Had Big Meeting.

Tuesday night Morley hall was filled to the doors to hear the questions of the day discussed by speakers on behalf of the Dominion candidates. John A. B. Macdonald acted as chairman, and in his opening remarks touched slightly upon the important features of the campaign, and took occasion to refer to the widespread feeling of indignation amongst the electors at the election being postponed.

Thomas Caven of Cranbrook was the first speaker on behalf of Mr. Goodve and while thanking the voters of Moyie for the splendid support they had given him in the contest, expressed the hope that they would do as well for Mr. Goodve. He criticized the action of the Liberal party with respect to the laboring interests and pointed out the evil effects of the Lemieux act.

J. A. Macdonald, leader of the local opposition, opened his address on behalf of Smith Curtis by a violent attack on Mr. Goodve for his actions during the troubles in Rossland in 1900. He made a labored defense of the actions of the Liberal party with respect to oriental immigration.

T. E. Kelly, on behalf of Mr. Davidson, refrained from making a speech on his behalf, and explained that the Socialists would hold two meetings in Moyie during the week, namely on Thursday and Saturday, and that Mr. Hawthornthwaite would be present at the last meeting.

W. A. Macdonald, K. O. was then called upon and in an address of two hours dealt fully with the important features of the campaign. He pointed out that the Conservative party was now as before the general election of October 26th, advocating measures which had special reference to the betterment of conditions in British Columbia. He completely disposed of the attack made by J. A. Macdonald on Mr. Goodve by stating that in Moyie at a public meeting Smith Curtis had admitted that Mr. Goodve had only done what any other person of good judgement would have done under the circumstances.

The actions of the Liberal party with respect to Asiatic immigration was then contrasted with the Conservative record. It was pointed out that with respect to the Japanese treaty the Conservative party was on record as opposed to the adoption of the treaty, except with proper restrictions upon immigration similar to those contained in the treaty between Japan and the United States. And this stand of the Conservative party was officially evidenced by an order in council passed on the 3rd day of August, 1895.

Better terms was also dealt with at considerable length and the importance of showing to the rest of Canada that our province was not satisfied with the treatment it was receiving.

The Lemieux act was severely criticized as being unfair and unworkable, and the action of Mr. Borden in moving a resolution to have the bill sent to a committee was a proper move and after events have shown that this course should have been pursued. But Mr. Lemieux, minister of labor was bound to press forward the bill for adoption, giving as one of the reasons that large concerns in western Canada had written to him asking that the bill should be passed immediately so as to be in force to operate against strikes that were then threatened, and having control of the majority in the house the act was passed.

Mr. Macdonald then dealt with many other subjects. In closing his address quoted the expressive words of Chris Foley recently uttered in Vancouver and more expressly referring to laborers: "In the name of God, and children yet unborn, I implore you get together and teach the Liberal government that your interests must not be trampled on. Oust these political hypocrites that govern Canada."

The meeting closed with cheers for Mr. Goodve.

A New Bakery.

H. A. Deagon, who recently purchased the building formerly occupied by MacEachern & Macdonald as a store, is getting his bakery ready as quickly as he can. Already he is turning out some bread to supply the stores, but it will probably be a week or two until he gets his fixtures installed and will be prepared for the general trade. The bakery will have a capacity of 300 loaves a day. Mr. Deagon intends making his loaves "standards" size, weighing one and a half pounds and they will be retailed at 10 cents straight.

Mine Looking Good.

The Black Horse mine in the Cour d'Alenes is said to be looking better every day. The cross-cut tunnel which cuts the vein at a vertical depth of 803 feet is opening up an immense body of very good ore. The company at present is making a contract with the smelter to ship two cars of crude ore a day commencing about the first of the year. The ore runs 75 per cent lead and 18 ounces in silver to the ton.
