares and sorrows, remarks the Sandon Paystreak.

Miss Stone, that strong minded old maid with missionary motives whose name has been so prominently before the public for some months past as the hostage of Bulgarian brigands, is about to make a cool \$10,000 out of her little experience. An American publishing firm, it is said, has made a contract with her for this amount for the exclusive rights to her narrative.

James Wilks, president of Nelson; Rupert, Bulmer, vice-president, of Rossland; Alfred Parr, secretary-treasurer, of Ymir, district association No. 6, of the Western Federation of Miners, have issued a call for a convention to be held in Kamloops on Monday, April 14th. The object of the convention is to decide whether the labor and reform interests shall take an active part in politics.

The Board of Examiners who have been examining the miners at Fernie for some time as to fitness for their position report up to the present four hundred and twenty applicants of whom three hundred and ninety three have been successful and twenty seven have failed, of those who have failed twenty four are foreigners. Mr. Barton, examiner, is authority for the statement that since the first crowd was placed, the Slavs have apparently been under an instructor who has drilled them so thoroughly that they have their lesson by heart and can say them off without waiting for the examiner to ask the questions.

Taking Out Ties.

Crow's Nest Coal Co.'s Annual Report. The fifth annual meeting of the shareholders of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal company was held in Toronto on March 7th.

The net profit of the year after paying all operating expense and all charge of every kind amounted to \$207,848.39. After paying a dividend at the rate of ten per cent per annum, a balance of \$28,142.89 was carried forward to the credit of profit and loss.

The number of men employed during the year was 1,312.

Six hundred and thirty six coke ovens have been constructed, with a capacity of 1,000 tons of coke per day.

During the year the company expended the sum of \$2,265,548.06. The payroll amounted to \$911,407.15. Expenditure for freight was \$346,092.41. The company's operations are progressing satisfactorily, under the management of an efficient staff, and still more satisfactory results will be shown at the end of the present year.

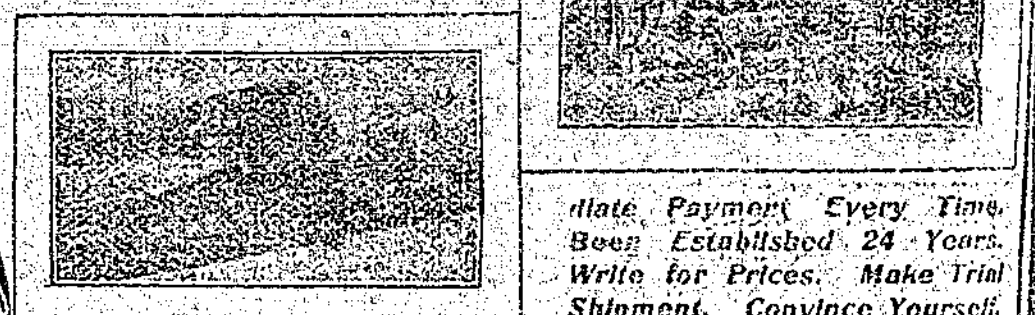
